

Our two Building Projects are Nearly Complete and "Baby Season" is Finally Winding Down!



etter from the Founder



Carol Lee Are YOUR gifts making a difference?

I never imagined the Wildlife Center would grow exponentially, let alone expand and flourish over the years. We've never had a 'parent' organization, nor been funded by our state/federal regulatory agencies. We relied 100% on donations from animal admissions, gifts, newsletter subscriptions, campaigns, ambassador adoptions, fundraising, education programs and grants. Every penny for 25+ years not used for operations was put into savings, with the hope of one day renovating the deteriorating old 3-story wooden barn with a dirt floor and no plumbing. For 19 years we ticked along on 100% volunteer power alone, but ultimately our Board recognized the need to hire someone to work 5 days a week, and someone to work the other 2. To say we've been frugal is an understatement.

Over the years, we valued tremendous veterinary, community and media support from all around the Texas South Plains, and often beyond - since 1988. The rehabilitation field was new here save for veterinarian Dr. Larry Farley who was also interested in wildlife. Early on, other area veterinarians were willing to help us — without compensation almost across the board, charging only for costly procedures or high-dollar supplies. I soaked up knowledge at ten national and one international wildlife conference for wildlife rehabilitators and our Center hosted a national "Raptors on the Prairie" conference in 2006 attended by 80 people from 13 states.

Over time, our savings paid for all capital improvements, beginning with a new work building that replaced an old tin livestock barn; a new outdoor aviary that also replaced an old dilapidated one; construction of "Ambassador Row" to house our education ambassadors (birds of prey); an outdoor learning center with large adjacent garden pond to enhance the property; renovation of another old outbuilding to raise and house baby birds, and construction of an outdoor 24 x 55 x 16' high flight cage in 2003. The best part is we had, and have, no debt. Have your gifts made a difference? Absolutely!

On another note, our quarterly Mockingbird Chronicles newsletter has always been a conduit to our donors to tell them what's being done with their funds and publicize things going on at SPWRC. This may change as we rely more on Facebook postings (there are two - the page Gail Barnes and Daniel Andrews maintain and one that is part of my personal page) as well as postings on our web site at www.spwrc.org Our expenses (utilities, insurance) will go up significantly once we move into our new facilities, and the expense for a printed newsletter may eventually have to go by the wayside in favor of an electronic copy, or a monthly/quarterly e-mail one page bulletin with news and photos. Your feedback is welcome regarding this!

I retired three times, but all attempts were short lived. As next year - 2016 -draws to a close, I'll be looking for someone to take over my clerical work. I first started working with wildlife in 1985, and I believe by the end of next year I'll be ready for another break.

I couldn't be more proud of our achievements, and we are thankful for all the volunteers, veterinarians, board members, scout groups, TTU groups, donors and supporters we have had over the past 27 years. We've given many thousands of wildlife casualties a second chance at life, and most of all, freedom.

We sincerely appreciate the \$50,000 grant recently received from the J.T. and Margaret Talkington Charitable Foundation, Inc. This ties in with a previous gift of \$189,435.00 received in January, 2014, providing funds to transform our old existing barn into a modern, fully contained, state-of- the-art animal care facility.

Our project costs exceeded what we budgeted for, and earlier this year we again applied for assistance from the Talkington Foundation, and again the Board granted our request. We have almost reached our goal of complete renovation of this structure.

From the time the first gift was received, details were discussed and committed to paper – what kind of facility did we need for wildlife patients of all sizes, shapes, and temperament? What elements would make for a pleasant workspace for volunteers and visitors? What structural changes would insure comfort, safety and energy efficiency? We selected an architect and builder, and things were set in motion. While we worked on hundreds of details for the exterior and interior, other volunteers started cleaning out the barn, which had no plumbing, a dirt floor, and was used mostly for storage. December 2, 2014 was our groundbreaking, and before long we had a new roof and skylights, and the old plywood siding was covered with red metal.

SPWRC saved every gift and donation over the past 27 years not used for operations for the eventual renovation of this barn, and now our longtime dream is finally becoming a reality. Although not quite finished, we hope to move in later this fall.

This grant from the Talkington Charitable Foundation certainly will result in transformational changes and establishes a cornerstone for our organization, and we thank you!

Thank you to The <u>CH</u> Foundation of Lubbock for granting our request for operational funds. This gift will be presented in 2016 and there will be an update at that time.

This was a matching funds grant, and Monsanto also contributed \$2,000 so we could hire a Texas Tech student to help oversee young people enrolled in our summer Junior Volunteer program. Our JV Program was started in 2003, has grown each year, and while Gail Barnes spearheads the program, it has become too difficult for one person to oversee, especially the summer months are our busiest time of year.

Texas Park & Wildlife game warden Aaron Sims brought an oiled RTH to us on September 30, 2014 from Yoakum County.

The hawk was bathed in Dawn dish detergent every day for over a month and we could not get the oil or the smell of oil off the bird. He needed to go through a molt and would not be able to maintain his body


temperature during the cold winter. He also had Avian Pox because of his debilitated condition. This was eventually cured.

Special permission is needed to rehabilitate a bird more than 6 months. U S Fish & Wildlife granted permission to keep the hawk.

The Red-tailed Hawk was released August 11th, 2015 by Aaron Sims in Terry County. The hawk's story will be part of an Animal Planet documentary that will be aired in early 2016, and we'll try to let our followers know about this in advance

if possible.




Creating a new cupola for our wild Barn Owls to nest in once again





of the barn, so we can ventilate and enjoy cooler


breezes during spring and fall.




The Waterfowl Facility is not yet finished. It is divided into three areas: a front area with a sink and food preparation area.

A climate- controlled center area where our ducks, geese and water birds can go inside during inclement and cold weather, and an outdoor area with a wading pool that will be netted on the sides and overhead allowing the birds to enjoy sunshine or showers.

This yard is for **temporary** housing of our patients. It is designed so it can be hosed out and cleaned as needed.


