#### **Dormitories**

The cost of regular room and board in the college dormitories—based on two per room—will be \$97.50 per term of six weeks, payable in advance. Corner rooms will be \$99.75 per six weeks. There are a few single rooms with bath which may be had at a cost, including board, of \$108.75 for six weeks. Room and meals in the dormitories will be available for married couples without children.

Dormitory Reservations. Applications for dormitory reservations will be made to the Office of Dormitory Reservations. A check for \$10 should accompany the request. This will be held as a dormitory

property deposit.

Should a student find it impossible to enroll in the college, he may apply for a refund of his reservation fee not later than May 15 for the first summer session and June 30 for the second term. If a student moves from the dormitory during the term, the deposit will not be refunded.

Occupants of the dormitories are expected to furnish pillows, towels,

bed linens, blankets, spreads, and other personal articles needed.

For information on off-campus living accommodations, inquiries should be directed to the Office of the Dean of Student Life, where arrangements for non-dormitory housing will be considered.

# Department Of Architecture And Allied Arts Art Workshop

The Department of Architecture and Allied Arts has scheduled an Art Workshop for both sessions of the 1953 Summer School. In this course (Allied Arts 341) you may paint with water colors or oils, draw with charcoal, pen, or pencil both of indoor and outdoor subjects or you may make block prints either on linoleum or on wood, during the first term. All of these activities will be under the leadership of Robert Ivan Lockard and Roderick Parkinson.

During the second term you may add pottery making and ceramics to the above art activities. The work will be under the leadership of Professor F. A. Kleinschmidt and Richard Tracy. Have fun this summer in drawing, painting or making pottery—things which perhaps you have always wanted to do. Enroll in the Architecture and Allied Arts Art Workshop of Texas Technological College.

The course may be taken for credit or for non-credit.

# Business Education And Secretarial Administration

Workshops

This department has two workshops planned for the 1953 summer session, one workshop for each of the two summer terms.

#### WORKSHOP IN SECRETARIAL SUBJECTS

During the first summer term, June 24-July 14, the Department of Business Education and Secretarial Administration will hold a workshop in secretarial subjects. The theme of this workshop is "the development of practical teaching materials."

Students in this workshop may register June 3—the registration day of the first summer term—or wait until the first day of class, June 24. The workshop is a three-hour course, and special questions may be referred to Dr. Donald J. Tate, Head of the Department of Business Education and Secretarial Administration, Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas.

#### BOOKKEEPING AND GENERAL BUSINESS WORKSHOP

For the first time, the Department of Business Education and Secretarial Administration will offer a workshop in bookkeeping and general business. This workshop is scheduled for July 16-August 6.

Business teachers should be particularly interested in this workshop. The course carries three semester hours credit. Registration for the workshop is July 16, the first day of registration for the second summer term.

#### Education

This summer it is possible for you to combine your conference attendance, your workshop activities, and your formal course work taken for credit. Among your choices are:

- The course in Advanced Administration Workshops (Ed. 5139) may be taken for a minimum of 2 and a maximum of 6 semester hours.
- The course in Advanced Supervision Workshop (Ed. 5337) is the Texas Tech course designed for the state-wide Cooperative Workshop in Supervisory Leadership. This three-week workshop carries 3 semester hours of credit.
- The course, entitled Family Life Workshop, is sponsored jointly by the Departments of Child Development and Family Relations, Education, Psychology, and Sociology. Each of these departments gives 3 semester hours of credit for the course as 5336.

# Adult Education Program Planning

From June 15 through June 19, three agencies will sponsor a workshop in adult education program planning at Texas Technological College.

These agencies are the Fund for Adult Education (Ford Foundation), Texas Technological College, and the Lubbock Public Schools.

Laurence K. McLaughlin, Western Field Representative for the Fund for Adult Education of the Ford Foundation, is the chief resource person of the workshop, and Dr. Per G. Stensland, Head of the Adult Education Program at Texas Technological College, is the workshop coordinator.

