Thank you for your letter of April 18, 1983, regarding the merit selection of judges. We share your concern for the inclusion of more Mexican-American judges, as well as for the inclusion of more black judges and women judges, on the Texas bench. We are not in favor of creating a merit selection based on wealthy-white-male virtues, whatever those virtues might be. Do wealthy, white males have virtues that the rest of us do not have? We do not want any of our judges to be chosen on the basis of wealth, color, sex, party affiliation, good looks or charm. We want judges to be chosen on the basis of their legal education, training, and knowledge; on their experience with the law; on their ethical standards and their reputation in their communities for intelligence, integrity, and character.

The League of Women Voters of Texas believes that we have a better chance to get the best judges through the process we support than through regular competitive, partisan, expensive elections. The process we support is appointment by the governor from a short list of nominees screened and evaluated and recommended by a nominating commission followed by a non-partisan, non-competitive retention election at the end of each term.

Let me tell you about a couple of recent judicial races in Harris County. One of our most admired (by the legal profession) Mexican-American judges lost his place because of his party affiliation. Another fine Mexican-American judge running for an appellate judgeship garnered a large majority of votes in his home county but lost the election because his excellent qualifications were not known to the voters in the rest of the appellate judicial district. I don't believe that the results would have been the same in either of these cases if the merit selection process had been in place.

We hope that you will reconsider merit selection of judges and that we can work together to acquire the finest judges possible for our Texas courts. We

are confident that the finest judges would include women, Mexican-Americans, and blacks. Goodness, honesty, intelligence, wisdom, integrity are not qualities pertaining solely to white males.

- (b) Notice and hearing shall be provided in the same manner as provided for creation of a district in Sections 52.025 and 52.025 of this chapter.
- (c) If the commission finds that the proposed merger is feasible and beneficial, it shall hold an election on the proposition for merger in each of the districts in the same manner provided by Sec. 52.029 for a confirmation election.
- (d) If the proposition for merger is approved by a majority of those voting in the election, the commission shall issue an order creating the new district and providing for the election or appointment of its directors. The commission shall also issue orders dissolving the districts that have been merged and providing for the disposition of their assets and the discharge of their obligations.



- (e) If the proposition for dissolution is approved by a majority of those voting in the election, the commission shall issue an order dissolving the district and providing for the disposition of the assets of the district and the discharge of the obligations of the district.
- Sec. 52.502. INCLUSION IN A NEW DISTRICT. (a) The petition for creation of a district under Sec. 52.023 of this chapter may include a proposal for dissolution of an existing district that is located within the area of the proposed district.
- (b) The ballot proposition for confirmation of a district under Sec. 52.029 of this chapter may include the dissolution of an existing district.

(c) If the proposition for creation of a district and for dissolution of an existing district is approved by a majority of those voting in the election, the commission shall issue an order dissolving the existing district and providing for the disposition of its assets and the discharge of its obligations.

SEGTION-3.

- SECTION 4. (a) The owner of a water well that comes under commission jurisdiction and that is in existence on January 1, 1985, shall register the well with the department no later than March 1, 1985. By the same date, the owner of such a well shall pay to the department the fee required by Sec. 13.073 of this code for operation of the well during 1984.
- (b) The owner of a water well in a district listed in Subsection (c) of Section 13.052 of this code for which a permit is required under Section 52 of this code and for which a permit has not previously been issued by the district shall register the well with the district no later than September 1, 1984.

AID TO FAMILIES WITH DEPENDENT CHILDREN

Welfare. . . .income assistance. . . .something for nothing. Nothing conjures up more negative thoughts and attitudes than these few words. The myths of welfare riches prevail over factual knowledge of poverty. The reality is that Texas has only one cash assistance program for families with needy children. And it is only for single-parent or caretaker families. The monthly payment is so low that the basic Aid-to-Families-with-Dependent-Children grant for three persons provides only 18% of the income nationally defined as poverty level. The destitute Texas child receives \$34.51 a month. That is the welfare that Texas dollars finance. It is hardly the road to riches.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) is a public assistance program for poor families with needy children. It is administered in accordance with federal regulations and is jointly funded by federal and state governments. AFDC provides direct monthly cash grants to children deprived of the support of one or both parents. The remaining parent or related caretaker also receives assistance. In Texas, two-parent families do not qualify except when one parent is incapacitated.

