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RED RAIDER MEN'S STAFF

You don't have to wake up before the sun rises to catch Texas Tech Assistant Coach ROB EVANS heading out of town on a recruiting trip, but it probably wouldn't be much after that. Evans, who has been on the Red Raider staff for going on 12 years, has a reputation as one of the most successful recruiters in the business.

In addition to his skills as a recruiter, Evans is also noted for his coaching ability on the floor that helped the Raiders to the SWC title last season.

Since he joined the Tech staff in 1975, Evans has been responsible for attracting some of the top roundballers in Tech history to the West Texas campus. His vast association with coaches throughout the country, as well as his ability to relate to players from a point of view that they are familiar with has enabled him to successfully keep the Raider program among the best and most highly touted anywhere.

A native of Hobbs, NM, Evans was a basketball and baseball standout for the Eagles in high school. A versatile athlete, he was drafted by three different professional teams in three different sports. The Houston Colts (now Houston Astros) drafted Evans out of high school, but he opted to continue his athletic career with Lubbock Christian College (then a JUCO) as a basketball player.

He became the first-ever NJCAA All-American at LCC after averaging 19.8 points for the Chaps in 1966. After completing his career for the Chaps he transferred to New Mexico State where he was a member of the famed "Miracle Midgets" of 1966-67. He served as captain of both the 66-67 and 67-68 NMSU teams and helped the Aggies to a 15-10 record the first year and a 23-6 ledger in his final campaign. In his senior season the Aggies received an NCAA tournament bid.

After completing his collegiate career at NMSU, Evans was drafted by the Dallas Chaparrals of the old American Basketball Association. He also displayed enough athletic ability to become a draft choice of the American Football League's Oakland Raiders.

Evans returned to NMSU after a short stint with the Raiders and received his Bachelors Degree in 1968. After completing his degree work, be became the head coach of the NMSU junior varsity. In his four years as head of the Aggie JV program he compiled an impressive 90-15 record. He came to Texas Tech in 1975 after serving the previous five years as an assistant coach for the Aggie varsity.

Rob and his wife, Carolyn, have a son, Damon, 13 and a daughter, Amber, eight.

When Texas Tech head coach Gerald Myers hired JIM WALL to become a member of his coaching staff back in 1983, he had no idea that Wall would bring the success he enjoyed as a high school coach with him. However, after winning the last two SWC tournament titles, one might be led to believe that Wall did, indeed, bring some of that winning tradition with him.

You see, Jim Wall has never been associated with a losing season as a coach in the 18 years he's been in the business--at any level. He began coaching in 1968 at McLean Middle School in Fort Worth and later coached at West Texas State and Arlington Heights HS in Fort Worth.

In 1972 he became the cage boss at Fort Worth Paschal HS and stayed there for 12 years prior to joining the Red Raider staff. While at Paschal, Wall's teams compiled an impressive 301-92 (.766) overall record and averaged 25 wins a year. His teams won 30 or more games on three different occasions and posted 21 wins or more in seven of the remaining nine years.

Known for his on-the-court coaching abilities and his knack for knocking off top teams, the 39-year old coached teams to the state finals in Class 5A two years, losing in 1975 to Houston Kashmere and in 1983 to Bryan High School. He coached 40 All-District players, seven All-State selections and one High School All-American during his tenure at Paschal. Several of his former Paschal players are playing for major colleges around the country and many others are currently playing at the small school level.

Coach Wall is a 1968 graduate of Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls. He was a four-year letterman for the Indian basketball team and also lettered four years in tennis. While at MSU he played on three (1965-66-67) national basketball tournament teams and was an All-District VIII choice two years. He obtained his Master's Degree from West Texas State in 1970.

A Fort Worth native, Wall was a basketball, baseball and track letterman for Trimble Tech HS. He was a two-time All-District basketball player and was named the "Most Valuable Player" in Fort Worth in 1963.

Jim and his wife, Mavon, have three children: Melissa, 13, Hunter, six and Ryan, three.

The newest member of the Texas Tech coaching staff is RON POWELL, who comes to Tech after a successful high school coaching career at North Mesquite High School. Powell brings with him 20 years of coaching experience and he has been one of the top schoolboy mentors in the state over the last 13 years at North Mesquite.

University, Powell posted a career coaching record of 330-122 on the high school level. Several of his North Mesquite teams were ranked in the state's top twenty and he won numerous district titles while at the helm of the metro-plex school. In 1982 his team advanced all the way to the state Class 5A tournament before losing in the semifinals. Over the years his teams averaged 25.5 wins a season, while losing just 9.8 per year.

