B. Statement of Problem

The financial burden of today's rampant inflation and exorbitant energy costs places the rural poor, the majority of whom are seasonal farmworkers, in a precarious position. They will survive as they have done since the establishment of this country.

It is the purpose of this proposal to aid this seasonal farmworker and rural poor in his plight against inflation and the high cost of energy.

Unofficial surveys by Defensa Inc. have revealed that 70% of the houses in which seasonal farmworkers live are in need of repairs. Needed repairs range from broken windows to leaking and partially decomposed roofs.

The average annual income of farmworker households in Texas in 1975 was \$3,990. Less than 3% of all Texas farmworkers earn as much as the national average. Fifty one percent of all farmworker families have no other source of support except farm employment.

Given these statistics, it is virtually impossible for seasonal farmworker families to repair their homes to a standard suitable for living. Most times, because of the high cost of living, it is even impossible to replace broken window panes.

The problem of energy conservation is further complicated with the fact that few if any farmworkers are familiar with energy saving tips which are available.

D. Methodology

It is the intent of Defensa Inc. to utilize CETA slots which have been committed by the South Plains Community Action Program upon funding of this project to perform labor needed to accomplish the goals of repairing 15 houses in Muleshoe. Materials will be bought from funds requested in this proposal.

Tenant owners will receive first priority in repairs of houses if they meet low income federal guidelines.

A bi-monthly publication will be developed by Amigo Consultants for distribution in Muleshoe. Two thousand issues will be printed of each of the three editions published in the six month period. The publication will reflect what local citizens are doing to weatherize their homes through the proposed project. It will also contain helpful tips as to how to conserve energy and social service programs available to migrants and seasonal farmworkers.

A slide presentation will be developed to give visual and audio tips as to simple and inexpensive ways to conserve energy.

D-4 Monitoring and Evaluation

An evaluation of the progress and effectiveness of the proposed Program shall be conducted on a quarterly basis by the submission of a report to be completed by the paid staff, the consultant, and the Board of Directors of Defensa. Inc. Said reports will be submitted in writing to NAFO.

C. Goals and Objectives

It is the goal of Defensa Inc. through its proposal of "Weatherization and Energy Conservation Education Program" to alleviate the problems discussed in the previous statement of need and faced on a daily basis by farmworkers.

The program will have the following results:

1. Repair and weatherize ³⁰ ~~15~~ homes using a maximum of ⁸⁰⁰ ~~\$200~~ per house. — Muleshoe 10 - Herford
2. Provide energy conservation ^{seminars} for 50 households on an individual basis in the Muleshoe area through publications, films and slide presentations. 30 - Herford
3. Utilize this pilot project to obtain more monies available from federal or private agencies for more extensive weatherization projects.

C-3 Population to be served

Migrants and seasonal farmworkers who have Muleshoe as a home base and who own or are buying their homes will be eligible for direct weatherization aid, ie. repairs.

Energy conservation education programs will be presented as requested by farmworker groups and interested persons.

C-4 Compatibility with Selection Criteria

It is the opinion of Defensa Inc. that this proposal directly addresses itself to fulfilling the objectives of NAFO in that it both teaches energy conservation to migrants and seasonal farmworkers and it provides a means of conserving energy by weatherization of homes.

We were very happy to receive news that our grant for a Migrant Rest Station in Muleshoe had been approved.

The following points are further explained as you requested.

1) Justification of Consultant.

I, Bidal Aguero, was listed not as director of the project but as contact person since the proposal was written by my company Amigo Consultants under the direction of the Board of Directors of DEFENSA Inc. The responsibilities of Amigo Consultants shall be as follows:

a. Fiscal management. DEFENSA Inc. is a farmworker organization and as such has very few persons who can adequately organized reports both financial and logistical. The board is composed totally of farmworkers and staff is used to acquire actual necessities of migrants and seasonal farmworkers.

b. Resource development. Proposal writing to further expand the migrant center shall be a major responsibility of Amigo Consultants.

c. Budget supervision. Amigo consultants will be charge with the responsibility of advising DEFENSA as to how monies allocated can be spent within guidelines.

d. Evaluation. Amigo consultants will be responsible for writing and sending full evaluations of the project to grantor. and also to schedule regular evaluations as scheduled in proposal.

