

LUBBOCK -- World-renowned toxicologist Perry J. Gehring will present a free lecture on the topic "Pesticide Research and Development" at 2 p.m. Monday (Jan. 12) in the Biology Lecture Hall 101 on the Texas Tech University campus. The event is open to the public and anyone interested in the topic is invited to attend.

Gehring, vice president for research and development for DowElanco, is recognized for his research in the area of toxicity of chemical substances and risk assessment. He joined Dow in September 1965. While at Dow, he was named in 1970 as the assistant director of the Toxicology Research Laboratory. He became director of the laboratory in 1973. Gehring later was named director of Health and Environmental Sciences, U.S.A. in 1978. In 1981, Gehring became vice president of Global Agricultural Products Research and Development at the Dow Chemical Company prior to moving into his current post in 1989. Gehring also serves as an adjunct professor at Michigan State University.

Gehring received his bachelor s and doctoral degrees in veterinary medicine in 1960 from the University of Minnesota. He performed graduate work at Iowa State University and Baylor University in 1960 and 1961 before returning to the University of Minnesota where he received a doctorate of philosophy in pharmacology in 1965.

Dow AgroSciences, formed in 1989, is one of the largest research-based agricultural companies in North America where researchers focus on weed management, insect management products, plant disease management products and biotechnology.

The lecture is sponsored by Texas Tech's Institute of Environmental and Human Health whose focus is to provide multidisciplinary graduate and undergraduate education in environmental science, toxicology and environmental health.

MIDLAND -- Texas Tech officials announced on Friday the creation of a new endowed chair to benefit rural health during a news conference on the Midland College campus in the Scharbauer Student Center.

The chair has been established by Permian Basin businesswoman and philanthropist Marie Hall, and it is named the Marie Hall Chair of Rural Health.

Texas Tech Chancellor John T. Montford thanked Miss Hall for her contribution. "It is fitting that someone with such a commitment to the Permian Basin and rural health would take this great step forward," Montford said. "Marie saw a need for this chair to promote rural health, and her vision will benefit this region for years to come."

Leo Vela, M.D., M.P.H., medical director of the Center for Telemedicine and Telehealth at TTUHSC, was announced as the chair holder during the news conference. In this post, Vela's responsibilities will include finding new ways to deliver quality health care education and service to rural areas by building interdisciplinary networks across West Texas' medical, nursing, pharmacy and allied health professions.

"This is a great opportunity for us to use Texas Tech's expertise in rural health care to benefit this region," Vela said.

Miss Hall said, "Of major concern to rural Texans is receiving and providing quality health care. It is vital to human survival, and it is essential to the well-being of the region.

"The spirit of the chair is to foster a passionate quest for innovation and excellence in health care. This chair will advance preventive medicine through the study of health problems associated with rural life, and it will improve the responsiveness and broaden the scope of rural health service through the development of the team approach."

Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center President David R. Smith, M.D., said the chair will establish a new network of health care services. "This endowed chair places us in a position of national prominence in rural health. With this commitment, we can extend our innovative resources, such as telemedicine, across traditional boundaries to form a new network using interdisciplinary resources."

Zumwalt To Receive Nation's Highest Civilian Award

LUBBOCK -- Distinguished Naval veteran Elmo Russell "Bud" Zumwalt, Jr., will be among the 15 civilians to receive the Presidential Medal of Freedom during a special ceremony Thursday (Jan. 15) at the White House in Washington, D.C. The award symbolizes the nation's highest civilian honor.

Zumwalt served as Commander of the United States Naval Forces in Vietnam and later as Chief of Naval Operations. He has served as chairman of Texas Tech University's Vietnam Center's National Advisory Council since 1989. Presently, Zumwalt devotes his time to obtaining compensation for veterans whose health problems can be linked to their military service in Vietnam.

LUBBOCK -- Texas Tech Chancellor John T. Montford will accept a million dollar donation from Jack Hamilton of Houston at a press briefing at 4 p.m., Wednesday (Jan. 21) in the Board of Regents Room, second floor, east wing of the Administration Building.

The gift will fund \$500,000 in undergraduate scholarships in the College of Business Administration. Additionally, \$500,000 of the gift will be used to create an endowed professorship in the College of Business Administration in honor of former professor George Berry. Dean Roy Howell will make comments following the presentation.

Hamilton is president of Davis Hamilton Jackson & Associates, an investment advisory service located in Houston. He received his bachelor's degree in finance in 1968 from Texas Tech. Hamilton and his wife Connie are members of the Chancellor's Council and long-time supporters of the university.

