AFTER RECESS

The Convention met at 1:30 o'clock p.m., pursuant to recess, and was called to order by the President.

The roll was called and the following were recorded present: 176 Present, 3 Absent-excused, 2 Absent. (Record 1, Appendix)

Dr. Carl A. Heckmann, President, Texas District, The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, Austin, Texas offered the invocation as follows:

It's in humble gratitude for the blessings that have come from Your hand of love to our nation, to the commonwealth of Texas, and to us as a people . . . it's with bowed heads recognizing the sins of our society and our own sins as a people . . . and still it's with confidence and assurance, that we come before You in this moment of prayer.

FISCAL ANALYSIS FOR MONTH

SUBJECT: Fiscal Analysis for the Month of
January 1974

In accordance with Section II.5. of the Convention Rules, I am submitting to you the attached fiscal report covering Convention expenditures for the month of January.

Since this report reflects cash disbursements only through January 31, some categories, such as Delegate Compensation (I.A.), will show no disbursements, as the checks for January's compensation were not issued until after that date. Expenditures for such items will be reflected on the March 1 statement which will cover cash disbursements during the month of February.

Item II.E. represents the \$225 monthly allowance for additional staff for delegates which is available only for the months of February and March, and thus no disbursements were made in this category during the month of January.

You will find justification for these budget figures also attached. Expenditures which are broken down in accordance with the requirements of the Rules are cross-referenced by arabic numerals enclosed in parentheses in items I., II. and IV. on pages one and three of the fiscal analysis.

I hope you find this helpful. If you have any questions about these figures, please do not hesitate to call on me or Jim Ray for explanation.

REMARKS ORDERED PRINTED IN JOURNAL

The President recognized Delegate Traeger to speak on Personal Privilege.

On motion of Delegate Nichols and by unanimous consent, Delegate Traeger's remarks were reduced to writing and printed in the Journal.

REMARKS OF DELEGATE TRAEGER

Mr. President, Delegates, may I have your attention a moment, because I think what I am going to say probably affects each of you indirectly, one way or another, or will affect you. In the twelve years that it has been my privilege to serve in the House and Senate, this is only the second time I have ever taken the mike on personal privilege. The other was in reaction to a threat, and I don't take that privilege lightly.

I am here today simply because I am concerned for the basic precept that I think has been violated by, not necessarily members of this body, not necessarily by the press, but some by all. I resent, particularly, the implications that appeared in a press release by Mr. Sam Coates, of the Citizens for Texas. This press release has to do with a poll that I took in the Local Government Committee on whether the majority of that committee felt it would be worthwhile to consider recessing after the committees have

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reported and going home and considering and talking with our people about the reports. Now that to me is a logical prediction, one which I do not expect everyone to agree with, and I do not think less of anyone who disagrees. But I do not like the implication that any time we do not--we have an independent thought--or do not agree with someone's canned opinion, that we are automatically trying to sabotage or destroy this Convention. Not only my opinion or anyone else's opinion, whether I agree or disagree with it, I think the right to disagree is one of the most important things we have in this body, or in any legislative body.

Mr. Coates says in his release, and I don't believe he cleared it with a fine group of people who are connected with the Citizens for Texas because there are some very fine people, dedicated people, who are serving as Board of Directors of that particular group, but he says that since the beginning of the Convention, there have seemed to be three or four delegates intent upon destroying the Convention and the entire revision process. The proposal to recess at the end of this month must be their latest ploy to create dissention and unrest, and to undermine the steady and continuous deliberations necessary under the ninety day schedule, or to wreck that schedule by purely political motivated moves. I resent that implication. And as far as speaking only for myself, I say it is completely unbiased and completely untrue. It refers to an article in the Houston Post, which incidently was very accurate. It was an interview, telephone wise, with Mr. Felton West, but Mr. Coates took it completely out of context. He said that he is shocked--I am sorry we shocked Mr. Coates--I wouldn't want to do that--by the very minute majority who have fought the public's mandate for constitutional revision.

I would point out to him that I was Chairman of the Constitutional Amendments Committee in the House that favorably passed this bill out of committee that allowed the public to vote on a new constitution; that I worked for it on the floor and voted for it, and helped pass it when it appeared in front of the public at a public referendum.

