Answer - Question I

As Austin implements the new desegregation plan in August, I envision a role of affirmative leadership. I shall continue to adopt a consistent, positive approach in molding community support and do all that I can to alleviate the tensions caused by desegregation.

I would like to see the District reevaluate its education programs and services as it seeks to provide equal educational opportunity for all students. Since this is the most opportune time to make changes, more emphasis should be placed on multicultural and bilingual eduation as well as special programs to make the curriculum more responsive to the needs of all students. Above all, I would like for all segments of the school community to work toward maintaining community involvement in the ongoing school desegregation process.

Although the research is inconclusive as to the effects of desegregation on the achievement scores of minority and majority students, some schools have experienced improvement in achievement scores if improvements in educational services and programs accompanied desegregation.

I do hope that the District will move away from its present emphasis on norm-referenced standardized tests and develop more criterion referenced instruments, based on specific objectives and the students' mastery of them. Emphasis should also be placed on a reduced dropout rate and an increased percentage of students seeking higher education.

Answer - Question 2

- 1. Instructional materials should be ranked first; this includes textbooks. supplies, software, etc. Teachers need a variety of materials, easily accessible so that they can provide for individual needs and be innovative in the classroom
- 2. Capital outlay items receive second rank; this includes television sets, movie projectors, and other hardware.
- 3. New facilities will be needed gymnasiums and band halls enlarged. This does not preclude maintenance and the upkeep of present facilities.

- 4. Enrichment programs for both underachievers and the gifted and talented should receive high priority.
- 5. We must maintain a competitive salary scale so that we can continue to attract competent teaching and administrative staff.

Answer - Question 3

I do favor a separate board and taxing authority for the Austin Community College. Since the college has experienced phenomenal growth, additional funding and more adequate facilities are necessary. I favor the establishment of a new countywide community college district and support the election being held as soon as feasible.

Answer - Question 4

Having talked briefly with several persons involved in special education. I am presently of the opinion that no additional programs are needed in this area. Some specialists, however, do believe that additional personnel is needed, occupational and physical therapists, for example. I do favor continuing to contract out certain services where adequate arrangements can be made. I believe that special emphasis should be placed on minimizing the disruption of the special education programs during the desegregation process. Finally, we should continue to sensitize teachers, students, and the community to the importance of mainstreaming many of our special education students. The District must continue to meet the needs of all students.

Answer - Question 1

a. The role school board members should play in the Austin school desegregation plan would be to provide the leadership to enable the community to implement this court ordered plan in an equitable and orderly manner. Relief for areas of strain should be accomplished through the political process, not emotional rejection of the judicial. We are a nation of law abiders and we know that an unacceptable judicial interpretation can be changed by constitutional amendment as well as federal and state legislation. Unless the legislative process modifies the judicial, then we must assume the existing law is the desired law and school board

members, as well as school patrons, should and must support this court ordered plan.

b. The A.I.S.D. must have a competent and independent Office of Research and Evaluation department for testing and evaluation of the educational programs. It must continue its emphasis on competency of teachers and administrators.

c. Because segregation is both legally and morally unacceptable, desegregation can and will be accomplished. But the aim of the District should be integration. I feel that there should continue to be a constantly improving quality education for all Austin children — a program of college bound courses as well as a very comprehensive vocational-technical program. Greater involvement of community leadership would certainly be beneficial.

Answer — Question 2

My first budget priority would be in the elementary grades, as preparatory for secondary — this should include bilingual and migrant education, as well as beginning academic, fine arts, and athletic programs; second, in the secondary — divided into career academic and career vocational-technical; third, the special education and the handicapped, and the gifted and talented; fourth, the athletic and fine arts programs; and fifth, the adjustment of the individual to cope in non-academic involvement in the greater community.

Answer - Question 3

No, I do not favor a separate board and taxing authority for the Austin Community College. The original aim and emphasis for ACC was to stress the vocational-technical and continuing life education programs. The ACC was not intended to be all things to all people — it was incorporated to provide the vocational-technical training that the A.I.S.D. public schools could or would not provide, not to provide a weak liberal associate of arts degree.

Answer - Question 4

Special education in A.I.S.D. seems adequate except in the fields of the physically handicapped and the gifted and talented. I feel that to the extent possible in individual cases, mainstreaming should be accomplished. I support the concept of more individualized instruction and smaller teacher-pupil classes for those able to benefit from it."

