LUBBOCK -- Friday, 25 high school seniors from Lubbock will join a select group of former schoolmates currently on full scholarship at Texas Tech University. The students will be guests at an annual lunch to recognize recipients of the Texas Tech Excellence Scholarship.

The scholarship program was begun by the Office of New Student Relations in the spring of 1988 to attract and retain outstanding minority students from the Lubbock Independent School District.

LUBBOCK -- Professionals in the health care, pastoral and counseling areas will benefit from a workshop titled "Ethics and the Counselor" sponsored by Texas Tech University's Division of Continuing Education.

The workshop, originally scheduled for June 9, will be 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. June 30 in Room 111 of the Home Economics Building on the Texas Tech campus.

"Ethics and the Counselor" will examine the theories and principles which underlie difficult decision making in the counseling profession. Particular emphasis will be placed on ethical issues which arise in health care and educational settings. A variety of professional ethical codes will be examined in their application to every day practice. The relationship between personal and professional values also will be discussed.

Instructor for the workshop is Tom McGovern, Ed.D., an associate professor in the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center department of psychiatry. He also is program director of the Ethics/Medical Humanities Program which addresses ethical issues in health care settings. His major focus in both research and clinical work centers on the affective, ethical and spiritual components of addiction. McGovern is recognized in the United States and Europe for his contributions to the field of addiction.

Registration is \$59. The workshop is approved for Texas Association of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselors, Licensed Professional Counselors and Continuing Education Unit credit. MIRACLE CURE -- Once thought to be the shining star in the cholesterol battle, new studies show that oat bran may not be that effective after all. According to Jan Fry, a TTHSC registered dietician, it's no wonder consumers are confused. For years now, consumers have been inundated with various cereal ads claiming to have the most oat bran in their product. Every trip to the grocery store turns up yet another product fortified with cholesterol-reducing oat bran. The truth of the matter lies somewhere in between, Fry said. Although oat bran may not be a miracle cure for high cholesterol, it still plays an important role in a healthful diet. For more on oat bran and a healthy diet, contact Fry at (806) 743-3150.

AN OUNCE OF PREVENTION - Staying healthy is a life-long process that begins in our youth, yet so many people wait until middle age to begin healthy habits. High cholesterol, hypertension and various forms of cancer generally show up later in life, but the problems usually can be traced back to poor habits during the youthful years. A lot of people will visit their physician in their mid-50s expecting a "tune-up," said Mitch Jacques, M.D., of the TTHSC family medicine department. But it just doesn't work that way. Tuning up has to start in childhood and continue throughout life. More and more, Jacques said, physicians are recognizing the importance of prevention and are encouraging their patients to be aware of the fact that an ounce of prevention is, after all, worth a pound of cure.
