BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

DECEMBER 8, 1962

- 741. The Board of Directors of Texas Technological College met in regular session in the Office of the President on Saturday, December 8, 1962, at 9:30 a.m. The following Directors were present: Chairman DeBusk, Vice Chairman Smith, Mr. Allison, Mr. Hinn, Mr. Mathews, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Wall and Mr. Wooldridge. In addition, President Goodwin, Academic Vice President Pearce, Vice President and Comptroller Pennington and Secretary Wells were present.
- 742. Upon motion made by Mr. Wall, seconded by Mr. Smith, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the Minutes of the October 26, 1962 Board Meeting.
- 743. Upon motion made by Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Wall, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the Agenda under date of November 26, 1962, Items No. 595 through Item No. 740, with the exception of Item No. 679 which was not approved. A copy of the approved Agenda is attached and made a part of the Minutes. Attachment No. 1.
- 744. Mr. Polk Robison, Director and Business Manager of Athletics, gave a report on Intercollegiate Athletics at Texas Technological College. A copy of the report is attached and made a part of the Minutes. Attachment No. 4.
- 745. Upon motion made by Mr. Wooldridge, seconded by Mr. Allison, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the addition of twenty-four (24) new courses and the deletion of twenty-eight (28) existing courses, at the undergraduate level, as listed on Attachment No. 6.
- 746. Upon motion made by Mr. Wooldridge, seconded by Mr. Allison, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the addition of twenty-one (21) new graduate courses and the deletion of one (1) existing graduate course in the School of Agriculture as listed on Attachment No. 6, pages 2 and 3.
- 747. Upon motion made by Mr. Wooldridge, seconded by Mr. Allison, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the addition of twenty-five (25) new graduate level courses and the deletion of three (3) existing graduate level courses in the School of Arts and Sciences as listed on Attachment No. 6, pages 4 and 5.
- 748. Upon motion made by Mr. Wooldridge, seconded by Mr. Wall, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the addition of ten (10) new graduate level courses and the deletion of six (6) graduate level courses in the School of Business Administration as listed on Attachment No. 6, pages 6 and 7.
- 749. Upon motion made by Mr. Wooldridge, seconded by Mr. Allison, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the following changes in undergraduate degree programs in the School of Agriculture:

750. Upon motion made by Mr. Wooldridge, seconded by Mr. Allison, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the following changes in graduate degree programs in the School of Agriculture:

751. Upon motion made by Mr. Allison, seconded by Mr. McLaughlin, the Board by a majority vote, authorized the preparation of a document to be presented to The Texas Commission on Higher Education requesting permission to establish a Law School at Texas Technological College. Mr. Wall voted "No" on the motion. Mr. Smith and Mr. Mathews refrained from voting.

Chairman DeBusk stated that he could not vote but if he had voted, his vote would have been against the motion. Mr. DeBusk, Mr. Mathews and Mr. Smith all stated they would be in favor of including the Law School in a "long range plan."

The document which is to be prepared for submission to The Texas Commission on Higher Education will be presented to the entire Board for review and approval before presentation to the Commission.

- Mr. Allison submitted several documents to support the request for a Law School. These documents have been presented as Attachment No. 11.
- 752. Upon motion made by Mr. Wooldridge, seconded by Mr. Hinn, the Board by a unanimous vote, requested the Administration to study the possibility of adding a School of Education, a Department or School of Nursing and a Department or School or Pharmacy. The motion further requested the Administration to make a continuous study of needs such as other Departments and/or Schools.
- 753. Upon motion made by Mr. Mathews, seconded by Mr. Wooldridge, the Board by a unanimous vote referred the proposed Revised Organizational Chart for the College to the Executive Committee for review. The Executive Committee will make a recommendation to the Board at a future meeting.
- 754. Upon motion made by Mr. Wall, seconded by Mr. Mathews, the Board by a unanimous vote, authorized the Administration to study the feasibility of a Faculty Senate to replace the present Faculty Advisory Committee at Texas Technological College.
- 755. Upon motion made by Mr. Wall, seconded by Mr. Hinn, the Board by a unanimous vote, granted permission to Dr. John R. Bradford, Dean of the School of Engineering, to go to Beverly Hills, California, and San Francisco, California, from December 9, 1962 through December 15, 1962, to confer with Dr. C. B. Thornton, Chairman of the Board of Litton Industries, concerning research at Texas Technological College and to go to Stanford University to seek a staff member in Chemical Engineering and bicengineering; expenses are to be paid from the Institute of Science and Engineering, Account No. 3058.
- 756. Upon motion made by Mr. Wall, seconded by Mr. Mathews, the Board by a unanimous vote, granted permission to Dr. John R. Bradford, Dean of the School of Engineering, to meet with representatives of universities and colleges in Arizona, California, Oregon, Washington and Montana regarding new staff members and research programs at the individual schools and to interview potential staff for the School of Engineering for approximately eight days during the month of January, 1963; expenses are to be paid from the Office of the Dean of Engineering Maintenance, Equipment and Travel Account.
- 757. Upon motion made by Mr. Wall, seconded by Mr. Allison, the Board by a unanimous vote, adopted a Resolution in memory of Mr. Spencer A. Wells, a former member of the Board of Directors of Texas Technological College. A copy of the Resolution is attached and made a part of the Board Minutes. Attachment No. 7.
- 758. Upon motion made by Mr. Wall, seconded by Mr. Allison, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved a budget in the amount of \$17,730.00 for the Student Council. A copy of the Budget is attached and made a part of the Minutes. Attachment No. 8.
- 759. Upon motion made by Mr. Wall, seconded by Mr. Allison, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved a transfer from the Unappropriated Prior Year's Balance of the Reserve Parking Lot Account, the sum of \$3,400.00 to the Reserved Parking Lot Current Operating Account for the purchase of two automatic gate systems and four hundred (400) card keys.

