#### The Most Desirable and the Shortest STANDARD GAUGE Route to Mexico is via New Orleans, Houston, San Antonio, and The Eagle Pass Route.

For the convenience of Tourists unfamiliar with the routes of travel the following information is furnished, although changes may occur at any time, and the latest time-tables should always be examined.

#### ROUTES AND TIME CONNECTIONS.

#### BAGGAGE REGULATIONS.

One hundred and fifty pounds of baggage will be cheeked free on each whole through ticket issued from or to points in the United States, and seventy-free bounds on the half through ticket. On first-class local tickets between points in Mexico, the half of the first of the carried free for each between points in Mexico, the half of the first of the carried free for each passenger. Baggage destined to Mexico via the continuous must be checked to Diaz, Mexico, ONLY, and not beyond that point. But of the coming into the United States from Mexico must be checked to Eagle Fass, Texas, and no FURTHER. Passengers from Mexico for the United States will re-check baggage at Eagle Pass, Texas, and passengers from the United States for Mexico will re-check at Diaz.

#### INFORMATION.

On through tickets, children under five years of age will be carried free of charge; from five to twelve years of age, inclusive, at half rates; and over twelve years, at full rates.

On local tickets, children under five years of age are taken free; from five to ten years, at half fare. Children over ten years of

from five to ten years, at half fare. Children over ten years of age will pay full rates. Only passengers holding first-class tickets have the right to travel in Pullman cars.

The mexican customs officials inspect baggage of passengers to Mexico at Diaz and United States customs officers inspect baggage of travelers from Mexico at Eagle Pass.

These inspections are quickly and courteously made, and passengers should have their keys ready to open their baggage when requested by the customs officers. Dutiable articles included in baggage should be duly declared as such upon a blank furnished by the officers of the custom-house.

Stop-over privileges are allowed on first-class round trip tickets to or from all points in the United States, with the exception of tickets to or from points on M. & M. G. R. R. Mex. Nat. R. R. and points on M. I. R.R. north of and including Monterey.

Mexican money necessary to cover traveling expenses may be obtained at any of the banks at New Orleans or San Antonio. Exchange can also be made in the City of Mexico and with the Station Agents and Banks at Eagle Pass and Diaz.

# MEXICAN INTERNATIONAL

This "Gate City" of the Mexican International Route appears des-DIAZ. This "Gate City" of the mealest inco. The climate has proved to be exceedingly healthful, and the site is favorable for a large town. Pure and excellent water is at hand, and the surrounding country possesses great agricultural resources.

SABINAS, situated on the river of that name is the principal station of the bituminous coal region which extends over an area of forty by sixty miles, in and adjacent to the Sabinas Valley. From near Sabinas a branch road has been constructed as far as San Felipe and Hondo, and will be extended to Lampazos, connecting there with the Mexican National R.R. The coal from this region is daily finding new markets and bids fair to soon meet the demands of the entire consumption of Mexico. More than 1,000,000 tons have been already mined, and there are now five mines in operation. Large iron works could be advantageously established at Sabinas, as an inexhaustible supply of iron exists in the magnetic iron ore deposits, found near the line of the International road, between Monclova and Castafio.

formerly the capital of Coahuila and Texas when they MONCLOVA, formed one State, is an attractive city of about 15,000 inhabitants. It is the center of a paying and extensive mining region. A line is under construction from this point to the rich mining region of the Sierra Mojada, 159 miles distant. This branch will pass through Cuatro Cienegas, forty-seven miles from Monclova, which is the center of a section splendidly adapted to the purpose of colonization; land rich and cheap, water plentiful and climate unsurpassed. It is perhaps the best wheat region in Mexico, and there being only a few wheat producing districts in the republic, no industry guarantees a quicker, surer, and more profitable return for the amount invested. Grapes of many varieties and of the best quality are raised in great abundance with very little labor. Several colonization companies have this section in view, and it is only a question of time when it will become one of the most popular and desirable in the republic.

MONTEREY, the capital of the State of Nuevo Leon, has a population of about 57,000. Being so close to the border, it has become Americanized to a great extent, and in the past few years has developed into quite a commercial center. It has many flourishing enterprises, prominent among them being large smelters, a wire and nail factory, furniture factory and brewery. The foundation of the city, however, dates from 1596, so there is still much of the ancient about Monterey to interest the tourist.

Connected with Montercy by the Mexican International Railroad as well by street car lines, are the famous Topo Chico Hot Springs, about three lies distant, which are visited annually by hundreds of pleasure and health

seekers.

Monterey is the junction point of the Mexican International Railroad,
Mexican National, Monterey & Mexican Gulf, and Monterey & Mineral Belt

HORNOS. From this point a branch line extends to San Pedro, 14 miles district, famous for its large production of cotton. The plant produces from five to ten years without renewal. Many thousand bales are annually shipped from this point. From the Tishualilo Ranch alone 5,000 bales were shipped in 1886. The famous Viesca sait mines which are well night inexhaustible, and which supply sait all over the republic, are only a few miles south of Hornos.

TORREON is the junction of the Mexican International and Mexican Central Railways. This point has experienced a phenomenal commercial growth in the last few years.

Leaving Torreon, the line enters the San Carlos valley, noted for its richness and beauty. Passing through the valley, the great "Divide" at Huarachie, and wonderful horse-shoe curve are reached. Here also is the great natural bridge over which the train rides safely.

PEDRICENA. From this point a branch extends to Velardeña, six miles distant, where may be seen the extensive smelting plant of the Velardeña Mining Co. which exports annually a large tonnage of ores of various classes and bullion.

DURANGO the present western terminus of the Mexican International R.R. is at the city of Durango, the capital of the State of the same name. It is a city of \$8,00 inhabitants, and is stuated at the base of the Siorna Madre mountains \$997 feet above the sea. The famous Iron Mountain, composed entirely of iron ore of great purity, overshadows the city, while the Sierras which surround it on every side, are rich in gold and silver ores, as the many mines in successful operation in the vicinity bear testimony.

Besides its mineral wealth the State of Durango contains much land that is devoted to agriculture and grazing; there is also an abundance of timber. The products of the soil are, cotton from the lowlands in the eastern portion of the State; own and other cereals from the upland plains towards the mountains; and coffee and tropical fruits from the fertile valleys to the south.

The delightful climate, the dry air and the altitude make the city of Durango a Mecca to which many with pulmonary complaints are attracted.

There is a mail route from Durango to Mazzalan on the Pacific Ocean. The ordinary schedule is four days between these points.

GRADE. The maximum grade on the Mexican International Railroad from Diaz to Durango dees not at any place exceed one per cent. of 52 feet per mile.
