is held to bail by an Examining Court the person
who holds the Examining Court should receive from the
Commonwealth not only the costs per day but for
all the bonds; subpoenas, recognizances etc. the same
as circuit clerks receive -

2 days (all day) for which I only received \$2.00 -

There are other matters about which I have not time to write -

The law requires an execution to be directed to the officer
who executed the summons - I had ^{an ex.} issued directed to the
Coroner who lives in Springville and he did not make his
appearance for more than a week - I thought perhaps the law
should be so amended that
"When an officer, who executes the original process in a suit in circuit
or County Court shall fail to call at the office of the Clerk for
the execution when it is due the execution may be directed
to another officer"

Ireland
Frankfort Ky.

Having within the last week or two days measurably recovered from my sick spell I have felt considerably filled with the spirit of talking writing about the current topics of the day. as the state of the Country. the action of Congress and particularly of an Legislature. What I shall say may however be of but little use and so far as I say it may help a hero, however I venture far as I have heard during for the last few days to impress upon you the reading. a penitent letter. We had, however, no other kind of gain Sepia we have greatly disappointed in getting Frankfort paper. I have not & I hear the same complaint from others gather the half of mine. We have, therefore, lost the connection of the accounts of your proceedings

July 13th 1863

Yesterday I got the Truth paper
of the 7th for with your proceedings
as late as the 6th there was and
things in it that greatly surprised
me! You had impressed us with the
idea that nothing but highly
conservative action would
lead from the Compromised sec
Fed Relations. The news papers
as far as we could see them
did the same. Yet strange to say
after all this, we find Mr. Fr.
Wulf. the Gov. of Louisville -
Reporting from that Committee, and
(he supposed with the sanction of
a majority of it,) Resolutions
for a Conv. of delegates from Ky
to meet at Louisville, with others
from Ind. Illinois and other states
to take into Consideration - what -
the state of the Country & the best way
of having about peace! So they
say - But in fact, the object has
to find out and mature the best
& most feasible way to break up
the Union, the nation and the forms
- now of a Western or Mississippi
Republics, in the view of that

Arch Demagogue & Scoundrel, led
Vallandigham - God preserved by from
any more Conventions - Has she not
had enough of them in the failure of
the one at Washington & the Border State
Convention? Is this plan sanctioned
by the Union men of your body?
I hope not. Can they see that
it is full of evil. Habit is a master
and taking of the South to drag her
into the rebellion has indeed the whole
North West. Have not our Union
men long since learned that the only
way to put down this rebellion is to
fight and break its military power.
Captain Thang or Dring and all the
Country its leaders. Can they see
that this rebellion is contrived &
conducted by a few leaders. Not over
a hundred, ~~that~~ when they are
broken down the Major will by
the force of circumstances & by
necessity as well as a desire for
the Union return & thus alleggeinse

and in this manner the Union. There is no
other way to save it. If the Major will
not do so. if enough of people in each

State will not allow their leaders and caught

Then it will be time for us to debate
the questions of Compensation, separation
by treaties or Congress soon to
preserve the Territorial integrity or
entirely of the nation -

But if, Conventions are the order of
the day with our Union party. I shall
well say in the misery & despair of
my soul: When shall I go? with
Whom shall I act? What shall I
do? Fight them damned insipid
stages of treason. Already the secede
say it is the only sensible act of
secession. Until this hour which may
the wind blows - Is it not enough to
open the eye of Unionists. Then by all
of the sacred ties that bind you
to your native land. fight them
wrathful thus now. As we are assured
since writing the above - on Friday. which
I lack away. Forget to finish to
put in the office. I am an Sunday the

15th how to give you a list of news.
Yesterday the 14th by a general
understanding & concert there was
a meeting of the Disunionists of

Rev. J. S. C. was put in the background.

From the evidences of the persons in
Iowa there was a pretty general ~~consensus~~
~~of the party.~~ All but those who
have not openly spoken, were here
I regret to have to say. I find that there
were said to be others who we have trusted
Placed upon us. Missouri or Mr H Murphy
this day. James John Gray Sam Brown
Frank Martin from off ~~land~~
~~The whole Capper Head force in the lower~~
Batture. except Neal Merring & Mr J.
McLennan says more than Jerry Davidson
& A Merring were the Chief speakers
Jerry took bald Vandank and grumos.
I learn that G E Red. Adams & Billy
Biggs will be the Chief contestants for
Candidate of the Party for the Leg.
The 14th Army has gone back upon Sunday
All the troops from other States have
left. I wish the men at the head of
affairs would bring all of the
troops back into the State & take the
leaders of the others with. I don't fear but
our troops will prove true. Why it went
you into. Bob Rabb says that you
have gotten drugged and something that
has been said & thought went into this
