MINUTES

Of the Twenty-Fourth Annual Reunion of the Texas
Division of the United Confederate Veterans,
Held at Hillsboro, Texas, October
Sixth and Seventh, 1915.

Morning Session-October 6, 1915.

The convention was called to order by Maj. Gen. Felix H. Robertson, commanding the Texas Division, United Confederate Veterans. Rev. S. H. Blair, Chaplain of the Texas Division, opened the convention with prayer.

Hon. W. H. Knight, Mayor of the City of Hillsboro, was introduced and delivered an eloquent address of welcome to the hospitalities of the city.

A telegram from Mrs. Charles Hammil, President of the Texas Division of the Daughters of the Confederacy, expressing her regret that she was unable to be with the veterans on this occasion, was read.

Judge C. C. Cummings was then introduced and made his report as Historian of the Division.

The following committees were appointed:

Resolutions—Comrades Seth P. Mills, of Waco, Texas; George W. Blair, of Dallas; R. S. Whitehead, of Granbury, Texas, and Albert Casey.

Credentials—Comrades William Barr, of Fort Worth; H. W. Williams, of Mexia, and Bradford Hancock, of Waco, Texas.

Hon. J. C. Jones, Commissioner of Pensions for the State of Texas, was then introduced and made an address on the importance of purging the Pension Rolls of those who are not entitled to pensions, followed by some interesting reminiscences of his trip to the Richmond Reunion and his visits to a number of battlefields.

Afternoon Session-October 6.

The General Commanding called the convention to order at 2 p. m.

The Committee on Credentials reported, through their Chairman, Wm. Barr, as follows:

We, your Committee on Credentials, recommend that all Camps shown by the Adjutant Generals report as having paid their per capita tax be allowed a voice in this convention, including those who have paid during this meeting.

(No list of names of delegates was reported by the committee.)

General Felix H. Robertson gave his experience in the management of the Division during the past year, including the conditions surrounding the Confederate Soliers' Home at Austin, Texas, as well as the Confederate Women's Home, complimenting the superintendents, Dr. Oliver and Miss Kate Daffan, of these important institutions, closing his remarks by reading a letter from General Lee to Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederacy, in regard to the conduct and results of the Battle of Gettysburg.

The following Mortuary Committee was appointed: Henderson Perry, chairman; Dr. Milner S. H. Blair and Joe C. Archer.

Dr. J. C. Loggins of Ennis was called for and made an interesting and instructive talk about the Battle of Gettysburg, in which he participated, and was captured, closing with an interesting description of his escape from prison by swimming Delaware Bay.

The Commanding General adjourned the convention until October 7 at 10 a.m.

Morning Session-October 7.

The Commanding General called the meeting to order at 10 a. m.

Comrade Snipes, from Texarkana, was introduced and read an eulogy on Stonewall Jackson.

Col. Wm. B. Featherston of Cleburne was then introduced and delivered an eloquent address on the life and character of General Robert E. Lee.

General E. W. Kirkpatrick, Commander of the Third Brigade, McKinney, Texas, made an eloquent address, complimenting the ladies of the South and their influence, through the Daughters of the Confederacy, in preserving correct history and perpetuating the principles and traditions of the South.

Mrs. H. P. Nelson of Greenville, Sponsor of the Third Brigade, was then introduced and delivered an eloquent response to General Kirkpatrick's eulogy on the Daughters of the Confederacy.

The Major General then declared the convention adjourned until 1:30 p. m.

Afternoon Session-October 7.

The convention was promptly called to order at 1:30 p. m.

The Resolution Committee made the followin report:

We your Committee on Resolutions respectfully report the following four resolutions, numbered from one to four, inclusive, all of which have been unanimously approved by this committee, and recommend the adoption of each of them.

> SETH P. MILLS, GEORGE W. BLAIR, A. CASEY.

WHEREAS, Our President, Woodrow Wilson, has, under the most trying circumstances, steered our Government clear of many unforeseen difficulties that have arisen in his administration with consummate skill and wisdom.