Answer - Question 1

a. I believe it is vital that school board members take a leading and constructive role as desegregation is implemented. I would work to insure educational excellence in each school through adequate budget support and appropriate policies. Futher, I want to encourage active roles for students, teachers, parents and the community at large in helping us all adapt to change. A board member must also recognize that a strong public school system is an integral part of a strong community.

b. Academic quality can be monitored through effective use of A.I.S.D.'s Office of Research and Evaluation and close contact between Central Administration and schools. I would continue to visit schools and work for increased parental involvement.

c. We should emphasize the positive aspects of desegregation so our children can gain an understanding of various cultures, new friendships and a respect for the law. We should improve and expand opportunities for the gifted and talented. Attention to the individual needs of special education students needs to be stressed while promoting comunication between the handicapped and non-handicapped. Staff development that helps teachers teach also deserves support.

Answer — Question 2

1. Desegregation: Funds are needed for teacher support, programs to encourage participation in extracurricular activities, programs to familiarize staff and families with new schools, and adaptation of programs such as bilingual education to fit changes in school populations.

2. Teacher Salaries: These must be increased because of inflation, the new reponsibilities teachers will have under desegregation, and to hold and attract superior teachers.

3. Special Education: We must comply with laws on the education of the handicapped. More importantly, local funds should be used to supplement state monies for handicapped as well as regular students.

4. Gifted and Talented: Too long neglected, these students, with nurturing, will be tomorrow's leaders.

5. Renovation of existing facilities

and construction of new ones to relieve overcrowding.

Answer — Question 3

Yes. The need for a healthy Community College has been dramatically demonstrated by the explosive growth in enrollment. Without additional resources, ACC cannot maintain its current high quality. Approximately 2,000 students were turned away last spring for lack of facilities. The need is particularly great in the vocational/technical programs.

However, without taxing authority I favor a single board for both institutions to help insure continuing cooperation between A.I.S.D. and the Austin Community College.

Answer - Question 4

Special education needs additional teachers, physical therapists and other staff who have direct contact with handicapped students. Classroom teachers, many of whom have no training in special education, need more help in working with "mainstreamed" children. We must insure building and program access for the handicapped parent as well as the handicapped child.

It is the responsibility of the school district, not only from a legal point of view, but also from a humane and pragmatic perspective, that special education children are given the opportunity to become happy and productive members of society.

a. I would perceive my role as a new Board Member as being to work with the present plan and ultimately modify

the plan with court agreement to minimize the number of students being transported. My intention is to prevent white flight which is unhealthy for the school community. There appears to be no reward for school communities that have naturally integrated.

b. The desegregation plan requires monitoring academic programs and assuring the public that the principle role of the school district is quality education. The quality of leadership at all levels will determine the quality of the programs, where you find good administration and teachers, you will find good schools.

c. We tend to think of the school district as an entity that must operate within traditional perimeters. I suggest a cooperative effort between the Austin Community College which has a great vitality and enthusiasm for learning and our public schools in areas of instruction which would involve students in different patterns of learning. Many students at high school level are interested in opportunities for learning, competencies that are demanded by the sophisticated industries moving into our community. Many students would succeed in Austin Community College pilot programs where they fail in public school

Answer - Question 2

My first three priorities are: salaries, construction of new high school south, upgrading and renovating schools so that they can successfully handle current and upcoming enrollment changes. Then study and implement ideas to support teachers and principals, in these changing times.

Answer - Question 3

I'm a strong supporter of the Austin Community College and the programs they offer the citizens of Austin. I feel a separate Board appointed by the AISD Board would have more time to work with the Austin Community College problems, and would allow AISD Trustees more time to work on the problems of our district. I realize that the Austin Community College is one of the fastest growing community colleges in the nation and we must help them with all means possible, however, with the unsettled amount of tax increase for the AISD public schools, and the national economic situation appearing gloomy, I'm not sure our taxpayers would support, at this time, a new taxing district in Travis County.