2) A full time staff person has been approved by a local farmworker manpower agency to mann the center at all times. This person will also be charged with instruction of migrants on troubleshooting techniques. Necessary materials for instruction will be purchased. This person will also conduct two, one hour classes per week to seasonal farmworkers on basic mechanics.

3) Enclosed is a letter to Jorge C. Corralejo requesting NAFO energy specialist as soon as possible to set up data collection system for the project.

SUPPLEMENT TO REVISED INSTRUCTIONS FOR R&D PROJECTS (November 21, 1978)

EFFECTIVE DATE: January 22, 1979

APPLICABILITY: All grantees funded under NAFO R&D monies

I. PROJECT PERIODS AND DEADLINES

If a project does not go into operation within a reasonable time of its funding date, NAFO has been advised by Community Services Administration that the grantee does not have the capability to carry out the project. In such a case, NAFO will recover the grant funds from the grantee on thirty days notice.

II. REPORTING PROCEDURES

1. In accordance with CSA Instruction 6710-1, if any question arises as to the expenditure of NAFO R&D funds, CSA/NAFO may inspect and/or audit any corporate records or accounts which are relevant to the resolution of such question.
2. In accordance with OMB Circular A-110 and PMC 74-7, CSA/NAFO reserves the right to require additional documentation in the areas of planning, work progress, or budget if the grantee's management, performance, or finances are not in order.
3. Under the direction of the National R&D Project Coordinator, NAFO's area energy specialists have authority to monitor the project activities of all R&D grantees.

Energy specialists have the specific authority to request documentation in planning, work program, and budget, and to identify changes in work programs which require NAFO's prior approval.

III. AMENDMENT OF PROGRAMS

NAFO's area energy specialists will have the authority to recommend additional project activities in cases where such activities would support R&D functions and/or fulfill any special conditions formally stipulated by NAFO.

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Budget Justification

Travel \$465

Because of a larger project than anticipated it has become necessary to make additional trips to acquire supplies for the greenhouses and to talk to advisors at Texas Tech University. It is also the desire of Chicanos Unidos Campesinos to travel to other projects to observe them in order to improve our project.

Space Cost & Rental

Utilities \$600

Telephone \$300

The 25 X 48 foot greenhouse which was built through the R&D grant has obligated our organization to provide heat and power for the greenhouse. It is anticipated that current utility bills will increase by approximately \$50 per month.

Communication with Texas Tech University and other advisors in Lubbock and surrounding areas has increased in order to improve the project. An estimated \$25 per month is needed in order to cover long distance phone calls.

Consumables & Supplies: \$1,000

Although Chicanos Unidos Campesinos has acquired technical assistance from Texas Tech University and have reached agreement with them to buy plants, roots, and seeds through them in order to get them at a reduced price, costs for buying such items are expected to reach \$1000. This will allow for two growing seasons within the greenhouse.

Equipment: \$600

Because of hail storms which sometimes produce hailstones that measure up to 4 inches in diameter, it has become evident that 4 tarps costing \$100 each are needed in order to protect the greenhouse.

An additional \$200 is necessary to buy tables and irrigation equipment to furnish the greenhouse.

Other Costs.

In order to avoid delays it is necessary to allocate at least \$1,000 for miscellaneous costs incurred by the project.

B. Statement of Problem

The high cost of energy which has soared to unbelievable levels in the past few years has severely effected the lives of the migrant and seasonal farmworker. These persons have led a life of travelling from city to city and state to state. Many have witnessed the raise in gass prices go from 25 cents per gallon to 65 and 75 cents per gallon in a very short time span.

