The last week has been so extremely ^{rainy and} unpleasant and in fact it has been so since our sojourn here that our sight seeing trips and excursions in and about Paris have had to lie dormant and succumb to the elements of the weather - last week has been devoted almost entirely to shopping - dress ordering and not much buying - that is when the weather was any way reasonable - the folks all agreeing with me that it would be much better to have everything ordered and finished - ready to pack one week before leaving - then there is no care, no excitement, no running back and forth trying on dresses, it is done suit, and this is not finished - I don't like this - but I have very little, in fact no trouble,

all my trunks are packed and out of the rooms at least a half hour before our leaving - since having the Courier - I send him ahead with the baggage which he has registered, procured the tickets and is waiting at the Depot - with all our traveling (and I am sure the most difficult part of the trip, through Germany ^{and} to Lucerne was carried through without a courier for French being of little or no use, especially on the Rail Road, as the German was only generally spoken) we have not missed a train, or lost a piece of baggage - of course credit should be given where due I can thank all by their punctuality in making it much easier and more agreeable for me - Paris as a city no doubt is a very grand Magasin well stocked with everything - anything and nothing - but say what they may N.Y. can more than compete
