Fort Worth, Texas, March 4th, 1917.

To the officers and members of R. E. Lee Camp, U.C.V:

Your committee brings these memorial datas as to our late comrade James C. Young, a long life resident of Tarrant County, but at his death, January 9th, 1917 resided in Kansas City, Missouri

The remains were brought here and buried by the side of his old friends and kins people who had gone on before. The following survive him, his wife, Mrs. H. S. Wolfson, a resident of Kansas City, Misses Pearl and Carrie Young, C. B. (Melvin) Young, and Mrs. D. H. Poindexter, of Fort Worth, Texas.

Our comrade was born in Higginsville Missouri, January 8th, 1847, thus reaching his three score and ten years and one day.

His uncle attained the rank of Major in the Confederate army for gallant and meritorious conduct.

He was a son of Howard Young who settled in Fort Worth when it was a fort on the ~~saxtix~~ frontier under Major Ripley Arnold as far back as 1852.

His descriptive list as taken from our camp roll as to his services in the confederate army, reads that in 1863 he enlisted in company H. Hills regiment, Throckmortons brigade Texas troops Trans Mississippi department; with head quarters at Decatur Texas, where they succeeded in driving away the marauding Indians who were very dangerous and troublesome, and thus they preformed an important and indispensible duty of protecting the helpless ones, while their fathers and brothers were in the confederate army.

After the war was over he surrendered with his command at
Deaatur, Texas.

Our comrade was a long while deputy sheriff under various sheriffs of Tarrant County and was widely known as a brave and efficient officer in the line of his duty.

His father kept a hospitable board around which gathered his children and friends in the days of frontier life, when the latch string hung out to each passer-by without money and without price, and was presided over by his good wife, who was ~~noted~~ noted for her beauty and sprightliness of mind. Our comrade married Miss Tannehill, also one of the pioneer families, the mother of his children.

We mourn his loss sincerely and extend our sympathies to the bereaved.