- 760. Upon motion made by Mr. Wall, seconded by all Board Members, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the conferring of an honorary Doctorate Degree on Mr. Cal Farley, Amarillo, Texas, at the 1963 Spring Commencement.
- 761. Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Wall, the Board by a unanimous vote approved a budget for the College Air Force ROTC Property Account No. 4007, in the amount of \$1,075.00, and a budget for the Air Force ROTC Uniform Commutation Account No. 4002, in the amount of \$19,825.00. A copy of each budget is attached and made a part of the Minutes. Account No. 4007 is Attachment No. 10 and Account No. 4002 is Attachment No. 9.
- 762. Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Wall, the Board by a unanimous vote approved a Resolution concerning Water Research. A copy of the Resolution is attached and made a part of the Minutes. Attachment No. 19.
- 763. Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Wall, the Board by a unanimous vote authorized the initiation of a Research Project entitled "Studies of Filtration and Recharging 'Suitable' Water into the Ogalalla Formation", involving the Departments of Chemistry, Agricultural Engineering, and perhaps others as soon as funds become available. The Board also authorized the Chairman to appoint a subcommittee of the Board to approve a budget, to complete arrangements for the project, and take the necessary action to get the research underway prior to the next Board Meeting.

Chairman DeBusk appointed Mr. Hinn, Mr. Wall and Mr. Smith to this special Committee.

- 764. The Campus and Building Committee of the Board met on Friday afternoon, December 7, 1962 at 2:30 p.m., in the Office of the President, to consider the recommendations from the Campus and Planning Committee, and to formulate recommendations to be made to the Board on Saturday Morning, December 8, 1962. The next ten (10) items, No. 765 through 774, will record the official action of the Board following the recommendations of the Campus and Building Committee,
- 765. The Board approved the recommendation of the Campus Planning Committee, that the enlargement of the Texas Tech College Bookstore be scheduled for the fall of 1964 rather than for the fall of 1963.
- 766. The Associated Architects and Engineers presented the acoustical report on the study of the dormitories and provided each member of the Board with a detailed written report.

Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Wall, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved including the results of the studies in Project No.: CH-Tex-150(D), Unit A as far as possible, and, including the results of the studies in the plans and specifications for Units B and C. In addition, the Board voted to plug the holes between the rooms in Thompson, Gaston, Carpenter and Wells Halls as suggested in the report.

The Campus and Building Committee suggested that the Campus Planning Committee study the possibility of noise reduction through the installation of carpeting in the halls of the dormitories.

767. Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Wall, the Board by a unanimous vote awarded a construction contract to H. A. Lott, Inc., Houston, Texas, in the amount of \$6,301,635.61, subject to the approval of the Housing and Home Finance Agency, for new dormitories and dining facilities, designated as Project No.: CH-Tex-150(D), Unit B and Unit C. The loan agreement has been sent to the Washington Office for their approval. The amount of the contract was determined by:

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768. Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Wall, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the recommendation of the Campus Planning Committee that no plans be made for additional housing in 1965 and that steps be taken to effect other needs of the Dormitory System in the interim.

769. Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Mathews, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the recommendations of the Campus Planning Committee that an over-all plan concerning Housing and Food Service be prepared and presented with a recommendation for the employment of a Consultant at the February Meeting. The plans should consider such items as the long-range dormitory plan, and methods after 1965, a combined kitchen and dining facilities for Bledsoe, Gordon, West and Sneed Halls, central food storage, bakery, athletes kitchen and dining room and the remodeling of the Office of Room Reservations.

770. Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Smith, the Board by a unanimous vote, approved the revised plans and specifications for the Killgore Beef Cattle Center, subject to the final approval by the Trustees of the Killgore Foundation; authorized the Campus and Building Committee and/or the Vice President and Comptroller to advertise for bids; to receive and open the bids; and to make a recommendation on the contract award at the February Board Meeting.

771. Mr. Harold Hinn, Chairman of the Campus and Building Committee, presented a recommendation from the Executive Committee of the West Texas Museum Board of Directors to the Texas Tech Board, along with the reasoning of the Committee. The recommendations are given briefly below:

"The recommendation of the Executive Committee of the West Texas Museum Board of Directors for a site other than Fourth Street and, as a first choice, ten acres at the northwest corner of Indiana and Nineteenth, and as a second choice, nine and a fraction acres at the triangle formed by Nineteenth Street and the Brownfield cutoff."

After careful consideration of the recommendations, the Building Committee stated that the requested sites conflict with the future uses of the College and do not fit into the over-all planning.

The Building Committee felt that the Fourth Street site is better, although it could be at another location on Fourth Street. Since Indiana will be extended through the campus in the future, the thought was expressed that it might be well to consider a site at Indiana and the freeway.

The Board stated that the Fourth Street Site had been approved by the Board and there is no real basis for changing the approved site at this time.

772. Mr. Harold Hinn, Chairman of the Campus and Building Committee presented the following informational report on the proposed facilities for Psychology and Speech:

All the items requested by the Board of Directors at the last meeting have been done, with the exception that as yet it has not been possible to get the amounts which could be negotiated from the low bidder. However, he has promised the information on Tuesday, December 11, 1962.

The Building Committee has been authorized by the Board to act on the projects, and the information will be conveyed to the members as quickly as it is available.

773. Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Smith, the Board by a unanimous vote, awarded a contract in the amount of \$50,594.90 to the Panhandle Construction Company, Lubbock, Texas, the low bidder, for the construction of a Sewage Outflow Line. The cost of this project is to be paid ninety (90%) per cent from Dormitory Funds and ten (10%) per cent from Local Building Funds. A copy of the tabulation of bids is attached and made a part of the Minutes. Attachment No. 12. A copy of the Contract is attached and made a part of the Minutes. Attachment No. 13.

- 774. Upon motion made by Mr. Hinn, seconded by Mr. Smith, the Board by a unanimous vote, granted the City of Lubbock the necessary easement for the City to construct a sewage line from Fourth Street north to the sewage disposal plant at no expense to the College; and to dedicate additional land to widen Indiana North of Fourth Street to the Clovis Highway. These were approved with the stipulation that the City of Lubbock would secure the necessary permission from the Fifty-Eighth Legislature; the City of Lubbock will move the fences and buildings without cost to the College; that the right-of-way would extend only to the curb; and that the City would be granted permission to construct the necessary traffic control devices and street lights behind the curb.
- 775. The Board requested the Campus and Planning Committee to renew its study of signs to identify the Campus Buildings.
- 776. Upon motion made by Mr. Mathews, seconded by Mr. McLaughlin, the Board by a unanimous vote, authorized the President to file a request with the Fifty-Eighth Legislature for a change in the Workmen's Compensation Insurance Act for Texas Technological College. The proposed changes are to update the act. (Re: Workmen's Compensation Law, Vernon's Annotated Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, Volume 22, Article 8309f.)
- 777. Mr. William H. Butterfield, Vice President for Development, gave a brief report on the work of the Office of Development during the year, 1962.

778. The Board adjourned at 2:30 p.m., until the next regular Board Meeting on Saturday, February 9, 1963, in the Office of the President, Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas.

SUBJECT:	Dormitory and Dining Facilities for 150(D), Unit A	Womer, Project No. CH-Tex-

At the last meeting, the Board of Directors referred the acoustical report on the dormitories by the architects to the Campus Planning Committee.