Therefore, the Texas Division, United Confederate Veterans, here assembled at Hillsboro, Texas, do most heartily endorse his administration and wish it the same success in the future as it has been in the past.

Ruled out of order by the Commander as being political.

Whereas, since the death of our lamented Comrade S. A. Cunningham, December, 1913, by the terms of his will, a board of trust has been acting in the conduct of the Confederate Veteran Magazine, Gen. Virgil Y. Cook of Arkansas, Gen. K. M. Vanzandt and Commander in Chief, Gen. Bennett Young, trustees, and Miss Edith Pope, trustee, and as secretary; and,

Whereas, This publication represents the Southern Confederated Memorial Association, the United Confederate Veterans, the United Daughters of the Confederacy and the United Sons of Veterans; and,

Whereas, The subscription is diminishing and this publication is of the utmost importance to the perpetuity of the principles for which we have ever stood; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That we cordially endorse the splendid management of this board in the past, and pledge ourselves to loyally stand by it in the future, and urge every Veteran of this Division to subscribe for it.

Unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

WHEREAS, It is the general impression that there are many who are on the Pension Rolls who are not entitled to receive a pension from the State; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, By the Texas Division of United Confederate Veterans, assembled at Hillsboro, Texas, that the county judges of the several counties be requested and urged to ful-

ly investigate and scrutinize all applications for pensions, and that no application be approved until the law governing same be fully complied with, and further request that all local camps assist the county judges in the investigation of the application.

Adopted.

WHEREAS, The Twenty-fourth Annual Reunion at Hillsboro has been one of the most delightful in the history of the Texas Division of United Confederate Veteran Association; and

Whereas, this has been made possible by the united action of every element of the citizenship of that splendid city without an exception; therefore be it

RESOLVED, By this Division that we most cordially appreciate this kind attention from all, from the address of the mayor of this city, welcoming our presence here, from the local press of the city, the delightful reception accorded us the first evening, and the crowning event in the magnificent noonday feast spread before us and our lady sponsors, maids and matrons of honor on the second day. All of which will be remembered by us as one of the red letter days in our calendar.

Unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Comrade C. H. Saxon, Commander of Walter P. Lane Camp, No. 639, U. C. V., introduced the following resolution:

Headquarters Walter P. Lane Camp, No. 639.

Orange, Texas, August 7th, 1915.

The Camp being in regualr session do hereby adopt the following resolution, to-wit:

BE IT RESOLVED By this Camp that our delegates to the next convention of the Texas Division, U. C. V., be and are hereby instructed to ask that body to use its influence in favor of the withdrawal of the Divisions in the Trans-Missis-

sippi Department from the general organization, and to organize the Trans-Mississippi on an independent basis. We believe this course would revive the interest in our cause and its work, which seems on the decline. Our members are growing too feeble for the long trips made necessary by the action of the large majority east of the river. It has been said that there are only 42 or 44 Texas camps now in good standing. We think that the action we ask would revive a majority of the dormant camps. We earnestly disclaim any want of disrespect to the parent organization, but believe the interest of the camps could be best served by this plan.

By an almost unanimous vote the resolution was tabled.

Next in regular order was the election of Commander of the Texas Division for next year; General Robertson vacated the chair and General Vanzandt was called to preside.

General Felix H. Robertson was duly nominated, and there being no further nominations, thereupon motion was made that the Adjutant General cast the vote of the camp for General Robertson as Commander for the ensuing year, and carried unanimously.

The Adjutant thereupo nannounced that the entire vote of the convention was cast for General Robertson, and he was declared re-elected for the ensuing year. Gen. Felix H. Robertson then took the chair and thanked the convention for the honor conferred upon him and announced that the election of Brigade Commander was now in order.

Whereupon, the delegates from the several Brigades met and elected Brigade Commanders as follows, viz: First Brigade, F. W. Redman of Beaumont; Second Brigade, H. G. Askew of Austin; Third Brigade, E. W. Kirkpatrick of Mc-Kinney; Fourth Brigade, R. S. Whitehead of Grandbury. All to serve until the close of the 1916 re-union at Terrell, Texas, on the first Thursday in October, 1916. The next in the order of business was the election of a place for holding the next re-union.