One hour credit will be given if requested. Registration dates are June 13-14.

"Mature Community Life Needs Adult Education" is the theme of the workshop. Purposes are to explore the resources in West Texas available to adult citizens, to evaluate the channels for this adult education, and to demonstrate and analyze the techniques most effective in planning and executing local programs.

A special trip to Palo Duro Canyon is planned for June 20 following the completion of the workshop program.

#### Audio-Visual Education

#### WORKSHOP

Texas Technological College welcomes all recipients of this bulletin to participate in an Audio-Visual education workshop, Aug. 10-14.

This workshop is designed to provide experiences in (1) equipment selection and utilization, (2) location of resource materials, (3) administration of audio-visual programs, and (4) application of resources to curriculum development.

The theme of this workshop is "Increased Efficiency In Learning Through Audio-Visual Resource Materials," and emphasis will be placed on building audio-visual programs for area public schools.

Dr. Horace C. Hartsell and Dr. Ray Davidson, both of the Department of Education staff, and Henry McCarty, Director of the West Texas Audio-Visual Cooperative Services, are coordinators of the program.

# Fifth Cooperative Workshop On SUPERVISORY LEADERSHIP

July 20-August 7

This fifth annual workshop, like the preceding ones, will be sponsored by the cooperating colleges and universities of the state and the Texas Education Agency.

Students attending the conference may register for three semester hours credit in the institution of their choice. Please note that this registration is to be completed at the cooperating college or university according to the accepted procedures of that institution and should be completed before coming to Lubbock.

Those participants registering for credit at Texas Technological College may do so upon arrival.

The leader of the workshop will be Mercedes Erro, Director of Curricular Services in San Luis Obispo County, California. Consultants will include Maurice Ahrens, Corpus Christi Public Schools, representatives from the faculties of the cooperating institutions, the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, and the Texas Education Agency.

In this fifth year of the developing programs of supervisory leadership in Texas, the following points of emphasis will be considered at the workshop and selections made for study and action by the group:

- 1. Development of In-Service Education Programs
- 2. The Role of the Specialist in Supervision
- The Teacher in the Supervision ProgramThe Principal in the Supervision Program
- 5. Supervision and the Production of Curricular Materials

6. The Superintendent in the Supervision Program

7. The Role of the College and University in the Pre-Service and In-Service Education of Supervisors

8. Shared Planning in Supervision

9. Action Research in Supervisory Programs

Facilities for the activities of the workshop, as well as rooms, are provided in the same dormitory. Meals also will be available. The cost will be approximately \$70 for the three-week period.

Recreation possibilities include week-end trips to such places as Santa Fe, Taos, Carlsbad, and Ruidoso.

If you are interested in this workshop and feel that there is a chance that you may attend, will you please communicate with the Head of the Department of Education at Texas Tech, indicating your area of interest in the "points of emphasis" and expressing your desire to receive material developed in further planning of the workshop.

"How to Make Use of Local Health Resources" is the general theme of a health education workshop June 1-5.

Sponsored by the Lubbock School Nurses Association, the Texas Education Agency, and Texas Technological College, this workshop's purpose is to find ways and means of coordinating health resources with the school health program.

One semester credit can be earned, but the workshop can be taken for non-credit.

Dr. R. W. Kireilis, Head of the Department of Health and Physical Education and Recreation, is workshop coordinator. Instructors will represent the Lubbock City-County Medical Society, Texas Technological College, and the State Department of Public Health.

Workshop sessions will be conducted at O. L. Slaton Junior High School in Lubbock.

#### **Driver Education**

#### WORKSHOP

From July 16 through August 6 a workshop in driver education will be conducted at Texas Technological College.

This three-semester hour course is designed for the training of those who plan to teach driver education in public schools. Upon successful completion of the workshop, the Texas Education Agency will give the student a certificate of approval as an instructor of Driver Education and Traffic in Texas Schools. (This is a partial requirement of the Driver Education Certification Law which eventually will require three hours of Safety Education in addition to the three hours of Driver Education)

Morley Jennings, Professor of Health and Physical Education and Recreation, is workshop coordinator, and sponsors include the Texas Education Agency, State Highway Department, and State Department of Public Safety.