Answer - Question 4

In my opinion, classroom teachers have been given major responsibilities, many of which they are not professionally prepared for. I would recommend additional training for the

teachers in this area. However, until the school district stabilizes under the court order and our special education students have adjusted to the new programs and new school assignments, I would not suggest implementing additional programs. I do believe, to be really effective in special education, we should get the special education students at a pre-school age.

regularly check classroom procedures. There are numerous ways to do this. The different views and suggestions could be brought up and discussed at a school board meeting. I feel with the mixed views, and have experts come in and suggest, the board could come up with something that could work.

I am standing on a traditionalist platform. The answer would be "back to the basics." Children should be able to read and write. Accelerated programs should be set up for the gifted students.

Answer - Question 2

Answer - Question 1

a. The school desegregation plan will take an immense amount of work on part of all persons involved. The Board of Trustees must give clear policy direction to the superintendent and then be very strong in seeing that it is carried out. The fiscal issues grow-

ing out of desegregation must be carefully handled by the Board so that all dollars spent are done so efficiently. The Board must continually monitor progress and closely monitor court decisions that would lessen the burden on the pupils and costs involved.

b. All classroom teachers, principals and instructional coordinators should make progress reports on academic programs periodically with any recommendations they have. The reports from these people should be relayed to the Board with evaluation from the Superintendent. The Board should review all of the reports, the evaluations and recommendations and direct the Superintendent if any change in emphasis is necessary.

c. We should emphasize a greater sharing between schools of the many creative programs that are going on and being planned within the system. A wider sharing of gifted and talented programs, of pilot programs, and of other innovative programs should be encouraged so that all children can gain from these new experiences and ideas.

Answer - Question 2

 Salaries for all personnel at levels which encourage continued quality work.

- 2. Monies to fully supply each teacher with all materials needed for instruction.
- 3. Monies for maintenance and renovation of schools to maintain present facilities in good repair.
- 4. Monies to provide enrichment and special education programs for students.
- 5. Monies to provide a high level of administrative effectiveness with maximum cost efficiency.

Answer - Question 3

I do not favor another taxing authority for Austin at this time. The desegregation plan will be a hard problem for fiscal policy for the AISD and the taxpayer. The taxpayer should not be subject to any additional burden at this time due to the college.

Answer - Question 4

For several reasons, including the desegregation plan, one of the additional needs for special education appears to be a review of facilities for the special education programs. In order to make the program more cost efficient so that new programs could be available, special education facilities in other areas should be studied and carried out if they can serve the neighborhood and system better and in a more cost efficient way.



The LWV of Austin publishes a Citziens Guide to Austin and Travis County which details governmental structure and services.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Texas has a permanent voter registration system. A voter remains registered as long as the information on his/her certificate is accurate. In November of odd numbered years, a new certificate will be mailed automatically to each registered voter. If you have moved, the new certificate will not be forwarded and your name will be removed from the voter registration rolls. If you do not receive a renewal certificate, you must reregister. There is no fee to register.

WHEN TO REGISTER

Register as soon as possible after moving into the county. There is no residency period. Your registration becomes valid 30 days after your application is received by the Registrar.

Register at least 30 days before an election in order to be eligible to vote in that election. (It is not necessary to register before each election.)

Register not more than 60 days before your eighteenth birthday.

Registration is on a county-wide system. Once you are registered in your county of residence, you are also registered in all other political subdivisions in which you reside.

HOW TO REGISTER

You may register by mail or in person at the office of the County Tax Assessor-Collector (Travis County Court House Annex, 10th and San Antonio, or 6549 Burnet Road, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. - 5 p.m.) or through any authorized Volunteer Deputy Registrar. Do not leave your application with any volunteer unless you get an official receipt.

For information on obtaining a postage-paid, mail-in application, contact the Registrar at 476-7041.

You may register for yourself or an eligible spouse, child, or parent. You must supply complete name, residence address in the county, birth date, and place of birth. Social Security number is requested.

You should receive your registration certificate by mail within 3 or 4 weeks after applying. If you do not receive it, notify the Registrar.

The procedure for changing address, name, or incorrect information is indicated on your registration certificate. The change must be made 30 days before an election in order to vote in a *new* precinct. You may vote in your old precinct for 90 days after moving within the county.

If you move to another county, you must register in that county as a new resident.

LOST CERTIFICATE

A new certificate will be issued only after the voter personally notifies the Registrar in writing (a signature is necessary), or signs an affidavit of loss of certificate at the polling place on election day.

