Virginia July 22: 1771

Since my letter to you by way of Bristol,
I received a letter from Miss^{rs} Perkins Buchanan & Co.^{ship}
desiring me to affreight Capt Lally in Loading of his
by shipping him or them some Tobacco, but as I was
engaged with W^r Cary it was not in my power to comply
with their request, but would do any thing in my power
to forward his Lading with any Interest that I had;
you will know the value of my Estate, If the House
I should think proper to take up any Bills of mine that
Cary may think proper to protest, I shall be very much
Obliged to those Gentlemen to take them up, & I will most
certainly ship them to me next year, though perhaps not so
much as will pay the whole, & pay for the Goods; by this
I expect you have received my Letter, wherein I have laid
down the whole plan at large to you, & those Gentlemen;
I do not by any means intend to be largely indebted to
any one, but as there is no disposing of so large an
Estate for ready money, I only want Credit for a year or
two perhaps it may be three before the whole money can
be remitted, I have sold my Houses & Lots in York for
£1250: 0: 0 which will lessen my debts so much, the Isle
of Wight Estate, & that in Carolina, will not exceed near
five thousand pounds by selling them for two or three^{rs}
Credit, then the Mountain Estate of 12500 Acres with
two hundred Slaves will be sufficient for my Family,
I therefore entreat you, to use your Interest to prevail
with the House to take up my Bills if protested; in this
you will greatly oblige