The majority of these migrants and seasonal farmworkers have older cars and trucks which use excessive gas because of lack of money to maintain upkeep.

Lack of proper upkeep of an automobile very often leads to other major problems. These problmes and calamities on the road cause a domino effect of problems to families.

For the most part automobile trouble seems to be the most recurring problem. If a migrant family's automobile breaks down on the road, even though the cost for repairs might be minor and possibily the repairs could be done by themselves, the migrant usually does not come prepared and quiped with the tools to do the work. They are then forced to look for a mechanic who will do the work for them at a very expensive rate.

The majority of migrant families after having worked for two or three months manage to save approximately from one to three hundred dollars to return to their homes, many of these migrant families returning from labor camps in the north often encounter various calamities which many times impede their safe and swift return home. Because of the lack of resources which

might be used to help an abandoned migrant family on its way back to their home base, many unfortunate Farmworkers are forced to spend their hard earned money which they have saved to migrate home. Having no recourse they find themselves penniless and are forced to find employment in the locality in which they are stranded for whatever wages they can find. They do this solely for the purpose of gathering enough funds to be able to return to their homes. As a result of these delays in returning home quickly those members of the family who are still in school often times lose three to six weeks of their studies.

C. Goals and Objectives

It is the goal of Defensa Inc. to continue a project which has been funded for the past twelve months by the Mexican American Program Committee of the Palo Duro Union Presbytery and the Self Development of People Fund.

Specifically in the area of services available to transient migrants which are at the present time non-existent, Defensa Inc. wishes to continue an established Migrant Rest Station for farmworkers migrating through the Muleshoe area to different parts of the country.

The project shall work toward providing short term crisis intervention caused by lack of energy (gas) and will also provide long term better utilization of energy by providing free tune-ups for qualified individuals.

In addition the project will provide the following services:

1. Offer overnight accommodations and facilities such as rest-rooms, showers, cooking and eating areas, and sleeping areas.
2. Provide mechanical assistance in the form of tools, equip-

ment, and experienced mechanics for migrants which may encounter automobile difficulties while on the migrant route.

3. Provide a minimum of 200 tun-ups within one year for migrant and seasonal farmworkers passing through the area.
4. Establish an information resource center about work and crop conditons, housing conditions, and wage levels which might help the migrant in securing the best working conditions possible in different parts of the country. This center will also provide printed material concerning energy conservation.
5. Help to establish in the State of Texas services and assistance to migrating farmworkers in need of help such programs as are presently available in Indiana, Ohio, and Michigan.
6. Study and document the number of transient migrants traveling through the Muleshoe area at any given time.

C-3 Participants

Muleshoe Texas has long been a center of activity for the migrant farmworker. The number of migrant farmowrkers in our area according to the Texas Department of Health, Good Neighbor Commission, the Governor's Office of Migrant Affairs and the South Plains Planning Region can be determined only on approximative figures. Based on this information, the following number of migrants will potentially be served by Defensa, Inc.

F. Budget Support Information

1. Personnel - Wages and Salaries

Present staff is presently provided by CETA. Ten hours per day of one staff member will be devoted to the Migrant Rest Station.

2. Fringe Benefits are paid by CETA contractor.

3. A flat fee will be paid to Amigo Consultants for services rendered such as fiscal management, budget supervision, on-going evaluation and resource development. \$500 will be paid for a total of six months.

4. Local travel will be paid to reach stranded motorist at a rate of 17¢ per mile.

Out-of-town travel will be paid to travel to buy supplies, auto parts, etc. for center.

