A regular meeting of the League |March. Criteria for League of of Women Voters bi-monthly Discussion Group was held Friday morning at Kinsloe House, with Mrs. Melville Samuels as chairman. The subject for discussion was "The Proposed Agenda for 1958-59," with Mrs. E, D. Criddle, Jr, as leader.
A resume of the three Proposed Items discussed is as follows:
I. NEED FOR ZONING LAWS.

Mrs. Criddle read a letter from R. W. Knight, secretary of the Corsicana Chamber of Commerce, commending the League for exploring the need of adequate city poning Mrs. C. E. Stipe gave a talk defining and explaining the steps in securing an effective zoning ordinance.
Displayed and discussed were publications from an organization called ACTION (American Council To Improve Our Neighborhood), a non-profit, non-political, non-commercial group whose objective is to help citizens and communities combat housing decay
II. PUBLIC LIBRARY FACIL ITIES
Mrs. Criddle read a quote from Eloise Roach, author and teacher, as follows: "Developing in young people the 'library habit' is as neeessary for the child's mental growth as developing the proper food habits for physical growth. But such development is also neeessary for the continuing life and usefulness of the library. In every child acquiring the library habit, the library has a potential supporter, the type of friend without whom the library cannot fulfill its function as a central storehouse of learning and delight for all ages in the community."
The discussion brought forth the following list of needs for the Corsicana Public Library, stated by Corsicana citizens:

1. Open more hours. 2. More people using library. 3. Adequate children's room. 4. A teenage corner. 5. Cabinet to display Memorial Books.
2. Outside receptacle for returning books, 7. A Jewish encyclopedia. 8. Furniture repair. 9. Air conditioning.
3. Work room for repair of books.
4. More display tables. 12. More stacks for books.
5. Rest room and magazine room heated. 14. Create interest in Story Hour. 15. Remodel auditorium and house a Museum.
To accomplish these recommendations would require more personnel and more money
III. YOUTH RECREATIONAL FACILITIES.
Announcements were made of the PTA meetings where this subject will be discussed more fully Some of the needs mentioned In the League discussion were:
6. More adequate YMCA BuildIng. 2. A better control of BB guns and firearms, safety through training programs (in YMCA, NRA, Boy Scouts, and local clubs 3. Bowling Alleys. 4. Roller skating. 5. "Junior Achievement" movement, 6. "Big Brother" movement. 7. Consensus was that the greatest need is for more trained adult volunteer leadership.

33. Any voter who changes his residence after the close of registration should be permitted by law to vote at the following election in the precinct where he formerly resided and is registered.

## NON-PARTISAN POLICY OF THE IEAGUE

The Board endorses the non-partisan policy which states that League leaders shall not take an active part during their period of League leadership, in party politics, which includes attendance at precinct conventions.

The Board clarified the meaning on non-partisan, which it points out is sometimes misunderstood by people to mean neutrality in all issues as well as non-partisanship, so far as parties and candidates are concerned. The League never supports parties or candidates, but may, when study and concensus by the appropriate League Unit has taken place, support or oppose legislation.

The Board endorses the following statement from the State League Board: twhen the League reaches consensus on a Current Agenda item and desires to take effective positive action...i.e. informing and educating the public, initiating legislation through the proper governing body...the primary responsibility for camrying out this phase of League Program rests with the item chairman and her committee. Material prepared by this committee for wide distribution and voter education should not be confused with Voters Service work. Any material prepared by the Voters Service committee for a Voters Guide should present both sides of the issue and should not carry or reflect in any way the League's position on the issue". Voters Service information may or may not be provided by the League in an issue where the League has taken a stand.

In view of the above policy of the League, Mrs. Ethel Hook has tendered her resignation from the Board in order that she may work actively for a canidate.

## WHEN ORGANIZED

With the help of members of the Waco and Dallas Leagues, Corsicana women interested in the political scene organized a Local League in January 1952.

## PURPOSE

The purpose of the League of Women Voters is to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation in government.

## LEAGUE AND POLITICAL PARTIES

The League supports or opposes measures, but never parties or candidates. It does, however, urge its members, except for leaders during their term of of fice, to work as individuals in the parties of their choice. The leaders forego partisan activity in order to insure the integrity and effectiveness of the League as a whole. The League may, however, take a stand on a governmental issue after a period of fact-finding, discussion, and objective consideration of the public interest.

## PROGRAM

State and National programs are chosen at biennial conventions by delegates of local Leagues. Local Leagues adopt a Current Agenda each year at their annual meetings. League positions represent the consensus of members' views, but minority opinion is recognized also. Members are free to work through well-defined channels to change any position from which they dissent.

Criteria for program making include the following principles: Does it duplicate work of other organizations? Is work load feasible? Are there sufficient per, sonnel and funds to carry it out?

## HOW FINANCED?

League dues, purposely kept at a minimum to promote membership, provide only part of the money needed to keep the League functioning. The remainder is derived from contributions by members and other public-spirited citizens who wish to encourage the nonpartisan work of the League.


## WHO BELONGS TO THE LEAGUE?

Voting membership in the League of Women Voters is open to all women citizens who subscribe to the League's purpose and policy. Women who are under 21 or who are not citizens of the United States and men may be associate members. Annual dues are $\$ 3.00$, payable April 1. Anyone interested in participating in the League's work may attend the meetings.

## VOTERS' SERVICE

Known for its service in the voters' service field, the League proposes in each election to arouse sufficient interest for voters to study qualifications of each candidate, merits of each issue, and to exercise their right to vote as they please at the polls.

Poll Tax Campaign: League members and friends, properly instructed, collect poll taxes the last week in January.

Get-Out-the-Vote: In local, primary, and general elections, League of Women Voters stage "get-out-the vote" campaign through newspaper and radio publicity and through speakers at meetings of various organizations.

Voters' Guide: Thousands of copies are distributed to give pro and con explanations on candidates and proposed legislation.

## PUBLIC RELATIONS

Public relations work is carried out by each League member rather than by a committee alone so the entire membership helps in carrying out the League program. Newspaper, radio, and civic-minded speakers have been used as media in reaching the public. Civic organizations and groups such as the Parent-Teacher Associations, the Business and Professional Womens Club, the Navarro Junior College, the Corsicana Public Schools, the Chamber of Commerce, the Y. M. C. A., and many individuals have worked with the League on projects.

League Publications: Available at nominal prices or free, on three levels of League study, are National, State, and Local publications, including a monthly bulletin for each level.

## LOCAL PROGRAM

In the Corsicana League, the program is adopted in the spring at the annual meeting. It consists of current agenda (current local government issues chosen for concerted study) and continuing responsibilities (former current agenda items on which the League has a position).

One of the most important lessons in citizen education can be learned from the League's continuing responsibilities-that, in a democracy, reforms do not come about over night but often take sustained attention over a long period of time.

Several general membership meetings are held during the year. Unit groups hold small meetings twice monthly. Visitors are always welcome.
