# CONFEDERATE HOME.

## REPORT OF PRESIDENT BOARD OF MANAGERS.

Austin, Texas, December 1, 1898.

Hon. C. A. Culberson, Governor of Texas:

SIR: In transmitting to you the report of the Superintendent of the Confederate Home—which is adopted as the report of the Board of Managers—we would most respectfully call your attention to that part of the report which refers to the necessity for amending the present law, and would recommend that the Legislature be requested to so amend Article 172 of the Revised Statutes, as to give the Board of Managers authority to control the conduct and behavior of the inmates while outside of the limits of the Home. This recommendation is caused by the recent decision of the Judge of the 53rd Judicial District, to the effect that the Board has no such authority; which decision, to a great extent, limits the power of the management for efficient control.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT.

SUPERINTENDENT'S OFFICE OF THE TEXAS CONFEDERATE HOME, AUSTIN, TEXAS, December 1, 1898.

Hon. Joe B. Rogers, President Board of Managers of the Texas Confederate Home:

DEAR SIR: On April the 12th last, I took charge of the Texas Confederate Home, as Superintendent. At that time there were 217 inmates on the roll, and every available place was occupied, and we were without an appropriation for building additional room. Since that time, by the alteration of some rooms in the Administration building, and the remodeling of an old stable, I have been able to admit twenty-five (25) additional inmates, and there are now on the roll, 242 inmates. Since the last annual report, the population of the Home has increased forty-five (45). There have been admitted, since last report, eighty-five (85); twenty-four (24) have died, and sixteen (16) have been discharged. At the beginning of this winter, it was found that nearly all of the inmates had to supplied with new winter clothing; the beds with new blankets; most of the rooms with new stoves; and all the others had to be repaired to a greater or less extent, and the necessary outlay has been proportionately large. The latter part of the summer, all the beds in the hospital, and a large number of those in the cottages, had to be supplied with new sheets and spreads. New bed-steads, bedding, etc., were necessary for the additional twenty-five inmates admitted since I assumed the position of

The estimate made by the Board for the support of the Home, for the two years beginning the 1st of March, 1897, was, for the first year \$36,-000.00, and for the present year, ending February 28th, 1899, \$43,000.00. The Legislature appropriated, instead, \$28,000.00 for the first year, and \$32,000.00 for the second, (the present year). The Board asked, at the same time, for about \$10,000.00 for cottages, but instead, \$2,250.00 was appropriated; which was used by my predecessor in the erection of an eight (8) room cottage, which was filled with inmates as soon as finished. In addition to the number of inmates admitted since I became the Superintendent, I have now on hand twenty-six (26) approved applications; a large number of the applicants being extremely old and infirm, and totally without means. There was, with the most economical management, of my predecessor, a deficiency of the maintenance appropriation, for the year ending February 28th, 1898, amounting to about \$1600, which was, in order to save the discount on that amount until the meeting of the Legislature in January, 1899, carried over and paid out of the maintenance appropriation for the year commencing March 1st, 1898; so as to make the deficiency for the two years come at the latter part of the second year, just before the convening of the Legislature, and to obtain

the necessary amount, the loss in discount, or interest, will be small. This left the maintenance appropriation for the year ending February 28th, 1899, about \$30,400.00, out of which provision was made in the way of supplying and furnishing rooms for the additional twenty-five (25) inmates admitted; besides their maintenance, and the supplying of new clothing and bedding for all of the inmates, and stoves for the cottages. There will, therefore, be a deficiency in the maintenance appropriation for the term ending February 28th, 1899, amounting to \$6,500.00. For the obtaining of this sum, I have prepared the proper affidavit, which has been executed by you and filed with the Governor, and duly approved by him, as it was a recognized fact, during the first fiscal year, both by the Board and the Governor, that there would, necessarily, be a deficiency, if provision was made to admit and maintain those who were then seeking admittance; and about that number was admitted by my predecessor, and

since my incumbency twenty-five more have been admitted.