Berry served as professor of finance from 1960 to 1969 in the College of Business Administration where he taught senior and graduate level courses in the areas of investments, real estate and business finance. He left academia to pursue a career as an economic consultant. He currently is Chief Executive Officer of George William Berry, Ph.D., in Austin. Berry is recognized for his ability to prepare students for the business world through a real-experiences approach to teaching.

Berry received a bachelor's degree in 1956, a master's degree in 1957 and a doctorate in 1961, all in business, from the University of Texas at Austin.

The Hamilton gift will count toward the \$300 million goal Texas Tech has set to raise in private donations as part of The Horizon Campaign.

The Horizon Campaign officially will be launched on Feb. 6, as Texas Tech celebrates its 75th Anniversary with a gala musical presentation in the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium.

LUBBOCK -- Texas Tech University will gaze at its horizons past and future as it celebrates its 75th anniversary at 8 p.m. Feb. 6 in the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium.

The gala musical performance, "Celebrate," will feature Texas Tech students, faculty and alumni who now are stars of opera and theater around the world. The gala is open to the general public, donors, friends and supporters of Texas Tech.

In his 25 years at Texas Tech, Gillas has directed 77 productions of 59 opera, operetta and musical comedies.

Performers in the production include Mary Jane Johnson, David Gashen, Ann Sanders, Kelly McClendon, Jana Campbell and Donnie Allison. Johnson, who performs with opera companies around the world, is a protégé of Luciano Pavarotti and won an Emmy Award in 1982 for her performance in "LaBoheme" on PBS. 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#### Texas Tech's 75th Gala Wins National Acclaim

The 3,000 members of the audience who witnessed Texas Tech's 75<sup>th</sup>

Anniversary Gala and kickoff of The Horizon Campaign in Lubbock's Municipal

Auditorium on February 6 were unified by their standing ovation that the performance was truly outstanding. The reception at the Museum of Texas Tech University before the gala and the festive post-gala reception in a 1,000 square foot tent (?) outside the auditorium brought unanimous acclaim from the evening's celebrants.

But the Lubbock guests were not the only ones who recognized that the 75<sup>th</sup>

Anniversary Celebration was a night to remember in the history of Texas Tech.

The Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE), an international organization dedicated to the promotion of higher education initiatives, honored Texas Tech with their 1998 Silver Medal Award for activities surrounding the gala and The Horizon Campaign kickoff.

The organization bestowed the silver medal on Texas Tech for its planning and organization of the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Gala and Campaign Kickoff. The silver medal was presented to Texas Tech at the organization's annual meeting, held on July 12-15 in Chicago. Texas Tech was selected to win the award for special celebrations from among 300(?) universities that submitted entries in the competition.

"The Texas Tech talent that came together to produce our 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Gala was overwhelming," said Chancellor John T. Montford. "We are very pleased that CASE, the premier international organization in support of higher education initiatives, realized the merit of our endeavor."

"We are also pleased to be the only Texas university recognized by CASE for special events planning in their 1998 competition," Montford also said.

The award is the sixth won by Texas Tech in the annual competition. In 1989, the university received a Gold Medal for improvement in its Public Relations programs. In 1991, the university received a silver medal for its community relations program. In 1992, Tech photographer Artie D. Limmer was named International Photographer of the Year by CASE, and in 1993 the university and health sciences center received a gold medal for their programs in support of animal-based research in biomedical sciences. In 1995, Texas Tech was honored for fund raising program excellence by the 3,500 member organization.

"Each time Texas Tech has been selected by the CASE Annual Awards program, we have received positive media attention and recognition from other institutions of higher education. We are justifiably proud that our 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Gala and Horizon Campaign Kickoff join our award-winning tradition at Texas Tech," Montford said

LUBBOCK -- Texas Tech Chancellor John T. Montford will accept another anonymous one million-dollar donation at a press briefing scheduled for 1 p.m., Tuesday (Jan. 27) in the Board of Regents Room, second floor, east wing of the Administration Building. A West Texas family gave this New Year's gift to the university.

The one million dollar gift, plus an additional commitment of \$250,000 approved as a donation by the Chancellor's Council, will serve as a \$1.25 million challenge grant to increase Honors Program scholarships.

This challenge, when successfully met, will create an additional endowment of \$2.5 million for 100 new Honors Scholarships. Associate Vice President and Honors Program Director Gary Bell will make comments following the presentation.

The Chancellor's Council, formally known as the President's Council, was organized in 1966 to provide leadership support for the advancement of Texas Tech. Members of the Chancellor's Council provide financial support to a wide-range of university programs, including scholarships, faculty awards and student recruitment.

Kendall, director of The Institute of Environmental and Human Health at Texas Tech University, has been selected to chair a United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Science Advisory Panel Subcommittee Review on genetically enhanced plant pesticide resistance management in agriculture, particularly in cotton, corn and potato crops.

