Consensus: Factors to consider in funding - need for services and quality of services. No consensus on incentives for developing residential services for most difficult to place and incentives for serving mentally ill in the criminal justice system as concepts are unclear.

Consensus: How to provide an adequate number of well-trained care takers - increase the number of physicians with mental health training, expand academics and research in the mental health system, require continuing education and in-service training, and provide higher salaries.

Consensus: League of Women Voters supports the rights of all mentally ill to have access to services to help them reach and maintain optimal level of functioning - yes.

Discussion followed on optional opinion question. Consensus: Need more clarification on optional opinion question.

The above consensus responses were approved by the El Paso League Board members after a motion for approval from Joy and a second from Pearl.

 - b. Availing oneself of information where party nominees are chosen
 - c. Observing precinct conventions
- 4. All Board members are urged to work as any other citizen in the election process. Therefore, Board members other than those listed in Section 3 may participate on a broader scale, i.e. (as an individual):
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When Board members comment on political candidates it should be made clear that the opinions expressed are their own.

5. Before a Board member becomes a candidate for public office, they shall submit a written resignation in sufficient time to allow the League to publicly announce her change in status. Announcement of resignation by the Board should be worded carefully to avoid any direct endorsement of the member who is running for office. Resignation from the Board does not mean resignation from the League.

II. PUBLIC RELATIONS

The President shall examine every press and radio release and every speech to be made in the name of the League to make sure that the careless use of a word or phrase does not impart a partisan slant to the release or speech. When practical, members shall be referred to in print by their given name rather than their husbands' given name.

III. BOARD PLANNING

1. Each Board member or committee chair shall submit for Board approval detailed plans for every proposed League activity.

2. If a Chairman is temporarily absent or resigns from the Board, the proper Vice President (as listed in the organizational chart) shall assume the necessary duties of the vacant portfolio until such time as the vacancy is filled.

- 3. At the expiration of terms of office, all League materials will be returned to the League office or transferred to the new Officer or Director.
- 4. Board members are expected to attend each Board meeting. Failure to notify the President or her Vice President of an absence shall constitute an unexcused absence. Three unexcused absences shall constitute a resignation from the Board.
- 5. Board members shall submit a written annual report on a date set by the Board, and shall place a duplicate of such report in her files.
- 6. Copies of reports made to State and National shall be placed by the reporting Chairman in her files.

E. A Board member shall resign from the Board with written resignation before filing for elective public office in time for the Board to first make public announcement of the resignation.

F. If any member of the immediate family of a Board member becomes a candidate or appointee for any elective public office in El Paso County such Board member shall consult the Board to determine if there is a conflict of interest. 2. BOARD PLANNING

A. Each Board member or committee chairman shall submit for Board

approval detailed plans for every proposed League activity.

B. The three Vice Presidents shall at all times be responsible for the functioning of each portfolio under her office in accordance with

the organizational chart of the El Paso League.

C. If a chairman is temporarily absent or resigns from the Board, the proper Vice President (as listed in the organizational chart) shall assume the necessary duties of the vacant portfolio until such time as the chairman resumes her work or until the vacancy is filled.

D. At the expiration of her term of office, each Board member shall turn in her complete file, including notebook, and all other materials, supplies, and equipment belonging to the League.

- E. Except in rare emergencies, Board members shall attend each Board meeting. The minutes of the Board meeting shall list the members present, the members absent with permission or excused absence. Failure to notify the president of an intended absence shall constitute an unexcused absence.
- F. Board members shall submit a written annual report on a date set by the Board, and shall place a duplicate of such report in her notebook.

G. Copies of reports made to State and National shall be placed by

- H. Any delegate authorized by the Board to attend League or other related meetings shall, upon her return, submit a written report to the Board.
- 3. ROSTER: Generally, membership lists are not made public. The roster of a local League is for the use and convenience of its members in carrying out League work. D. All Board members are encouraged to exercise their rights as any other citizen in the election process. Therefore, Board members other than those listed in C may participate on a broader scale, i.e.

serving as a convention delegate where party nominees are chosen. working at party or candidate headquarters distributing party or candidate literature.

E. A Board member shall resign from the Board with written resignation before filing for elective public office in time for the Board to first make public announcement of the resignation.

F. If any member of the immediate family of a Board member becomes a candidate or appointee for any elective public office in El Paso County, such Board member shall consult the Board to determine if there is a conflict of interest.

STATEMENT OF POLICY FOR LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF EL PASO, 1974-75

Having a Policy Sheet avoids the tendency to put into local Bylaws many minute regulations which clutter them up, thereby making it possible to change policies more readily as the need arises.

l. NONPARTISANSHIP: From its very beginning the League has been non-partisan. Experience has proved this choice a wise one. It has kept the League free to welcome women of all opinions to work together; free to seek solutions in the public interest on the basis of fresh inquiry and objective study; free not to be beholden to any party or faction; free to move ahead of all political parties. It has made possible wide public acceptance of League Voters Service and other educational activities. It has added value to League's position on an issue when one is reached.

"The League may take action on governmental measures and policies in the public interest. It shall not support or oppose any political party or candidate." (Bylaws, LWV of U.S.) The non-partisanship policy of the League applies not only to the many political parties but to factions within a party, to any group which supports candidates, and to any candidate for public office whether or not running under party designations.

- A. All non-board members are urged to work as individuals in the party of their choice. However, there is a restriction: she may not speak in the name of the League. League members who represent the League to the public, or speak for the League shall have Board approval prior to engaging in political activity. All correspondence written in the name of the League must be approved by the president and bear her signature. The president shall at all times speak for the League unless she specifically designates another for a particular time and purpose.
- B. Members of the Board shall not engage in any partisan political activity during their term of League leadership. Board members who do this should use discretion and attend the rallies and teas or coffees for candidates of more than one political party.

*Board members in sensitive areas should use discretion in attending precinct conventions. Board member may not be delegate to County Convention.

The nonpartisanship policy of the League applies not only to the political parties but to factions within a party, to any group which supports candidates, and to any candidates for public office whether or not they run under party designations.

Members of the Board shall not engage in any partisan political activity during their term of League leadership. No Board Member shall run for public office, actively promote a candidate whether or not the candidate wears the label of a political party, hold office in a political party organization or in any organization supporting candidates, hold or attend political rallys, precinct conventions or coffees to meet candidates. League members who represent the League to the public should have Board approval prior to engaging in political activity.

- 3. ROSTER Generally, membership lists are not made public.
 The roster of a local League

BACKGROUND ON COMMUNIST CHINA

PEOPLE: Population: More than 740 million; males 15-49, 179 million; fit for military service, 89 million. Ethnic Divisions: 94 percent Han Chinese; 6 percent minorities including Chuang, Uighur, Hui, Yi, Tibetan, Mongol, Pu-I, and Korean. Religion: Most Chinese, even before 1949, were not formally religious, but pragmatic and eclectic; most important elements of religion are Confucianism, Taoism, Buddhism, ancestor worship; about 2-3 percent Muslim, 1 percent Christian.

GOVERNMENT: Type: totalitarian Communist dictatorship. Capital: Peking, Political subdivisions: 21 provinces, 2 centrally governed municipalities, and 5 autonomous regions. Voting: Universal suffrage over 18; 100 percent Communist with no political nonconformity permitted. Parties and Leaders: Chinese Communist Party (CCP) is the only effective party; Chou En-lai is premier of State Council, Liu Shao-ch'i is chief of state. Mao Tse-tung is Chairman of the political bureau of the CCP, which has been the real center of power in China. It has 25 members and alternates. Mao is also chairman of the Central Committee with 200 members and alternates. Central Committee is elected by a full Party Congress, which in turn is supposed to be newly elected every 5 years, according to the CCP constitution; the last Party Congress—the Eighth—was held in 1956, and the Ninth Party Congress election is 5 years overdue. Communist Party: 18 million members.

ECONOMY: Gross National Product: Estimated \$70 billion; less than \$100 per capita. Agriculture: Grain imports since 1960 averaged six million tons—approximately 3 percent of total consumption of 180 million tons. Food distribution: One of the most serious problems China must face in the near future is the problem of harvesting and distributing the winter crops and planting the spring crops. In times of trouble, there is frequently a tendency for people in the countryside to hold on to food needed in cities. A breakdown of central authority could seriously effect food distribution. Crude steel: Estimated above 10 million tons; coal: 220 million metric tons; oil: 8 million metric tons; grain: 180 million metric tons; electric power: 36 billion KWH; railroad mileage: 21,000 miles. Trade: Exports, 1965: \$2 billion; imports, 1965: \$1.7 billion.

STATEMENT TO THE LEGISLATIVE INTERIM COMMITTEE FOR THE STUDY OF LAND USE AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL Public Hearing in El Paso, Texas, July 17, 1970

I am Mrs. L. H. Butler, Chairman Air Pollution Committee, El Paso League of Women Voters.

For almost 4 years the League of Women Voters of El Paso has studied the problem of Air Pollution with special emphasis on El Paso's Problems in particular. We had completed our study and were in the process of putting together a fact booklet containing the essence of our findings when air pollution became an issue in El Paso.

Our activities in this area began with our statement to your committee at a public hearing in III Paso, on March 22, 1968.

More recently we have given testimony at two public hearings before the Texas Air Control Board when ASARCO's application for variance came before that Board. We have helped to form a citizen's group in El Paso, and we were interested observers when our city presented its case before 41st court.

As before we see a need for more stringent controls, and regional and international cooperation. We look to the state to supply adequate standards and help in enforcing those standards. We are aware that certain medical officials have indicated that they are not satisfied with the present Texas standards for SO₂ in particular and other pollutants in general. (El Paso Times, 7/9/70). We are also aware that Congress is becoming impatient at the slow air clean up, no significant progress having been made since 1968 in the cleaning up of our air. (C. S. Monitor, July 1970).

Although we see some significant progress in El Paso, we know that we cannot content ourselves with what has been done when there is so much remaining to be done.

We appreciate the work of the Texas Air Control Board, but we find that we still do not have an adequate assessment of exactly what is in El Paso's eir. We are still lacking equipment and personnel, although we are assured that a recent grant will be used to help remedy this situation.

On March 19, 1970 the Texas Air Control Board notified several El Paso industries that they were in violation of the Texas Clean Air Act. To our best understanding these companies are still operating in violation of the law and are doing their own testing. Although deadlines were given no further action has been taken, except in one instance.

Based on our findings to date we make the following recommendations regarding air pollution:

Report to Interim Committee - Page 2 1. That our state develop and maintain a comprehensive Air Pollution Control Program and help our local community to rigidly enforce the Regulations of the Texas Air Control Board and any local legislation that may be enacted. That standards be constantly updated. 2. Insist that local pollution sources install and apply effective control methods and procedures and set up adequate enforcement procedures to see that they do. 3. That frequent reporting to the public be made through the news media as personnel are hired, as testing equipment is acquired, as results of testing are known and interpreted and as recommendations are made by the technical air pollution control staff. 4. That public announcements concerning state regulations, findings of the State Air Control Board, and El Paso's plans for enforcement of State regulations be made periodically. 5. Encourage the initiation of an Air Control Program in Juarez through the governments concerned. 6. That Texas Air Control Board hearings may be postponed but not moved forward. That sufficient notice be given of change of date in hearings. 7. That we determine what insecticides are being used and by whom. How much aerial spraying is being done and by whom? 8. That studies and standards be initiated so that we may keep abreast of Federal policies on pesticide centrol methods and studies. 9. That, once initiated, some means of insuring the tenure of workable policies be written into law since policymakers change so often. 10. That we work for the gradual withdraws of persistent chemicals and integration of others in planned programs with billogical and cultural controls. We must think in terms of control and not annihilation. 11. That all businesses with open courts be required to keep their premises clean under penalty of fine, and that builders and contractors must clean up after themselves under penalty also. (You might not see what this has to do with air pollution unless you were in El Paso in a high wind. Then papers become polluters. I have seen wallboard, ter paper, even cooler covers blowing in high winds here.) 12. That ecology become a required subject in our schools beginning at kindergarten levels so that all will learn to take care of their environment at an early age. 13. That the city of El Paso adopt legislation under the enabling clause in the Clean Air Act of Texas 1967. This would have the effect of in-volving local authorithesempse actively in air pollution control and abatement.

Report to Interim Committee - Page 3 14. That the City Council appoint a citizen committee on air pollution to ascertain significant air pollution problems. They would inform our city government officials, the technical air pollution control staff, the State Air Control Board, the Industrial Betterment Council, this Legislative Interim Committee, and the citizens of IN Paso of the existence of these problems. 15. That our City-County Health Department consider the training of volunteers in the absence of adequate staff to perform the non-technical work of abating air pollution. 16. That A Paso governmental authorities seek cooperation from from all segments of our population, rather than relying solely on the Industrial Betterment Council and that they not permit industry to monitor itself. 17. That the City Council supplement the State Air Control Board by developing a local Air Pollution Control Board to supervise more closely the city's air pollution control program. 18. That our city continue to develop and maintain a more comprehensive local Air Pollution Control Program and rigidly enforce the Regulations of the Texas Air Control Board and any local legislation which may be enacted. That they will maintain a current emissions inventory with periodic review, as recommended by the Texas Air Control Board's Air Quality Survey. Some of these recommendations should sound familiar to you, as they were made in March of 1968. This League still feels this item to be of such importance that they have continuously carried on the work since March of 1967. When I began this study as Air Pollution chairman I thought to confine my afforts solely to the field of air pollution. This was impossible. I could not avoid certain facts. Each thing is interdependent upon another. I found a unit in which if one link of the chain breaks, all the others are affected. We are of the same stuff, gentlemen. The fly, the tree, and you and me and if I may borrow a phrase, "Whatsoever ye do unto the least of these, ye do it unto me also." What we put forth into the atmosphere around us always comes back eventually to plague us. We are alarmed, but we are also optimistic. We will not concede the ultimate doom of our planet, at least not without a supreme effort to save it. We believe the life principle to be eternal. Nature will renew itself, given the opportunity, but we must work with it and not against it. We must heed the warning we find in the conditions around us - and more important we must give more than lip service to correcting those conditions.