I would point out to him further, that I have not missed a committee meeting, or a meeting of this session since the beginning of the Constitutional Convention, and I do not intend to if it lasts until next December. I'll still be here.

President Daniel, I note, says that he would like to finish in the ninety day period. This is an admirable and commendable goal. Whether we can do it or not, I think he would be the first to admit, is a matter of opinion. I notice that he has changed his mind on one item that I was very much in disagreement with because I did not think it was practical, and I respect his right to change his opinion, that this could not be submitted to the people in the May primaries, because of the many problems involved thereto, and in any special election I think even the most optimistic member would say it would be doomed to failure, because the anti's vote at special elections. The only logical time it can be voted on is during a

general election in November.

Yesterday, I think, is probably an example. This document here is now obsolete. I think any of you who have paid any attention to our proceedings know this. We've each been compartmentalized in our committees, and I for one have been very pleased with the work of our committee. It's been conscientious. Practically everything we have sent out has been by a large majority of votes, but we have sent out something entirely different than what's in this basic document. Anyone who can tell me they can find in yesterday's scramble that you could refer to this document and find out anything they simply are naive or haven't paid much attention. This document is of no further value when the committee reports come in. We are now considering the committee reports as a basic document from which we will write a constitution.

Now, then, I would like--and I'm sure some of you with more nimble minds and a higher intelligence level followed everything that happened yesterday and were completely familiar with every substitute to the substitute and the amendment to the amendment to the substitute, and I'm sure you knew exactly how everything went--but from the way that board switched back and forth, I have a feeling that some of us, and I will include myself, were led astray just a little bit on a few occasions and were not quite sure how clear the issue was delineated. I talked to one of my school superintendents at home and he said, "What did you do?" Well there was a long pause because I'm not sure what we did, or where we stood, and I'm sure he didn't. So I said, "What do you want?" And he said, "I don't know what you are considering." So I tried to give him a capsule of some of the substitutes and things that we did discuss yesterday, and he said, "Well, just do whatever you want. I can't figure it out."

Now I really believe, and I feel firm in this conviction, that there is merit to the idea that if, after we get all of our committee reports, of taking these back home and getting reactions on them. I don't know who's backing what any more. Not that that is the major determining force, but I certainly do want to get the feel of my constituency, as I am sure most of you do. And I do not think that having that opinion puts me in the position of wanting to sabotage this constitution. I think we have a good chance of writing a viable constitution that will exist for many years for the State of Texas. And I think that the majority of this group wants that. I have not, incidently, polled, or conducted a poll of the Convention. My total activity in this area was simply getting a reaction on the Local Government Committee without even talking to anybody--just passing around "What do you think about recessing for a period of time? Dates unfirm. This is a straw poll." If there is anyone in this convention hall that can say that I have come to you and polled you, except if you were present that day in Local Government Committee, I would like to know. Now a lot of members have come to me and said, "How's your poll running?" I'm not running any poll. But as of this date I'm going to start taking names of people that come and say, "I think maybe there is some merit in what you say, that I

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would be interested in considering a recess." I don't intend to tear the convention apart, and the last thing I would want, and I will not even bring it up or consider it, unless it looks like that represents a close to majority of opinion, or close enough to have--to make a debatable issue of it. If we can get finished in ninety days, then probably that would be great. But I want each of you to watch the next few days and see whether that is your opinion or not, and whether you feel that we can. If you can I hope you will let me know.

But I also want to make this perfectly clear. I respect your right to totally disagree. I have won battles and lost battles in these halls. I have disagreed at one time or another with, I suppose, every member here, and agreed on occasion with every one, but I never think less of a man because he disagrees with me. And every vote you cast, I don't think the press, any group such as this, or other members should write in some ulterior motive behind what might be a considered legitimate honest opinion. Thank you very much.

ARTICLE VII ON SECOND READING

The President laid before the Convention as unfinished business Article VII, Section 1.

Question: Shall the amendment as amended to Article VII, Section 1 be adopted?

Delegate Barnhart offered the following substitute for the amendment as amended:

Amend Article VII, Section 1 of the Education Committee Report to read as follows:

Section 1. EQUITABLE SUPPORT OF FREE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

A general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature to establish and make suitable provision for the equitable support and maintenance of an efficient system of free public schools below the college level, with the goal of providing equal educational opportunity.