Resource persons will be representatives of the State Department of Public Safety, State Highway Department, and Texas Education Agency.

Registration is the first day of the workshop, July 16.

#### Home Economics

## Household Equipment WORKSHOP

From June 3 through July 10, three two-week workshops will be conducted by the Department of Home Management, the Division of Home Economics, and Texas Technological College on the selection, use, and care of household equipment, including major and small appliances and kitchen and laundry planning and lighting.

Each of the three workshops are separate courses and may be taken for graduate or undergraduate credit. A schedule of these workshops is as follows:

Registration dates for the three are June 3, June 16, and June 29.

Miss Lola Marie Drew, Associate Professor of Home Management at Texas Technological College and coordinator of the workshops, will be assisted by Mrs. Ollyne Jeffries, Southwestern Director of the Home Economics Institute of Westinghouse, and Miss Marjorie Boyts, representing the Consumer's Institute Staff of General Electric. Other home economists, or demonstrators from utility companies, appliance manufacturers, and detergent companies will be announced later.

# Home Care Of The Sick WORKSHOP

A workshop designed to give special training in effective methods of teaching home care of the sick is scheduled June 23-28 by the Department of Home Economics Education and the American Red Cross.

This workshop prepares teachers to teach Red Cross Home Nursing classes, thereby assisting in the civil defense programs in their communities.

Dr. Geraldine Clewell, Associate Professor of Home Economics Education, is coordinator of the workshop. Chief resource persons are Mrs. Glenn Woody, Instructor Trainer, Red Cross Home Nursing, and Miss Elizabeth von Wagner, Nursing Field Representative of the American Red Cross.

A credit hour will be given if requested, but the workshop will also be given for non-credit. Registration is possible from 8:30 a.m. to 9 a.m. June 23 prior to the first session.

## Applied Arts WORKSHOP

Dr. Marjorie Batchelder McPharlin, Designer and Puppeteer from Santa Fe, N. M., will be in charge of a workshop in applied arts July 6-10.

The theme of this workshop is "Puppets for Recreation, Teaching, and Advertising."

# Bishop Method Of Clothing Contruction WORKSHOPS

Short cuts in clothing construction—using the Bishop method—and tailoring by the Bishop method are the themes of a workshop in clothing construction July 20-25. Mrs. Edna Bryte Bishop, originator of the Bishop Method of Clothing Construction, will be the chief resource person.

The workshop, sponsored by the Department of Clothing and Textiles and the Home Economics Division of Texas Technological College, will be held in Rooms 105-106 in the Home Economics Building. Miss Mabel D. Erwin, Head of the Department of Clothing and Textiles, is workshop coordinator.

Registration for this workshop is from 8 to 9 a.m. July 20, and the first morning session is scheduled 9 a.m. until noon on that day.

One semester hour credit can be earned by taking Clothing 512, and another credit hour can be earned by taking Clothing 513.

# Dramatics and Forensics (High School) WORKSHOP

A workshop in dramatics and forensics for pre-college, or high school, students will be conducted by the Texas Technological College Speech Department, June 5-July 3.

The workshop is open to any interested sophomore or junior, or outstanding freshman of the 1952-53 school year.

The program will include study and practice in effective speech. Voice, diction, personality development, role-playing, bodily action and development of good speech habits are some of the aspects considered part of the program. The students will have opportunities for participation in plays, discussions, debates, and radio programs, according to the student's interests.

Students interested in dramatics will produce as many plays as can be cast from the group. The theory and practice of make-up, costume, and lighting, as well as acting, will be included.

The problem for the 1953-54 forensics season will be the basis for study and practice of principles involved in effective discussion and debate. Each student will participate in several practice sessions, culminating in a public demonstration at the conclusion of the session.

Weekly picnics, plays, and other recreational activities have been scheduled for the play period of the students.