Technology alone is not going to save us. It will require a reevaluation, a re-thinking of the whole process. Each thing must be considered in relation to the whole. If we love and respect the universe around us, it will return that love in the form of a habitable environment.

The sky is the skin of the apple. It is not a garbage dump and we do not intend that it should continue to be used as one. We will work with you to make it clean again. Thank you.

There won't be time at Unit Meetings on Feb. 25th & 26th, to do more than discuss the questions presented here. So put that excellent brain of yours to work and after you've read Housing Fact Sheet IV - take a few extra minutes to study it and decide what you'd like to say. Then come and say it!

Last spring we addressed our discussion toward some of the recommendations made in 1964 by The Slums Council of the Mayor's Advisory Council because we felt that too ofter Blue Ribbon Groups are asked to study given situations and make recommendations. These reports are read, filed and often forgotten. Then some years later another Blue Ribbon Commission is asked to cover the same ground once again.

Now, in an effort to sum up our year's study, let's take a closer look at the four essential elements to a Workable Program as these cover the whole spectrum of local efforts and can help us spell out guidelines for League Action.

INTRODUCTION

June 1964, The Slums Council of the Citizens Advisory Council reported to the Mayor and City Council of El Paso their findings and recommendations.

The latter are set forth in detail on pp. 9-12 in their published report. The League's Housing Resource Committee reproduced the 15 basic recommendations for all members in April 1969.

In reviewing those 15 recommendations, it is interesting to note that 12 of them have been realized.

January 1968 - The Southern Standard Housing Code was adopted

August 1968 - El Paso's Workable Program received certification for l year.

December 1969 - El Paso's Workable Program received certification for 2 years.

May 12, 1969 - following discussion the LWV of El Paso stated consensus reached as:

- 1. Support of a Workable Program for El Paso
- 2. Housing Code: Support of the Housing Code Guidelines:
 - a. We should work for reasonable enforcement of the present code.

November 1, 1969 - following three more sets of discussion meetings, the consensus we had reached was stated as:

- I. Because of the desperate housing need in El Paso, we support posthaste construction of the 1650 new Public Housing Authority units already approved by HUD.
- II. Following completion of these 1650 new P.H.A. units, a tenement unit becoming vacant should not be rented until it meets Housing Code standards. Any tenant displace by enforcement of the Housing Code should be given priority in the new P.H.A. projects.
- III. We urge that plans submitted by El Paso for future P.H.A. projects include the following elements:

1. Units architecturally designed to avoid an institutional appearance.

- 2. Plans to include esthetically pleasing as well as functional landscaping and land use.
- 3. Projects scattered throughout the city and small enough to be integrated into the neighborhoods.
- IV. The League of Women Voters will work with the city in educating the neighborhoods in which P.H.A. projects are to be built.

February 1970 - Housing Resource Committee realizing that our year of study is nearly over has been taking a look at where we've been, where we are, and where the "Action" may lie in the future.

Therefore, we are seeking further guidelines based on this year's evaluation to spell out League Support positions. We feel that these will be needed especially in view of the Board's Recommended Local Program: no further study in Housing Item.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

HUD
Stands for the Department of Housing and Urban Development administered by Secretary George Romney. There are 8 regional offices, El Paso comes under Region V with offices in Fort Worth, Texas.

THE WORKABLE PROGRAM
The name given by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to an overall plan of action developed on the local level for meeting that local communities overall problems of slums, blight and community development.

NATIONAL MODEL CODES
These are codes written by a nationally recognized building code congress; professional means who have access to the cummulative information of testing and research laboratories. There are 4 of these.

<u>URBAN RENEWAL</u>

Name applied by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to a type of projects (federally assisted)

---acquiring a nd clearing a slum or blighted area, either residencial or nonresidential, and disposing of the land for redevelopment in accordance with planned uses

or--rehabilitation of structures in such an area by propery owners, accompanied by improvement of community facilities by the local government, result: conservation

or--a combination of the above planned and carried out by one of the following public agencies (local choice dependent upon state law):

1. Separate public agency
2. Ideal housing authority - prohibited by Texas State Law
3. department of local government

FOUR ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF A WORKABLE PROGRAM

The Workable Program (see April and Sept. Fact Sheets) requires four essential elements established by HUD and carried through at the local level as an indication that the local community is making a real effort to help itself.

Let's take a look at these four broad guidelines for local effort, asking ourselves:

What do we need to know to make a citizen's decision?

1. ADOPTION OF UP-TO DATE HOUSING AND BUILDING CODES AND THE EFFECTIVE ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM IN AREAS OF PRIORITY NEED FOR ENFORCEMENT.

We need to know that on Oct. 3, 1969, the Mayor received the following from the Assistant Regional Administrator, Department of Housing and Urban Development:

"Under the Workable Program, it is HUD policy to require the adoption of reasonable current editions of nationally recognized model codes or State or local codes with comparable standards, provided such standards do not significantly increase the cost of housing construction or restrict the use of materials and methods authorized by such nationally recognized model codes. An analysis of the 1955 edition of the National Plumbing Code and a comparison of this code with the standards set forth in the other nationally recognized model plumbing codes indicate that the National Plumbing Code does not permit the use of the latest nationally recognized standards for materials (e.g., plastic pipe) and methods used in plumbing installations.

"Therefore, the 1955 editions of the National Plumbing Code will no longer be considered acceptable as meeting the Workable Program requirements for codes adoption. In addition, any State or local plumbing code which has not been revised to eliminate restrictions on the use of the new materials and methods of plumbing installations, will also be considered as unacceptable for meeting Workable Program code requirements. Communities operating under the National Plumbing Code or with restrictive State or local codes will be required to modify their codes to incorporate standards comparable to nonrestrictive nationally recognized model plumbing codes.

"Communities should analyze their present plumbing code and schedule the action necessary to accomplish the required revision."

We need to know that the El Paso Plumbing Code, written locally, was adopted in 1939, does not permit the use of the latest nationally recognized standards for materials (e.g., plastic pipe) and methods used in plumbing installations. Therefore it would not be considered acceptable.

We need to know that the Codes Enforcement Committee of the Mayor's Council for Social Action made the following recommendations on Dec. 8, 1969 and these were approved by the Executive Committee, Mayor's Council for Social Action, December 17, 1969. We also need to know that the Codes Enforcement Committee invited comments prior to submitting their recommendations.

"The Code Enforcement Committee of the Mayor's Council for Social Action submits the following report and recommendation regarding building and related codes of the City of El Paso.

"These facts are observed by the Committee:

- "1. The Department of Housing and Urban Development will require the City adopt, before renewal of its "Workable Program", wither a code written by a nationally recognized building code congress or an equivalent updated locally-written code. This renewal is scheduled for early 1970, and is required if El Paso is to receive aid or funds made available by the federal government for planning and development in areas vital to the City's growth and improvement.
- "2. Présent Codes, based on the 1955 edition of the Southern Standard Code, are outmoded and their updating has not been sufficient to coincide with the rapid growth of the City and advancing technology and construction methods. This opinion has been expressed by profese sionals and others working in the construction industry.
- "3. An individual municipality has neither the money nor the resources to maintain an adequate code-writing entity. Therefore, national codes have been adopted by large and small cities as well as some states. The four major national codes a re written by professional teams who have access to the cumulative information of testing and research laboratories. Changes in these codes are made only after materials or techniques have been proven sound.
- "4. The Building Inspection Department, in fulfilling its roll in code enforcement, has neither the time nor the resources to write a new code.
- "5. There are conditions in the City that cannot be improved solely through code enforcement. Sub-standard housing can neither be eliminated nor raised to minimum requirements by strict and immediate enforcement of the recently adopted Housing Code.

"The Committee concluded that a new nationally recognized code should be adopted by the City. The Committee researched the three most widely used codes in this region. They are:

"1. Building Officials Conference of America, Inc. Basic Building Code 1965 Edition.

- "2. Southern Standard Building Code, revised through 1968.
- "3. Uniform Building Code, Volume 1, 1967 Edition.

"Companion codes to the above were also studied as well as the National Electric Code, which is the only recognized electric code. The Committee found, after comparison of the codes, that they were basically the same. Each Code has the purpose of assuring public safety to the greatest degree.

"The Committee found that the Southern Standard and Uniform Building Codes are the most clearly written. Of these two the Southern Standard is a performance code as opposed to a specification type code. This seemed to be the most suitable for El Paso. Also, the change over from our existing code derived from an earlier Southern Standard Code would be made more easily, As the codes are cross referenced the Committee felt that all codes should be written by the same congress where possible.

"The Committee agreed upon the recommendation that the Southern Standard Building Code, 1969 Edition; the Southern Standard Plumbing Code, 1967 Edition with latest revisions; the Southern Standard Gas Code, 1969 Edition; The Southern Standard Housing Code, 1969 Edition; and the National Electric Code, 1968 Edition; be adopted as written, only adding those amendments required by conditions unique to the City of El Paso. Also, the Committee suggests that future changes to the codes be made through active participation and ecoperation with the Southern Building Code Congress and the writers of the National Electric Code. In addition, all future updating of the codes should be accomplished through review and adoption of the current revisions to the codes made by writing authorities.

"In the case of the Housing Code, the Committee further recommends that the decisions resulting from the joint Housing and Code Enforcement Committee meeting of September 9, 1969, be considered and acted upon, thereby eliminating the Tenement Code and providing a means of partial, increasing enforcement of the Housing Code through discreet action of the Housing Board.

"The Committee feels that the two following amendments should be considered:

"1. Due to local high wind velocities, the Committee recommends that the table design wind pressures for various height zones should be modified to read:

Height of Zone (Ft.) Horizontal Load (Lb./Sq.Ft.)

less than 30 20 30 - 49 25 50 - 99 30 100 - 499 40 500 - 1199 45 1200 and over 50 "2. Fire Districts be redefined by the El Paso Fire Marshall's office to consider structures now existing.

"In view of the overwhelming demands to improve the conditions of existing sub-standard housing, the Committee recommends the immediate adoption of an amendment to the Housing Code which would provide the installation of properly vented gas heaters, or their equivalent that would conform with the conditions required by Section 305.3 of the Housing Code.

"The Committee feels that there are sufficient requirements i in the existing Air Conditioning, Refrigeration, Ventilation and Evaporative Cooling Code of the City of El Paso, Texas, adopted 1947, that should remain in effect. This code should be reviewed by the proper city board and revised to work in conjunction with the new codes, if adopted.

"The Committee submitted its recommendations to the El Paso Council of Construction Associations for their review and comments. A copy of their concurring recommendations is included with this report.

"The Code Enforcement Committee requests that the recommendations made herein be submitted to the various city boards concerned with the separate codes, and that these boards make recommendations concerning the appropriate local revisions to the Codes. The Committee would then desire a chance to review and comment upon those revisions prior to action by the Mayor and City Council.

"The Committee feels that its continuing reponsibility will be to review revisions of the Codes and to assist in the promotion of improved code enforcement."

"Respectfully submitted,"

We need to know that the phrase "be adopted as written, only adding those amendments required by conditions unique to the City of El Paso" had reference to an enlargement of the recommended codes in order to incorporate methods and materials native to this area and to take advantage of our geographical and climatical conditions. Examples would be adobe construction, evaporative cooling, and no problems concerning termits, frost lines, high humidity or snow loads.

We need to know that the Advisory Boards have made no offical recommendations to date.

We need to know that groups of experts don't always agree which makes our citizen's decision difficult indeed.

We need to know another point of view as presented by the City's

Chief Building Official who supplied us with a most comprehensive overall picture of local housing problems and some pessible solutions. Since, as he pointed out, the low economic sector of our population is the group which has the most accute need for housing (1960 census - 23% of city's population earns less than \$3,000 per year and 70% of these people live in low cost areas of the city) the problem is one of economics. Especially on the South Side, it's a dynamic problem where immigrants (note: from Mexico and rural areas of the South West) are "learning" - a transitional time and place. We, according to him, need to find ways and means of cutting that transitional time.

The average rent paid is \$25 for 2 rooms. What does that mean? — four walls, a roof and floor. The rooms are approx. 12 ft. by 12 ft. or 144 sq. ft. making a total of 288 to 300 sq ft. for the two rooms. Therefore, the rent is approximately \$0.83 per sq. ft. If that same man could afford to pay \$85 rent (range is now \$80.00 - 115.00) for a small house with perhaps 1,000 sq. ft. of floor area, the man would be paying approximately \$0.85 per sq. ft. But now he gets a rest room, a kitchen, properly vented heating etc.

He proposed that rents be subsidized, the economic stability of El Paso be increased through better training, education and jobs, and that a combination of private and governmental programs be used to achieve these.

Land costs are a big factor in housing. (Note: he used figures that were about two times the land cost for a moderate cost house - his example was \$3,500 - \$4,000 building site and the house of 1000 sq. ft. at \$8,500 cost.) He said that the cost of land in South El Paso makes rehabilitation difficult. For the so called Private Sector, in his opinion, about the only way it could help is through Rent and Interest Suppliment projects and possible Public Housing Turn Key. This is due to high financing and high land costs.