Powell, a native of Dallas, is married to the former Carol Lynn Walker and they have a son, Mark, 23.

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

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TEXAS TECH BOARD OF REGENTS

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
The same nine-member Board of Regents governs each of the separate institutions on the Texas Tech Campus. Dr. Lauro F. Cavazos is president and chief executive officer of each institution, and top level administrative officers are shared by the university and the health sciences center.

Regents are appointed to sixyear terms by the governor of the state. The terms of office of three regents expire every two years. The board is legally responsible for the establishment and control of institutional policies. It appoints the president who directs the operations of the institution and is responsible for carrying out policies determined by the regents.

Texas Tech University was chartered in 1923 and is now designated by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, as one of the state's four major universities. It has a second, 411-acre regional campus in the Hill Country -- the Texas Tech University Center at Junction.

The Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center began with a School of Medicine established in 1969. It now has also schools of Nursing and Allied Health -- both established in 1981 -- and Regional Academic Health Centers in Amarillo, El Paso, Lubbock and Odessa.


JESS STILES Assistant Athletic Director

No one familiar with Texas Tech athletics should need an introduction to Assistant Athletic Director Jess Stiles. An assistant on the Red Raider football coaching staff for 10 years, Stiles returned to the Tech campus in January, 1982 to assume the position of Assistant Athletic Director. Stiles works in conjunction with the Red Raider Club in all phases of fund raising and already has been instrumental in the establishment of the beef coach program and the upgrading of the automobile program. He is vital in a number of other areas, including promotions-public relations. He returned to Tech after a three-year stint at Texas A&M as an assistant coach and defensive coordinator. A native of Clarksville, Jess graduated from Midwestern University in 1954 and went on to compile a 82-35-7 record during his high school coaching career. He joined J T King's staff in 1969 and led Tech freshmen teams to four unbeaten seasons and a 25-5 record in six seasons before moving up to the varsity with Steve Sloan in 1975. He helped coach the Raiders to the SWC co-championship in 1976 before resigning to enter private business in 1978. He joined Tom Wilson's staff at A&M later that year and went on to help the Aggies to two bowl games. Jess and his wife, Treva, have three children, Susan, Steve and Sara, and a son-in-law, Jess Hudson.

JEANNINE McHANEY Assistant A.D./Coordinator of Women's Athletics

Until the merger of the men's and women's athletic departments last fall, Jeannine McHaney had been athletic director of the Women's Athletic Department at Texas Tech since its inception in 1975. She came to Tech in 1966 as an assistant professor of physical education and director of women's intramurals, immediately after earning her bachelor's and master's degrees in physical education from Arkansas State University. For nine years, she coached the Texas Tech volleyball team and played an important role in the elevation of the women's extramural program to its current NCAA Division I status. During that same period, she was also the coach for the women's gymnastics squad for four years. She is a working chairman of several Southwest Conference committees and has been active on the national level through her membership on the NCAA Committee on Committees. In January 1986, she was elected to a three-year term on the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee, which selects the teams each year that will receive bids to the prestigious NCAA Tournament. Other honors include the Women in Communication Golden Key Award in 1985, the Pathfinders Award in 1984 for women involved in Lubbock history; Women in Communication Award presented to Outstanding Women in Education in 1980; and Texas Tech University "Woman of the Year," 1975-76.





RON DAMRON Facilities Coordinator/Tennis Coach

Few administrators in college athletics can hit a backhand like Ron Damron. In his fifth year as Facilities Coordinator, Damron also is in his seventh year of heading the Red Raiders' tennis program. His administrative duties include supervision of all athletic facilities and he is game administrator for football and basketball. A two-year letterman for the Raiders in the mid-60's, Damron played and coached tennis in the United States Army for 10 years where he and his teams achieved many top honors. He also was a helicopter pilot in Viet Nam and a flight instructor during his years of military service. Following his discharge, Damron was a club professional, including stints with Vista Hills Country Club in El Paso, and Hillcrest and Lakeridge Country Clubs in Lubbock. He earned his BBA in Finance from Texas Tech and his Masters Degree in Business Administration from Chapman College. He and his wife Sue have a daughter, Kelly, 18, and a son, Mark, 16.



