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

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

• You Know You're Getting Old When: you meet someone in the music biz who's never heard of payola. Kinda weird because payola isn't dead. It isn't even sick. At an Accordion Kings seminar, Heuv P Meaux, the Crazy Cajun, remarked on his past problems with payola, "Hell, it's the American way. It costs \$50 million to elect a President who makes considered running a regular Sideman \$200,000 a year. Somebody owns his ass." Meaux also reflected "You can hear any instrument you want in the accordion," a point brought home at Ed Miller's tape release by Kathy Brotherton, who produced tin whistle and bagpipe lines out of her chromatic.

However, pace the Chronicle's minimalist approach to Austin music, the unfortunate Licke is obliged to cover areas he really is pig ignorant about, ie everything else. Take, for instance, his recent note about Jimmy Day's departure. One is confident that Lecki had never heard the name before in his life and wouldn't know a pedal steel guitar if he fell over one, so naturally he made a dog's dinner of the third hand story. But this, as with countless other examples, isn't really his fault. Mind you, if he actually believes that writing about music is like dancing about architecture, or, as Texas Beat so elegantly phrased it, puking about appliances, one does wonder why he bothers.

• Way back at the dawn of MCT, we featurette, but bogged down over one insurmountable problem—where do you start? The idea perished—God knows we had enough else to do-but every once in a while I wish we had a place to highlight exceptional players. Names that come to mind, beyond the obvious (Glasse, Reed, Neubert, Brotherton, Frosty et al), are Larry Wilson (guitar, Barb Donovan/ Jimmy LaFave/Lillian Standfield), Kevin Smith (bass, High Noon/47 Indians), David Heath (bass, Tracy Lyn/Don McCalister's Cowboy Jazz Revue), Gretchen MacMahon & Becky Blount (guitar & alto sax, Bon Terra) and Lisa Pankratz (drums, 47 Indians).

• Last issue, I mentioned Paul Glasse talking about his album sidemen as his "dream band." One way I sort out players is by the "daydream band;" I admire many in my head, but draft those I love on an instinctive gut level, though the line-up changes according to whether I'm being a rock & roll, rockabilly or country star. Of course, I can sing like Jack Scott, Don Walser and Arthur Alexander and play guitar like Link Wray, Jimmy Bryant and James Burton (I'm not just brilliant, I'm versatile), but second guitar/vocals would be John Inmon, Wes McGhee or Sean Mencher; Lisa Pankratz or Steady Freddie Krc on drums; Kevin Smith or Linda Shaw on bass; Jimmy Day on steel (this band travels first class); on fiddle either Mary Egan or bring the incredible Eithne Hannigan over from England; Becky Blount on alto sax. I'll tell what, we murder them.

 Being in Austin seems to have made me an equal opportunity daydreamer. A few years ago Eithne Hannigan would have been the only woman in the band-it may get me deported from Texas, but I've not heard a fiddler here, including Johnny Gimble, who can touch her.

• Last month I gave Jimmie Dale Gilmore kind of a hard time for making another album with hired guns rather than his regular band. This turned out to be moderately controversial. I love Jimmie Dale as a person, but I have perhaps unfair expectations of him, combined with a deep-seated aversion to session musicians, in this context a recipe for disaster. Rather than plod through the argument, here are the main building blocks of it. Construct, or demolish, your own version according to taste.

• Dance with who brung you • Bob Wills, asked if any Texas Playboys could sight read: "Sure, several of them, but it don't hurt their playing none" • Ex-Gilmore sideman: "Jimmie, if I'm not good enough to record with you, I'm not good enough to play with you" • The Beatles made their records with the worst drummer in the world and still managed to sell a few • If you don't make it live, you don't make it at all • Voltaire: "The best is the enemy of the good" • Zen proverb: "Don't push the river."

• Our MVP, Pat Mears, raving about Dutch clubs, reminds me just how horrible Austin venues are compared to almost anywhere else. Great music, shitty sound. Either the room is an acoustic nightmare, and/or the PA is a cheapo off-brand, and/or the person at the desk has tin ears. No point in naming them, you all know who they are, though if you want a good laugh, check out Dance Across Texas, reputed to have cost most of a million. Throw in the 75¢ spent on the sound system and that's a lot of money.