He feels that only the Federal government can do the job as the City, Gounty, and State do not have the money required.

In a fascinating step by step process which involved League's three interviewers in cost estimates (also revealed that we need a refresher course in basic arithmetic) he showed us that the cheapest building material is cinder block, painted inside and out i.e. "solid masonry". (Note: He did not mention the difficulties involved in installing flexible conduit for wiring and that "cutting through cinder block to do so weakens the block. The use of flexible conduit is solid masonry walls is barred in most cities and by the National Electric Code because of it's low resistance to corresion. It is required here in El Paso within the walls. The State of New Mexico doe not permit it's use for any purpose. Additional Note: Concret or cinder block does not provide good insulation against heat and cold.)

He does not anticipate any problems in enforcement of the codes if adopted as recommended by the Codes Enforcement Committee.

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In reguard to propsed Code changes, the Building Dept. has no objections as long as the materials and methods are not going to effect everybody in the city.

However, since, in his estimation, some of these changes do increase the fird hazard because of dry climate and high winds and we need to consider economics again. His concept is to lower quantity but not quality. He estimates a cost saving in a \$400 electrical job of \$50 which amounts to about 1% of the total cost of a small house with the use of non-metallic sheathed cable. He was candid in his objections to it and detracted from his arguements by misrepresenting the material. He discribed it as 2 wires, insulated and wrapped in paper. He also stated that it was not gounded and if a short occurred it would smolder in the wall and would not blow a fuze or trip a circuit breaker. (Note: the National Electric Code requires all systems to be grounded including non-metallic sheathed cable (Romex) which uses a three wire system and at present the ground wire must be the same size as the conductors. Most, if not all Romex is plastic sheathed and is commonly used in El Paso as "direct burial" cable to such outdoor devices as post lights because of the corrosive factors of flexible conduit. Non-metallic sheathed cable does carry the Fire Underwritters' Seal.)

According to him, the City has oked the use of phastic pipe plumbing systems however he does not recommend them and would not use them. His reasons: plastic pipe has been eatten by rodents, it can't stand heat or sunlight, has a greater coefficient of expansion, is not as strong as metal, is more susceptible to wear and tear and adds to the fire hazard. (Note: the city now permits the use of neoprene seals on cast iron pipe.)

The restrictive amendments to our present Building Code are two:

- l. prohibites the use of wood shingles however there is a Fire Underwriters'approved treated wood shingle which can be used. "We have not lower quality and have arrived at what people want." However, as he pointed out, it is about 5 times as expensive as a built up gravel roof.
- 2. Limited the use of wood on the exterior in houses and apartments to:
- 1) unprotected wood can be used on the whole front of the building as long as the building is 70 feet or more from facing building.
- 2) unprotected wood may be used on up to 25% of each of the other walls.

He told us that the reason for these restrictions is fire risk. El Paso has the lowest fire rate in the State and that we have the "Best" fire experience rate. He explained that the "Key Rate" is a basic rate and then the fire experience rate (cost of fires to the insurance cos.) is a refund to the citizens of the area. (Note: he did not mention San Antonio in this - please see mext page.)

We need to know the following about fire insurance ratings.

The "Key Rate", set by the State, is based on many factors such as Water Works, pumping units, fire department, no. of men, units, fire alarm system, overhead or undergraund wires in mercantile district, building laws and structural conditions - this last accounts for \$.03 of a total of \$.11 charges for El Paso. On the credit side, Booster trucks, acrial trucks, public school instruction of methods of fire

El Paso's Key Rate is the lowest in the State and we share this honor with San Antonio which city, we understand, permits frame construction and the use of non-metallic sheathed cable. In 1969, El Paso's Fire Record Gredit was 5% as compared to 10% for San Antonio.

prevention and principles of fire insurance, an arson award, and the National Electric Code or enforcement accounting for 4% of El Pase's

20% credit. The "Key Rate" is \$0.11 - 0.02 = \$0.09.

75% or more of the buildings in the fire rated area would have to be roofed with wood shingles to raise the fire insurance rate \$0.04. (15% or less such roofs, no charge.)

In commercial buildings, the exterior would have to be 50% or more frame to increase the fire insurance rate. Then, if many are frame, the largest building in the area sets the rate for all of the others.

It was interesting to note that those who are knowledgeable about fire insurance talk in terms of "fire resistant" rather than "fire proof" materials. Even a Type A Fire "Resistive" rate - the best possible insurance rate - is only carried on 4% of the buildings in the whole State. These building are built according to the Underwriters Laboratories Guidelines in all naterials and material systems. Yet, the insurance premium runs approximately \$50 less than Type B - "Semi-fire resistive" rate.

It was reported to us that although an all steel building with steel roof, steel deak and joists does carry a better fire insurance rate than one with above conditions except a wood deck, in the event of a large fire, the steel deck and joists will tend to draw the roof and walls inward and in many cases completely destroy the building. This does not occur with the wood deck as the wood would fail and collapse before pulling in the walls.

Incidently, a building could carry a Type A insurance rating and yet the entire contents could be destroyed by fire.

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Housing IV - page 10

We need to remind ourselves that it's human nature to fear the "unknown" and this tends to make us all hesitant about changing old, tried and true materials and methods for new ones.

We need to know that Mr. John Kemp, during a tour of the Pilot Project (upgrading a tenement) told us that without the granted exception, i.e. use of a plastic pipe plumbing system, the tenement pilot project would have been too expensive for consideration.

We need to distinguish between good intent and vested interest.

We do not quarrel with "good intent" however when such good intent spells super adequacy within established high standards to the degree that flexibility is lost, then perhaps we should question.

We need to know a little about so called "vested interest" because the rumors concerning code changes effecting "pocket books" don't make sense.

The following information was supplied by a former electrical general contractor.

The National Electrical Code authorizes the use of some materials and methods which are not permitted in El Paso through restrictive amendments.

Basically permitting the use of these materials and methods would not effect a change in the cost of material used in a given job. The saving would be in labor cost. It is estimated that the labor cost of installation would be approximately one half in working time. However there are other cost saving factors perjob in overhead expenses - i.e. workman's compensation, unemployment compensation, insurance, and the amount of different pieces of material that the company would have to keep on hand. The estimation amounts to approximately 25% saving in the cost per job.

Therefore: The cost of materials bought from the electrical supply houses remains the same so it would seem that that profit is not effected.

The Electrical Contractor realizes a savings of about 25% per job and can therefore either pass it on or make that much more profit. Since he bids competively, he would probably pass it on.

The man on the job is paid the same, however is now in a position to wire two housing units in approximately the same time that it took to wire just one.

We may indeed ask, "just whose pocket book has been hurt"?

Housing IV - page 11

We need to know that out of the joint Codes Enforcement and Housing committee recommendations (meeting held Sept. 9, 1969) came the creation of the new Codes Enforcement Dept., established in Jan. 1970.

We need to know that the Codes Enforcement Dept has established guidelines for tity wide enforcement of the Housing Code. (Those who missed the taped report of the Codes Enforcement Official at the last set of Units may call for details.)

We need to review Fact Sheet III for brief details of The Concentrated Codes Enforcement Program.

We need to know that City Council will review all codes in the near future.

2. DEVELOPMENT OF A LOCAL PLANNING AND PROGRAMMING PROCESS.

We need to know that El Paso adopted the Kessler Master Plan in 1925. This was a comprehensive general plan for the City of El Paso. The Kessler Plan has served as a reference and guide in the planning and execution of public improvements since 1925. Because of the many changes anticipated by the Chamizal Treaty and other rapidly changing conditions, the Department of Planning undertook, on the 40th Anniversary of the 1925 Plan, a detailed study to draw up a new Master Plan.

We need to know that an extensive economic survey of El Paso was made by a research firm in 1965-66.

We need to know that another independent firm, Alexander and Associates, archetects and city planners also made an extensive survey during 1965-66.

We need to know that state agencies were called upon for advice.

We need to know that a number of League members attended the Mayor's all day seminar - El Paso's Future, Fact or Myth - in 1966 and heard the reported recommendations of the research firms, State agencies and City Dept. Heads.

We need to know that the City Plan Department, working with all, incorporated the findings of both surveys and State recommendations into a new Master City Plan adopted by the City Council and published by the Plan Dept. as The Development Atlas.

We need to know that the Community Renewal Program Department (see Fact Sheet III) is working to coordinate all programs into an overall

city wide effort toward realistic community action, thus involving the human element. W:

We need to know that CRP may recommend the use of Urban Renewal Programs in some areas of the city.

We need to know the Urban Renewal Program is not necessarily wholesale leveling to the ground but can be another approach to arresting deterioration, hence "renewing". (see Fact Sheet III - page 14)

We need to know more about Urban Renewal and more about zoning than we do.

3. LOCAL EFFORTS TO EXPAND THE SUPPLY OF HOUSING FOR LOW-AND-MODERATE INCOME FAMILIES AND THE DEVELOPMENT OF A COORDINATED RELOCATION SYSTEM

Our consensus indicates that we are fully aware of the need.

We need to know that the City Administration is working with local groups (prospective Housing Sponsors & the Private Sector) the FHA and HUD officials in an effort to set up low interest loans to upgrade housing, an additional 1,000 housing units, rent supplement and interest supplement projects and participation in HUD's Project Rehab.

(a) City would buy tenements

(b) rehabilitate them for Public Housing.

We know that the Community Renewal Program Department has developed a coordinated relocation system (Sept. and Jan. Fact Sheets) i.e. Housing Relocation Office.

We are aware that "supply" of any kind of housing is a National problem as well as El Paso's.

We are aware that the average family in Wouth El Paso consists of husband, wife and 4 children; that 1/3rd of these families include 3 relatives under the same roof and the average monthly income is approximately \$190. (League's Human Resource - National Program, Unit Meetings Jan. 1970. The information was taken from the South Side Community Action Council survey published Oct. 8, 1969. That Council survey was made by Bravo, Maya, Machos, Vista and Transcentury.)

We know that El Paso has authorization for a total of 3300 P.H. units.

We need to know that future plans call for a total of 5000 P.H. units, however money has not yet been funded for 1700.

We know that in June, 1964, The Slums Council of the Citizens Advisory Council recommended:

- "5. It is recommended that the City study the possiblity of supporting better housing conditions by landlowed or tenant subsidies.
- "6. It is recommended that steps be taken by the El Paso Housing Authority and/or private industry to embark upon a continuing program of construction and renting of single, duplex and three unit dwellings on land made available through the condemnation of presently unsuitable housing that cannot be upgraded. (There was a minority dissent on this recommendation.)"
- 4. DEVELOPMENT OF SPECIFIC PLANS FOR ACHIEVING EFFECTIVE CITIZEN PARTICIPATION IN PLANNING AND DEVELOPING HUD-ASSISTED PROGRAMS.

We know that the Mayor's Council for Social Action is involving citizens in the following: Area Councils, Capital Improvements, Code Enforcement, Community Relations, Community Promotion, Health, Housing, Senior Citizens, Sports and Youth.

We know that there is an over-all community effort by citizens working toward finding solutions for many El Paso problems. When the League's Committee worker on the Atl America Cities Award Entry they had a difficult thre talegting just two projects. The ones they selected involved the greatest number of citizens participating in the project.

Women Voters' President Pleased By Panel's Work

Texas League of Women Voters president Veta Winick is meeting with local league members this week to discuss

plans for the 1975 LWV State Convention to be held in El Paso April 15-17.

A new budget will be adopted at the convention along with the election of new officers and a discussion of plans for new programs.

An avid "constitutional revision watcher," Mrs. Winick said she is pleased with the

work being put Veta Winick forth to revise the State constitution, but if it does not please the league after it is complete, members will fight against the constitution when the voting period takes place.

As a league member for 14 years and State president for five years, Mrs. Winck carries an overall view of the typical LWV member: "She is active minded, pushy, outspoken and opinionated, and does not let other people make decisions for her." she said.

"With 56 per cent of the vote coming from women in the State, it is a shame that so many of those women let their husbands think for them. ..women are just too apathetic," she said.

"With the qualities and background it takes for a man to enter politics, women must be twice what a man is if she wishes to enter the race. Why, I don't know, that's just the way it has to be," Mrs. Winick said.

Mrs. Winick also believes the women's movement in America have opened many doors for women and their careers. "but there are still too many females who let their emotions cloud their ideas and enjoy hiding behind the chauvenistic mannerisms of the male," she said.

Mrs. Winickresides in Dickinson, Tex., and has attended colleges in Massachusetts, Maine and at Purdue University.

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PROPOSED RULES FOR THE ANNUAL MEETING

COMPOSITION:

Admission to the Annual Meeting is open to members and non-members. Only members may vote.

QUORUM:

Forty members shall constitue a quorum.

DEBATE:

Only paid members of the League of Women Voters of El Paso have the privilege of the floor.

No person may speak twice until all who wish to speak have had an opportunity to do so. Debate shall be limited to two minutes for each speaker.

When speaking to an item, no member may speak to another item as a reason for not adopting the item being spoken to.

Any member, upon recognition by the chair, shall use the public address system when addressing the Annual Meeting. She shall first state clearly her name.

MOTTON:

When a member makes a motion, it shall be put in writing in duplicate and signed by the mover. One copy shall be sent at once to the Secretary and the other copy retained by the mover.

CONSIDERATION OF BYLAWS CHANGES:

These Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present and voting at the Annual Meeting, provided that the amendments were submitted to the membership at least one month in advance of the Annual Meeting.