The full report has yet to be made, but on the suggestion of Bolt, Barenek and Newman, some changes could be made in the women's dormitory now under construction. As soon as enough information was available, the following recommendation was made to the members of the Building Committee:

- 1. Approve an extra in the amount of \$4,053.75 to the contract with H. A. Lott for the construction of the new women's dormitory to place 1" blankets of 1# density Gustin Bacon Ultralite insulation (36" wide and 9' 3" long to lap back approximately 2" on walls, ceilings and floors) on both sides of all 2½" plaster partitions between wardrobe units. This material is easily compressed and will fill all the void at this location when the wardrobe is placed.
- 2. Approve an extra in the amount of \$1,138 for the same project to place 1" blankets of 2# or heavier density Gustin Bacon Ultralite insulation or equal between the channels in the 4½" double plaster walls between all bedrooms where lathing has not been installed. (This is 66 locations, mainly in the four-story wing of Unit C.)

# REPORT TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS TEXAS TECHNOLOGICAL COLLEGE

on December 8, 1962

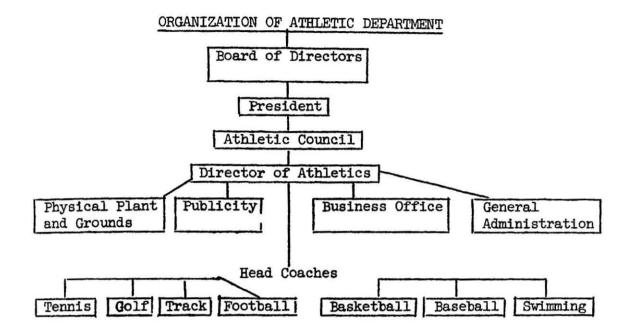
I appreciate the opportunity of meeting with you gentlemen and discussing with you the purposes, organization, finances, staff, problems and projected outlook of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics at Texas Tech.

PURPOSE I am certain that we all realize the real purposes and reasons for the existence of such a department as an integral part of the overall program at Texas Tech. I would be the first to admit that keeping the athletic program apace with Texas Tech's academic strides is not an easy assignment. We realize, as President Goodwin has suggested on at least one occasion, "that athletics can be the show window of a college." We want our teams to reflect the progress made by Texas Tech in its basic function - of educating our youth. We believe, therefore, in athletics remaining in proper perspective.

A college president was quoted as saying that whenever he gets the urge to exercise, he lies down on his couch until that urge passes. Another administrator has said, after his institution had experienced a very successful season on the gridiron, "Now, we must begin to build a university of which the football team can be proud." I think that somewhere between these two extremes is the type of program that we want at Texas Tech.

ORGANIZATION The chart shown on the following page indicates the general organizational structure of the athletic program at Texas Tech. It is through this structure that athletic policies are determined and administered.

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All lines of authority and responsibility are observed as indicated in organizational chart.

Overall authority is in the President, with responsibilities delegated as indicated.

Chairman of Athletic Council acts as deputy of President in supervision of athletic program and as faculty representative to Southwest Conference and N.C.A.A.

Athletic Council, as faculty committee of the President, sets general policy, budget, standards of eligibility, procedures; approves schedules and relates the general program of athletics to the academic program.

Director of Athletics administers the program of the department, supervises all activities, and makes recommendations to the Athletic Council. He is responsible for the observance of the regulations of the institution, the conference, and the N.C.A.A. He is to administer the budget and adhere to the policies set up for the department.

The head coach of each sport is responsible for the conduct of his sport, including recruiting, budget control, and observance of all institutional, conference, and N.C.A.A. regulations.

### ORGANIZATION (Continued)

In our program, we have made every effort to support our aims and purposes of the Department of Athletics in a sound and constructive way. Our plan is to build a solid program on a sound foundation in every area of the seven sports in which we participate. I would like to visit with you for awhile in regard to analyzing our football program. At the time of selection of our present football staff two years ago, Texas Tech was confronted with a number of problems that were not visible to the general public. Aside from our financial problem, we were most concerned with the respect which our program held in the minds of our student body, professors, administration, and public. This football staff, under Coach J. T. King, took this under consideration and has proceeded to build in the right way a program of which we hope all will be proud. Despite the unusual adversities and our disappointment with the record of the 1962 football season, there are a large number of encouraging developments that have taken place which we feel will have a positive bearing on reaping the fruits of victory in the future.

