GAIL - SHORT ON PEOPLE, STORES, BUT HAS CATTLE, OIL - and a PHONE

Table-topped Gail Mountain, a hunk of the Plains that has strayed off into the heart of Borden County, marks the site of one of the smallest county-seat towns in Texas. Gail has 45 residents, living mainly in silvery gray old houses that were built by the town's founders. Old Flat-Top, as the hill is popularly known, once looked down on a thriving little ranching center. There were hotels, there were general stores selling dry goods, groceries and hardware, there was even a barber shop. In 1914 things were going so well that the town decided to build

a new schoolhouse, a three story structure of native stone, for its 100 scholars. Things are a little different now.

The top story has been torn off the school building, which this fall opened its doors to 12 pupils and their teacher, Mrs. C. S. Harris, wife of Borden County': Judge-Superintendent. Students above the sixth grade ride the school bus to Snyder There is no hotel, no general store, not even a barber shop.. A fellow who needs a haircut drives 30 miles east to Snyder or 30 miles west to Lamesa, unless he wants to look for a neighbor who's handy with the scissors.

Spread out along Highway 180, which serves as Gail's main street, are a handful of old unpainted frame store buildings, a rock building orso and some dwelling houses. South of the road, a little above the rest of town, are the Court House, a modern brick building erected in 1939, and the jail, built in 1893 of rock from Gail Mountain. Water from the town's one well is piped to the Court House. Any body who needs water and doesn't have a cistern of rainwater in his own back yard can carry it from there.

Clustered together on the north side of the highway are the chief business houses: two cafes, the post office, the Borden County Abstract Company and, the real center of life in Gail, Dave Dorward's drugstore.

Of course, just about everybody gets down to the post office once a day when Mrs. Gene Skeen, postmaster, puts up the mail that comes in on the route from Big Spring. Folks drop in at the cafe once in a while and stop by one of the three filling stations for gas or groceries. BUT MR. DORWARD HAS THE TELEPHONE.

When there's sickness in the family, somebody goes to Mr. Dorward's and phones. If there's oil or cattle business to be transacted, the phone will be ringing at Mr. Dorward's. Waiting to get a call through, or just stopping by for a visit, people sit around the butane stove in the drugstore and talk about the crops and the weather or the chances for making a well out of the newest wildcat. Kids come in, pick out a barof candy or an ice cream stick and leave the money in the cash register if Mr. Dorward is busy with the phone or working on his books at the old roll-top desk.

Mr. Dorward, who has been in the drugstore business at the same location since 1901, came to Gail, in 1892. Only J. H. Smoot, who arrived before the County was organized in 1891, has been there longer. A registered pharmacist, Mr. Dorward still has a sign labeling one corner of his store as the pharmacy, and a few bottles on his shelves. But he hasn't rolled a pill since Gail's last physician, Dr. J.W. Hannabass, died in 1927. In the late 1890's, Mr. Dorward recalls, Gail was big enough to support three resident doctors. The town developed rapidly until, in the years just before World War I, the population numbered several hundred. The history of Gail, as Mr. Dorward remembers it, has been a peaceful one. "We've always got along with each other," he says, "never had the quarrels and bloodshed that were so often a part of the development of the west."

People in Gail still get along with each other. The Gail Community Club has monthly meetings in the school house, with lots of suppers and parties. And nearly everybody gops to one of the churches-sometimes to two oreven all three of them. The Baptists and Methodists have services once a month. The Church of Christ has Sunday School but no regular church service. There are not many places to go in Gail, or many things to do, but for most of the 45 residents, 30 miles is close enough to movies and night clubs. And if that means being 30 miles from a hardware store or a doctor, too - well, the road is good, and there's always the telephone at Mr. Dorward's. WRITTEN BY CORRESPONDENT JANE GILMORE

PAT N. HENSLEY, 75, of Borden County, died February 13, 1996. He was born in Draw. He attended school in Draw and Texas Tech University. He married Jo Williams May 18, 1941 in Draw and they moved to Borden County in 1957 from Lynn County. He served in the U. S. Army during W.W. II where he was a member of the 158 Regimental Combat Team. He had been a member of the school board, a member of the Borden Co. Tax Review Board, ASC Committee Chairman and on the FHA Board. His survivors include his wife, Jo, three sons, Rusty of Rockwall, Kenny and Randy of Borden County and a daughter, Lesa Enlow of Wichita Falls, a brother, Zan of Lubbock, ten grandchildren and 3 great-grandchildren.