VOTING PROCEDURE:

A majority vote of those qualified to vote and voting shall constitute an election. Absentee or proxy voting shall not be permitted.

Adoption of budget and recommended program items requires a majority vote of voting members present and voting.

ANNUAL REPORTS

FROGRAM

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY:

SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL: We started off an exciting EQ year with Units on Solid Waste Disposal with Emphasis on Recycling. We reached consensus on the local level and this was very helpful to us this year when National LWV asked for more specific consensus on Solid Waste Management.

WATER QUALITY: Our work is being recognized throughout the state and we were invited to participate in hearings on water planning in Austin in July. Since that time we have received a continuous report from the Army Engineers so that we are able to keep abreast of recent planning.

AIR QUALITY: Your EQ Chairman attended several meetings in Austin as a member of the Citizen's Advisory Council to the Texas Air Control Board. It is gratifying to participate at the state level, but we sometimes wonder how much we are listened to. Testimony was sent to the Texas Air Control Board in Austin on Automobile Emissions and the reduction of Carbon Monoxide in February.

- TRANSPORTATION: The chairman has been in conversation with the City Transportation Director, Mr. Levin Lee. The City Council set up a study with the help of a federal grant in the amount of \$50,000. Three consulting firms have been hired to do the study with began in November and will be completed by May 1. An interim report is due for release as of this writing. A citizens advisory committee will be set up soon, and Mr. Lee has said that he would like a LWV representative on that committee. In December an on-board bus survey was taken of the passengers. Information was gotten as to destination, distance passenger was riding and why, and suggestions as to better service that could be rendered or complaints. The study included an inspection of the various buses from the three privately-owned companies to see their condition and to learn their routes and the number operating.
- HOUSING: The housing committee has continued to work with other organizations to attempt to improve housing conditions for low income people. Letters have been sent, along with newspaper articles and pamphlets passed out by concerned groups to the office of HUD in Washington, D. C. and the Southwest Regional Office. A study of zoning has grown out of the housing study. A Zoning Fact Sheet was sent to members, and part of the Feb. unit meetings were devoted to Zoning. Additional study and consensus on Zoning is planned in the spring.
- URBAN RENEWAL: Approximately 30 speeches were made to various citizen groups to inform them of the facts and the League position on Urban Renewal. In addition, 2 radio and 4 TV programs were presented. After several postponements the UR referendum was voted on in the November General Election and was defeated. About one-third of those voting cast a vote on the referendum. The Citizens Advisory Group failed to get organized due

- URBAN RENEWAL (continued) mainly to the fact that an influential chairman was never appointed. It is not yet know how drastically the recent cuts in HUD funds will affect the future of UR in El Paso. There is a possibility that the Texas State Law requiring a UR referendum may be changed in the current session of the Legislature.
- HUMAN RESOURCES: El Paso was chosen as one of four cities to participate in the field-study phase of the 13th Multinational Seminar for Latin American Women Leaders co-sponsored by the Department of State and the Overseas Education Fund of the LWVUS. The Seminar focused on the problems of marginal populations and the possibilities of promoting their active incorporation into community life. The field-study phase of the Seminar was preceded by a two week study phase of problem analysis and group techniques and was followed by a one-week evaluation of the Seminar. Fourteen women participated with seven visiting El Paso and Charleston, W. Va. The group was accompanied by a State Department interpreter and a US Leaguer from Sudbury, Mass. Twenty El Paso Leaguers participated in various agency visits and leisure time activities.
- LAND USE: This is a broad study overlapping many areas of League study.

 Therefore among those serving on the committee are the Chairmen of the EQ, Housing, Mass Transportation, Urban Renewal and Human Resources Committees. A set of unit meetings on Land Use and Zoning and a panel discussion featuring speakers representing various segments of the Land Use question were held in February.
- VOTING RIGHTS: Unit meetings were held in April presenting mock precinct conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties. In August El Paso was one of forty Leagues in the US asked to send a representative to an Election Systems Project Meeting in Washington, D. C. organized by the National Committee. The purpose of this meeting was to help Leagues rectify voting rights infringements discovered in the nation-wide study by the Election Systems Project in which El Paso participated in 1971-72. As part of the State S₊udy on Voting Rights we held one set of information units and one set of consensus units in the early fall.
- PUBLIC SCHOOL FINANCING IN TEXAS: Following the emergency adoption of this item at the State level, our local Education committee put aside our local study and scrambled for information and understanding of this complex subject. In November two sets of unit meetings were held to present information and reach consensus.
- EDUCATION: After a series of units in May, the committee devised a questionnaire to use in interviewing school board members, school administrators, teachers, parents and students. Before the interviewing was begun, the committee had to turn its attention to the emergency state item. The committee plans to resume the interviews over the coming League year.
- TEXAS CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION: Units were held in May to gather ideas for voter understanding of Amendment 4. We had an all-out campaign in

TEXAS CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION (continued) cooperation with other local organizations to promote passage of Amendment 4 including use of bumper stickers, distribution of pamphlets, speeches, radio "talk shows", T.V. programs, newspaper editorial endorsements, and a League information center.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

VOTER SERVICE: The League joined in a city-wide drive to register voters at the beginning of the year. The registration deadline for voting in the General Election was October 7. We registered voters in shopping centers in September and early October. Because the Tax Assessor's Office was closed on Oct. 7, the deadline for registration for the General Election, six Leaguers opened their homes, and over 700 persons were registered that day.

We had two one-half hour candidates shows on KTSM TV for candidates for State Senate, and a one hour show on KROD TV for candidates for State Representatives. There were also two live Candidate Rallies co-sponsored with the Jewish Community Center. Response from candidates was excellent,

but attendance was poor.

10,000 State Voters Guides and 8,000 local Voters Guides were distributed to stores, libraries, banks, schools, etc. for the May Primary Election. 15,000 State Voters Guides were distributed for the November General Election. Plans to publish a Voters Guide for the City Election in March are now underway, and the Voters Guides should be completed by Annual Meeting.

We did Election Night Reporting in May and November for KROD TV. We covered 80 precincts and received \$840.00 for this service. We also did reporting for ABC National TV. They ask Leaguers to do this every year

because "they are reliable, accurate, and fast".

Two series' of Citizenship Classes were held the early part of the year with satisfactory results. We decided not to continue classes in the later part of the year as no Leaguers volunteered to teach and other

organizations had since started similar classes.

We were asked to provide transportation for the elderly at Chelsea Plaza. The first time we used cars and transported about 25 people to and from their polling place. Being asked again and being promised a better turn-out, we enlisted the Army to lend us a bus. However, the elderly got up every early and walked to the polls and only seven people rode our government bus. We live and learn, but we never give up!

We worked with Girl Scouts to aide them in earning their Active Citizen Badge. The girls distributed Voters Guides and gave a demonstration on using voting machines. Boy Scouts distributed Constitutional Revision flyers for credit toward their God and Country awards.

In addition, Your Elected Officials Guide and Voter's Keys were distributed.

PUBLIC RELATIONS: The primary functions this year were:

1. Dealing with news media in connection with Voters Service. The basic points of emphasis included voter registration information, announcements on radio "community calendars", cooperation with Fort Bliss Voting Officer and announcements in the Daily Bulletin. We had radio and TV spots for voter registration and "get out the vote" but found that station managers said they had their own. We worked with KROD TV on candidates show.

2. Discussion of issues pertinant to League, on radio and television

- PUBLIC RELATIONS (continued) programs. Radio programs were presented on Constitutional Revision and Status of Texas Election Laws and procedures, and TV programs (including cable TV) were presented on What is League? and issues of Urban Renewal, Electoral College, and Texas Constitutional Revision.
 - 3. Other functions included coverage of the Multinational Seminar, spots on radio "community calanders" and publicity of the garage sale.
 - 4. We had newspaper coverage of the Multinational Seminar, general meetings, orientation series, meague studies, finance drive, and voters service information.
 - 5. Beginning with a candidates' show featuring candidates for mayor, in March, we will have a monthly 30 minute show on prime time on KELP TV. KELP will make camera crews available for a 60 Minute type program.
- SPANISH CO-ORDINATOR: The position of Spanish Coordinator was created in 1972 with the main objective of coordinating League activities with the Spanish speaking persons of the community by providing spoken and written material in Spanish, assisting in community relations services requiring bi-lingual abilities, and recruiting Spanish speaking ladies into League.

Activities through the year included ll television presentations, (one in English) most of which were in Spanish on the program "Perspectiva"; ll voter registration drives at hospitals, schools, shopping centers, banks, and churches; location of persons to call in primary election and national election returns to television station, publication of LWV information in Spanish newspaper, recruitment and committee work on voting rights, education and Multinational Seminar.

- SPEAKERS BUREAU: Speeches were given to various clubs and organizations on the following subjects: Constitutional Revision, Being an Active Citizen in Government, Urban Renew, Campaign Issues, Information on Voting, The Electoral College and What Is League?
- FINANCE: As this is written, the finance drive for this year has been organized with cards updated, packets to give to solicitors ready, workers recruited, and plans made for a kick-off brunch on February 13.

We failed to reach income goals set in the 1972-73 budget and therefore it is necessary to take money from our Savings Account for League operating expenses during March. It is hoped that money to replace this sum will be raised during the forthcoming finance drive in addition to the money budgeted for the 1973-74 year.

ORGANIZATION

MEMBERSHIP: From March 1972 to February 1, 1973, the LWV of El Paso had an increase in membership from 134 to 159, a 19% increase. Our recruitment activities included League Orientation Seminars in the spring (daytime) and summer (evening), with 11 newcomers added to our roles during the two-session orientation on August 29 and 31, 1972. The most recent membership activity was the Winter Coffee on January 27, 1973. Three guests joined League that day, and we are hopeful that more of our visitors to the Coffee will join.

Personal contacts by members and invitations to Unit and General Meetings have also been effective ways of introducing propects to League and gaining new members. In addition, we mailed "Facts," "Intrigued by League", and a current VOTER throughout the year to propsective members

MEMBERSHIP (continued) and provided these publications at Orientation meetings and coffees.

Two more Orientation series are planned for February and March. One

set will be in the daytime; the other will be an evening series.

Helping each member find a satisfying niche in League was an important aim for this year. Each member indicated committee and study item preferences and her special talents and interests on a Member Information Sheet. A Clearing House was set up to help committee chairmen learn who was interested in various activities.

Another Membership function was welcoming new members to League with a personal letter, a copy of the membership list, a Member's Handbook,

and other publications.

- UNITS: The LWV of El Paso has continued with four units 3 day units (Eastwood, Westside, and Northeast) and 1 night unit (Central). All units with the exception of Eastwood (Tuesday Morning) have been well attended. Several Eastwood members have returned to school or are now working; however, we expect the unit to show growth as a result of our Winter Coffee and the League Orientation Seminars.
- TELEPHONE: Seven members compose the general telephone committee which calls all members about general meetings or special events. There is a calling committee within each unit which calls for unit meeting information.
- PUBLICATIONS: The following publications were sent this year: Facts and Issues The Battered Ballot, Politics, Parties and Primaries, and Texas School Financing; Facts; Intrigued with League; When You Write to Washington; When You Write to Congress; Your Elected Officials Guide; Member-ship Handbook; National, State and El Paso VOTERs; Voters Guide Local-& State; Zoning Fact Sheets; Urban Renewal Fact Sheets. More publications could have been sent had our financial picture been a little brighter.
- VOTER: Nine issues of the VOTER were sent to all members, presidents of other Texas Leagues, State Board members, National LWV office, prospective local members, some elected officials and the news media.

BUDGET KEY

Hear Ye - Hear Ye - Hear Ye

The Budget Committee was asked to propose two budgets due to a proposed By-Law Change to raise our dues. The Board went over our work and agreed on the larger budget, thus it is called "Budget" and the one without a raise in dues is designated as the "Alternate". Board members believe that a new mimeograph machine and additional Voter Service materials are necessary. The choice is up to the members at Annual Meeting.

Budget figures are just money symbols for our activities. To help all of us convert the numbers into what they do for League, we're including the following very brief word discriptions of each account. We also have been asked to set expanded guide lines under each item and we would welcome any and all suggestions from you. - Budget Committee, Peg Brand, Chairman, Kay Burrell, Elayne Brown, Joyce Powers, and Mary Beth Brient, ex officio.

A. General Administration

- 1. President This should be a realistic allowance for expenses involving official League business (carfare, travel, fees, meals when attending non-League meetings).
- 2. Board Tools and Expenses should allow for the same general expenses listed under the President for board members (it does not) plus costs relating to the operation of the board (leadership materials, supplies etc.).

3. Administrative Committees

- a. Finance costs related to fund drives and the cultivation of contributors' interest.
- b. Membership Costs incurred in encouraging women to join and in orienting them as members.
- c. <u>Unit Organization</u> Costs of training unit chairmen, discussion leaders, and recorders; organizing and maintaining units.
- d. <u>Public Relations</u> Costs of tools for committee members; information supplied to the news media, entertaining press; cost of reaching other groups however any such activies which are part of a large-scale community project should be included under the appropriate sub-heading D item 3, <u>Community Services</u>.
- e. <u>Budget and Nominating</u> Cost of gathering ideas from members, visual aids, tools for committee members, etc.

4. Operating costs

a. Equipment upkeep - does not include purchase of any equipment but only servicing, repair, rental, replacement of parts.

(Budget Key - continued)

- b. General Supplies- Includes staionery, envelopes, mimeograph paper for all activities but bulletins, carbons, stencils, and office supplies other than permanent equipment.
- c. <u>Postage</u> cost of all postage <u>except</u> bulletin and subscription service.
- d. Telephone and telegraph all telephone and telegraph expenses incurred by League leaders on League business.
- e. <u>Insurance</u> Leagues should seriously consider carrying liability insurance covering League-sponsored meetings.
- B. Capital Expenditures Cost of cr accrued funds for new equipment.

