

Imperial Hotel Breakfast  
Sunday June 23<sup>d</sup> 1872

Dear Mother -

It is over two weeks since I have undertaken to write you and thereby comply with the most important of your requests and the most urgent of which I should consider my first duty - the last and I may also say the first and only one so far that I have written since my leaving home - but I will not only endeavor but will do better in the future - this being only the second missive of any kind which I have penned since the 5<sup>th</sup> inst -

so you can hardly feel that I have slighted you for any one else - even if you do think that I have not entirely done my duty - a page and a quarter to apology - is all that is necessary. Is it not? - We landed at Lurrinstown June 15<sup>th</sup> about 7.15 a.m. - a rainy damp but pleasant morning - took train at 9 a.m. arriving at Cork Imperial Hotel about 12.15 a.m. - a miserable little town of but little importance remained over Sunday - Monday jaunting car to the <sup>ruins of</sup> Blarney Castle kissed the Blarney Stone and the whole affair completely suggestive of its name "Blarney" you can hardly expect me but to give the most important outlines of the trip as I see.

June 20<sup>th</sup>. leave Kilkenny at 9 a.m. arrive Dublin 11.40 P.M. Shelbourn Hotel - the best hotel we have visited - most beautifully situated opposite a large park -

June 21 - Joe - Jennie - Geo - self - visited points of interest in and about town Botanic & Geological Gardens Cemetery - O'Connell's & Curran's monument &c -

June 22<sup>d</sup> leave Dublin on 8.10 train "lightning express" arrive Belfast 11.30 a.m. - Imperial Hotel -

June 23<sup>d</sup>. Joe + self attended service at St. Georges' Episcopal church this morning service at 11.30 a.m. -

and that brings me up to  
the present time - 4.10 P.M. -  
you I presume are just  
about coming out of church  
now as in New York it is  
about 12.30 P.M. - We antic-  
ipate leaving here to mor-  
row at 8 P.M. by way of  
steamer across the Irish  
sea to Glasgow arrive about noon  
Tuesday - from there to Edin-  
burgh - hope to be in London  
next Sunday where we  
expect to remain about  
two weeks - I wish you would  
keep all the papers &c I send  
home for me - Keep a sharp  
look out for Frank in my  
room &c &c. It is a most  
remarkable fact - that it has  
rained every day since we

Jennie - Maggie and the boys  
having gone to take a walk  
no doubt as a helper to di-  
gestion - you having just  
finished writing a letter to  
her Father - is sitting reading  
her Bible - keeping me  
company - we are in Aunt  
Mamie's room I occupying  
a seat by a little desk  
busily plying my pen en-  
deavouring to amuse you  
with my rough description  
of our trip - being desirous  
of writing we were compelled  
to retreat - to this room - as  
the folks were all in the  
sitting room and I would  
like to see any one con-  
nect any reasonable ideas

with Charles & Geo - skimming  
around the same room - Aunt  
Mary - Joe & all send love -  
Joe says she will write you  
from Edinburgh - Gussie has  
not been very well - but  
nothing of any serious nature  
we have been pretty well on  
the go and we are all a little  
tired & fatigued we will  
all have a better chance to  
recuperate from the strain  
of our sea voyage when we  
lay over at London - coming to  
more important points we will  
remain longer at each place -  
with this exception and Joe's  
tooth ache - all are well -  
send love - write as soon as  
you receive this - love to all

I have not as yet given this  
day up - when I say it has  
rained I mean that it has  
either snowed or else been  
unpleasant and rainy - We  
have had but two or three  
real pleasant days or at  
least parts of days - but as  
yet have not succeeded in  
accomplishing 24 consecu-  
tive pleasant hours - although  
we must indeed hope for  
settled weather soon - the  
season in Ireland & all  
through the section of the country  
which we have travelled has  
been very late indeed - as for  
Ireland & towns & cities I can't  
say much - but its mountain  
and valley scenery is indeed  
charming - The weather has

of course been somewhat of a drawback so far to our trip but not such a dimension as to be of any account or to hardly speak of - Charles is indeed a trump to travel with and good company - he and I are room mates - but with separate beds - George is the Caesar of the party contrary and stubborn and I am sorry to acknowledge more the pleasure of his mother at times - but the last leaf better be kept a secret between you & I - Aunt Mary is sitting quietly in the sitting room enjoying herself - just having finished her dinner - herself, Jennie the children & Maffie eat all meals in their sitting room or as we term it Headquarters

deavor from time to time to carry your imaginations from place to place leaving a more thorough description until I reach home - leave work at 8 a.m. June 18<sup>th</sup> arrive at Kellaney about 12.m. Royal Victoria Hotel 4 miles by stage coach most beautifully and picturesquely situated bordering on what is termed the lower lake with most charming scenery of distant mountains towering up with cloud capped peaks afternoon drive Macross Abbey 700 yrs old - whose crumbled walls thickly frescoed with clinging ivy rendered indeed a most imposing aspect - before reaching this we had a most charming drive of about 6 miles Aunt Mary in-

dulging herself part the way  
to a jaunting car ride - returning  
by the way of the middle and  
lower lakes - (making a most  
charming diversion of route)  
to the hotel - in time for  
Table D'Hotel at 6 P.M.

June 19<sup>th</sup> Joe - Charley & self  
leave hotel at 9 A.M. - jaunting  
car ride of 9 miles - horse  
back ride through a rocky  
pass of five miles - known as  
"Dunlos Gap" - return by way  
of the three Lakes - making  
a most delightful trip for  
the day returning in time  
for Table D'Hotel - The lakes  
of Killarney with its surround-  
ings - as far as the most in-  
struction & pleasing spot we  
have yet visited - it does  
indeed defy description.