- 1. Discipline A strongly disciplined program under a disciplined football staff. This was evidenced by the morale of the 1962 football team under most severe circumstances. This discipline evidenced itself among the freshman squad as well as among the varsity. These attitudes were not confined to athletics but were displayed in the fields of academics and student government participation.
- 2. Academics With the increasing demands academically, we in athletics must strengthen our program in that area. This the staff is doing in its selection of personnel, its discipline which positively affects the athletes not only in athletics but also in their academic pursuits. We have secured an Academic Counselor, Mr. Clide Prestwood, who this year is on a full-time basis. It is his duty to assist the athletes in helping them to help themselves in the following ways:

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- Giving advice, counsel and personal interest in academic achievement.
- Teaching them how to budget their time and how to study.
- Conducting of special study hall periods under supervision.
- 4. Furnishing, in certain cases, special instruction.
  in reading improvement.
- Providing liaison between faculty and Department of Athletics.
- Regular checks on grades and absences through the cooperation of the professors.
- Motivating the proper attitudes toward securing an education at Texas Tech.
- 8. Advising and counseling on schedules.
- 9. Selecting special tutors through the recommendation of the head of the academic department concerned.

We know that the records show this program to be making rapid strides in this important area. This is not only a sound financial investment and will enable us to more quickly reach our goal in athletics, but also a fine investment in the future of these young men in our athletic program.

RECRUITMENT OF ATHLETES During the four year period of being in no conference, our football recruiting of top personnel was a real problem. This, combined with the high attrition rate due to academics and other reasons, left the new staff with very little manpower of comparable ability with any of the Southwest Conference Teams which had established S.W.C. caliber squads built up over years and strengthened through "red shirt" programs. The 1961 recruitment was good but not comparable to most S.W.C. institutions; however, some of the key men recruited in 1961 had academic difficulties during the fall semester. These men or most of them were on the "red shirt" squad this fall. The football staff feels that the 1962 recruits were comparable to most of the SWC teams and better than some. The backfield talent with speed and the quarterback prospects stand out. From this squad of some fifty-five

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prospects, there will come the first true "red shirt" program at Texas

Tech. Possibly 20-30 of these young men will be held out of competition
during their sophomore year. This will give experience, maturity, and
fundamental development to a group of young athletes who have ability
but need more seasoning. I predict it will take two true "red shirt"

programs for Texas Tech to be on a par with all other teams in the S.W.C.

HOUSING AND DINING OF ATHLETES It was the opinion of the Athletic Director and the coaches, supported by the Athletic Council and the Administration, that better relations could exist among students, faculty and athletes if our athletes could be housed in regular campus dormitories as other men students at Texas Tech are housed. Through the administration, the Department of Athletics was allotted 130 reservations in the Sneed, Bledsoe and Gordon Men's Dorms. A suitable financial arrangement was made whereby these student-athletes could also eat their breakfast meal with the other students housed in these dorms. This, we feel, has brought our student-athletes into a closer relationship with the other students on our campus and has enhanced the student support of our athletic program. Our student-athletes are under the same supervisory control as are other students in these dormitory areas. The student body, under the direction of the student council, has helped us greatly in our recruitment program. This still further ties them in with the program of intercollegiate athletics. We feel that the support given our program by the student council, all student organizations, the student press, and the students at large has been outstanding.

We feel that our athletic dining facilities are inadequate, not comparable to the dining and kitchen facilities of the other men students, and certainly not on a par with athletic dining facilities at other Southwest Conference institutions. We feel that this is the major weakness of our physical plant and affects the morale of our athletic teams and the success of our recruitment program. After discussing this problem at length with the Athletic Council, we would like to recommend that an adequate athletic dining facility be built

in the area of Bledsoe and Gordon Halls. We recommend that the facility be so constructed that it could be used for the following purposes.

- 1. Preparation and service of food for the student-athletes.
- 2. Use as a study hall with four smaller areas for tutoring sessions with small groups.
- 3. After-lunch skull sessions. (The football staff meets with the squad immediately following their noon meal for a thirty minute classroom session. This avoids the holding of any "skull sessions" at night.)
- 4. Housing of visiting prospective athletes. (We like to keep these visiting athletes on the campus and foresee how a portion of this facility could be used for temporary housing of visiting athletes during the recruitment period.)

As you gentlemen know, the Department of Athletics is a department on our campus which receives no tax subsidy or appropriated funds. We are not only responsible for making what we spend in the way of salaries and operational costs, but must amortize our building indebtedness, which includes a rather expensive stadium. We must be self-sustaining, and our expenditures must not exceed our income. This has been most difficult to do in years past, and we appreciate the support given this program by the Board of Directors and college Administration during some most difficult years. I am happy to report to you that the Department of Athletics is on a sound financial basis at the present time.

As this report from the Auditor's office shows, we are presently in a position to call in the \$300,000.00 Revenue bond, which can be done on next November 10, 1963.