 Mind you, Austin's real crime against humanity is mixing from the stage. Two Hoots had a keyboard player at the Hole In The Wall recently taking up 50% of the stage and 0% of the mix. Hope he sounded good in the monitors.

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RECORD & TAPE REVIEWS

TISH HINOJOSA AQUELLA NOCHE

(Watermelon, CD/cassette)

Recorded live on two "certain nights" at In an MCT poll, a voter for Ed Miller under On Silver Moon, McCalister opted for a Waterloo Ice House, these 14 cuts show off Hinojosa's sweet vocals, acoustic guitar styling, exquisite songwriting and, on several cuts, recent collaborations with Beto Skiles and Paul Glasse, which together with discriminating selections from Hispanic artists and subtle percussion highlighting, provide the listener with 14 Spanish language cuts. Traditionally sentimental love ballads blend nicely with sambas, cumbias and other Tex-Mex rhythms to form a South of the Border compilation that should make everyone involved proud. Spanish music, like much of the Blues, is often too 'down' and melancholy for my taste, but this album didn't have that effect; perhaps because of the perfection of the vocals, combined with my mercado-level comprehension of the language. In fact, it's been on the tape deck for several days as meditation background. Two songs with a verse in English help linguistically handicapped listeners like myself, as do Tish's occasional introductions, not to mention the biartist who has long deserved a world-wide audience, Aquella Noche may provide Hinojosa entre' to new, appreciative markets for her work

ED MILLER HOME AND AWAY

(Wellfield, cassette)

Folk, asked "who else is there?" Good point. Folk is an amphorous word, one reason we use Acoustic to cover both singer-songwriters and genuine folk music, ie rooted in tradition. In this sense, Scots expat Ed Miller may not be the only folk musician in Austin, but is clearly the most important, one who has not let 20+ years in Texas soften his cultural identity, or, come to that, his accent. As with 1990's Border Background, you get a booklet with words, glossary and background to "Songs from the Scottish Folk Revival," ranging from Robert Burns to moderns, the most striking, Banks O' Sicily and The John McLean March, by Hamish Henderson. Adam McNaughton's Blood Upon Price and Debbie Rothschild harmonizing. DON McCALISTER JR BRAND NEW WAYS

(Biscuit Boy, cassette)

somewhat generic folk sound; this time his strongest suit is the very effective syncopated swing of his Cowboy Jazz Revue. Recorded during various fiscal highs over the last two years, the multiple credits reflect a lack of uniformity, though McCalister roped in some terrific players, sharing the guitar work with Marvin Denton, Rick McRae and Boomer Norman, with Johnny Gimble and Gene Elders fiddle, Floyd Domino piano, Stan Smith clarinet, AD Manion and Rick Ward drums, Keith Carper, Carl Keesee and Dave Klaus bass, Ed'Outhouse' Bradfield harmonica, Frank Kammerdeiner cello, Betty Elders, Marianne Gonna Go Downtown shows almost reckless courage. John Ims' Two Of A Kind, the Louvins' Cash On The Barrelhead and Laura share space with five originals, including a reworked Silver Moon, with the enigmatic story Walk On By the most impressive. With the Revue approach, McCalister's found a distinctive, individual sound, sharing ground with both Hal Ketchum and Walt Hyatt.

BNL REVUE LIVE

(ELK Audio, cassette)

they ain't fooling around. Out of any recognizable mainstream, even by Austin standards, they range through jazz, bluegrass, folk, blues, country and even, having added a drummer, near-rock. With three voices, a variety of instruments, a lot of experience and infectious enthusiasm, they are, up to a point, reminiscent of Houston acoustic swingsters The Banded Geckos, but their up-front strength is not Gecko style three part harmonies but two very different female voices. Marci Laine's is clear and pure, Eve Kuniansky's deeper and highly shaded, with some striking phrasing. Nine songs, not including any of their political material, come from four band members, predominantly Mike Ochs (guitar, vocals, harmonica), but the three best, Encounters, Head Over Heels and Why, intelligent, offbeat lyrics that could come from a cabaret musical, are by Kuniansky, who also plays some very pretty flute. BUCKET No 6 HIGH ON THE HOG