C. Delegates, Travel and Affiliations

1. State Convention or State Presidents' Council

2. National Convention

3. Regional meetings and Workshops

4. Local

Items 1, 2, and 3 should include a fair estimate of expenses of delegates to these meetings (travel, hotel, meals, registration) and is probably beyond our reach, however something to consider. In a year of no National Convention, part of the expense for the following year is budgeted here as Accrued for Convention.

Item 4, Local, cost of League representation at local meetings of value to League activity.

D. Program and Activities

1. Publications

- a. State and National should be the net cost (expense less income from sales). Cost of materials used by committees is budgeted for under the appropriate heading.
- b. Local includes the net cost of printing or mimeographing any local publication (except the bulletin). If the publication is to be sold (including those on subscription service) budget here only the amount of cost less sales.
- c. Monthly bulletin- includes all expenses of monthly bulletin, supplies, reproducing, postage or mailing costs.
- d: <u>Subscription Service</u> includes all expenses covering subscription service, supplies, records, postage, and the cost of materials mailed to members.
- 2. Pregram Committees cost of supplying chairmen and their committees with basic tools, resource materials, visual aids used in presenting Program to members. Presenting Program to the public is included under item 3, Community Services.

(Budget Key - continued)

3. Community Services

- a. Meetings, demonstrations, tours cost of renting rooms for public meetings, sending notices, visual aids etc.
- b. <u>Voters Service</u> cost of publications distributed free to voters and other Voter Service information projects.
- c. Educational Activities Cost of providing League Program information to the community.
- d. Action expenses incurred in promoting League stands.
- 4. Support of State and National services the pledge to support the preparation of Program and leadership materials; guidance through conferencing and individual visits, development and coordination of local League viewpoints, promoting League Program, legislative activity, developing new leagues. These make democratic coordination and action on a statewide or nationwide basis possible and thus strengthen local League effectiveness in the community.
- 5. National dues this is the \$4 per member (number as of Jan. 1) dues By-Law change adopted at the last National Convention.
- E. Audit Books should be audited each year.
- F. Reserve Savings a contingency or emergency fund should be established.

INCOME

A. <u>Dues</u> - Raise them or not to raise them - ah, that indeed is the Question?!?

Budget 1 or Budget 2 - it's up to you. Or even something new!

Come to our League's Eighth Annual Meeting and make known your view.

B. Contributions

- 1. <u>Members</u> includes all contributions made by members, cash or gifts in kind.
- 2. Nonmembers includes contributions from non-members, individuals, business firms, other organizations cash or in kind.
- C. <u>Publications</u> any net income realized from sale of all League publications including those distributed through a local publications service.
- D. Other Sources includes income from Election Night reporting; garage sale; net income of any public meetings; any other income.
- From Reserves money accrued in last year's budget for future activities. It could also be money taken from reserve savings to balance the budget.



ARTICLE VI

Financial Administration

Sic

Sec. 2 <u>Dues</u> Amount of dues shall be set at the annual meeting by a 3/5 vote of those members present and voting. Annual dues shall be due and payable at the Annual Meeting in May.

- a. Any member who has not paid her/his dues by July 1st shall be dropped from the roll.
- b. Dues from new members will be prorated on a schedule as set by the Board.
- c. Senior citizens, 65 years or older, or students may be eligible for a 1/3 reduction of the annual membership dues when the need exists.
- d. A household membership is available when two or more members reside at the same address. The second membership, and subsequent memberships, will be 1/2 reduction of the annual membership dues.

BYLAWS OF THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF EL PASO

As adopted at the Annual Meeting in March of 1967 and amended by Annual Meetings in 1970, 1971, 1972, 1973, 1974, 1975, 1976, 1977, 1978, 1981, 1982, 1984, and 1986.

ARTICLE I Name

Sec. 1 Name The name of this organization shall be the League of Women Voters of El Paso. This local League is an integral part of the League of Women Voters of the United States and the League of Women Voters of Texas.

ARTICLE II Purposes and Policy

Sec. 1 <u>Purposes</u> The purposes of the League of Women Voters of El Paso are to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government and to act on selected governmental issues.

Sec. 2 Political Policy The League of Women Voters of El Paso may take action on local governmental measures and policies in the public interest in conformity with the Principles of the League of Women Voters of the United States. It shall not support or oppose any political party or any candidate.

ARTICLE III Membership

- Sec. 1 <u>Eligibility</u> Any person who subscribes to the purposes and policy of the League shall be eligible for membership.
- Sec. 2 Types of Membership The membership of the League of Women Voters of El Paso shall be composed of voting members and associate members.
 - a. Voting members shall be those citizens at least 18 years of age who join the League at the local level. Those members who make a lump sum life membership payment to the LWVUS shall be paid life members of LWVUS; those who have been members of the League for 50 years or more shall be honorary life members excused from the payment of dues.
 - b. Associate members. All others who join the League shall be associate members.

ARTICLE IV Board of Directors

Sec. 1 Number, Manner of Selection, and Term of Office The Board of Directors shall consist of the officers of the League, six elected Directors and not more than six appointed Directors. Three of the elected Directors shall be elected by the general membership at each Annual Meeting and shall serve for two years. The elected members shall appoint such additional Directors, not exceeding six, as they deem necessary to carry on the work of the League. The terms of office of the appointed Directors shall be one year. All terms shall coincide with the Fiscal year.

Page 2

Sec. 2 Qualifications No person shall be elected or appointed or shall continue to serve as an officer or director of this organization unless he/she

is a voting member of the League of Women Voters of El Paso.

Sec. 3 Vacancies In the event of the absence, disability or death of the President, the three Vice Presidents, in the order of their rank, shall possess all the powers and perform all the duties of that office until such time as the Board of Directors shall select one of its members to fill the vacancy. Any vacancy, other than in the office of the President, occurring in the Board of Directors by reason of the resignation, death, or disqualification of an officer or elected member, may be filled until the next Annual Meeting by a majority vote of the remaining members of the Board of Directors. Three consecutive absences from a Board meeting of any member without a valid reason shall be deemed a resignation.

Sec. 4 Powers and Duties The Board of Directors shall have full charge of the property and business of the organization with full power and authority to manage and conduct same, subject to the instructions of the general membership. It shall plan and direct the work necessary to carry the Program as adopted by the National Convention, the State Convention, and the Annual Meeting. The Board shall create and designate such special committees as

it may deem necessary.

Sec. 5 Meetings There shall be at least nine regular meetings of the Board of Directors annually. The President may call special meetings of the Board of Directors and shall call a special meeting upon the written request of five members of the Board.

Sec. 6 Quorum A majority of the members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE V Officers

- Sec. 1 Enumeration and Election of Officers The officers of the League of Women Voters of El Paso shall be a President, a first Vice President, a second Vice President, a third Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer who shall be elected for terms of two years by the general membership at an Annual Meeting and take office at the beginning of the fiscal year. The President, first Vice President, and Secretary shall be elected in odd-numbered years. The second Vice President, third Vice President and the Treasurer shall be elected in even-numbered years.
- Sec. 2 The President The President shall preside at all meetings of the organization and of the Board of Directors. She/he may, in the absence or disability of the Treasurer, sign or endorse checks, drafts, and notes. She/he shall be, ex officio, a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall have such usual powers of supervision and management as may pertain to the office of the president and perform such other duties as may be designated by the Board.

Sec. 3 The Vice Presidents The Vice Presidents shall perform such duties

as the President or Board may designate.

Sec. 4 The Secretary The Secretary shall keep minutes of all meetings of the League and of all meetings of the Board of Directors. She/he shall notify all Officers and Directors of their election. She/he shall sign, with the President, all contracts and other instruments when so authorized by the Board and shall perform such other functions as may be incident to her/his office.

Sec. 5 The Treasurer The Treasurer shall collect and receive all moneys due. She/he shall be the custodian of these moneys, shall promptly deposit them in a bank designated by the Board of Directors, and shall disburse the same only upon order of the Board. She/he shall present statements to the Board at their regular meetings and an annual report to the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE VI Financial Administration

Sec. 1 Fiscal Year The fiscal year of the League of Women Voters of El Paso shall commence on the first day of June each year.

Sec. 2 Dues Amount of dues shall be set at the annual meeting by a 3/5 vote of those members present and voting. Annual dues shall be due and payable at the Annual Meeting in May.

a. Any member who has not paid her/his dues by July 1st shall be

dropped from the roll.

b. Dues from new members will be prorated on a schedule as set by

c. Senior citizens, 65 years or older, or students may be eligible for a 1/3 reduction of the annual membership dues when the need

Sec. 3 Budget A budget for the ensuing year shall be submitted by the Board of Directors to the Annual Meeting for adoption. The budget shall include

support for the work of the League as a whole.

Sec. 4 Budget Committee A Budget Committee shall be appointed by the Board of Directors at least two months prior to the Annual Meeting to prepare a budget for the ensuing year. The Proposed Budget shall be sent to all members one month before the Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall not be eligible to serve as chairman of the Budget Committee but must review semiannually the financial status of the organization with the Budget Committee and present a report of that review to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

- Sec. 1 General Meetings There shall be at least four meetings of the membership each year. Time and place shall be determined by the Board of
- Sec. 2 Annual Meeting An Annual Meeting shall be held between May 1st and May 31st, the exact date to be determined by the Board of Directors. The Annual Meeting shall:

a. Adopt a local Program for the ensuing year,

b. Elect Officers and Directors, the chairman and two members of the Nominating Committee,

c. Adopt an adequate budget, and

d. Transact such other business as needed.

Sec. 3 Quorum Thirty percent of membership shall constitute a quorum at all business meetings of the League of Women Voters of El Paso.

ARTICLE VIII Nominations and Elections

Sec. 1 Nominating Committee The Nominating Committee shall consist of five members, two of whom shall be members of the Board of Directors. The Chairman and two members, who shall not be members of the Board, shall be elected at the Annual Meeting, and nominated by the current Nominating Committee. The two Board members shall be appointed by the Board of Directors immediately following the Annual Meeting. Any vacancy on the Nominating Committee shall be filled by the Board of Directors. Suggestions for nominations for Officers and Directors may be sent to this committee by any voting member.

Sec. 2 Report of Nominating Committee and Nominations From The Floor The report of the Nominating Committee of its nominations for Officers, Directors, and the members of the succeeding Nominating Committee shall be sent to all members one month before the date of the Annual Meeting. Immediately following the presentation of this report, nominations may be made from the floor by any voting member provided the consent of the nominee shall have been secured prior to the meeting, or in writing, if the nominee is not present.

Sec. 3 <u>Elections</u> The election shall be by ballot. Provided there is but one nominee for each office, the Secretary may be instructed to cast the ballot for every nominee. A majority vote of those qualified to vote and voting shall constitute an election. Absentee or proxy voting shall not be permitted.

Sec. 4 All nominees must have paid their dues by the time the nominating committee's report is published.

ARTICLE XI Program

- Sec. 1 $\underline{\text{Authorization}}$ The governmental principles adopted by the National Convention, and supported by the League as a whole, constitute the authorization for the adoption of the Program.
- Sec. 2 Program The program of the League of Women Voters of El Paso shall consist of:
 - a. Action to protect the right to vote of every citizen, and
 - b. Such local governmental issues as the membership shall choose for study and action.
- Sec. 3 Action by the Annual Meeting The Annual Meeting shall act upon the Program using the following procedures:
 - a. The Board of Directors shall consider the recommendations sent in by the voting members three months prior to the Annual Meeting and shall formulate a Proposed Program.
 - b. The Proposed Program shall be sent to all members one month before the Annual Meeting.
 - c. A majority vote of voting members present and voting at the Annual Meeting shall be required for adoption of subjects in the Proposed Program as presented to the Annual Meeting by the Board of Directors.
 - d. Recommendations for Program submitted by voting members three months prior to the Annual Meeting but not recommended by the Board of Directors may be considered by the Annual Meeting provided that:

 (1) The Annual Meeting shall order consideration by a majority vote, and (2) The Annual Meeting shall adopt the item by a two-thirds vote.

- e. Changes in the Program, in the case of altered conditions, may be made provided that: (1) information concerning the proposed changes has been sent to all members at least two weeks prior to a general membership meeting at which the change is to be discussed, and (2) final action by the membership is taken at a succeeding meeting.
- Sec. 4 Member Action Members may act in the name of the League of Women Voters only when authorized to do so by the proper Board of Directors.

ARTICLE X

National Convention, State Convention and Council

- Sec. 1 National Convention The Board of Directors at a meeting before the date on which the names of delegates and observers must be sent to the national office shall select delegates to that Convention in the number allotted the League of Women Voters of El Paso under the provisions of the Eylaws of the League of Women Voters of the United States.
 - Sec. 2 State Convention The Board of Directors at a meeting before the date on which names of delegates and observers must be sent to the state office shall select delegates to the Convention in the number allotted to the League of Women Voters of El Paso under the provisions of the Bylaws of the League of Women Voters of Texas.
 - Sec. 3 State Council The Board of Directors, at a meeting before the date on which the names of delegates and observers must be sent to the state office, shall select delegates to that council in the number allotted to the League of Women Voters of El Paso under the Provisions of the Bylaws of the League of Women Voters of Texas.

ARTICLE XI Parliamentary Authority

Sec. l <u>Parliamentary Authority</u> The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the organization in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these Bylaws.

