LUBBOCK -- Paul H. Randolph, professor of information systems and quantitative sciences in the College of Business Administration at Texas Tech University, recently received his second Fulbright grant to teach and conduct research at the Middle East Technical University in Ankara, Turkey.

Randolph will depart for Turkey in July to teach management courses during the summer. During the fall semester he will teach management through the department of industrial engineering.

Randolph was a Fulbright grant recipient from 1990-91, where he served as a visiting professor at METU. He first was invited to teach for one year at METU during the 1970s by the United States Agency for International Development.

Randolph is one of approximately 2,000 American Fulbright faculty members who will travel abroad during the 1995-96 academic year. The Fulbright Program, which was established in 1946 under congressional legislation introduced by former Sen. J. William Fulbright of Arkansas, is administered by the U.S. Information Agency. The program annually awards 5,000 grants to American students, teachers and scholars to study, teach and conduct research around the world, and to foreign nationals to engage in similar activities in the United States.

More than 200,000 people worldwide have participated in the program, which is funded by more than 41 foreign governments and the United States.

Randolph's research expertise at Texas Tech focuses on production and operations management. He will return to Texas Tech in July 1996.

Randolph joined the faculty of the College of Business Administration at Texas Tech in 1981. Prior to coming to Texas Tech, he was employed at Mobil Research and Development Corporation in Princeton, N.J., and had served as a vice president at The Chase-Manhattan Bank. He has been a faculty member at several universities, including Iowa State University, New Mexico State University, Purdue University and Illinois Institute of Technology. Additionally, Randolph has been a visiting professor at the University of Heidelberg in Germany and the University of Oslo in Norway.

Randolph received his bachelor's degree in mathematics in 1948, and a master's degree in statistics in 1949, both from the University of Minnesota. He earned a doctoral degree in statistics with a minor in industrial engineering in 1955, also from the University of Minnesota.

LUBBOCK -- Wayne Bailey recently was named director of the School of Music at Texas Tech University. Bailey will begin his new duties in late August.

Bailey is presently chairman of the department of music at East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, Tenn. Robert E. Henry, assistant professor and associate director of the School of Music, has served as interim director since January when Dean Wayne Hobbs returned to full-time teaching.

"He has excellent credentials in performance and scholarship as well as administration, and he has taught music at all levels," said Jane Winer, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. "I am especially looking forward to the contributions he will make to our interdisciplinary fine arts doctoral program, where he will interact closely with our new theatre and dance chair as well as the strong art and philosophy programs," Winer said.

Prior to his current post, Bailey was a faculty member at the University of Colorado in Boulder, Colo. He began as an associate director of bands in 1982 then served as chairman of music education from 1986 to 1993. Bailey served as assistant dean of the College of Music from 1989 to 1993.

The Iowa native also served from 1980 to 1982 as director of bands and instructor of trumpet at Hastings College in Hastings, Neb. Bailey also taught at Alabama State University in Montgomery, Ala., and Howell Public School in Howell, Mich.

Bailey received a bachelor of music education in 1977 from Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa, a master's degree in music in 1978 from the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, Mich., and a doctorate of musical arts with an emphasis on instrumental conducting in 1986 from the University of Colorado in Boulder, Colo.

LUBBOCK -- Jason Allan Becker, a Pampa native who graduated in May from Texas Tech University with a master's degree in accounting has won first place in the Beta Alpha Psi graduate manuscript contest.

LUBBOCK -- Thomas A. Langford recently was named dean of the Graduate School at Texas Tech University. Langford, currently associate dean of the Graduate School, will assume his new position Sept. 1 for the 1995-96 academic year. A new dean will be named after a national search.

Langford replaces Clyde Hendrick, professor of psychology, who is returning to the full-time teaching and research. The announcement was made by Executive Vice President and Provost Donald R. Haragan.

"I'm glad that Dr. Langford, with his extensive administrative experience, has agreed to guide the Graduate School through the coming year," said Haragan. "I'm sure he will continue the excellent work of his predecessor and set a positive tone for the future of the school and his successor."

Langford began his professional career as an English instructor at Charles Page High School in Sand Springs, Okla. He was a fellow in the U.S. Office of Education in Washington, D.C., for one year before joining the English faculty at Texas Tech in 1968. In that year, he was appointed assistant dean of the Graduate School. He served as interim dean of the Graduate School in 1970-71 and has been associate dean since that time.

Langford was the recipient of the 1991 President's Award from the Association of Texas Graduate Schools and in 1992 received the Distinguished Faculty Leadership Award at Texas Tech.

Langford received a bachelor's degree in English in 1956 from the University of California at Riverside, a master's degree in English in 1963 from Texas Tech and a doctorate in English in 1967 from Texas Christian University. His teaching and research have been in Victorian literature and the poetry of John Milton.

LUBBOCK -- John M. Burns, professor of biological sciences and chairman of the department for the past eight years, will assume the position of vice provost for academic affairs at Texas Tech University Sept. 1.