MICHAEL P SMITH NEW ORLEANS JAZZ FEST

(Pelican, hardback)

When this semi-acoustic quintet says "eclectic," Rob Patterson, the band's publicist, and Tom In 1970 a few hundred people were in Congo Square for the first New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival, in 1991 250,000 packed the 35 acre enthusiastic about these immigrants from Fair Grounds Race Track. BNL, slide guitar work, well served by production, treatment, while shooting the spectacular Mardi Gras Indian gangs in b&w is simply a waste of film. Useful if you really need to know right now what, say, Chris Owens looks like. JC

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
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RECORD & TAPE REVIEWS

PAT MEARS THERE GOES THE RAINBOW

(SilenZ, import CD)

Reviewing Mears' original 6 track independent cassette last January (MCT #19), the main difficulty was reconciling an admired acoustic singer-songwriter with this radically different incarnation. Backed by the relentless, implacable hard rocking of Calvin Russell's band, and with darkly brooding, densely textured songs that broke completely with her old material, the transfiguration of Pat Mears was total. As she says, "I turned 180 degrees, gutter." Unaware of this metamorphosis, reviewers of the 11 song Dutch CD were able to go straight to the heart of the matter—"you will be nailed to your chair . . . absolutely unique . . . awe-inspiring . . . gives you goose bumps all the time . . . unbelievably good." Most echoed my comparison with Janis Joplin, one perceptively observing that Mears opts for control, while Janis could never find the brakes. With her elegant structures and lyrical complexity, Mears is less gritty, more poetic than the bare-knuckled Russell, but together they constitute a rebirth of Texas Rock, fusion of rock, country and blues has been in. It's no coincidence that, like Ely before them, their readiest acceptance is in Europe.

3 BALLS OF FIRE SOUL SURFIN'

(Pearl's, cassette)

Blithely ignoring the fact that if God had meant The avidly anticipated Flatlanders (Steve Texans to surf, He'd have made bullshit tidal, Clay Jackson, Big Kahuna of Pearl's Oyster Bar, the lonely outpost of good music in South Dallas (or North Austin as the locals insist on calling it), presents Pearl's first annual Summer Special tape. On their recent Men With The Burning Guitars tape, 3 Balls mixed surf with R&B, rock & roll and film theme music, but this time they're hard core, apart from a stab at from fragile folk to music from the Austin Link Wray's immortal Rumble (the only instrumental ever banned on radio!). Being merely human, they can't match the edgy violence of the original, but then neither could Ry Cooder. Otherwise it's original and classic— Chantays, Pacific Arrows, Marketts and, of course, The Ventures—surf instrumentals, with such all-time greats as Pipeline, Sleepwalk, WalkDon'tRun. Ideally, the album would have been made live at Pearl's, but, with Jim Yanaway producing, Burnin' Mike Vernon (guitars), Jackie Newhouse (bass) and Steve Fulton (drums, guitar), with assists from Phil Bennison (scream on Pipeline, drums on revealing what sad doldrums that once vital Rumble) and Stan Moore (drums, Surf Rider) run through the gamut of surf guitar effects with verve. A tape for the water-skiers to take to the Lakes.

VARIOUS ARTISTS COOL TRACKS: DALLAS DEMOS

(Texas Music Association, cassette) 'Kool' packaging (it looks like the cigarettes) showcases cuts by 13 diverse Dallas-based groups ranging from regional faves Killbilly (the bluegrass-styled Muddy Rio Grande, with Austin's Louis J Meyers on electric guitar) and Picket Line Covotes (Limb From Limb) to unknown wannabes, some considerably better than others. In true Big D style, the production is in the main excellent and the bands chosen display the variety Texas music is famous for around the world. The Dallas TMA Chapter has a sampler to take pride in: almost all of the cuts are strong, the whole well-balanced, although the fidelity varies as the tracks came from varied sources. Representative of their Developing Artists series, this should go far in helping the growth and recognition of the artists as well as for Dallas' music melange in general. Other cuts: Rhett Miller: Cryin' Drunk; Twist of Fate: Do You Believe In Love?; Yeah! Yeah! Yeah!:Don't Take Life Too Seriously (power guitar and my favorite lyrics of the batch); Judy & The Essentials; Second Chance; The Martyrs: Global Eyes; The Mystics: Mr Mean: Clever Pennies: Love For A World Insane; Goodfoot: Hippie Chick; Katau:Winged Children; Big Boss Groove:Like It Or Not; The Homewreckers: Doncha Hang Around My Door.

