

LEGION OF MERIT (First Oak Leaf Cluster)

Colonel CHARLES C. UNDERWOOD. Infantry, United States Army, distinguished himself by performance of exceptionally meritorious service during the period July 1966 to February 1972, while serving successively as Deputy Public Affairs Officer, Pacific Command, and Information Officer, Headquarters, United States Army, Pacific. Colonel Underwood's performance of service was characterized by outstanding professionalism, exceptional managerial ability, and administrative expertise. As Deputy Public Affairs Officer, Pacific Command, Colonel Underwood insured that United States and Free World forces were informed of America's efforts to restore stability in the turbulent climate of communist aggression in Asia. He was constantly sought for his guidance and advice in the area of public affairs. He successfully arranged and supported press conferences during PACOM visits of the President of the United States and on two occasions, his meticulous planning and precise actions earned him the personal commendations of the President. At the personal request of CINCUSARPAC, Colonel Underwood became Information Officer for the Army in the Pacific. Under his dynamic leadership, circulation of the Pacific Stars and Stripes surpassed 225,000 copies per day in 1969. His vigorous efforts in support of the Modern Volunteer Army Program resulted in an increased public awareness of the positive aspects of the Army, and enhanced civilian appreciation for the American soldier. In this, Colonel Underwood's final active duty assignment, his performance of duty was typified by the same dedication to duty, diligence, and professionalism which have characterized more than three decades of his honorable military career. His outstanding achievements reflect great credit upon himself, the United States Army, and the military service.

Underwood, Infantry, served meritoriously as Commanding Officer, 1st Armored Rifle Battalion, 51st Infantry, from 19 July 1957 to 30 June 1958, and as Executive Officer, Headquarters Combat Command A, from 1 July 1958 to 27 March 1959. Exhibiting outstanding initiative, organizational ability, and professional competence, Colonel Underwood directed the activities of his battalion in such a manner as to develop its fullest capabilities. His battalion was the first unit of the 2d Armored Division to receive trainees. The results achieved by his battalion in this training mission were outstanding. His professional knowledge of military and administrative matters was further evidenced by the receipt of excellent and superior ratings in the inspections of Logistical Records and the Annual General Inspection of 1958. In addition to outstanding proficiency in training, Colonel Underwood's command achieved outstanding success in athletics. 



The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress, July 20, 1942, has awarded the Legion of Merit to

COLONEL CHARLES C. UNDERWOOD, UNITED STATES ARMY

for exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services:

Colonel Charles C. Underwood, Infantry, distinguished himself by exceptionally meritorious service while serving in a position of responsibility as Chief of Public Information Division, Office of The Chief of Information, Headquarters, Department of the Army, during the period June 1964 to July 1966. Through his skill in developing and executing an improved Army Information Program, Colonel Underwood projected a favorable image of the Army worldwide and provided the public with a greater understanding of the Army's role in the military structure. He was responsible for the over-all coordination of the Army's public information program and achieved equal success as a principal advisor to the Chief of Public Information. During a period characterized by many sensitive situations, including the expansion of the Army with a heavy commitment of troops in Vietnam and numerous Congressional inquiries into Department of Defense actions with accompanying extensive press coverage, he established rare rapport with members of news media through his sound judgment, integrity, and responsiveness. His efforts were also reflected in the formulation of information plans pertaining to many Army activities. Among these were the release of comprehensive information about the Army's airmobile division; the deployment of forces to Vietnam; and research and development programs in the area of antimissile capability. Through his discernment, diplomacy, and resourcefulness, he significantly enhanced the prestige of the United States Army by instilling in the public an awareness of the Army's outstanding record of achievements. Colonel Underwood's distinguished performance of duty and exceptional accomplishments throughout this period are in the finest traditions of the military service and reflect the utmost credit upon himself and the United States Army.