To be eligible, the AFDC child must be under age 18 (unless he or she is a full-time student expecting to graduate before age 19), be a United States citizen or a permanent U.S. resident, and be a member of a family with limited resources and income. Children of illegal aliens are not eligible. The family may not have more than \$1,000 in assets or resources, not counting its home, nor more than \$1,500 equity in an automobile. Income limits used for AFDC eligibility are based on a standard of need. The current Texas AFDC need standard, which is the lowest of any state, is determined by the cost of the basic needs of housing, utilities, transportation, clothing and personal care in 1969.

Texas uses only 70% of the 1969 standard of need as the basis for its montly AFDC payments. As a consequence, Texas ranks 49th among the states in the amount of AFDC payments provided.

A destitute Texas parent with two children (average AFDC family size is 2.2 children) can be given a maximum basic AFDC grant of \$118 per month, but the average monthly payment per recipient in FY 1982 is \$34.51. In recent years, after much effort by the League of

Women Voters and other advocacy groups, the Texas Legislature approved special payments to each AFDC child for school expenses and other special needs. In 1982, \$110 has been given to each AFDC child - \$55 in January and \$55 in August. However, the Federal Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981 requires that these lump-sum payments be counted as income in determining AFDC eligibility. All AFDC families will be adversely affected: either they will become ineligible for one or two months following the special payment or their AFDC grants will be reduced by the amount of the special payment. Because of this situation, funding for the lump-sum special payment will not be requested for FY 1984/1985. Rather, the Department of Human Resources (DHR) will propose to the Texas Legislature that the special payments be incorporated in the basic grant figure for the 1984-1985 budget.

All AFDC children and their caretakers are eligible for Medicaid, and most are eligible for food stamps and fuelbill assistance. Excluding Medicaid, which does not provide spendable income, an AFDC family of three — a mother and two children with no other income — could receive the maximum monthly benefits of \$316. At present, only 1% of AFDC children receive the maximum payment.

Each family must report income and expenses on a

monthly schedule. If the family has earned income, pensions, unemployment compensation, Social Security, etc., the monthly AFDC payment is reduced accordingly. A parent with two children cannot have a gross income of more than \$252.00 a month to be eligible for AFDC. That figure is 150% of the standard of need. The parent or caretaker must sign all rights to child-support payments to the state and cooperate with the state in efforts to collect child support. If employed full-time, the parent or caretaker may take deductions of up to \$75 per month for work-related expenses, as well as up to \$160 a month per child for child-care costs. If not employed, an AFDC parent must register for the Work Incentive Program (WIN); however, a person with preschool children or who is unable to work is exempt. WIN will be terminated at the end of 1982 and may be replaced by one of various federal employment proposals.

The Texas Department of Human Resources (DHR) administers the state's AFDC program. In FY 1982, the state provided \$42 million for monthly grants and the federal government's share was \$75 The state's portion for basic grants was 6% of the DHR annual budget. (The total state budget for the 1982-83 biennium is \$26.6 billion.) The special payments will raise the state's allocations to AFDC to \$64 million this year. The state and federal governments share all administrative costs equally. Because the number of AFDC families is projected to increase, the DHR will request \$79.98 for basic grants, including special payments, for 1985. That will be precariously close to the \$80 million ceiling in the Texas Constitution for annual state expenditures for AFDC benefits.

Despite the stringent AFDC eligibility requirements, almost 94,000 Texas families are expected to qualify in 1982, which means that approximately 200,000 Texas children could be living on AFDC grants. Who are these people? Contrary to popular beliefs and prejudices, these recipients are not able-bodied loafers with large families who refuse to work and who receive huge monthly checks


from the government. Of AFDC adults, 95% are head-of-household women with children, usually two, whose total maximum benefits are less than half the national poverty-level income. Of AFDC children, 40% are under the age of six and 38% are between the ages of six and twelve. Most of their mothers or caretakers do not have a high school diploma or job skills. One-third have eight years or less of education. Day care and transportation are critical problems. The average family remains on the state rolls about 54 months while the children are small. Two-thirds do not return after withdrawing. The family is usually black (44%) or hispanic (41%), while 14% are anglo.

Although Texas AFDC payments are absurdly low and at best a guarantee of extreme poverty, the AFDC family does have medical care, special payments for school expenses, and usually food stamps. There are three and a quarter million Texans who are not poor enough to qualify for AFDC but who are living substantially below the national poverty level of \$7,760 (non-farm, 3 persons). One out of every four Texas children lives in poverty — counting AFDC children, the number amounts to more than one and a quarter million.