121 IT'S OKAY, I'M WITH THE BAND

(Oak Haven Records, cassette)

Songwriter Brian Cummings, along with John Driver, Eric Adamson and Tommy Holden, based in Manor, offer an introduction to their style—laid-back country rock with extensive guitar breaks, more early to mid-70s than not, which is probably when these guys were musically imprinted. Some socio-political commentary in tunes such as the driving It's Freezing, It's Cold, Pill Road and London Massacre keep the lyrical content from being too predictable. A lot of the guitar leads seem a bit extended, derivative and over indulgent without the benefit of mind alteration, but that speaks more to personal preference than to the player's abilities. Cummings' strong and pleasing vocals sound a bit like Joe Ely mixed with Bob Seeger, the production from Lone Star and Bee Creek Studios is fine, the players (John Driver, Eric Adamson, Tommy Holden with guests Lance Keltner, Spencer Starnes, Mike Skinner and 'Del Rio' Johnny Miller) seasoned and able. If you like Seeger, the Eagles and similar 70's rock, you'll be delighted with this Central Texas version. In their promo, i2i make no secret of their mature years, but, as Emily Kaitz tells us, middle-aged rock & rollers are so darn cute: EM

BUTCH HANCOCK No 2 ALIKE #12

(Rainlight Records, cassette)

Wessen, Jimmie Dale Gilmore, Joe Ely, Tony Pearson + hisself, along with Spider Johnson) reunion comprises the last scheduled night of the marathon, probably the highlight for many. Too bad this segment isn't on video so everyone could enjoy the novelty of the legends dressed in matching costumes after an on-stage change for Hancock. Ely kicks off with One Road More, but it's taken over by each in turn, followed by a Town Pump motivational story introducing the rough-styled Honky Tonk Tavern, lit up by Wessen's stylings. Gilmore leads Down this Road & Back Again and The Stars in My Life, perfect for his voice, two of the many songs Butch seems to have written just for him. Butch takes over again on a rather enigmatic ballad, She Had Money, She Had Time, then Steve takes off to West Texas windmills & water tanks (You've Never Seen Me Cry). Everyone takes a verse of the classic If You Were A Bluebird, while Wesson's saw and mandolin with Butch's sweet harmonica weave a spell. Gilmore spurs the pace with Shadow Of The Moon and then eases into the sweet love ballad When The Nights Are Cold. Richard Bowden and Jesse Taylor ioin the reunion for West Texas Waltz, complete with a baloon orchestra break, the traditional audience participation and the POP. It was the final tune of the evening, but not of the series. Watch this space for a couple more months yet.

GUY 'N' GOLD A.K.A. THE SCALPEL & THE SLEDGEHAMMER

(Goldprod, cassette)

These guys are young enough to be his sons, but they definitely developed their brand of blues in the style of Leon Redbone. Guy Forsyth and Artie Gold play and sing well enough, especially Gold on the slide guitar; and the recording at Folkreels, engineered by Eric Blakely (who also helps out on the upright bass on the title cut), digitally edited by Jerry Tubb at Terra Nova Studios, is as good as anyone could ask for. But the retrograde, objectiving, original but derivative lyrics spoil much of the potential enjoyment, at least for this reviewer. Going back to roots for style is one thing, regressing attitudes are something else again, especially questionable coming from educated, young white guys. Redbone can get away with being a museum piece, but that sort of thing has a limited market. It is to be hoped that being young could mean these artists will develop a voice and headset more their own with time, experience and some re-programming about the female persuasion. The musical potential is EM there.