During the past two years, this department has operated well within its budget, as we will expect to do in the future. Our income has exceeded our expectations during these two years, and we have been able to accumulate some \$170,000.00 in reserve. It is very important that we maintain an adequate reserve, for it is most difficult to accurately anticipate income due to the unforeseeable circumstances with which we might be involved, such as weather, win-loss record and schedule. These elements must be considered both at home and away so we must also consider the strengths and weaknesses of the opponents.

Although we have not received any game reports from our out-of-town football games, we predict that we will receive the anticipated income in football that is shown on our 1962-63 budget. This will be possible as the result of a financial cushion gained from our first three home football games. Basketball income will definitely meet our expectations for the current season.

I feel confident that we will operate soundly within the structure of our 1962-63 athletic budget both in regard to income and expenditures.

### SUMMARY OF THE PAST SEASON RESULTS

Basketball - The basketball team, under the direction of Coach Gene Gibson, earned a S.W.C. co-championship and defeated S.M.U. in a playoff game. The team represented Texas Tech in the N.C.A.A. Regional held in Manhattan, Kansas.

Swimming - The swimming team, coached by Jim McNally, had the best record shown in our participation in that sport. We ended the season in fourth place in the S.W.C. and were a winning team in dual meet participation against strong opposition. Highlight was a victory over Texas at Austin.

Baseball - Coach Berl Huffman led the varsity baseball team to a successful season, winning the most baseball games in Texas Tech's baseball history.

Golf - Without any returning lettermen, Coach Jay McClure's golf team ended up in sixth place in the S.W.C. race. Their highlight performance was defeating the championship A & M Team 5-1 in the last match of the season. Only one letterman will be lost from last year's team.

Track - Some institutional records were broken in track, and
Bob Swafford won the 440 yard hurdles at both the Texas and Kansas Relays.
The team ended its season in seventh place in the S.W.C.

Tennis - Coach George Philbrick with three sophomores and a junior had an outstanding record in tennis. The Texas Tech doubles team won the S.W.C. and represented Texas Tech at Stanford in the N.C.A.A. The team ended its season in third place in the S.W.C.

### SUMMARY OF THE PAST SEASON RESULTS (Continued)

Football - Despite the lack of depth and most unusual physical adversities, the football squad, disciplined as they were, held together with a spirit that was unusual in the face of so many tough breaks. (Twenty-one men of the varsity squad were lost for one or more games due to injuries. This included the first two quarterbacks who were lost for most of the season.) Such must be considered in evaluating the success or failure of a staff or a team.

Those of us who are very close to the situation were disappointed in this season's record but not at all discouraged in the program which is being carried on by Coach King and his staff. We feel that a sound approach is being made and a solid program is evolving which in due time will bring about the football success we all desire for Texas Tech.

Most of the institutions against whom we are competing have built up their varsity squads through a series of "Red Shirt" programs. This is a necessity in present football build-ups. Our varsity squad will be joined by what we all feel to be the strongest frosh team we have ever had here at Texas Tech. It will also be bolstered by eight to ten "red shirts", who are considered to be fine football players.

### OUTLOOK FOR THE COMING YEAR

Basketball - Due to the loss of four outstanding starters from last year's co-championship team, the team naturally will not be as strong. This year's team may surprise some predictors in finishing higher in the Conference than expected. The continued interest is evident by the season ticket sale and by the largest opening game attendance ever (8,300). A strong frosh team will bolster the varsity in 63-64 and another upper bracket or championship contender is in the making.

Swimming - Better times are already being shown by the year's varsity swimming team, which is aided by several strong performances from last year's frosh team.

Tennis - All lettermen have returned from last year's third place team including the championship doubles team which represented the Conference in N.C.A.A. competition last summer.

Golf - Best prospects since the S.W.C. championship team of 1959.
Only one letterman lost from last year's team.

Baseball - Though the baseball team is not competing for S.W.C. championship, a full schedule will be played including some S.W.C. competition. Most of last year's winning team are returning.

Track - Should be improved over last season, but will not be a championship contender. Strong relay team contenders are expected but overall strength will probably not be of upper bracket caliber.

Football - Should be the strongest squad since the Gator Bowl Team of 1953. Some "red shirt" personnel will strengthen the varsity. Anderson, Gatlin, and Lowery are outstanding backs of the "red shirt" squad. Carroll, Dorethy, McLelland, and Bentley should bolster the line. The freshman team will give speed, depth and two of the most highly sought after quarterbacks to the varsity next fall. From this freshman team, there should come a good "red shirt" squad. This will be the first true "red shirt" program that Texas Tech has had.

