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Meet Tech's President . . .


Dr. Robert Cabaniss Goodwin, Texas Tech's seventh president, is known around the campus as a man who gets things done.

As one executive put it, "Maybe he will tell you no. But if he does, you get the answer in a hurry and can turn your attention to other matters."

Goodwin is no cloud-riding academician. As a chemist, he has been an industrial consultant as well as teacher. He is co-holder of a patent on a method of accelerating vucanization and has been recognized for his research on the removal of flourides from public water supplies.

But his administrative abilities have caused him to be "drafted" from the classroom and laboratory and into Tech's Graduate School deanship (1938), School of Arts and Sciences deanship (1945) and academic vice-presidency (1959). In September of 1959 he was named acting president. In August, 1960, he accepted the presidency.

A native of Brownwood, Texas, the 63-year-old educator holds a bachelor of arts degree from Howard Payne College, master of arts degree from the University of Texas, and doctor of philosophy degree from Harvard University. He joined the Tech faculty in 1930 as chemistry department head, coming from the University of Florida.

When DeWitt Weaver, who contributed so much to the expansion of Texas Tech's athletic program, resigned in November after nearly ten years of service as athletic director and head football coach, his successor as athletic director was his assistant, Polk Robison.

King, a former University of Texas gridder under D. X. Bible, coached previously at Kenedy, Tex., and Enid, Okla., high schools before entering college ranks in 1946 at Tulane. He had also coached at the University of Texas and Texas A&M before joining the Texas Tech staff in

After the war he coached at University of New Mexico before taking posts with the State of New Mexico and the City of Alamogordo, N.M. 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



Football Coach . . .

J T King, who served as an assistant coach at four major schools, begins his first season as a head college coach this fall.

King previously was an assistant coach at Tulane, Texas A&M, University of Texas, and Texas Tech. After three seasons with the Red Raiders, he was promoted from his No. 1 assistant's post to the top job in late November, 1960, following DeWitt Weaver's resignation.

A 1938 graduate of the University of Texas, where he lettered at guard, King compiled an enviable record at Kenedy and at Enid, Okla., High schools before going into college ranks. During King's six seasons at Enid, the team won its conference five times and was regarded as unofficial state champion three years.

In 1946, Henry Frnka summoned King to Tulane to help re-build the school's grid squad. King recruited so well in Texas that 14 of Tulane's top 22 players two years later were from the Lone Star state.

After Tulane compiled a 9-1 mark in 1948 for the New Orleans school's best record in the last 21 years, King returned to Texas to coach, first a year at Texas A&M, then to his alma mater. In his 1950-56 period at Texas, the Longhorns won three Southwest Conference titles.

King, after serving successively as end coach, line coach, and head defensive coach, under Blair Cherry and Ed Price, was brought back to Texas A&M by Paul (Bear) Bryant, When Bryant moved to the University of Alabama following A&M's Gator Bowl appearance, King went to Texas Tech in 1958.

Considered well-versed in all phases of the game, King saw his defensive abilities nationally recognized in 1953, when the American Football Coaches Association asked him to address its annual convention on "Defensing the Spread Formation."

King, born in Hamburg, Ark., and educated at Houston's John Reagan High School, is married to the former Beth Buttrill of Lometa. They have four children, John 20, Charles 15, Robert 11, and Betty Jane 7.







BOSTON COLLEGE . . .

In the year 1863, a handful of Jesuit Fathers obtained from the Massachusetts Legislature a charter authorizing Boston College "to confer such degrees as are usually conferred in this Commonwealth . . . "

As a Jesuit institute, one of the 29 such institutes of higher learning in the United States, Boston College is part of the four century-old system of Jesuit education. Father John McElroy, S.J., began the erection of the buildings on Harrison Avenue and on September 5, 1864, the doors of the college were first opened to students. Its first president was Father John Bapst, S.J., whose heroic sufferings for the faith in Maine had made him a famous figure in New England history.

Since coming to its present site at University Heights in 1913, Boston College has grown steadily. Its campus is spacious and attractive and is adorned by buildings which are universally acclaimed as outstanding monuments of Collegiate Gothic in the United

The campus now covers 200 acres and 30 buildings and has spread out into three areas: upper, middle, and lower. The upper campus includes the expanding dormitories of Tudor architecture presently numbering 11 buildings, housing 1200 men students from 35 states and 30 foreign countries. The middle campus has the beautiful Gothic academic buildings, laboratories, lecture halls, and libraries. The lower campus is now devoted to enlarged athletic facilities. On the middle or academic campus are located the four undergraduate colleges—College of Arts and Sciences, College of Business Administration, School of Nursing, and the School of Education.

The University which totals 12 schools and colleges also comprises the Graduate Schools of Law, Arts and Sciences, Social Work and Business Administration; the Evening Under-graduate Division of Arts, Sciences, and Business Administration; and the Summer Session. The Development plans of the university now call for some 10 new buildings to be erected by 1970.

On the threshold of a second century, Boston College can look back upon one hundred years of dynamic progress and achievement. The orginal enrollment of 22 students has grown to 6,200 full-time students and 4,300 part-time students. In 1961, some 142 Jesuits—the largest Jesuit teaching community in the world—and 450 dedicated lay professors are serving at Boston College, now the largest Catholic university in New England and the third largest in America.