Burns will replace C. Len Ainsworth who announced his resignation earlier this year to serve as a part-time faculty member in Texas Tech's College of Education and as director of the university's Junction campus in South Texas.

According to Donald R. Haragan, executive vice president and provost at Texas Tech, "Dr. Burns represents the kind of academic leadership that is key to the position because he successfully finds ways to blend the university's commitment to both undergraduate teaching and research opportunities for all students."

Burns said, "I look forward to continuing the superb efforts of Len Ainsworth and hope to expand the contributions from the Office of the Executive Vice President and Provost. My strong background as a faculty member and interest in undergraduate teaching will help me to increase the university's reputation and emphasis on the undergraduate experience."

Burns directs the Clark Scholars Program, an eight-week summer venture that teams exceptional college bound high school students with university professors in intensive research endeavors. The program is in its fifth year of operation.

He also is director and co-director of the Howard Hughes Medical Institute program on campus. The program, funded since 1992 by grants totaling \$2.3 million, emphasizes undergraduate research opportunities and science programs for K-12 teachers.

Burns is the recipient of the Outstanding Teaching Award from the Junior Panhellenic Association, 1975; Amoco Distinguished Teaching Award, 1980; Arts and Sciences Council Outstanding Teaching and Service Award, 1980; Mortar Board Outstanding Teaching Award, 1981; Omicron Delta Kappa Outstanding Teaching and Service Award, 1981; the President's Excellence in Teaching Award, 1986; and the Faculty Distinguished Leadership Award from the Dads and Moms Association, 1992.

Burns, a Hobbs, N.M., native, earned a bachelor's degree in education with a major in chemistry in 1963, and a master's degree in biology and microbiology in 1969, both from New Mexico State University. He received a doctoral degree in zoology and endocrinology in 1969 from Indiana University at Bloomington. Burns also served as an endocrinology research fellow at the Mayo Medical School in Rochester, Minn., from 1976-1977.

LUBBOCK -- Courses for Emergency Medical Services personnel will be offered in seven West Texas towns by the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center during the fall semester.

The 16-week courses for persons interested in Emergency Medical Technician-Basic (EMT-Basic) training will begin Aug. 15 in Crosbyton, Aug. 21 in Slaton and Aug. 22 in Lubbock.

EMT-Intermediate courses will start Aug. 22 in Tahoka, and Aug. 21 in Lubbock and Denver City. Training for the Emergency Care Attendant designation begins Aug. 8 in West Carlisle and Aug. 22 in Wolfforth.

Successful completion of the EMT-Basic courses in Slaton, Crosbyton and Lubbock will result in certification as an EMT-Basic. Completion of the intermediate courses in Denver City, Tahoka and Lubbock leads to certification as an EMT-Intermediate. Those finishing the Emergency Care Attendant courses in Wolfforth and Denver City will be certified as Emergency Care Attendants.

Cost of the EMT-Basic courses is \$300 plus books. The intermediate courses are \$600 plus books. The Emergency Care Attendant course costs \$150 plus books.

The EMT- Basic course in Lubbock will be offered 6-10 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays through Dec. 14. Caron McMillian, EMT-P, will teach the classes. The EMT-Intermediate courses will be offered 6-10 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays through Dec. 11. Neil Coker, EMT-P, will be the course instructor.

In Crosbyton, the course will be offered 6-10 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays through Dec. 7. Scott Murray, EMT-P, is the instructor.

The Slaton course will be offered from 6-10 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays through Dec. 18. Doug Smallwood, EMT-P, is the lead instructor.

In Tahoka the course will be from 6-10 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays through Dec. 12. David Harbour, EMT-P, and Chris Black, EMT-P, will co-teach the classes.

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The Denver City course will be taught by Chris Black, EMT-P, from 6-10 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays through Dec. 11.

LUBBOCK-- One more member of the School of Nursing faculty at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center has been named a fellow of the American Academy of Nursing.

Nancy Ridenour, R.N., Ph.D., will be officially inducted at the academy's annual meeting Nov. 9 in Washington, D.C. She joins Dean Pat S. Yoder Wise, R.N., Ed.D., and Helen Cox, R.N., Ed.D., as the third honoree from the Health Sciences Center since 1992. Other fellows from the School of Nursing are Ana Valadez, R.N., Ed.D.; Susan Pollock, R.N., Ph.D.; and Myrna Armstrong, R.N., Ed.D.

Fellows are named nationally for outstanding contributions to the nursing profession. The designation is the academy's highest professional honor.

Ridenour has been on the Texas Tech nursing faculty since 1981. She served from 1984 until 1990 as associate dean for practice programs and practice development. She was associate dean for graduate programs from 1990 to 1995.

Ridenour, who currently is the associate dean for education, was one of 31 primary care providers selected to participate on a national health care task force with Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala in 1993.

She has done extensive research and practice in rural and under-served areas of the United States as well as the People's Republic of China, Peru, Jordan and Egypt.