The three poorest Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas in the country, based on per capita personal income, are in Texas. Reality is grim for all these people. The sagging economy does not promise more or better jobs. Recent federal budget cuts will severely hurt the working poor and their families. Block grants of federal funds for social services, health services, child abuse protection, day care, nutrition programs, job training, education, etc., have been consolidated and considerably reduced. The number of food stamp recipients has been reduced by 6% in Texas and the federal housing subsidies for both new construction and rental assistance are very limited. It is not likely that the Texas Legislature will appropriate state money to replace all the lost federal dollars.

Thus, neglected by the state's laissez faire and by its paucity of assistance, the poverty-stricken child's plight in Texas grows worse. It is unconscionable but true.



HERE ARE THE **FUNDAMENTAL DO'S**

- DO make your letter legible. Type if possible.
- DO be concise and brief. Write about only one issue.
- DO use your own words. Don't let anyone else write your letter.
- DO sign your name legibly and give vour address.
- **DO** address him correctly, using the accepted forms.
- **DO** be courteous and reasonable.
- DO write to give him your appreciation when he does something of which you approve.
- **DO** write early in the discussion of a subject.
- **DO** feel free to write committee chairmen or a member of a committee not from your District.

The purpose of the League of Women Voters is to encourage political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government.

DON'T send a carbon copy to your Second Senator or Representative. Write each individually.

DON'T write to the members of the House when the bill is still being considered in the Senate, and vice versa.

DON'T ignore your legislator and write to one from another District.

You can send a 15-word telegram called a Public Opinion Message (P.O.M.) to the President, Vice President or congressman from anywhere in the United States for only \$1.00. Your name and address are not counted as part of the message unless there are additional signers. The same rate applies to wires sent to your governor and state legislators.

The League of Women Voters of Texas appreciates many of the decisions of the Sunset Advisory Commission, but we urge you to reconsider your decision to transfer the management of the hazardous industrial solid waste program from the Texas Department of Water Resources to the Texas Department of We do not believe such a move would improve the state's ability to protect public health and the environment. However, additional resources for the Texas Department of Health to perform health-related assessments and routine evaluation of permit applications for their health implications would advance protection of public health. Leaving the hazardous waste program in TDWR would provide some constancy while hazardous waste regulations are in flux due to recent reauthorization of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA). The League believes that we benefit from having TDWR manage the environmental program while having TDH available to monitor public health impacts. In this fashion, we take advantage of the different skills and experience unique to each agency.

Consolidation of the hazardous waste program in TDWR (since that agency already manages 90% of the program) was discussed extensively by the Siting Committee of the Governor's Task Force on Hazardous Waste Management. A task force recommendation that the Legislature study consolidation of various types was made because committee members agreed with TDH that such a change has widespread implications and required more in-depth study than the task force could undertake.

The League strongly believes that Texas must have an effective and efficient program to manage its hazardous waste in order to protect public health and the environment while allowing for economic growth. TDWR has been developing expertise in the industrial waste area much as TDH has done in the municipal solid waste area. Transferring the hazardous waste program would disrupt a management system during the critical time that over 90% of the state's hazardous waste facilities are being considered for permits for the first time. It is crucial that we determine whether these facilities can meet new protective standards in a timely and thorough fashion. A transfer of jurisdiction would seriously disrupt this process.

Permitting hazardous waste management facilities is a costly, time-consuming process for all, and most people are supportive of efforts to consolidate and simplify the process. Transferring jurisdiction to TDH is the antithesis of such consolidation for the company seeking a permit, the concerned public, and the state which must review and decide on the permit application. Permit applicants would have to go through the permitting process with both TDWR and TDH instead of just one agency as they do now. For example, at present, an injection well permit also contains the RCRAregulated surface facilities because the two are intrinsically related. With the jurisdictional switch, a company would need an Underground Injection Control permit from TDWR and a RCRA permit from TDH. In addition, most facilities also need a wastewater discharge permit, which TDWR can grant. Other examples of duplicative use of the state's resources can be envisioned as TDWR retains control over some industrial waste, wastewater discharge, and deepwell injection under the proposed transfer.

It is obvious to the League that Sunset Commissioners are working hard to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the state agencies that manage hazardous waste. We applaud your recommendations to provide earlier notice of permit applications, to authorize the use of administrative penalties, to increase some fees, to require enforcement hearings, to make memoranda of understanding more public, and to change the name of the Texas Water Development Board. However, the decison to transfer jurisdiction over most hazardous waste to TDH does not improve agency efficiency and effectiveness in a field where wise management is critical to public health and the environment. If further justification of our positions is useful, please let us know.