Terrell and Bowie, Texas were placed in nomination. A vote being taken, Terrell received 156 votes and Bowie 17 votes.

Motion was thereupon made, seconded and carried that the selection of Terrell be made unanimous, and that the Twenty-fifth Annual Re-union of the Confederate Veterans be held in that city.

There being no further business, the meeting of thee Texas Division, U.C. V., for 1915, was adjourned to be convened on the first Thursday in October, 1916.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This Association of Confederate Veterans shall be known as the Texas Division of United Confederate Veterans.

ARTICLE II.

The objects and purposes of this organization shall be strictly social, literary, historical and benevolent. It will strive first to unite in one general federation all of the Confederate Camps in Texas. Second—To cultivate the ties of friendship that should exist among those who have shared common dangers, sufferings and privation. Third-To encourage the writing by participators therein of accounts, narratives, memoirs, histories of battles, episodes and occurrences of the war between the States. Fourth-To gather authentic data, statistics, documents, reports, plans, maps and other material for an impartial history of the Confederate side. To collect and preserve relics and mementos of the war; to make and perpetuate a record of services of every member, and, as far as possible, of those of our Comrades who preceded us into eternity. Fifth—To see that the disabled are cared for; that a helping hand is extended to the needy, and that the Confederate widows and orphans are protected and assisted. Sixth—To urge and aid in the erection of enduring monuments to our great leaders and hero soldiers and sailors, and people, and to mark with suitable headstones the graves of the Confederate dead wherever found. Seventh—To instill into our descendants a proper veneration for the spirit and glory of their fathers, and to bring them into association with our organization, that they may aid us in accomplishing our objects and purposes and finally succeed us and take up our work whenever we may leave it.

ARTICLE III.

Membership, Requisites and Limatations.

Section 1. Membership in this Division shall be by Camps.

Sec. 2 The various Camps joining shall be registered in numerical order according to the date of their formation.

Sec. 3 Every Camp will be required to exact of each applicant for membership in its ranks satisfactory proof of honorable service in the Army or Navy of the Confederate States and honorable discharge therefrom.

ARTICLE IV.

Organization.

Section 1. Each of the four subdivisions of Texas shall constitute one Brigade, and no Brigade shall be formed of less than five Camps.

ARTICLE V.

Officers—Election, Term of Office, Succession.
Section 1. The officers of the Division shall be one Major General, its executive head; four Brigadier Generals, one commanding the Northeast subdivision, one commanding the Northwest subdivision, one commanding the Southeast subdivision, one commanding the Southwest subdivision, which Southwest subdivision includes the subdivision formerly known as the Central subdivision, as per re-alignment of territory made in General Order No. 16 of Texas Division, dated July 1st, 1901.

Sec. 2. The Major General and four Brigadier Generals shall be elected by the delegates at the annual meeting of the Reunion of the State Division, and shall hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.

- Sec. 3. Vacancies occurring among officers shall be filled, until the next annual meeting, by appointment of the Major General commanding, on recommendation of the Camps within the jurisdiction where such vacancy occurs.
- Sec. 4 Staff Officers—Staff Officers shall be appointed by the different Generals, to serve during such General's term of office, or pleasure. No staff officer shall be at the same time a staff officer and an officer of a Brigade or Division, or hold two staff offices. The staff of the Major General shall be as follows: One Adjutant General and Chief of Staff, with the rank of Colonel; one Inspector General, with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel; one Quartermaster General with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel; one Judge Advocate, with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel; one Surgeon General, with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel; one Chaplain with the rank of Major, and such assistants and aids as may be found necessary. The Brigadier General shall be entitled to appoint the same staff officers as the Major General, and the rank of the same shall be one degree lower than the Major General's staff.
- Sec. 5. Camp Officers—Camps for their convenience may adopt the following nomenclature for their officers, viz: Commander; First, Second, Third (or more) Lieutenant Commanders, Adjutant, Quartermaster, Surgeon, Chaplain, Officer of the Day, Treasurer Sergeant, Major Vidette, a Color Sergeant and two Color Guards, and define their duties. The Commander, in official intercourse, shall be addressed as "Captain."
- Sec. 6. No one shall hold office unless he be a member of some Camp in this Division.