Much continued work is ahead of us in promoting and building interest in the 1963 football season. It is only natural that this year's record has been a set back. This may be evidenced in our season ticket sale, and certainly, this season's results have delayed a strong option seat sale. We realize that there has been much criticism of our present football staff due to the poor record. We also know that there is much loyalty, praise and understanding of this staff and the rather unusual problems with which they have been confronted. I believe the vast majority of our alumni, friends and supporters desire a sound building program handled in the right way in preference to a flash program built on questionable practices though the latter might have shown more visible results at an earlier date.

We appreciate your loyal support of the continued efforts of our entire staff.

Gentlemen:

When he affixed his signature to the Bill creating the Texas Technological College, Governor Neff said,

"Gentlemen, I look on this act that I have just concluded as one of the greatest accomplishments of my Administration as Govenor of Texas. I sincerely hope that this Technological College will grow and prosper and not only grow into an institution that will benefit the boys and girls and the people of West Texas, but one of which the entire state will be proud, and that it will reflect proper credit upon the Ione Star State of Texas."

This concluded a fight that began in 1896 for the establishment of a State supported institution to be located North of the 29th parallel and West of the 98th meridian.

Nearly all of this area of Texas was described as an arid range land and very sparsely settled. At that time the City of Lubbock had a population of 4500. In a resolution by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in 1920, it was said that because of its location that West Texas, by far the largest area of the State, the sons of West Texas seeking an education find it necessary to matriculate in colleges outside of Texas. The Honorable Clifford B. Jones, a member of the original Board of Directors and the Past President of our school "envisioned Texas Technological College as one of the greatest in Texas and he was certain that these ambitions would be realized because of the spirit of West Texas and of the fine men and women who were to guide its destinies during the formative period". But yet, while the Legislature was still trying to pass a bill to create the school, Representative M. E. Rosser, during the Thirty-seventh legislature gathered some statistics as to the need for such a college, which are as follows:

- 1. Within the boundaries mentioned there are 107 counties and 18 border counties within the same, almost one-half the total counties of the State.
- 2. Within the boundary there are 119,706 square miles, there being 265,780 square miles in the State, thus giving the territory almost one-half the entire area of Texas.
- 3. Within the boundary there is a population of 855,034 people. The population of the entire state is 4,663,228, giving this section approximately one-fourth of the population of Texas.
- 4. The counties within the boundary, as shown by the tax records, have rendered taxable values in the amount of \$972,798,088.00, while the total rendered value of the State was slightly in the excess of 3 billion.

The numbers of counties and the numbers of square miles remain the same today but the population in 1960 had grown to 2,036,279 people, while the counties within this boundary as shown by the tax records of the State Comptroller's Department have rendered taxable values in the amount of \$3,476,076,368.00.

Our school has grown from an enrollment of slightly more than 1,000 students in 1925 to more than 11,000 students now registered at Texas Tech.

While the great band of West Texans were still trying to obtain the college, one special fact pointed out in their brief was that the report of the United States Department of Agriculture showed that out of 3,405,873 bales of cotton produced in the State of Texas in 1916, 1,020,474 were produced in the region known as West Texas, the section that within a decade had been transported from a great cattle region to an agricultural section. Today in only 25 counties surrounding Lubbock there is more cotton produced than in any other producing cotton state.

In the self study report, Dr. Pearce pointed out to this Board that almost from the beginning, Texas Tech gave something to an area

within a 300 mile radius around Lubbock.

Dr. Gates, in his report to this Board, at its August meeting in 1962, reported that the first Doctor's degree was conferred here in 1952 and that we have now awarded 74 Doctorates and that every doctor turned out by this college is currently holding a position of responsibility. He further pointed out, with such a background, that suggestions for strengthening the graduate school and the institution as a whole, should be given much consideration by this Board; saying further that:

"In addition to the new doctoral programs offered in engineering, government, mathematics, physics and business administration, that we should consider further expansion of our school."

In closing, Dr. Gates said to this Board of Directors,

"We too must move resolutely forward without delay, not only in our graduate programs, but in all aspects of the University."

Our own President, Dr. R. C. Goodwin, was quoted in the Avalanche Journal on October 8, 1962, when he said:

"Just as industry constantly revamps its program, so the College changes its curriculum to meet new needs. We can't sit back and wait", said President Goodwin. "We must go ahead, be flexible and ready to shift gears."

