THE loris is a fmall animal of Ceylon, which is very remarkable for the elegance of its figure, and the fingularity of its conformation. Of all animals, its body is, perhaps, the

The length of its body is an effect of this structure; and it apnears ftill longer, because it wants a tail. Were it not for this defect of tail, and the uncommon number of vertebræ, it might be comprehended under the lift of makis; for it refembles them in the hands and feet, in the quality of the hair in the number of teeth, and in the pointed muzzle. But, independent of the fingularity above taken notice of, which removes this animal from the makis, he has other peculiar qualities, His head is entirely round, and his muzzle is almost perpendicular to this fphere. His eyes are exceedingly large, and very near each other. His ears are large, rounded, and garnished in the infide with three auricles, in the form of a fmall shell. But, what is still more remarkable. and perhaps peculiar to this animal, the female discharges her urine by the clitoris, which is perforated like the penis of the male; and thefe two organs have a perfect refemblance to each other.

Linnaus has given a fhort, but excellent defeription of this animal*. It is likewife very

well repreferate by Seba; and it appears to be
the fame animal of which Therenot feals in
the following terms: 'I fam' in the Mogal comtry, apes which had been brought from Geylon.
'they were much eftemed, beaufe they exceeded not the fize of a man' hand, and
were of an uncommon fpecies. Their front
was flat, their cyte large and round, and of
a highty tellow colour, like thole of certain
cats. Their muzzle is very tharp, and the
infide of their ara is yellow. They have no
tail... When I examined them, they freed
on their hind-feet, often embraced each other,
and looked fleadfallify on the people, without
being graind's.