Hereinafter will be found my estimate for the appropriations that will be necessary to maintain the institution for the two years beginning March 1st, 1899, and for repairs and additional buildings, which I consider necessary to comfortably house the number I believe will seek admittance within that time. This estimate is made from knowledge and experience gained by long connection with the Home; and after due consideration of the benefits which will be derived from any law which may be enacted by the Legislature, making operative the pension amendment to the Constitution, recently adopted by the people of Texas. Under the provisions of the amendment, there will be great disappointment among a large and worthy class of Confederates, who are under sixty years of age, and whose disabilities are not the proximate result of service in the army. Under the present Confederate Home law, many can gain admission to the Home, who can not receive a pension; and in the interest of this class of our citizenship, and in order that my successor may not be subjected to the mortifying necessity of turning away so many worthy applicants as has been the case with myself and predecessors; I beg of your Board, and your successors, to impress upon the incoming Legislature the necessity of making liberal appropriations for the Home. I also call your attention to the advisability of amending the present law, so as to make it obligatory upon the Board, or Superintendent, to discharge from the Home, inmates who are habitual drunkards,—a man who is able to be drunk all the time, is physically able to gain a livelihood, if he will remain sober. I believe, also, for the proper management of the Home, and the happiness of its inmates, the law should be amended, so that inmates could be discharged by the authorities for any disgraceful, gross, or outrageous behavior committed in, or out of the Home enclosure, while enjoying its benefits. I do not believe it was the object or intention of the promoters of the Home, or the State of Texas, to support any habitual drunkards, or insubordinate, vicious and dangerous characters; and, while the Board, as authorized by law, has adopted rules and regulations to get rid of this class of men, the rules are not always observed or enforced, and a few of the inmates take advantage of the desire of the authorities to throw as few restrictions around the conduct of the inmates as possible, and to make the institution as nearly as possible, a Home in fact, for the old veterans, and violate the reasonable rules with impunity, and make themselves, generally, obnoxious and disagreeable to their room

mates and the inmates generally. I am happy to state, that there are only a few who do this, and that a very large majority,—at least ninetenths—of the inmates who are made unhappy by this few, are gentlemen, and conduct themselves as such, towards their fellow inmates and the officers of the Home. I believe, therefore, that such necessary rules with reference to these matters, as have been adopted by the Board of Managers, should be made statutory, and it made obligatory upon the Board to enforce them.

I have endeavored, under many embarrassments and with limited resources, to make such improvements in the Home as I deemed proper, and I have to thank you, and the entire Board, for your hearty co-operation and valuable assistance, and to no less degree, am I profoundly grateful to all of the officers of the Home for co-operation and aid. My association with the inmates has been very pleasant, and they have, as a rule, endeavored to make it so, and I have to thank them for their kind and courteous treatment, and their forbearance with my many shortcomings.

Next below, is the report of the Surgeon of the Home. Then follows my estimate for appropriations, necessary for the next two years; my statement of the financial transactions since last annual report; a list of the inmates, with the commands with which they served during the war; in the order named. I respectfully submit this report, with the request that it be printed in connection with your report to the Governor.

#### REPORT OF SURGEON.

AUSTIN, TEXAS, November 30th, 1898.

To Hon. Joe B. Rogers, President Board of Managers, Texas Confederate Home (through Gen. H. E. Shelley, Superintendent).

I herewith transmit the Surgeon's report for the year ending Novem-

In general terms it may be said that the health of the inmates under the Surgeon's care has been better than during any previous year recorded, and may be summarized as follows:

It should be noted that of these twenty-three deaths only three died of acute disease and only one died from a disease preventable by sanitation, and his disease was contracted while visiting relatives at Houston. I would also call your attention to the great decrease in the mortality rate, notwithstanding the increasing age of the veterans. In the two years next preceding my service, viz: 1893-4, there were 48 deaths out of the total average population for the two years of 306, or a mortality rate of 159 per thousand. This fell to 91 per thousand in 1895, 116 per thousand in 1896, 91 per thousand in 1897, and 81 per thousand in the present year, and average for the four years of my service of 95 per thousand.

This gratifying result can be attributed to the following causes:

1st. To the erection of a hospital where the sick are carefully nursed and fed according to their several necessities.

