SALAMANDER CROSSING

Henry Street - A Retrospective Signature Sounds SIG 1261

Underneath Henry Street in North Amherst, Massachusetts, there's a series of tunnels that allow the local salamander population to commute in safety, hence this aggregation found their performing name in 1991. At various times a trio or quartet, they finally called it a day last year.

While still a fledgling label, circa 1995. Signature Sounds distributed their self-titled debut and during the following year the quartet's second disc, Passion Train appeared. Time has confirmed their third set, Bottleneck Dreams, to be their swan song. Recorded in Nashville and produced by Canadian Colin Linden, the latter collection was released by Signature Sounds two years ago. This double CD collection brings together the first two Salamander recordings and then some. Disc one is enhanced by the addition of the traditional Dona Nobis Pacem (Peace On Earth), while songs composed by Claudia Schmidt, John Gorka and Gillian Welch, plus the traditional Wade In The Water flesh out disc two.

Never prolific (as writers), in terms of recording original material, Salamander Crossing was an acoustic marriage that explored material drawn from bluegrass, pop and folk sources during their honeymoon period. In that regard, a high-energy version of Lennon & McCartney's Things We Said Today lies comfortably alongside the closing and ethereal rendition of Shawn Colvin's Shotgun Down The Avalanche. With Passion Train came a road wise maturity and an inclination to experiment with material from other genres. Originally, circa 1987, a medium paced ballad on Springsteen's Tunnel Of Love, Two Faces became for the Salamander's, a fiddle driven bluegrass anthem.

One minor criticism – someone at the label failed to check the artwork prior to production. Not one, but both track listings are numerically wayward! Available from Fish Records, P.O. Box 148, Shrewsbury, Shropshire SY3 5WQ.

David Rovics Live At Club Passim (own label) Politically inspired songs – an Ochs for the new millennium? – balance precariously

with humorous throwaways like *The Alligator* Song. With Song For My Broken Heart, Rovics delivers the real thing. PO Box 995, Jamaica Plain, MA 02130 USA.

Lui Collins Leaving Fort Knox (Molly Gamblin Music MGM 1006) A marriage of traditional and contemporary folk styles though the material is entirely original including a cover of Dana Robinson's Loose The Ties. Accompanying herself on guitar and banjo, Lui rings the changes by performing (her) Saudade partly in Portuguese and

Robin Dale Ford Ain't That Skippin' & Flyin' (10th Planet Records 10-003) From Alaska, Ford delivers a banjo driven contemporary folk recording of a dozen of her own songs. Rarely strays into bluegrass pickin' mode, except on the title track. With a sweet, joyful voice reminiscent of Parton/Krauss, the spirited opener Hangin' By A Wire sets the tone for a pleasant, though hardly classic, recording. PO Box 10114, Fairbanks, AK 99710, USA