T. JONES

Red Raider Athletic Director



Problem solving and decision making are two categories T. Jones has become well-acquainted with during his first year as Athletics Director at Texas Tech.

Jones combined a strong background in business and athletics to impressively face all challenges after taking over the program's reins in Sept., 1985 and he looks forward to broadening the Red Raiders' horizons in all sports during the coming year.

"Every decision I have made has been directed toward one goal," said Jones. "That is the betterment of the overall program. I see a great future for Texas Tech athletically and I am excited about

being a part of it."

From the day he stepped on campus, Jones has labored tirelessly to assure a resurgence of the 15 men's and women's sports which he directs. During his first year, he has overseen the merging of the men's and women's programs under one roof, balanced a budget that quickly escalated due to greatly increased tuition costs, hired new head football and baseball coaches and scheduled

such heavyweight grid opponents as Nebraska and Ohio State for the coming seasons. He has kept a sharp eye on the progress of the Texas Tech Multi-Purpose Indoor Workout Facility to insure that all

phases are completed in a first-class fashion. He truly is a man of many hats.

James Carroll Jones, born Jan. 10, 1931, was nicknamed "T." during his early years while growing up in Childress. He was a multi-sport letter winner but derived his greatest pleasure from football. He played in the annual North-South All-Star Game in 1949, starring for the North team as a single wing tailback in a 7-7 tie. He went on to Texas where he quarterbacked the Longhorns to the Southwest Conference title in 1952 and followed that with a smashing victory over Tennessee in the 1953 Cotton Bowl game. He was a member of the only All-SWC backfield that included all four members from the same team: Gib Dawson, Dick Ochoa, Billy Quinn and Jones.

After receiving his BBA degree in 1953 from UT, Jones spent two years as a military officer before returning to Texas where he served as an assistant coach for eight years under Ed Price and then Darrell

Royal. He resigned in May, 1963 to enter private business.

He entered the banking profession in 1969 and was Director of Marketing and Senior Vice-President of City National Bank of Austin when he returned to UT in February, 1980 as Assistant Athletic Director under Bill Ellington. The Longhorn Hall of Honor member was elevated to Associate Athletic Director under DeLoss Dodds before leaving Texas to become the first Texas Tech Athletics Director to head both the men's and women's departments.

T. is married to the former Phyllis Todd and they have two grown children — Mike and Minette.

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

LUBBOCK COLISEUM

LUBBOCK MUNICIPAL COLISEUM

The 1986-87 season will be the 31st complete season that the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum has served as the home of the Texas Tech Red Raiders. The Red Raiders first basketball season (1925-26) was spent in the Aggie Judging Pavilion and the Tech Gym hosted Tech home games for the next 30 years before the team moved to the Coliseum in 1956.

Home crowds consistently rank among the largest in the Southwest Conference. The Raiders' game against Texas on March 2, 1961, drew 10,380-one of the largest single game crowds in SWC history. Season tickets to Red Raider home games are now available due to the option program which

began in 1983.

The first game ever played in the Coliseum was against Kansas State in 1956 and the Wildcats won the first game on the Red Raiders' home court by a 90-84 score. Going into the 1985-86 season, Texas Tech has played 368 games in the Coliseum posting a 277-91 (.753) record. The mark is even more impressive during the Gerald Myers era with the Raiders winning 153 and losing only 38, good enough for an .821 winning percentage.

Texas Tech has gone undefeated once in the Coliseum and once defeated four times in what some fans affectionately call the "Bubble". Myers averaged 10.9 points per game on the only team to go through a season undefeated in the Coliseum. Tech has recorded 12 victories in the "Bubble" in three dif-

ferent seasons-1975-76, 1980-81 and 1984-85.

Texas Tech's longest winning streak in the Coliseum is 17 games stretching from the second home game of the 1963-64 season to the sixth home game of the 1964-65 season. The Red Raiders' longest losing streak in the Coliseum is seven games and those came during the first eight home dates of the 1962-63 season.


Location of the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum-Auditorium complex is 900 feet west of Jones Stadium on the north part of Texas Tech's campus. On land dedicated by the college, the coliseum-auditorium is owned and operated by the city of Lubbock. Haynes and Kirby designed the building and it was built by BHFP Construction Co.

The Red Raiders played 16 home games during the 1985-86 season, drawing 69,282 spectators. Highlighting the home attendance figure was a capacity crowd of 8,174 (new total seating figure) for the Texas A&M games.

- E Refreshment stands are located on both sides of the Coliseum.