ARTICLE XII Amendments

- Sec. 1 Amendments These Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present and voting at the Annual Meeting, provided the amendments were submitted in writing:
 - a. to Local Board by the Bylaws Committee at least three months prior to the Annual Meeting,
 - b. to State Director at least two months prior to Annual Meeting, and
 - c. to the membership at least one month in advance of the Annual Meeting.

Sec. 2 <u>Dues</u> Annual dues of \$20.00 shall be payable on the first day of the anniversary month of the member's joining League. Any member who fails to pay her/his dues within three months after they become payable shall be dropped from the membership rolls.

I still have great faith in the corporate wisdom of any group. This may be another example where approving the work of a group enables the removal of guilt and allows them to reconsider the present and the future.

Attached is our write-up on El Paso and it's problems. It was difficult to stop at two pages and still present meaningful information. We have more problems but we'll save them for another time.

Reservations for four double rooms and one single room have been made at the Hotel Paso del Norte for five nights commencing Saturday, October 28th, per your letters of September 11 and 15. Mrs. Clifton has established the room rate for the doubles at \$14.00 per night-a government rate which is appropriate due to the State Department participation. She will confirm this in writing to you.

The hotel staff is almost entirely bi-lingual with the exception of the Manager, Mr. White and his Secretary, Mrs. Clifton. The house physician is also bi-lingual as are most personnel at our hospitals. A pharmacy, dry cleaning facility, shoe repair shop, and beauty parlor are all located within a block of the hotel. A composite list will be compiled and forwarded.

Our rainy weather has Binally cleared and left us with an unbelievably green desert. The nights are cool and the day time temperatures are running in the 80's. Quite delightful really since the humidity is once again low.

We regret that your duties will not allow you to return to El Paso with the Seminar participants.

Winick, President LWV of Texas El Paso County is a 674, 500 acre wedge of semi-desert and mountain in the extreme tip of West Texas. It is bounded by New Mexico, the state of Chihuahua, Mexico, and Hudspeth County, Texas. The physical terrain is dominated by the Rio Grande Valley, a portion of the Tularosa Baisin and the Franklin Mountains—the southern most of the Rocky Mountains in the United States. Elevation ranges from 3,500 feet above sea level on the Rio Grande Valley floor to 7,192 feet at the peak of North Mt. Franklin. Soils within the County vary from fertile bottomland soils, now largely irrigated, to the rough, rocky upland slopes of the mountains.

The City of El Paso covers 117.5 square miles, has a population of 336.534 and dominates the County. El Paso's population ranks her fifth largest in Texas and 45th in the nation by an updated 1970 Census.

The City of El Paso is closely tied economically and culturally to Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, across the Rio Grande and the population of Juarez-456,722-now exceeds that of El Paso. El Paso is the largest United States city on the U.S.-Mexican border and Juarez is the largest Mexican city on that border, as well as the fourth largest city in Mexico. Together, these two cities form an international metropolitan complex of over three-fourths of a million people.

El Paso's problems are a bit more complex than another U. S. city of comparable size. It's border location, the fact that the majority population is 58% Mexican-American(a minority group), the English fluency and the educational level of the majority population is considerably less than the remainder of the population, the Mexican-American cultural ties and family ties to Mexico, the constant influx of legal and illegal aliens from the interior of Mexico-all these factors contribute to the complexity of the City problems.

The most serious problem facing El Paso is the lack of adequate, decent, safe, low and moderate-income housing. According to the 1970 Census there are 20,000 people per one square mile in South El Paso-the most seriously crowded and underdeveloped area of the city and within walking distance of downtown Juarez. Adequate sanitation facilities do not exist as demonstrated by the following statistics: 4,000 of the 5,400 dwelling units in South El Paso are Slum Tenements. The 4,000 units in 260 structures contain 11,000 people. Only 158 units have inside toilets, the remaining 3,842 units share 791 outside toilets. Only 120 of the 4,000 units have showers or bathtubs. Most of the tenements do not have running water in the units-approximately ten families share ONE outside cold water spicket. The median rent per month is \$27.00. The population make-up of the 20,000 people is: 19,500 Mexican-American, 400 White-Anglo, 100 Negro. There are three parks, three Community Centers, three Youth Centers, two day care facilities, and two health clinics servicing the South El Paso Community. "Green Belts" or open spaces are virtually unknown.

Mormal growth, replacement housing, and compensation for declining median indicate a need for 4,109 dwelling units per year for approximately ten years. This figure will increase by approximately 2,000 units should the Muskie Bill pass. The year 1969 was considered a "boom year" for the El Paso housing industry, yet only 2,577 dwelling units were completed. It is generally felt that alternatives to conventional contracting must be found if the housing problem is to be solved. One of the approaches presently under consideration is a cooperative self-help effort for selected people of low income. This would of course be in addition to the hundreds of Public Housing units soon to be built.

Earlier this year the Public Housing waiting list exceeded 1500 names with applications being accepted at the rate of 20 per day.

Alien labor refers to both the legal and illegal entrants who work in El Paso. The number of illegal workers is impossible to estimate as is their economic impact. From January 1st to August 31st 1972 a total of 57,027 illegal aliens were apprehended in the El Paso Sector. On September 18, 1972 a new record of apprehended illegal aliens was set for the city of El Paso-533 in one day. Illegal aliens are escorted to the International Bridge and supposedly return to Mexico. The alien commuters, those aliens who have been legally admitted for permanent residence in the United States, but who have chosen to maintain their domicile in their native country while working in the United States, number 13,000 in El Paso. In addition to these commuters, it is estimated that there are 5,000 United States citizens who work in El Paso and live in Juarez and commute to their jobs daily.

The economic impact of this commuter labor is registered in increased retail sales in El Paso, as these commuters spend 50% to 85% of their salaries in El Paso. The existence of the commuter element adds to El Paso's attractiveness to industry by offering a large, low wage labor pool; it also serves to keep low skill wage levels at a minimum level. The employment affects of the alien labor force are exhibited in the lower skill, lower wage occupations.

The recent legislative studies of the commuter issue center on the economic and employment effects of the alien labor force and dismiss the social problems. Surveys of commuters indicate that if their right to commute were to be removed, 80% to 90% of them would move to the United States to retain their jobs (Muskie Bill). This would result in a population increase of 50,000 people if all commuters and their families moved into El Paso.

El Paso has two Independent School Districts (El Paso and Ysleta) within the city boundaries with resultant differences in educational policies and financing of the schools. There are approximately 105 elementary and secondary schools in the two school districts. At present there are only three schools out of 66 in the El Paso ISD which offer bi-lingual education for Mexican-American children in their first four years. There is a program slated to start in September 1973 (in 15 schools) which would ultimately result in bi-lingual education in all the schools - adding 15 schools per year. The program is called ESL-SSL (English as a Second Language-Spanish as a Second Latguage). Workshops are currently being conducted for the hundreds of teachers who will be involved in the ESL-SSL Program.

The lack of a bi-lingual education has resulted in some rather startling revelations. In a study conducted of Mexican-American families forced to relocate due to the Chamizal Project, it was found that only 8% of the fathers had a Good or Excellent fluency in English and 10% of the mothers. The educational levels were: 17% of the fathers and 19% of the mothers had some high school, and only 9% of the fathers and 7% of the mothers were high school graduates or above. How can the hopelessness and loss of productivity of these people be measured.

Public health services (city-county clinics) are limited to "Well Baby" maternity clinics, and innoculations. Infants and children are seen periodically by a doctor up to their fifth birthday. Vitamins are provided for infants under one year. Maternity and pre-natal clinics are conducted in City-County facilities altho deliveries are made at hospitals. Innoculations are given free of charge to anyone, regardless of age, as long as they are enrolled in an institution of learning. Space in the clinics is also loaned to Family Planning personnel from R.E. Thomason General Hospital. The programs are successful but facilities are heavily overused. Common health problems-particularly malnutrition, dental problems, diarrhea, and anemiamust be referred to Thomason Hospital or to private physicians. Thomason provides excellent facilities and staff but transportation to the hospital for those without cars is extremely difficult and time consuming.



vice president of the League of Women Voters of El Paso, told The Herald-Post today, "I am especially pleased about the All-America Cities Award, because the League of Women Voters were responsible for nominating El Paso!

"Consdering that League has only been organized in El Paso for five years, we are proud to have been able to show the nation the citizen interest and activity

Mrs. Tullis gave a brief history of the local league of Women Voters, explaining that it is a non-partisan group whose primary purpose is to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in gov-

MRS. JOHN BRIENT was chosen the first president in April, 1965, when the Provisional League of Women Voters of El Paso held its organizational meeting and elected a full slate of officers.

Mrs. Brient was later named Woman of the Year partly because of her work at that time. During the provisional period the El Paso League carried out an in-depth survey of El Paso city and county governments, studied state and national League program items, conducted a get-out-the-vote campaign for El Paso, and held a finance drive. Requirements of the provisional period were met in less than two years, and the League of Women Voters of El Paso was established in March 1967. Air pollution was adopted as the first local issue to study with Mrs. Irwin Brand president that year.

DURING THE following months the LWV of El Paso published and distributed its first local Voters Guide in English and Spanish, distributed Guides prepared by the state League, registered thousands of voters, and distributed a booklet on Texas Constitutional Review throughout the

In 1968 air pollution was continued a local study item and later that year LWV members testified before a State Senate committee on the air pollution study findings, made speeches about this study to civic groups, presented a public "Look at El Paso Poverty Programs," and prepared and distributed another Voters Guide. League members also sponsored a series of meetings for the public to hear candidates for School Board, and held a forum on Housing for the Com-

WOMEN VOTERS LEAGUE ADOPTS NEW POSITION

Editor, El Paso Times:

On Jan. 15, 1970, the League of Women Voters of the United States announced a new national position in favor of the direct popular election of the President and vice president and the abolishment of the present Electoral College system. This marks the beginning of a national effort for a constitutional amendment establishing a direct election method. The league position also includes provisions for a runoff election in the event that no candidate receives more than 40 per cent of the votes cast.

This position was reached after 18 months of study and discussion by 1,000 local Leagues in all sections of the country. This consensus is a reflection of the League's traditional commitment to full and direct citizen participation in our political system.

The League of Women Voters will immediately press for the passage of a Senate Joint Resolution for a direct election amendment during this session of Congress. (A House Joint Resolution, H.J. Res. 681, received the necessary two-thirds vote on September 18, 1969.)

URGES UNDERSTANDING OF HOUSING PROBLEM

Editor, El Paso Times:

The League of Women Voters of El Paso, having recognized the urgency of housing problems in El Paso, based on concentrated study and research, last November recommended that public housing complexes not be concentrated in one locale, but be integrated in all economic areas of the city. Under the original guidelines established by HUD, the area south of Interstate 10 and extending east to Zaragosa Road was the recommended locality for the construction of public housing. Recognizing the unfeasibility of this con-centration, HUD has eliminated this requirement and will permit public housing to be located in all areas of El Paso. We concur with this new policy and urge the Public Housing Authority to recognize the benefits to all parties concerned, both the present residents and the people who will occupy these proposed complexes.

The need for housing has reached critical proportions throughout the United States and we in El Paso are no less affected than any other area, perhaps more so. To alleviate this crisis requires cooperation from every segment of our community and above all, an understanding of the various possible solutions. An explanation of the various housing programs, types of housing accomodations, density, whether or not public facilities will be expanded, and other factural information would be of great benefit to the community, and to assist the citizen to make an informed deci-

The League of Women Voters urges that all concerned; government agencies, elected officials, citizen's groups, the news media; listen to all points of view, get the correct facts, dispel the misinformation and emotionalism an issue of this nature gives rise to, and work together, as citizens of El Paso, to create a better quality of life for all of our citizens.

The League commends the emergence of the many citizens' groups and hope that when the concern over housing is resolved, these same groups will continue to work for needed facilities and improvements in their neighborhoods, and will prove to be a bridge of communication between citizens and government.

Council hears Wiring Report

The prospects of adopting an Electrical Code allowing use of ROMEX wiring (non-metallic s h e a t h e d) for construction appear slim after disclosure that areas using the wiring annexed into the City have shown the highest rate of fires.

Fire Chief M. L. Coleman called ROMEX "a glorified extension cord" and pointed out that Van Horne Park and Hacienda Heights had homes with the wiring and also had a high fire rate. He made the statements during yesterday afternoon's second day of hearings before City Council on adoption of various national codes for the City.

THE SOUTHERN Standard Housing Code and the Air Conditioning, Refrigeration, Ventilation, and Evaporative Cooling Code drew almost no opposition and are expected to stay basically as is with some revisions.

Local builders called for the ROMEX wiring to end restrictions crippling construction in South El Paso and other low-income areas. In the past, the City has allowed variances to the City codes to allow construction where expenses made projects prohibitive.

A file letter from the City of Los Angeles introduced into the hearings revealed that the city has not allowed non-metallic sheathed cable wiring except for a World War II period. The letter said several cases of shock to persons resulted from the ROMEX type wiring being pierced by nails, staples and screw contacts. Flexible metal conduit has been used in Los Angeles for 35 years and has ana "excellent fire safety record" the letter said.

The current El Paso code calls for metal conduit.

New Voter Registration Policy Set

Unlike in previous voter registration periods, there will not be any deputization of agents during the 1971 voter registration drive.

This was explained by County Tax Assessor-Collector C. R. Terrazas, who said the new policy will not keep voters drive groups from picking up voter registration applications and distributing them.

TERRAZAS SAID the Tax office is also taking registration applications from persons 18 to 21 years of age, but holding them aside until the Supreme Court decides on the constitutionality of a federal government action allowing 18 year olds to vote.