Kendall, a member of the EPA panel, will chair the meeting which is scheduled for Monday and Tuesday (Feb. 9-10) in Washington, D.C.

Attendees for this meeting will include a variety of stakeholders including government representatives as well as representatives from environmental organizations throughout the nation. The results from this meeting will provide input to the EPA in their regulation of gene technology and its wider application in agricultural and pest management, Kendall said.

Academic scientists from across the country will compose the panel commissioned through the Office of Pesticide Programs at the EPA. Randy Allen, professor of biological sciences at Texas Tech, also will serve on the panel. He is an expert in plant biotechnology.

According to Kendall, breeding plants to produce toxins themselves as they grow would ward off pests and eliminates the need to use commercial available pesticides. Although this technology is applied in a larger scale in agriculture, particularly in cotton and other crops, resistance may build up in important pest species and measures to protect against the resistance are being studied.

Anderson received his bachelor's degree in park administration from Texas Tech in 1973 and a master's of landscape architecture degree from the University of Illinois in 1975. He began his career working three years as an environmental planner with the U.S. Army Construction Engineering Research Lab in Illinois before moving to Austin in 1978 to work for the General Land Office. For the past 14 years, he has completed more than 300 projects in four states and has been featured in more than 30 publications.

Before Ator completed his bachelor's degree in agronomy-crop science in 1969, he served in the Marine Corps during the Korean conflict. After graduation, he joined the Texas Department of Agriculture as an agronomist where he would later serve as district supervisor in Central Texas. LUBBOCK — Two-time Pulitzer Prize winner and Harvard University Professor E.O. Wilson will speak at Texas Tech University on April 1 at 3:30 p.m. in the Allen Theatre. Wilson is a conservationist and an advocate of the study of ecology within universities. His presentation will be on "The Diversity of Life" which will focus on conservation of the Earth's biodiversity.

The presentation is free and open to the public.

Wilson is considered to rank among the 100 top scientists of all time and among the 25 most influential people in the United States, according to *Time Magazine*. He has received most major awards given to international scientists including, The National Medal of Science, International Prize for Biology (Japan), American Association for Advancement of Science Award for Public Understanding of Science and Technology, Crafford Prize from the Swedish Academy of Sciences, and the Gold Medal from the World Wildlife Fund for Nature. He has written numerous books and has received two Pulitzer Prizes for his books "The Ants" and "On Human Nature." The publication, "Teaming Up Across Texas, The Resource Book," offers more than 70 examples of partnerships among universities, public schools, local communities and the business sector throughout Texas.

The following Texas Tech programs are highlighted in the publication:

- The Dean's Future Scholars Program -- a cooperative program to recruit minority students as future teachers. The program works with sixth graders from 21 elementary schools and students from 14 junior high schools and 11 high schools. Students attend all-day conferences at Texas Tech. The goals of the program include increasing the numbers of minority students who choose to become teachers and to create more student exposure to university personnel.
- The Texas Tech-Howard Hughes Medical Institute Biotech Traveling Electrophoresis Project -- a 10-day summer workshop program in which area science teachers are trained in modern DNA technology. When the teachers return to the classroom, they borrow a self-contained laboratory kit that allows students hands-on experience in DNA testing. Currently, more than 3,000 students, 40 teachers and eight trainers support the project.
- The Texas Tech Medical School is a partner in the Kellogg Community Partnership Institute for Border Community Health Education at the University of Texas El Paso. This is a community focused, multidisciplinary health care program for those living in the poverty stricken Texas-Mexico border area.

The book offers numerous examples of how Texas schools, colleges and universities are building partnerships to maximize their resources, opportunities and progress in various areas. Nine chapters present a variety of programs that involve more than 100 college and university campuses and more than twice as many public schools.

According to Texas Education Commissioner Mike Moses, "Teaming up Across Texas" provides outstanding examples of existing school-university partnerships and serves as an excellent foundation for expanding quality programs.

One hundred thirteen (113) medical students at Texas Tech campuses in Lubbock, El Paso and Amarillo were officially matched today with medical facilities nationally where they will begin postgraduate training after graduation. Of 113 total graduates, eight graduates matched earlier through military programs or sub-specialty matches, and three graduates deferred residency training.

More than half (71) of Texas Tech's medical class of 1998 will begin their residencies in Texas. The remainder will fan out across the country to begin residencies throughout the United States from California to Connecticut.

Twenty-one percent (24) of 1998 Texas Tech medical graduates will serve their medical residencies at Texas Tech campuses in Amarillo, El Paso, Lubbock and Odessa. Studies show that most residents go into practice within a 100-mile radius of where they serve their residencies. Texas Tech's residency program is helping ensure West Texas a steady supply of physicians for the future.