gigs coming up rather than rave about ones you missed. But I have to say that if you passed up the Accordion Kings, you blew it badly. Friday night, especially, with the Vrazels Polka Band, Little Willie Littlefield & The Zydeco Hitchhikers, Jackie Caillier & The Caiun Cousins with Andrew Cormier (plus fantastic guest appearance by Joe Bonsall) and Santiago Jimenez y Su Conjunto, representing the major Texas accordion playing ethnic communities and traditions, was sensational, a major Gig of the Year candidate. So too was the laid-back tune-swapping workshop with Tejano legend Valerio Longoria, Andrew Cormier, who came out retirement for the occasion, Little Willie Littlefield, who took up the accordion in his 40s after an industrial accident, and hot young Czech John Novak, with contributions by Nick Villareal and several generations of Longorias.

• As Mark Rubin said in our MVP slot last month, "in Texas we all dance to the accordion." Two striking aspects of the multi-ethnic night were the capacity crowd's age range, from children to great-grandparents—not your normal 6th Street crowd for sure-and the energy level. Czechs turned out in droves, but when the Vrazels were done, they stayed on the dance floor for the other bands, particularly taken with the fancy footwork of Littlefield's stage Zydeco dancing couple.

Normally MCT would rather point you at great • By the end of the non-stop weekend, the most dedicated accordion freak might well have felt squeezed out. Even the symposia were dominated by live and recorded examples. Manuel Peña setting the tone by insisting on playing historic tracks by such as Narisco Martinez all the way through. At times the talk shops were a bit Accordionics Anonymous, Chris Strachwitz of Arhoolie, Carl Finch of Brave Combo, Ken Erwin of Rounder Records and others testifying about how they got hooked.

> • The accordion is storming back, appearing in all kinds of unlikely contexts, but still has a rough time in popular imagery. A beer ad a couple of years back had a bar clearing out when polka was played on the jukebox, and a famous cartoon shows people entering Heaven being issued with harps or Hell being given accordions. I never really got that onespending eternity with a poxy New Age harp? Anyway, as a famous polka tells us, in Heaven there is no beer.

> Pat Jasper and Texas Folklife Resources can only be endlessly complimented, has prompted talk of an annual event. Maybe next year, we'll hear from Texas' minority minorities, Germans, Dutch, Swiss, Irish and, especially, women accordionists like Eva Ybarra, Lupito Ravela or even La Gloria De Tejas, Lydia Mendoza

ACCORDION 101

One problem with ethnic music is that it's relatively inaccessible to outsiders, who have to gamble, and often waste, time and money to educate themselves. Starting points can be deceptive; those names that do register in the outer world aren't necessarily the right ones. Rockin' Dopsie, for instance, is hardly regarded as a seminal figure by Zydeco lovers. Ethnic music gets very little press coverage, but that's not always the media's fault. Texas Polka News told me that they couldn't get polka bands to send them review copies, so, with the best will in the world, what chance does MCT have?

• The simplest and cheapest solution—I have to say this, being in the game myself—is to play the odds with samplers and then follow up whatever takes your fancy. This doesn't work for polka though. If there is a compilation, it's so hard to find that it might as well not exist.

• TEJANO The obvious choice is any one of • The success of Accordion Kings, on which Rounder's four wide-ranging Conjunto! albums. The soundtrack to Arhoolie's film Chulas Fronteras is highly recommended.

> • CAJUN Though not strictly Texas style, Swallow have Cajun Saturday Night and 21 Cajun Classics. Another Arhoolie soundtrack, J'Ai Ete Au Bal, is quite extraordinary.

> • ZYDECO Maison De Soul is the name here, Zydeco Festival and 101 Proof Zydeco.

Susan Jarrett used to have a store where you could walk out with any of the goodies she carries; selfreleases, local labels, Texas music from majors and indies, Rounder and Arhoolie's lists and imports, in every format. Now she's mail order only. In classified sections (Tejano, Cajun, etc), with a seperate Vinyl list, like Waterloo's recent A-Z catalog, this is an exercise in spending gobs of money in the comfort of your own home. \$1 to Box 312, Austin, TX 78767.