VOTING

You must vote in the precinct of residence as described by the governmental unit calling the election. Your voting precinct number is indicated on your Voter Registration Certificate.

In elections less than county wide, precincts may be combined and polling places changed. Polling places are normally published in local newspapers on election day. You may contact the office of the election authority holding the election (County Clerk, City Clerk, school administration, etc.)

WHO MAY VOTE

To vote in Texas you must be-

- 1. a citizen of the United States,
- eighteen years of age on or before election day,
 registered to vote in your county at least 30 days before an election,
- 4. a resident of the political subdivision (state, county, city, district, precinct, or school district) holding the election for at least 30 days before the election.

ABSENTEE VOTING

Absentee voting is conducted by either personal appearance or by mail. Qualified voters who may vote absentee are:

- Persons 65 years of age or older,
- Persons unable to go to the polls on election day because of illness, physical disability, confinement in jail (except convicted felons), or religious belief,
- 3. Persons who will be absent from the county on election day (must vote absentee in person) and
- Persons who will be absent from the county both on election day and during the entire absentee voting period (ballot must be mailed from outside the county).

 Absente Veting by REBSONAL ARREABANCE will be

Absentee Voting by PERSONAL APPEARANCE will be in the office of the County Clerk (or clerk appointed by the governmental unit calling the election) or at designated substations during business hours between 20 and 4 days preceding the election.

To receive an application for an absentee ballot BY MAIL, write or call the County Clerk (477-6188) at the County Court House (or the clerk appointed by the governmental unit calling the election) between 60 and 5 days before the election. After returning the application, you will receive the ballot which must be marked and returned, postmarked no later than midnight of the day preceding the election.


Special absentee voting procedures are available for voters who become too ill to go to the polls after the close of the normal absentee voting period. Contact the County Clerk for details.





Dear Ethel:

Nancy Bene has asked me to handle your request for a copy of the Project Request for LWV-Austin Voters Guide for the April, 1978, school board election. The reason there is no copy in your files is that no request was submitted. At the time, I was advised by both Diana Tilley and Joann Lovelace that it was not necessary, according to current TEF policy, to submit a request for a Voters Guide project as long as all standards for a Guide were met.

The use of TEF money for that Guide was a last minute decision when expected local direct contributors were unable to provide funds. In addition, our cost for the Guide increased about \$100 over the estimated cost because a member's offer of an in-kind contribution for typesetting did not materialize due to illness. Our Voters Service budget at that point could not have easily covered this extra expense. The point here is that I was consulting with Diana and Joann on how to get access to our TEF money as the Guide was actually being produced.

The Financial Report on the project was submitted on April 25, 1978, and the cost deducted from our account on June 3, 1978, so the assumption was made that there was no problem with the procedure used.

I hope this has clarified the situation for you. I am enclosing a copy of the information which would have been contained on the form had it been submitted. Please let me know if you need further documentation.

Another matter which has been of concern to Nancy and me is the status of local Leagues in claiming sales tax exemptions on projects funded by contributions to our TEF account. My understanding, again from Diana, is that LLs must pay sales tax on our local projects paid for with funds which have been funneled through the TEF to allow a tax break for the contributor. It seems quite unfair that LLs must pay sales tax while LWV-T projects funded through TEF are exempt. Could you please clarify this situation for us.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES IN TEXAS

- Texas has a permanent registration system.
- This means that a voter remains registered as long as the information on his certificate is accurate.
- However, in the fall of odd-numbered years,
 a new certificate will be mailed to every registered voter.
- If the voter has moved, the certificate will not be forwarded. However, if the post office has a forwarding address, an application form will be sent to the voter's new address.
- The voter *MUST* complete and return this form in order to remain eligible to vote.

PLEASE REMEMBER TO FILL THE APPLICATION IN *COMPLETELY* SO THAT THERE WILL BE NO DELAY IN YOUR BECOMING A REGISTERED VOTER. If you need assistance, call the Tax Assessor-Collector's office (476-7041) or the League of Women Voters (478-5523).

You should receive your registration certificate by mail within 3-4 weeks. If you do NOT receive it, notify the Registrar at the Tax Office (478-7041).



The Voters Guide projects approved by the Education Fund Board in September, 1975, remain unchanged in intent and purpose, but there have been some changes in the methods to be used to complete the projects.

SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION: The Austin League originally planned to print and distribute 10,000 Voters Guides for this election. However, the Austin Citizen, a local newspaper, has agreed to publish the Guide in a regular edition. The circulation of the Guide in this manner will enable us to decrease the number the League distributes to 4,000, thus saving money. Guides will be sent to members and contributors and approximately 3,500 will be placed in the public library and its branches. The short time between the filing deadline (March 3) and the election (April 3) allows very little time for publication and distribution of Voter Cuides, and we feel that this plan will enable us to reach the largest number of voters in this short time.

PRIMARY ELECTION: Application for funds made in September was only for a local Voters Guide for the Primary. Since we will also be printing the information provided by the State League on statewide candidates, the Guide may need to be larger than the 8 page tabloid originally planned. We would like to have additional Education Funds available to us to cover the additional cost of a larger Guide if it is necessary. The estimates for both an 8 page and a 12 page tabloid are attached. Lamar Savings Association has agreed to contribute approximately \$500.00 for the publication of the Primary Voters Guide. This gift will be acknowledged in the Guide.

PROJECT: Publication by the Austin League of Women Voters of a Voters Guide for Austin City Council elections to be held on April 5, 1975.

PURPOSE: To inform League members, contributors and the general public of the candidates' positions on specific issues.

NEED: Many voters in the Austin community have come to depend upon the League of Women Voters to provide objective, non-partisan voter information before an election.

DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT:

Development: Questions on some of the basic issues in the election will be carefully formulated by the Voter Service Committee, to be submitted to all of the candidates in the city council election. The local LWV board will evaluate and give final approval for the questions to be submitted.

Information Gathering: The approved questions will be either hand-delivered or delivered by Gertified Mail to each candidate with proper instructions for response in a cover letter. The candidates responses will be compiled unedited by the Voter Gervice Committee.

Publication: Copy for the City Council election will be delivered to the printer by March 12, 1975, so that the Voters Guide will be ready for distribution the weekend of March 21,1975.

Distribution: The City Council Voters Guide will be mailed to each candidate, to each member, to contributors and advertisers. The bulk of the Guides will be distributed through local banks, the Austin Public Library and its branches, businesses, and various community activity centers.

Re: The Austin City, Travis County Survey

The League of Women Voters of Austin is publishing a City-County Survey this year. The purpose of this project is to educate and inform League members and the public about the Austin City and Travis County governments using the National League publications as guidelines.

The Austin League has not done a city or county survey since 1953. It is our hope that once this initial survey is published, the information can be continually up-dated without the necessity of starting from the beginning each time.

The survey will be printed in booklet form ($8\frac{1}{2}$ " x $5\frac{1}{2}$ ") using a "soft" cover and saddleback assembly.

Nancy Bené is acting as Survey Chairman. She plans to have the data collected by December 1, the editing and fact verification done during December and January, the final draft to the printer at least by March 1, 1975.

The estimate received from the printer totals \$1180. (See attached copy of printer's estimate.) We are actively soliciting contributions from the community to cover the printer's costs. The Austin League has budgeted \$500 for the survey and this money would probably be used for mailing and distribution costs or any typing, art work, office supplies, or other miscellaneous costs. The printer assures me that inflation costs or additional printing costs would probably not exceed 10% of the estimated \$1180.

In lieu of the ALWV April 15th request for Ed. Funds, please consider the following as our ammended request:

In the fall of 1974, the LWV of Austin wrote a request for Ed. Funds based on the plan to publish a Voters Guide for the spring 1975 City Council election. Asevents progressed, the city of Austin was surprised with a Special City Council election only one month before the regular City Council election. The Austin League prepared Voters Guide material for both elections. stead of paying a publisher, we had the material for both Guides published in two local newspapers. By taking this approach, we did not alter the substance of the Guide at all, only the method of publishing was changed from our original plan. We then purchased extra tear sheets of the Voters Guide from one of the newspapers, The Austin Citizen for both elections. These tear sheets were mailed to members, contributors and advertizers, and placed in the public library and its branches in Austin. This arrangement represented a considerable savings for the local League and two satisfactory Voters Guides were the result.

I am requesting funds from our Ed. Fund account to cover the expenses resulting from this altered method of publishing the Voters Guide material.