In not deputizing additional personnel, Terrazas said the move has been towards one of modernization in hopes of avoiding errors in the process of applications.

In several cases last year aliens were found to have been registered, although there is no record showing they voted.

"WITH THE USE of data processing in sifting the registration applications, the need for typing is eliminated," said Terrazas. "Moreover, master and precinct lists can be readied immediately."

The current voter drive started in October with the County Tax office mailing registrations to the some 95,000 persons who registered for 1970.

Applications may be returned by mail. Deadline for returning applications is Jan. 31, 1971. Since Jan. 31 falls on a Sunday, the applications may be postmarked at midnight that day or be delivered by 5 p.m. Feb. 1, a Monday.

Registration slips will be sent to applicants starting Jan. 15, 1971.

Only husbands, wives, daughters, and sons may act as agents in delivering the registration applications.

Registration applications may be mailed or delivered in person to the County Courthouse, Northgate, and Ysleta offices of the County Tax office.

Says Pollution Problem Rests With Individual

Dr. John N. Abersold, environmental consultant and chairman of El Paso Industrial Betterment Council, said Monday night that solution of the pollution problem rests with each individual, since principal factors involved in the pollution crisis are rapid population growth and a higher standard of living demanding waste-producing products from industry.

Dr. Abersold made his remarks during a meeting of Cielo Vista School PTA in the

school. He emphasized that control and reduction of pollution, especially of the air, must be geared to tolerable, reasonable levels consistent with good health. He cited a recent article in U.S. News and World Report which predicted a bill to American taxpayers to clean up the nation's air and water of \$300 million over the next 30 years.

He also said within two or three years Mexico will initiate control standards similar to those of the U.S. which will lead to a reduction in air pollution in El Paso-Juarez area.

Anti-Pollution Law Row On El Paso Books

Through a local ordinance adopted Thursday by City Council, El Paso now has the way to control air pollution and all that remains is the continued will.

An anti-pollution ordinance cotrolling contaminants was adopted by Council on first reading incorporating regulations of the Texas Air Control Board and adding some of its own. Final passage is required by Dec. 31 to make the City eligible for continued federal aid grants.

Air contaminants are defined as any smoke, soot, fly ash, noxious or obnoxious acids, fumes, oxides, gases, vapors, odors, toxic or radioactive substances, waste particulate or any liquid, solid or gaseous matter present in the outdoor atmosphere.

CHARGE RESPONSIBILITY

Air pollution is defined as the presence thereof in sufficient quantity or duration and of such characteristic as to be injurious to public welfare, property, health of human, plant or animal life or which interferes with the enjoyment of life or

The City-County health director is charged with the responsibility of administration and enforcement. Jurisdiction extends 5,000 feet beyond City limits.

The ordinance states the director "shall" request institution of judicial proceedings to prosecute violations and compel the prevention and abatement of air pollution.

Also, he shall inspect all pollution control equipment, all new industrial activities where there is a possibility of pollution, investigate complaints; make investhestion of equipment and sources and manitain a complete record. He also is

directed to collect and disseminate pollution information to the public and foster the best possible management of air resources.

In addition to TACB regulations governing smoke, dust, outdoor burning, sulphur compounds and motor vehicle exhausts, the City adopted standards controlling emission of lead compounds, hydrogen fluoride, beryllium, hydro-carbons and carbonyls, ozone and carbon

It also set up local regulations and standards of opacity of smoke and dust.

Storage, processing, transportation and operation of equipment that are sources of windborne dust or particulate matter shall be so conducted as to prevent it from being carried beyond property boundaries in concentrations exceeding state regulations.

A section covering odors was deleted from the ordinance.

The health director or employes are empowered to enter upon private property to determine compliance with regulations and the City attorney is authorized to file and prosecute civil suits in district court to prevent continued violations.

Representatives of the League of Women Voters and the Group Against Smog and Pollution (GASP) lauded the action as a step in the right direction, but expressed hope that later amendment will further strengthen the ordinance.

Both organizations joined in calling for establishment of a non-political Air Control Board to consider local problems of pollution and enforcement, lending other wise unavailable expertise and taking some of the burden from City agencies.

OFFERS EXPLANATION ON AMENDMENT 7 44 20 Editor, El Paso Times:

The League of Women Voters, through its study of State-Local Relations, offers the following clarification concerning Amendment 7.

In 1966 a constitutional amendment allowed counties over 1.2 million population to consolidate offices and services; this would affect Harris and Dallas Counties. In 1968 El Paso and Tarrant Counties were given this authority in another constitutional amendment which passed.

The legislature has only approved the consolidation power for Tarrant County (Fort Worth area) however, and no actual consolidation of services or subdivisions has occurred there.

In order for El Paso County to exercise its constitutional right to consolidate services, the legislature must pass the enabling legislation.

In Texas, county government is an arm of the state. The organization, powers, and duties are spelled out in the state constitution and each county is organized in the same manner, no matter the size.

The County Home Rule amendment was not workable and was recently removed from the constitution by amendment.

Further, the passing of any amendment to the Constitution merely authorizes the legislature to pass enabling legisla-

for violation of the Clean Air Act of Texas.

Specifically, the City charged violations of Regulation I of the rules and regulations of the Tex. Air Control Board which limits industrial dust discharge to 175 micrograms per cubic meter. The City said tests taken on five dates in March and April showed from 213 micrograms to 803.5 micrograms emitted by the plant.

The suit was filed by assistant City Attorney John Ross Jr. after City Council met in special session authorizing it.

CHEMICAL EMISSIONS such as sulfur content are not included in the suit. The City charged only excessive particulate emission. Ross said he will go to Austin next Wednesday to confer with the State Attorney General in co-operations of the Texas Air Control Board. He said he had been working on the case two months.

In conjunction with the suit, Mayor Pete de Wetter will notify the TACB that the City urges no granting of a variance for particulate emission which is sought by ASARCO in a hearing before the TACB May 4 in City Council chambers.

E.P. Housing Survey Is Released

A housing survey has been released by the League of Women Voters in an attempt to explain several points about low-income housing proposals and existing units in the City of El Paso.

The survey is a simplification of the situation. It notes that 2,700 new units are scheduled including singles, duplexes, apartments, and town house units. It counts 2,670 exisiting units undergoing and scheduled to undergo modernization or rehabilitation. This includes 1,320 units already owned by the Public Housing Authority.

THOSE ELIGIBLE for the housing are listed by the League as elderly, low-income, and middle-income families. However, authorities have always pointed out that middle-income families are not candidates for public housing.

didates for public housing. 'Rent for the projects is explained by the league as 25 per cent of their net adjusted income. Officials of Housing Authority explain it thusly: A family with a \$3,000 income would be allowed a deduction of \$120 for the head of the family and \$100 per child. This would give a figuring income of \$2,480. Cut into a fourth or 26 per cent would leave \$620. Divided by 12 months would set the family's rent at \$51.66 per month. The rest of the rent tab would be picked up by the federal government.

Water and sewage service are treated in the survey to answer questions of how the new units would affect such service. The answer is that the PSB must furnish service no matter where the units are built and whether or not there is adequate service in the areas. PSB officials told The Herald-Post they will be beholden to extend lines if necessary, but that all areas will be given service.

PLACEMENT OF the units in the Lower Valley also brings up the question of irrigation water rights. The League's answer is that "acreage feet of water is not lost, it is re-divided among the users."

PSB officials say this is a simplification of the matter. El Paso Water Utilities director John Hickerson said, "It's true that water rights are not lost. However, the developers of the subdivisions have the right to reassign the water rights to other property owners or the PSB, and we actively seek those rights."

He explained that more water rights are salvaged if the reassignment can be made before subdividing. After subdivision the areas occupied by streets goes into a "pool" for all water rights users — both American and Mexican under the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation.

THE LEAGUE questions whether the water table might be disturbed by acreage being taken out of irrigation. Hickerson said, sometimes watering of lawns makes up for the loss of crop irrigation. No conclusive evidence is available to show that the water table is adversely affected, Hickerson said.

Three women, representing the League of Women Voters and GASP, Inc., sparked with recom mendations what started to be a routine air pollution problems hearing, novel to the hearing committee but old hand to the witnesses.

The hearing was conducted by the Interim Committee for the Study of Land Use and Environmental Control in City Council Chambers today. State Rep. Don Caviness, committee vice chairman, conducted the hearing.

EXPLAINING the purpose of GASP, which stands for Group Against Smog and Pollution, Mrs. Virginia Baylor, number two pollution problem, spokesman, told the committee GASP, with 300 members is concerned with all facets of pollution.

"We intend to be around a long time, so you might as well get used to us," she told the committee. Mrs. Baylor was not originally on the hearing agenda, but Rep. Caviness welcomed additional witness-

Butler, chairman of the Air Pollution Committee, El Paso League of Women Voters, gave committee members 18 recommendations to halt pollution based on the Women Voter's activities which began in March, 1968, before a hearing of the same committee in El

She asked among other things that a determination be made on what insecticides are being used and by whom. She urged the encouraging of an Air Control Program in Juar-

ANOTHER recommendation made was that ecology become a required subject in the schools starting at kindergarten so all children may learn of the environment at an

Mrs. J. Max Quenon, president of the Women Voters, told the committee the League is concerned with water pollution to a great extent, pointing that the Lower Rio Grande has seen some mineral contamination in areas where mercury is mined.

Earlier, John Hickerson, director of the El Paso Water Utilities, said no new laws were needed by the local utilities operation as it operated adequately under the Texas Water Quality Control Act.

HE SAID THE City relies on Rio Grande water for onetenth of its water supply and that it has been treating sewage water for return to the river since 1910.

OUR LOCAL RACE FOR INNER SPACE

"Man breathes roughly 10 times more air by weight daily than he consumes food and water. He avoids polluted food and water like a plague; should he not be equally concerned that the air which he is forced to breathe is reasonably free of pollution?" (1) p.79.

In March 1967, the LWV of El Paso adopted as its local program item, "A Study of Air Pollution in the El Paso Area with emphasis on:

1.) Testing methods

2.) Sources of Pollution

3.) Effective methods of control

4.) Legislation

5.) Effects on life (2)

Since that time we have familiarized ourselves with air pollution in general, and performed an in depth study of El Paso's air pollution situation. The result of our study is the following position statement reflecting member consensus: "The League of Women Voters of El Paso supports regional air pollution control." (3)

In addition to the above position statement the League suggested the following as possible areas of action:

- . Publish a "Facts and Issues on Air Follow" ..."
- . Report to El Paso by means of communications media as there are significant developments which affect this region.
- . Work for local ordinances dealing with air pollution control and abatement which are consistent with existing or forthcoming federal and state regulations.
- . Urge the formation of a citizens advisory committee on air pollution problems, their control and abavement.
- Urge the formation of a local Air Pollution Control Board to complement the Texas Air Control Board.
- . Urge on everyone the necessity for interstate and international cooperation for more effective control of air pollution problems.

In February of 1967 the local Fact Shoot asked the question, "Can the LWV be effective in encouraging the City of El Paso to implement the State Clean Air Act of 1967?" (4) We believe we have answered that question in the affirmative. Consult your Air Pollution Calendar and see if you don't agree?

AIR POLLUTION CALENDAR

1963 - 1970

MARCH 1968 - Air Pollution was voted as an item for continued evaluation and action and work began on a Fact Booklet. (Not published as yet, but close!)

Things were very quiet on the Air Pollution front during this period. Then a local attorney and State Representative seemed to sense that ecology will be the pollitical issue of the future. He held several meetings around town and stirred up considerable interest, even excitement. In the meantime our League President was working to organize a Citizen's Committee for Clean Air. After this, things proceeded rather rapidly and Air Pollution has been a red hot action item ever since.

MARCH 1970 - League President makes statement to El Paso County Commissioner's Court. League is instrumental in getting a \$9,000 Air Pollution allocation by the court to be matched by over \$104,000 in federal funds.

MARCH 31st - Clean Air Council votes to incorporate with Citizens' for Clean Air. This organization is now called GASP, Group Against Smog and Pollution.

APRIL 1970 - Former state Senator Claypool flies in for conference with local people interested in Air Pollution. League was included.

APRIL 20-24 - League Participated in Environmental Action Week at UTEP.

MAY 6 - Testimony before TACB concerning ASARCO low level emissions. *

MAY 14 - Testimony before TACB concerning ASARCO SO, emissions.

JUNE 17 - LWV El Paso makes 18 recommendations to State Senate Interim Committee on Land Use and Environmental Control. (See bolow.)

JUNE - League is instrumental in Mayor's decision to have the Health Department give bi-monthly air pollution briefings.

DECEMBER 8 - League statement at Public Service Board Meeting.

DECEMBER 17 - League supports local Air Pollution Ordinance.

The funds allocated in March of 1970 have provided our city with \$11,000 worth of sampling equipment We now have an air sampling network of six stations which will eventually be expanded to 10 stations. New personnel has been added to the department.

Correct work of the Health Unit included healting incincrators, testing small firms emitting particulates, contacting so ton gin operators, making weekly sampling of ASARCO as ordered by courd, and seeking solutions to the problem of unpaved roads. Several people that her sent to school and have gained additional information to be used in this work. Bus companies have been contacted and any reported be is removed and adjusted. They are seeking to coordinate weather reports and reduction of industrial activities on high air pollution potential days.

Long range plans include increased facilities and upgrading of current practices and an emergency contingency plan. (5)

We now have an air pollution ordinance. There is some doubt as to how effective this will be. It was passed in order that we might not lose our air pollution grant. However, several important clauses were omitted at final reading and we have no protection with regard to automotive emissions.