CREED TAYLOR & THE TRAVELLERS

(independent cassette)

This five-song demo from San Antonio is just enough to tantalize true country music fans with fresh, soulful and engaging original tunes based on well-traveled themes. At times the strong, earthy vocals remind one of Waylon Jennings, especially on Long Lonely Road, other cuts brought Steve Earle to mind. The slim sampling suggests C&W dancers would be at ease and on the floor whether they knew the songs or not—a basic necessity in this genre. Nothing revolutionary here, but worth a roadhouse trip to hear how they stand up to a whole evening's worth of listening. Besides, with his name, the man oughta be a Nashville star.EM

VARIOUS ARTISTS ANTONE'S ANNIVERSARY Anthology: Vol 2

(Antone's, CD/cassette)

Marking the club's 16th anniverary last month, this live recording, taped at the 11th & 12th anniversary shows, can stand on its credits alone. The first track (of 11), for instance, features Jimmy Rogers with Hubert Sumlin, Chester King, Pinetop Perkins, Calvin Jones and Willie Smith, the second Pinetop Perkins with Matt Murphy, Rogers, James Cotton, Jones and Smith! Otherwise, though, the big names, Buddy Guy, Otis Rush, Snooky Prior and Albert Collins, mainly rely on The Antones (Derek O'Brien, Sarah Brown, George Rains et al). No knock against these fine players, but my personal picks are Cotton and Sumlin duos; Howlin' Wolf's Moanin' At Midnight and Muddy Waters' Evan Shuffle. Produced by Angela Strehli, the recording is immaculate (rather more than can be said for the usual sound quality at Antone's). In real life, as it were, the club offers a much wider variety than suggested here, Texas Blues, Zvdeco, country blues, rockabilly and, of course, local artists, and it could be well argued that an anniversary album should reflect this.

VARIOUS ARTISTS TEXAS HARMONICA RUMBLE

(Fan Club, import CD)

Recorded, like the next door album, live at Antone's, but a very different beast. This is local boys-Paul Orta, Gary Primich, Lewis Cowdray and Walter T Higgs from Austin, Darrell Nulisch and Memo Gonzalez from Dallas, plus Greg 'Fingers' Taylor from Jackson, Miss. Supporting players include Wes Starr drums, Mike Kindred piano, John McVey of Orta's Kingpins guitar and producer Eddie Stout bass. The caveat, of course, is that you have to have a penchant for blues mouth organ to sit through the 15 tracks (two from each rumbler, Orta getting an extra), many of them, including Primich's Take That and Cowdrey's instrumental Texas Rumble, originals. Some strong blowing, with the inventive and experimental Primich as the clear stand-out, though the overall honors belong to Gonzalez, who, in a highenergy night, turns on the most steam. Put out by a New Rose subsidiary, the minimal, error-riddled liner notes are JC simply a disgrace.

Belle Southern

The first man to play and record with an electric guitar was born August 19, 1906, in San Marcos, TX. Actually that depends on your source. At the very least Eddie Durham was the first jazz player to do so, though another Texan, steel guitarist Bob Dunn of Milton Brown & The Musical Brownies, had lashed a pick-up and amp to a modified Martin and used it on wax in 1935.

• Durham started out in Walter Page's Blue Devils (Jimmie Rushing, Hot Lips Page, Buster Smith and Count Basie!), moving to Bennie Moten's band where he first experimented and recorded with non-electric amplification, becoming the first guitarist to solo in a big band. In 1935, recording with Jimmie Lunceford, he used a National resonator guitar, but by 1937 was running on mains electricity, cutting classic tracks with Basie's Kansas City Five/Six.

•The story gets real fuzzy around Charlie Christian. What's disputed is whether Durham really taught the young pianist to play guitar and/or sold him his electrified rig, though everyone agrees he was a major influence on the genius who first brought electric guitar to national prominence. Durham, still active in the late 80s, was an arranger and director most of his career, for a while with the all-girl International Sweethearts Of Rhythm.

• Electric guitarists everywhere, especially Texas, should remember this Hill Country pioneer on August 19th.

THE 1991 MUSIC BUSINESS GUIDES DIRECTORY (or The 1991 Music Business Directories Guide)

In the last few months, three different local sources have come out with "Music Industry Guides." They have much in common— the Texas Music Office were totally accurate. most of the entries for a start-but some Alas, the Chronicle, which left us out last the guides.