5. Rental of center is \$100 per month

6. 100 Tune-Up kits at \$15.00 each average \$1500.00

Gas and emergency food \$1000

7. Printing and Reproduction, 10,000 brochures in spanish and english will be produced to promote energy conservation.

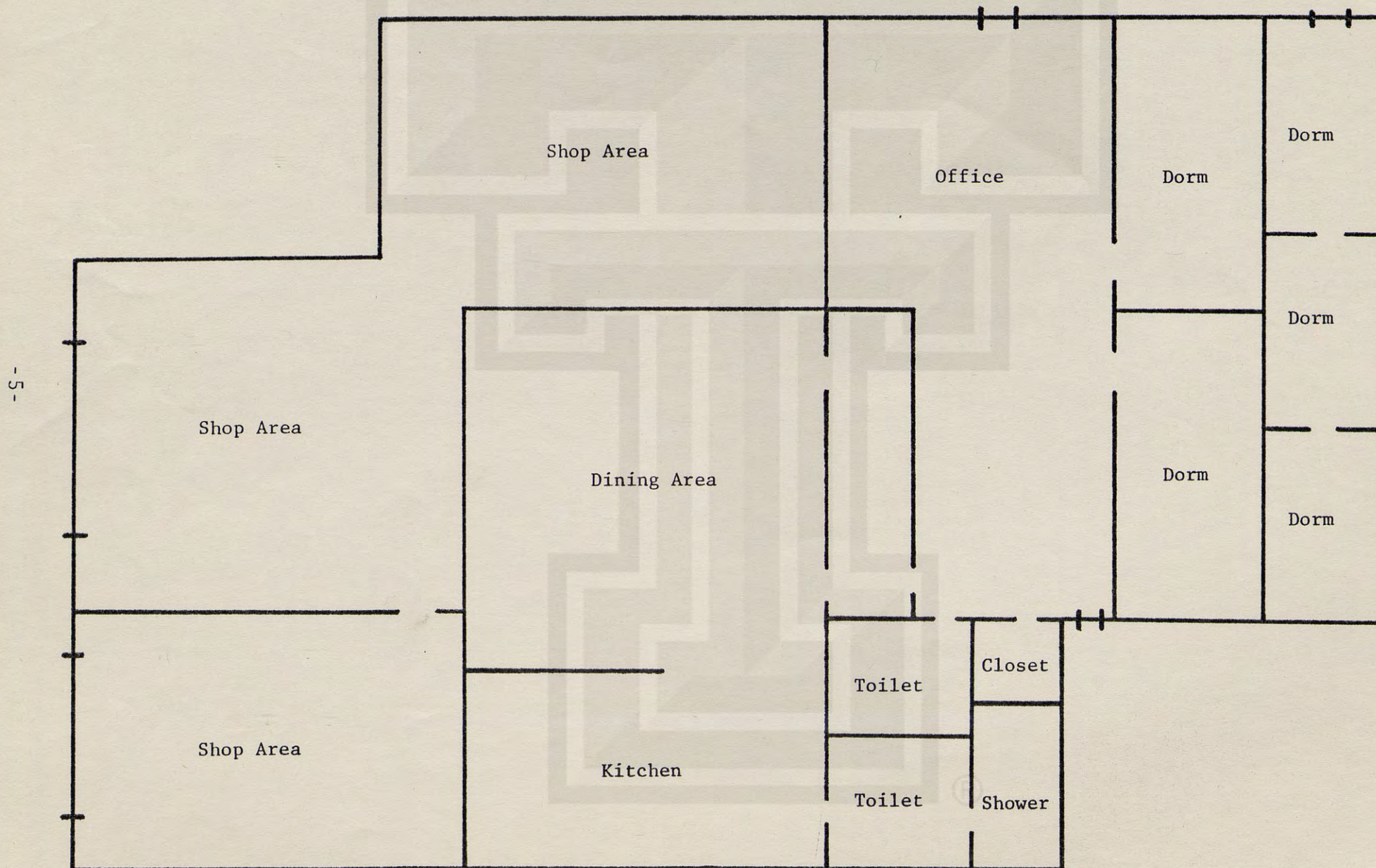
