It lives in the woods, and burrows in the ground.
Its skin is a beautiful fur.

## The SOUSLIK, or CASAN MARMOT+.

IN Cafan, and the provinces watered by the Volga, as far as Austria, there is a small animal

In figure and shortness of tail, it has a great resemblance to the thort-tailed field moufe. But it is diffinguished from the moufe or rat kind by its fur, which is every where interspersed with small spots of a bright and fhining white. These spots exceed not a line in diameter, and are placed at the diftance of two or three lines from each other. They are more conspicuous, and better defined upon the loins than on the shoulders and head. Mr. Pennant, a well known and very able naturalift, favoured me with one of these sousliks, which had been transmitted to him from Austria, as an animal unknown to the naturalifts. I recognifed it to be the fame animal with that of which I had a fkin in my possession, and of which M. Sanchez # fent me the following notice: 'Great numbers of the rats called foulliks f are taken in the barks loaded with falt in the ' river Kama, which defcend from Solikamski, where there are falt-pits, and fall into the Wolga, above the town of Cafan, at the con-