• Texas Music Industry Guide In Texas Beat Vol 2 #5, March 1991. The only guide available for SXSW. More grassrootsy than the others, and the only one to include bands/ musicians under its classified headings. Most of the 900 odd entries are barebones, but many paid \$10 for a 35 word description. Set in 6 point type, so a bit hard on the eyes, but much information not found elsewhere. Another edition is due in September.

book put out by the DoC's Texas Music Office, listing 1,169 music-related businesses. Most entries are simply names, addresses, phone numbers, about a third fully descriptive (\$30). A-Z with classified index; updates and supplements are sent out. \$15; free to music related businesses or NARAS-elegible musos.

• Austin Music Industry Guide In The Austin Chronicle Vol X, #43, June 28, 1991. 600+ entries in the Chronicle's fourth such guide, the first run in the paper itself rather than as a seperate publication. They also put out a Musicians' Directory, so skipped them but do have the only Venue heading. 7000 copies went to the New Music Seminar.

• Our simplest check, of course, is to look at MCT's various entries. Both Texas Beat and significant differences. Herewith, a guide to time, had the information in writing and confirmed it by telephone, but only got two words, Music and City, right this time. These were followed by News and another magazine's phone number and description. All corrected two weeks later, along with a whole slew of other errors, but we wonder if they got the amendments to those 7000 people in New York. As a music-related business, we were, obviously, least happy with the Austin Music Industry Guide.

• The Texas Music Office's stand alone • Texas Music Industry Directory 200 page product is by far the most convenient, though the Chronicle's center pages could be extracted. However, they're an awkward shape and size, need stapling and, being on newsprint, have a limited life expectancy. Texas Beat's guide, embedded in the mag, is poorly laid out (starts on a verso page) for removal. Both are larded with ads, a major point of the exercise for the two papers but

irritating to users in the long run.

• The knock against the Texas Music Office book is the price, but if you can bag a copy somehow, tuck Texas Beat inside and you'll have a pretty good window on the Texas music industry. The Chronicle guide? Let's just say that it's not 100% reliable. JC

Noon-2am benefit for Vietnam Veterans of America with Ponty Bone, Zydeco Ranch and Logan & The Lix as the Austin contingent, bands from Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Germany, plus arts & crafts, Texas wines, ethnic foods. SAT 3RD • KEVIN WHITE (Ritz). Ever wonder if something's going on you don't know about? After coming here from Baton Rouge with Chris Thomas, White is joining Will T Massey and the Statesman's Peter Blackstock in moving to Seattle to make a fresh start. His last headline gig showcases a style that melds Jimi Hendrix, Bob Marley, Otis Redding and Bob Dylan.

Sun 4th • SUMMER FEST (Chicago House). As Belle says, Chicago House have really pushed the boat out for Summer Fest with four great line-ups (see Calendar for the 4th, 5th, 6th & 7th), tonight's being marginally the strongest, certainly the one with the most heavyweights— Betty Elders & Mitch Watkins, Iain Matthews, Steve Young.

Sun 4th/11th/18th/25th • SAWDUST BOOGERS (Headliners East). Alter ego version of The Bad Livers, allowing them to relax and experiment away from the frenetic pace and iron discipline of their usual restrictive format. Kevin Smith of High Noon disapproves of Mark Rubin using an acoustic bass guitar instead of a stand-up, but we say, hey, let the guy take the load off his feet. Expect to hear some very off-beat material in laid-back style.

Mon 5th • Summer Fest (Chicago House). See 4th. Some good stuff, but the incredible meditate on where the King is tonight. Junior Brown is liable to sideswipe everyone Fri 16th • ELVIS NITE (Continental). No details else's act in a major way.

Mon 5th/12th/19th/26th & Fri 30th • DON WALSER'S PURE TEXAS BAND (Henry's). On the one hand he's been gathering devoted fans as diverse as Jo Carol Pierce (opening In The West for her), Troy Campbell and Sarah Elizabeth Campbell, on the other he's lost the

yodeller without compare. He's recruited Bert Rivera, long one of Hank Thompson's Brazos Valley Boys, to the steel chair, while Jason Roberts, just turned 16, is now a permanent featured band member, playing amazing twin fiddles with Howard Kalish.

