¹A hoca is the preacher and religious leader of a Muslim community. In pre-Republican times he was also a teacher, for education was then the responsibility of the clergy. In the modern era schoolteachers are required to have secular rather than religious training. For sentimental reasons, however, a teacher or professor may still be called hoca. For centuries Nasreddin Hoca has been Turkey's most beloved comic folk character. He is featured in countless folktales.

²Tamerlane (1336-1405) was a Turkic-Mongol leader who built an empire in central Asia. In English he is called Tamerlane or Tamburlaine; in Turkish (as in this tale) he is called Timur Lenk (Timur the Lame).