TEXAS ATR CONTROL BOARD

The TACB is "the principal authority in the material matter relative to the quality of the air resources in the state and for setting standards, criteria, levels and emission limits for air content and pollution control,"

All nine members of the TACB are appointed by the governor to serve for six years. Their terms are staggered.

The purpose is to safeguard the air resources of the state from pollution by controlling or abating air pollution and emissions of air contaminants consistent with the protection of health, general welfare and physical property of the people, including the esthetic out yment of the air resources by the people and the maintenance of a locate visibility.

SECOND STATE

Thank you for your letter about polarization at Convention. This is not the first Convention (nor will it be the last) where there were minorities on various questions and in varying strengths. I expect it will always be so for the League is a very diversified group as the Convention ceearly demonstrated. I think this Convention found much common ground. The votes on all Program choices but one were overwheiming and that one had a solid majority. Agremment on bylaws requires an extreordinary majority so the final choice of how Leagues should fund the national budget was acceptable to a very large number of delegates and earlier defeated proposals such as the variations on the Board's proposal were acceptable to a majority though not the 2/3 required. Actually, the minority did vastly influence the final decision on member financial support over 58% of the delegates voted for the inclusion of the support in the member article - local Leagues to set own, \$4 for state and \$4 for national.

I do not understand your basis for stating that voting was along geographical lines, bowever these terms would be defined and there might not be complete League agreement on that! There are conservative elements in every part of the country and liberal too. When we analyze Program - making recommendations from local and state Leagues and consensus reports we analyze both in relation to size of League and geopraphical location, i.e. we are looking to see if there are differences among the views of members in certain size League and Leagues in different parts of the country. Differences have not occured. We watched this especially closely on the issue of welfare, a controversial issue if there ever was one. For example, the position against a work requirement for welfare recipients came through to the same degree from all parts of the country and from all kinds of Leagues. I see no reason to think that Convention votes differed in this regard. I think it is good to keep in mind, too, that though larger Leagues have more representation and larger Leagues are more often in the heavily populated urbanized sections of the country, each League no matter how small (even 25 members) is entitled to at least one delegate, that is, there is a weighting in favor of members in small Leagues, and perhaps the middle of the country you speak of has more of these than other parts,

I am very pleased with the posttive attitude you express on the finance question, and that you have set out to support your state Board. The national Board 44d not anticipate that the national Beague would get

local Leaguenper member support and the state Leagues be left out. I hope League members everywhere rectify this serious ommision as rapidly as possible.

A Convention is not and cannot be a very much enlarged discussion unit and the process by which decisions are reached is not the consensus process. All decisions are made by a vote and the only way to reach a middly ground is through the process of amending a motion (which is also a vote). In the end, the delegate makes up her mind whether she is for or against the motion before her. It seems to be that delegate discussion does moderate views. Some motions themselves reflect a middle ground, I think this was true on the vote for the per member payment.

Thank you so much for wiritng to me and for your gracious words. We will certainly try to provide the "understanding leadership" of which you wrote so eloqueatly. Please write again if you have other thoughts or questions.

From: The Board of the LWV of El Paso

Some of our members, including several Board members, were disturbed by several decisions made at National Convention. The question in our minds became, "How do we react positively to a difficult situation?" To us the problem seems to be that there are two different philosophies held by different Leaguers, based primarily on geographical locations in the U.S. We realize that the more populous Eastern, Northeastern, and sometimes West Coast Leagues view League structure and goals differently from the vast majority of us living in "the middle", and that they out-voted us on most controversial issues at the Convention because they had more delegates there than we did. The attitudes of Leaguers generally reflect the thinking of the communities from which they come. We have responded to this situation in two ways.

First, for any of our members to drop out because they do not like events that took place at National Convention is a grave mistake. Copping out is not the answer at all. If we do not like the trend the League is taking it is imperative for us to remain in the fold, increase our numbers and give adequate financing to our local and State League to develop a stronger Texas League than ever before. We want our members to be inspired by the idea that we want to increase the size of our League in order to have more delegates go to the next National Convention. Further we want them to get excited about finances in order to pay the expenses of extra delegates as well as give more financial help to our State League.

Our finance drive was a disaster this year. We must operate our local League on a less than shoestring budget, and we may find that it is impossible to increase our pledge to state. But we intend to make our members aware of the plight of the Texas League, and involve them now in planning for adequate financing of both the State and local League for next year. We believe that a positive, optimistic attitude can be more contagious than a negative approach. We propose to give this kind of leadership, pointing out to our disgruntled members the things that they like about League, and helping them have a vision of how much greater we can become.

Secondly, we are concerned about the beginning of polarization which was evidenced at the National Convention. We are reminded of "United we stand, divided we fall . . .", and call on our national leadership to help Leagues from the two philosophical camps to minimize our difference, and in true League tradition try to find areas of agreement in order to avoid a real split in our national League membership.

Thank you for consideration of our thinking on these matters.

Dear Mrs. Benson,

I came away from the National Convention disturbed by what I feel is a trend boward polarization within League. There seems to be two different philosophies about League sturcture and golls. The stronger, more populous Eastern, Northeastern and some West Coast Leagues consistantly outvoted the Leaguers from more conservative areas in the nation on controversial issues.

Leaguers do seem to reflect the thinking of their local communities to a great extend. I believe that El Paso has the most liberal voting record of any Texas city. Our League seems to reflect this attitude, as we sometimes seem a little set-apart from the mainstream of Texas thinking. When I went to the State Presidents' Council I was shocked at the bitterness and negativism of many Texas Leaguers directed against the dues proposal. I consistantly and firmly believed that most of those Leagues who thought that they would go down the drain if the dues proposal passed would do so because of the directives rather than the money involved. But as I watched Leaguers not only from Texas but many other states during the week at Atlanta who found themselves always outnumbered with various proposals being adopted that would be difficult for their members or communities to accept, I felt a sympathy for their legitimate concerns, and the helplessness of being a minority. I could see that the Leagues from liberal areas who did not face these problems and like the innovative changes made at the national level were pleased that backward steps were not taken.

I was disappointed that the National Board did not try to pull the two groups together into a united body. What came through to me was that the national leadership was too concerned, perhaps justly so, about adequate financing to be aware of the seriousness of the division. The hopelessness and utter futuility of being a member of a strong minority became overwhelming by the end of the week. Decisions made relected a majority thinking and not consensus. In my opinion it was not League-like to pass up the opportunity to try to find a common meeting ground.

I will not quibble about the chair's reversal of interpretation on allowing Article XIV to be amended. Perhaps it was just coincidental that it came after the dues amendment was defeated, and those favoring that decision hay have found other reversals which appeared biased to them. With very few exceptions, I commend you for

being axtremely fair, your delightful sense of humor, and for being a truly beautiful and competent national president. I recall that you asked delegates to exercise dissipline in using red card, and at the same time asked us to be patient with those who did, because the issue was important to the person speaking. This is an exampled of trying to bridge a chasm. I firmly believe that is the National Board pledges to give this kind of understanding leadership, reaching out to both groups to help find areas of agreement in the true League tradition, that the polarization which is beginning in our group can be curbed, and that united, we can be the moderating voice that a country which is becoming fragmented desperately needs.

Incidentallyk when I was in Atlanta, I was very concerned about the financial plight of the Texas League (and heard similar expressions from Leaguers from many other states) but I did not think that El Pascans would be upset by delegates' decisions at the Convention, as our members had favored adequate financing for National League. I was not prepared for the strong reaction against the Vietnam Resolution. The Careful distinction that this was only an expression of the personal opinions of delegates voting at the convention and not an official League position was not make in our local paper. I am pleased that our local Board has taken a very positive attitude in recating to this difficult situation. In the hope that we may help other League leaders in Texas to be more positive, we have circularized the enclosed letter.

Dear Eloise,

I've thought and thought about your request, and I still come up with a big "zero" concerning additional training for local League Presidents. As I mentioned, I felt swampfed with questions without answers when I became president in March. But when I lhok back on the things perplexing me, I really cant't find very many that could have been answered by a state-wide workshop. I had not served on the local Board for four years, and had been fairly or toatlly inactive prior to my nomination as president. (The situation here made me sick, and I felt helpless to contribute to a solution, and so a stayed away from League meetings, most/Aly I think to save myself. All contacts with League at that time gave me a feeling of utter despair.) Thus, you see, I was totally unprepared to step in as president, and it took me a long while to wade through my confusion and ignorance, emerge, and finnally assume leadership. Actually I stepped into a situation that was much stickier than I had anticipated.

The greatest problem which all League's Presidents must feel is lack of time, and too many demands coming from too many directions. I don't know if there is a solution to this or not, but I do think your suggestion to compile a list where to find what in our publications would help because, as I'e heard Lois say a million times, It's all written down somewhere. The problem is lack of time to read.

One of the problems here has been a poorly trained Board. You may remember that I screamed about think the lack of Board Training here when I was on State Board, and wanted Lois to come as soon as possible last spring. That was okay as far as it went, but it took me a long while, receiving shock after shock to realize that although our Board is composed, for the most part, of people doing a fairly good job with their own portfoliosm they almost never assume responsibility for the whole League, and in fact are quite ignorant about areas of League out of their territory. For example, at a recent consensus taking meeting, a former PR Vice President suggested that we vote on our consensus.

This Seeing so many holes in their general League knowledge and their lack of understanding of total Board responsibility has led me to plan an in-depth

Board Training Workshop. This is where I could really use help. I am working on a curriculum, but would love to have a curriculum handed to me to be expanded or adapted for this League.

Dear Eloise,

My terrible personal habit of beginning, but not finishing or mailing letters has carried over to League.

I was just so glad that you called, and that we are going to get to room together! I really am looking forward to time with you. The New Mexico President called the Las Cruces president and wanted to room with her, and so that worked out fine. Mila Krone, our Program VP who wants to be a delegate is going for Wichita Falls, and has made a reservation for her room.

I wrote for our room reservation right after our conversation, but haven't heard yet. I really don't expect we will get into the Convention Hotel this late, but I wrote to the hotel and and room service provided by the Atlanta League.

We ended our League year with a very, very fine Annual Meeting. It seemed both the climax for a rather spectacular second half year, and the beginning of what promiese to be annual meeting. We sat on dead center for about the first five months of this League year, and then in Sept. we started moving. But in October a momentum got underway that has mushroomed, and frankly I find it not only exciting, but simply amazing. We have had a 42 percent increase in membership. League is vital, alive, stimulating and contagious, that this present great spirit of happening and movement plus an election year, our memberhip should certainly continue to increase.

My greatest concern is the workshop to grain board members. We are not going to assume that anyone knows anything, and start from scratch. The Local League Handbook and Fundamentals are my Bibles, but there is so much more to be said, and I'm sure I'll not think of all of it. I'm anxious to talk with you about this.

We have bridged the schism that had this League torm axuman asunder, but it will be years before the scars are healed. In deed, little skirmishes have taken place from time to time during the year, the latest just before the Annual Meeting. These are at least a nuisance, and somewhat destructive. The outgoing PR VP has been a ring leader busy-body and trouble maker, and is giving her successor hell right now. The new person is terrific, but is completely fed-up with the pettiness directed at her. We will probably continue to contend with this sort of thing, but the great positive tide can't be stopped by it. My philosphy has been that a positive, optomistic attitude is more powerful and contagious than negativism, and I believe that the results of the year bear this out.

I'm sorry that I didn't come through with any concrete suggestions for you, as I know that is what you need. It seems to me that most of the questions that I have besides those that had to do with the mess that things were in here, involve finances. That whole area has always been foggy for me—but then I can't balance our family budget, hate to write checks, etc., and so maybe that's just me, and other presidents find it all perfectly clear.

Speaking of fanances, we have our series of discussions on the proposed dues change, policy change, and emergency state program item this next week. Our Board opposes the dues change, but we are trying to present this as objectively as we would a program item—leading off with a discussion of what State and National Leagues are to help members understand what they do for us and why they need money, and then we'll go to the cons.







A group of 11 people elected from members of the El Paso Library Association, which is a private corporation (membership open to anyone who pays the annual dues); composed of a balance of men and women who shall hold office for a term of 7 years; two members are charged with the administration of the El Paso Public Library System; Librarian is elected by the Board and Board determines the Library Director's salary: officers of the Board are elected by the Board at the January meeting and they include a president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer; immediate past president if retiring from Board, is made an exofficio member.

Director of Public Libraries (Librarian) Elected by the Library Board. Has charge of the City library system, including a central library and branch libraries; and performs related work as required; salary range is \$12,841 · 17,278; City Council determines the appropriation the library receives.

While the final responsibility for total municipal function rests with the Mayor and City Council, authority for carrying out city policies is delegated to the various departments. All but a few employees are under classified Civil Service.

In addition there are some official citizens advisory boards and commissions which assist in the operation of the city government. These groups meet regularly, make general'studies in the area of their concern, arbitrate code variations or property evaluations, investigate and interview, where applicable, prospective department managers, and make detailed reports and recommendations to the City Council for final decisions.

These Boards and Commissions are established by City Ordinances, by the City Charter and in several cases, by State Law (for example, the Library Board and City-County Health Board). Their membership consists of experts in the field or ore known to be interested in it.


Members serve without pay, with the following exception - the Public Service Board - whose members receive \$20 for each meeting attended up to a maximum of \$1000 per year. The recently adopted City Charter amendment establishing an appointed Board of Equalization does provide that such members will be compensated for their services in a reasonable amount as determined by the City Council.