When Texas Technological College came into existence,

Southern Methodist University, Baylor University and Texas University
all had law schools. Since that time the following law schools have
been created at the University of Houston College of Law in Houston,
Texas; St. Mary's University Law School, San Antonio, Texas; South
Texas College of Law, Houston, Texas; and Texas South University Law
School in Houston, Texas. There is a distance of 400 miles from Lubbock
to San Antonio, 380 miles to Austin, 352 miles to Waco, 323 miles to
Dallas, and 513 miles to Houston. When Texas Tech came into being
Lubbock had fewer than 15 lawyers. Today there are 232 lawyers in
Lubbock. There were very few lawyers in the outlying counties but now
all of the smaller places, such as Littlefield, Levelland, Brownfield
and others have numbers of lawyers and it is my opinion that a very
large per cent of the lawyers practicing in the area surrounding Lubbock
have gone to one of the four above named schools for their legal education.

Had a law school been established at Tech this would not have been necessary. According to the November, 1962, Texas Bar Journal all of the law schools in Texas have shown great gains, percentagewise, in enrollment.

The Board, in its May, 1962, meeting, authorized a study for the establishment of a law school at Texas Tech. The foregoing is information regarding the area. Attached hereto are resolutions from various bar associations in West Texas that have recommended that we establish a law school at Texas Tech. Also attached is a Resolution from the Lubbock certified public accountants supporting the founding of a law school at Tech. Attached hereto are letters from various law book companies, who have already voiced their desire to help start a law library at Tech gratis from their respective companies.

In the spirit of the statement made by our own President,.
Dr. Goodwin,

"We can't sit back and wait. We must go ahead, be flexible and ready to shift gears,"

it is now my pleasure to make a motion that permission be requested from the Commission on Higher Education to the end that we may at the earliest possible date establish a law school at Texas Tech. Mr. Chairman, I so move.

WITNESSETH: That for and in consideration of the payments and agreements hereinafter mentioned, to be made and performed by the Party of the First Part (Owner), and under the conditions expressed in the bond bearing even date herewith, the said Party of the Second Part (Contractor), hereby agrees with said Party of the First Part (Owner) to commence and complete the construction of certain improvements described as follows:

Sanitary sewer improvements for Texas Technological College as shown on sheets 1 to 6, inclusive, of plans entitled "Texas Technological College, Sanitary Sewer Improvements" dated October 1962, and as specified in the attached specifications and at the unit and lump sum prices stated in the proposal and all extra work in connection therewith, under the terms as stated in the General Conditions of the Agreement; and at his (or their) own proper cost and expense to furnish all the materials, supplies, machinery, equipment, tools, superintendence, labor, insurance, and other accessories and services necessary to complete the said construction, in accordance with the conditions and prices stated in the Proposal attached hereto, and in accordance with all the General Conditions of the Agreement, and in accordance with the Plans, which includes all maps, plats, blue prints, and other drawings and printed or written explanatory matter thereof, and the Specifications therefor, as prepared by Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, Consulting Engineers, Lubbock, Texas, herein entitled the Engineer, each of which has been indentified by the endorsement of the Contractor and the Engineer thereon, together with the Contractor's written Proposal, the General Conditions of the Agreement,

and the Construction Bond hereto attached; all of which are made a part hereof and collectively evidence and constitute the entire contract.

The Contractor hereby agrees to commence work within ten (10) days after the date written notice to do so shall have been given to him, and to substantially complete same --

a. on or before March 15, 1963

The Owner agrees to pay the Contractor in current funds for the performance of the contract in accordance with the Proposal submitted therefor, subject to additions and deductions, as provided in the General Conditions of the Agreement, and to make payments on account thereof as provided therein.

## RESOLUTION

Because of the importance of water to Texas and the Nation;

Because there is a critical need for more research and a more concentrated effort to solve the water problems of the High Plains;

And because Lubbock is situated in a strategic position from the standpoint of water resources and problems -

It is proposed that an Annual Water Conference or Water Congress be held at Texas Technological College for the purpose of bringing together scientists, technicians, and other persons interested in the water problem to discuss, coordinate and plan activities to make more productive use of money and manpower and to focus attention on water for the future of West Texas and the Nation.

It is further proposed that an Advisory Committee be formed to aid in planning and conducting this conference and that this advisory committee be constituted of representatives from agencies and groups with an active interest in, and concern for, water in West Texas.

Confirmation having been received from many of the suggested members of this proposed advisory committee; it is hereby proposed that the date of Friday, February 1, 1963 be designated as the date for the First Annual Water Conference at Texas Technological College.