Tues 6th • SUMMER FEST (Chicago House). See 4th. Any line-up with Barb Donovan, Jimmy LaFave, Michael Elwood and George Ensle is rich enough but the icing on the cake is Kathy McCarty of Glass Eye with acoustic versions of her songs.

Tue 6th • David Rodriguez + Betty Elders + MICHAEL FRACASSO (Cactus). Not quite the cream off the top of the Chicago House Summer Fest shows, but pretty close. Three tremendous singer-songwriters, all of whom, incidentally, heve been on MCT covers, in extended sets. Wed 7th • SUMMER FEST (Chicago House). See 4th. Bob Reilly, like Bruce Robison on the 4th, is a particular favorite of the management. Sat 10th/Sun 11th/Sat 17th • CANDACE ANDERSON (Capn Tom's/Chicago House/Mike & Charlie's). Technically she's a Nashville recording artist, but don't hold it against her because, though she's opened for Emmylou Harris, she's out of the country underground. Terrific voice and, on her Talking To A Tennessee Moon tape, very intelligent lyrics. Sun 11th • WALT LEWIS (Hole In The Wall). He's only been in action six months but this young lawyer has taken off like a rocket. Starting in a folk vein, his forte turned out to be outlaw country, picking up where Willie and Waylon left off when the outlaw image took over from the meaning. His songs can be somewhat superficial, but, hell, he's still arookie. Debuting his band (with Boomer Norman on lead guitar), he's a naturally gifted perfomer

Thu 1st • HIGH NOON (Headliners East). The slow down the wonderful country singer and Fri 16th/Sat 17th • BOOGEKINGS (Antone's). 35th anniversary reunion of the 100% authentic original line-up. Saturday night in Port Arthur, 1956.

SAT 17TH • PAT MEARS BAND (Austin Outhouse). See MVP and Reviews. Apart from a solo acoustic show with Calvin Russell early September, your last chance this year to find out what's got the Dutch in such a lather.

Sat 17th • BON TERRA (Chicago House). Even when sandbagged by a tape duplicating service, the all-woman soul band had a great non tape release party for Behind The Light last month, so they should really be turning it on for the Real Thing. Steadily improving and worth a listen just for lead guitarist Gretchen MacMahon and alto saxwoman Becky Blount.

Sat 17th • ERIC TAYLOR (Cactus). Houston's leading singer-songwriter, whose rather fragile performing style nonetheless compels attention for some extraordinarily beautiful lyrics.

Fri 23rd . Teisco Del Ray & THE NUT Rockers (Hole In The Wall). Chained to the typewriter for many moons, Dan Forte, returns with Caspar Rawls, Mike Buck & Benny and inimitable surf/jungle sounds.

Sat 24th • KEVIN WELCH (Continental). For those who were there, the Okie country singersongwriter and his shit hot Nashville band were one of the real highspots of SXSW.

Mon 26th · JULIANNE BANKS & NICK JONES (Austin Outhouse). A Hot Tomato with a great voice and her own original, kinda Adult Contemporary material, accompanied by sizzling acoustic guitarist Jones, a team forged at Chicago House open mikes.

Eclectic, original acoustic quintet (see Reviews) Fri 30th • BETTY ELDERS & MITCH WATKINS (Chicago House). Unveiled at the Cactus last month, the team of Elders, herself a gifted guitarist, and jazz virtuoso Watkins, together with new material that's impressive even by her standards, marks a new stage in the career of the woman voted Best Female Songwriter and Best Female Vocalist in both MCT polls so far. Pre-production tapes for an album due later this year suggest very strongly that she'll have another Best Independent Tape award to go next to the one for 1989's Daddy's Coal.

Sat 31st • Rosie Flores + Bob Neuwirth (Cactus). The long awaited return of La Rosalita. Many love her kick ass country/rock band mode, but she's equally, if not more, dynamito in acoustic solo sets. Neuwirth is a very odd, not to say bizarre, writer and performer.