ARTICLE VI.

Prohibitions.

Section 1. No discussion of political or religious subjects shall be permitted in any of the Divisions or subdivisions of this organization.

- Sec. 2. No debts shall be contracted by any one of the Camps in this Division.
- Sec. 3. No assessment shall be levied on members other than the fees and per capita tax. The latter shall consist of five cents to be paid annually to the Division, in addition to the ten cents per capita payable annually to headquarters of the United Confederate Veterans. The five cents payable to this Division Headquarters shall be paid by the several Camps on or before the first day of January of each year, and shall be accompanided with a correct roster of said Camps.
- Sec. 4. The use of the seal, badges or names of the Division and Camps for business or advertising purposes, and the giving of its badges to person unauthorized to wear them, are emphatically prohibited.

ARTICLE VII.

Penalties and Suspension.

- Section 1. No Camp shall be permitted representation in any meeting of this Division until said Camp shall have paid the annual per capita tax due the Division.
- Sec. 2. Forfeiture of membership shall be declared against any Camp allowing political or religious discussion or taking any such action.
- Sec. 3. Forfeiture of membership shall be declared by a two-thirds vote, after proper investigation of the charges and only when the have been substantiated.

ARTICLE VIII.

Representation, Delegates, Limitations, Proxies.

Section 1. The representation of the various Camps at the annual meetings of the Division shall be by delegates, as follows: One delegate for every twenty active members in good standing in the Camps, and one additional delegate for a fraction of ten members; provided every Camp in good standing shall be entitled to at least two delegates. No proxy delegate will be allowed.

Sec. 2. At each annual meeting the first day and the second day until noon shall be devoted to the transaction of business of the Division; provided, the address of welcome and the responses thereto may be delivered at the opening of the meeting.

ARTICLE IX.

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Division Commander to appoint a Standing Committee on Legislation, and Investigation of the Soldiers' Home, not to exceed five, three of who mshall be residents of Travis County.

ARTICLE X.

Amendments.

Section 1. By a two-thirds vote of the delegates present at the annual meeting of the Division, alterations and amendments can be made to this Constitution; provided, that notice and a copy of the proposed changes shall have been sent to each Camp at least three months in advance of the regular meeting .

Headquarters Army of Northern Virginia. Chambersburg, Penn., June 27, 1863.

General Order No. 73.

The Commanding General has observed with marked satisfaction the conduct of the troops on the march, and confidently anticipates results commensurate with the high spirit they have manifested. No troops could have displayed greater fortitude or better performed the arduous marches of the past ten days. Their canduct in other respects has, with few exceptions, been in keeping with their character as soldiers and entitles them to approbation and praise. There have, however, been instances of forgetfulness on the part of some that they have in keeping the vet unsullied reputation of the army, and that the duties exacted of us by civilization and Christianity are not less obligatory in the country of the enemy than in our own. The Commanding General considers that no greater disgrace could befall the army, and through it our whole people, than the perpetration of the barbarous outrages upon the unarmed and defenseless, and the wanton destruction of private property that have marked the course of the enemy in our own country.

Such proceedings not only degrade the perpetrators and all connected with them, but are subversive of the discipline and efficiency of the army and destructive of the ends of our present movement. It must be remembered that we make war only upon armed men, and that we cannot take vengeance for the wrongs our people have suffered without lowering ourselves in the eyes of all whose abhorrence has been excited by the atrocities of our enemies and offending against Him to whom vengeance belongeth, without whose favor and support our efforts must all prove in vain. The Commanding General therefore earnestly exhorts the troops to abstain, with most scrupulous care, from unnecessary or wanton injury to private property, and he enjoins upon all officers to arrest and bring to summary punishment all who shall in any way offend against the orders on this subject.

With an increasing admiration of your constancy and devotion to your country, and a grateful remembrance of your kind and generous consideration of myself, I bid you an affectionate farewell.