Fifty-six percent (64) of the graduating seniors have chosen primary car fields (Family Medicine-28, Internal Medicine-16, Obstetrics/Gynecology-10, and Pediatrics-10).

The length of a residency will vary depending upon the specialty, but usually will run from three to five years. Sub-specialty residencies may be longer.

Match Day is the culmination of an eight-month process that matches student preferences with those of residency programs in the Unites States and Canada. The National Resident Matching Program coordinates the process and releases match results simultaneously at all the nation's medical schools. Approximately 14,000 fourth-year medical students throughout the U.S. and Canada receive word today of their residency assignments.

Graduating Texas Tech medical students will serve residencies in a variety of prestigious medical institutions nationwide, including Baylor College of Medicine, Stanford, Michigan State University, Bowman-Gray and Texas A&M-Scott and White Hospital.

Texas Tech To Study Athletics Program

LUBBOCK, TEXAS -- President Donald R. Haragan announced today that Texas Tech will begin a year-long, campus-wide effort to study its athletics program as part of the NCAA Division I athletics certification program. The self-study, which will lead to NCAA certification, is not related to the recent NCAA investigation at Texas Tech. Specific areas the study will cover are academic and financial integrity, rules compliance, and commitment to equity.

Academic accreditation is common in colleges and universities. This program is the first to focus solely on certification of athletics programs. Following a pilot project, the NCAA Division I membership adopted the program and its standards at the 1993 annual convention. Texas Tech was one of five schools nationally to participate in the pilot program in 1991.

The certification program's purpose is to ensure integrity in the institution's athletics operations. It will open up athletics to the rest of the university/college community and to the public. Institutions will benefit by increasing awareness and knowledge of the athletics program campus-wide, confirming its strengths and developing plans to improve in areas of concern.

The committee responsible for the study will include Haragan, Robert H. Ewalt, Vice President for Student Affairs and chair of the steering committee, various members of the university faculty and staff, as well as athletics department personnel. David Brunk of the NCAA compliance services staff recently traveled to Lubbock for a one-day orientation visit to meet with the committee and its subcommittees early in the process.

Within each area to be studied by the committee, the program has set standards, called operating principles, which were adopted by the NCAA to place a "measuring stick" upon which all Division I members will be evaluated. The university also will examine how activities of the athletics program relate to the mission and purpose of the institution.

Once Texas Tech has concluded its own study, an external team of reviewers will conduct a three-to-four-day evaluation visit on campus in June, 1999. Those reviewers will be peers from other colleges, conference offices and universities. That team will report to the NCAA Committee on Athletics Certification, another independent group. The committee will then determine the university certification status and announce the decision publicly.

During the course of the self-study, several hearings will allow for campus wide, and community wide input into the evaluation.

LUBBOCK -- The Pentagon recently announced that Magne Kristiansen, a Texas Tech University Thornton and Horn Professor in electrical engineering, was selected to receive one of 16 Multidisciplinary University Research Initiatives (MURI) awards for compact power sources.

Texas Tech's partner in this research project is the University of Missouri at Rolla. Consultants on the project come from Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, The University of Texas at El Paso, Texas A&M University and Loughborough University in England.

The five-year, \$5 million research grant will fund Kristiansen's continuing work into pulsed power research, a field in which Texas Tech is the leading university worldwide. Investigators from England, Germany, Russia and Japan will work on the project at Texas Tech laboratories. Other Texas Tech investigators include professors Lynn Hatfield, Jahan Rasty, James Dickens, Andreas Neuber, Michael Giesselmann, Hermann Krompholz and Edgar O'Hair.

The award is the second of its kind for Kristiansen. He also is the principal investigator on another five-year, \$5 million MURI project on high power microwave sources. Subcontractors on this project, which is near the end of its third year, are the University of Michigan and the University of New Mexico. According to Pentagon sources, it is unusual for any research group to have two of these prestigious programs.

Pulsed power is the science and technology of storing energy (usually electric) slowly and then releasing it quickly at a much higher power level. This is analogues to charging a battery slowly and then using its charge quickly when starting a car, except that the time scales are much more extreme. The energy release times in some of Texas Tech's experiments are shorter than one-thousandth of one-millionth of a second.

The latest MURI project involves converting the energy from explosives into short electric pulses to drive high power microwave generators, for example. The actual explosives tests will be performed at the University of Missouri.

The generation of short, high power electric pulses has applications to both civilian (i.e. atmospheric clean up) and military groups (electronic warfare).

The Pulsed Power Laboratory at Texas Tech was started in 1972 and has received more than \$40 million in federal research support. A new laboratory addition is being built with federal and state of Texas funds and is scheduled for completion this fall.