2nd. To a decided improvement at the general dining hall, where a diet more suited to the feeble digestion of the aged has been supplied.

3rd. To a general improvement in sanitation, including an excellent system of sewers. All these improvements have occurred in the past four years.

I am also gratified to be able to report a material reduction of expenditures for hospital supplies. There was expended during the two years next preceding my service, viz: 1893-4, according to the Superintendent's books, for the purchase of drugs, surgical dressings and instruments, artificial foods and liquors the sum of \$2099.75. This divided by the total average attendance as above, gives a per capita cost for these items of \$7.05 annually. The actual expenditure in the four years of my service has been \$3735.93 or an actual average decrease in expenditure as compared with the above of about \$116 per annum, notwithstanding the increase in population. The average per capita cost annually for my term is \$4.15, or \$2.90 saved for each inmate treated. This is quite a handsome saving. Applied to the total average population for present year alone it would amount to \$814.90, or more than the Surgeon's salary.

This has resulted from a change of methods adopted at the beginning of my term. The former practice had been to purchase drugs in retail quantities or send the surgeon's prescription to the city to be filled. This resulted in greatly increased cost, as well as frequent delay. We now have a nice dispensary, located in the hospital, carrying a stock amounting to five hundred dollars or more. The Surgeon's prescriptions are filled as soon as made. Our drugs are purchased in wholesale quantities at the lowest market price, the majority on competitive bids.

I have also devised a system of hospital records, which exhibits the name of each patient treated, the history and diagnosis of his case, and subsequent history and termination; also the treatment; so that my successor can almost instantly acquire a knowledge of the past history and treatment of any inmate in the institution.

A system of reports from the head nurse, and night nurse, is also kept, which has proven of the greatest value. All prescriptions are carefully labeled and recorded in a book for future reference.

I desire to call particular attention to the great improvement in our hospital since the introduction of female nursing, and also to express my appreciation of the services of our present head nurse, Miss Lee Bell, who has been faithful and efficient.

Having had the experience noted above, I would make the following recommendation to your Honorable Body, which I hope you will urge upon the incoming Legislature, through the Governor.

First, I would recommend the building of a new hospital building. The present is inconveniently and awkwardly constructed, badly located, and, generally speaking, almost totally unfit for the purpose. It was

built from an appropriation made for barracks, and upon the condition that it should accommodate fifty patients. The amount of appropriation was totally inadequate for the purpose, and the result was as above stated. It is situated in the very center of the quarters, and in such close proximity to them that the general noise of the institution pervades it to such a degree as to utterly destroy the quietude so necessary, and in fact indispensable in the sick room. It is also subject to intrusion of the curious and idle to such an extent that the privacy which the patients desire, and in many instances require, is interfered with. In turn, the hospital, with its sad scenes and sad events, is perpetually before the inmates in the quarters, and exerts a depressing influence upon them.

A new hospital should be built, on a quiet and retired part of the Home grounds, furnished and adapted to the peculiar needs of chronic, acute, and surgical cases, and a small cottage for the Surgeon near by.

This can be done at a very small cost, if it is proposed to enlarge the capacity of the Home sufficiently to meet the demands upon it. The bulding now used for hospital purposes will comfortably quarter sixty-four men and leave the space now used for the main ward for a reading and amusement room (which is badly needed), or such other purposes as may be desired.

To construct brick cottages for these sixty-four men would cost, approximately, \$8000.00. I believe that \$1200 would build such a hospital as the institution needs.

I would also recommend that an appropriation of drugs, of not less than \$1200 be asked for, this being about the amount actually shown by past experience to be necessary.

I would also recommend that the Surgeon's salary be raised to an amount equal to that paid the Assistant Physician at the Insane Asylums. The Surgeon here must possess a high degree of professional skill; he must be also able to accomplish a great deal of work, as the demands upon him are constant and heavy. And in addition to this, he should be a man of patience and tact, in fact a professional man of the highest character, and it is needless to say that he cannot be had for a salary that is lower than that paid any other physician in the employment of the

In closing, allow me to thank the entire management for courtesies too numerous to mention.
