NONPARTISANSHIP

I would suggest additions so that this section would read as follows (the additions are underlined):

Members of the State Board shall adhere carefully to the nonpartisanship policy of the League of Women Voters of the United States, as set forth in the Local League Handbook and the State Board Handbook. The State President shall be consulted when there is doubt as to interpretation of the nonpartisanship policy.

The Nominating Committee of the State Board shall acquaint prospective nominees with the nonpartisanship policy. Particularly pointed out shall be those areas of the policy in which the interpretation of nonpartisanship depends to a large degree upon circumstances, e.g., political work or governmental service by one's husband.

I would keep the last paragraph of the nonpartisanship section as it is in in the present Policy Guide.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

If it seems desirable to include in the Policy Guide any cautionary remark about answering Local Leagues (as suggested under your heading of "Board Correspondence") I would favor putting this under Public Relations. At the end of the second paragraph a sentence could be added: They shall also be prompt in answering communications. (Underlined to indicate this is an addition). I don't think It's desirable to put in the Policy Guide a detail such as acknowledging receipt of a communication if one can't answer within a few days, but it may be important to include a general reminder of promptness, such as the sentence suggested above. My feeling is that since "utmost tact in making suggestions" to local Leagues is mentioned, perhaps promptness in replying to communications also should be, since it, too, is important to good public relations.

FIELD SERVICE

I think the Field Service Core Committee, with its personnel and its abbreviation (FSCC) should be mentioned in the Policy Guide, but it seems to me that listing material to be sent to non-Board consultants is putting too much detail into the Guide.

I would be in favor of adding "tailored to its needs" after "annually" in the first sentence of the second paragraph. I would suggest, also, that there be inserted between the present second and third sentences of that paragraph a sentence such as this: "Field Service consultants shall keep the state office informed of the dates upon which

they are visiting local Leagues."

A higher minimum fee for provisional Leagues should be set, I think, and also a higher minimum paid-up membership. I would suggest that these be at least \$35 and 35 members, respectively. Quite possibly, \$40 and 40 members would be more realistic. I notice that our local Leagues recognized in 1959-60 and the years since have each had a membership at the time of recognition of considerably more than 40. Similar information as of the time when these Leagues were recognized as provisionals might be helpful in deciding what the minimum should be.

POLICY ON RESERVE FUNDS AND MEMORIAL FUND

Under the sub-heading Reserve Funds, I think mention should be made of when withdrawals should (or shall) be restored. I've thought of the following wording to be added as a second sentence at the end of the third paragraph, but am not really satisfied with it.

Withdrawals from the Reserve Fund should be restored during the next fiscal year, but if there are extraordinary circumstances the Board may prolong the period of restoration.

Perhaps the "should" in the above sentence ought to be "shall". I can think of several types of extraordinary circumstances -- one would be using withdrawals from reserves to establish a revolving fund to finance some unusual program project or to purchase badly-needed, expensive equipment.

Perhaps the Policy Guide should mention, also, that restoration of a withdrawal from reserves should be so designated in the Budget, since it mentions that withdrawals shall be so designated in the Budget.

Under the sub-heading Memorial Fund, I would suggest that the second sentence be changed to read (changes underlined):

This Fund may be used, at the discretion of the State Board, to finance educational projects, with the exception that any portion of the Fund which has its purposes specified by the terms of the gift shall be used only for those purposes.

I'm sure that this is what is meant by the present wording, but the present wording does seem to speak of the Fund as a whole, whereas the Fund would actually develop as a group of separate gifts, some probably having their purpose specified in the terms of the gift, others being unrestricted. Only those portions of the Fund specified for educational projects or unrestricted as to use could be applied to such projects; the rest would have to be used for the purposes specified—and this is what I'm trying to say in the changed wording I suggested above.

BOARD AND COMMITTEE MEETING EXPENSES

I favor putting meals back to \$4 per day.

STATE OFFICE FILES

In the present Policy Guide there's a typegraphical error in the last word of the first sentence--"bienium" should be "biennium".

SOME OTHER SUGGESTIONS AND COMMENTS

I don't think the Policy Guide should contain any deadline for response when the Board is polled. The deadline would vary with the particular situation and should be prominently stated on the communication.

Although I favor a minimum of detail in the Policy Guide, I do think that a sheet of "Procedures", supplementary to the "Guide for New State Board Members", would be helpful. It could cover such matters as how much may one spend on office supplies, copying, ordering publications, etc. without first getting authorization from the state office; more detail to guide one as to who gets copies of the memos etc. one writes (for exemple, should a memo about, say, publications and field service, as was mine of April 6th, have gone to you, Katy, as field service vice-president as well as to the Publications Committee and the state office?) In these "Procedures" could also be specified the material that is to be sent to off-Board field service consultants. And I expect there are a good many other details that it would be helpful to have written down.

P. S. With one running of this I could make two extra carbons, so I'm enclosing them, Katy, in case you want to pass them on to the other vice-presidents.



RE: Blueprint for Planning and other S-LR items

Enclosed in this mailing are these S-LR items: (1) the new publication, Blueprint for Planning; (2) Consensus Questions on planning; (3) a Discussion Guide to the new publication; (4) a copy of SCR 68, a concurrent resolution creating the Planning Agencies Council of Texas; (4) a copy of The Effectiveness of Metropolitan Planning, a recent study prepared by The Joint Center for Urban Studies (Harvard and MIT). The latter is in the president's envelope only because we have just one copy for each League.

We hope that all local Leagues will make extensive use of the new planning publication. It contains both a survey and a discussion of issues -- issues that are the same as the consensus questions. Therefore, it is possible, if time is short and minds weary, to rely entirely upon the publication in League discussion and consensus meetings on planning.

In addition to use within the League, we think the publication should be of interest to many outside the League, including no doubt some of the business and professional people on your contributors' list for the finance drive. We suggest that you give complimentary copies of the new publication to a selected number of persons in your community, such as officials involved in planning and opinion leaders who are interested in planning. If consensus in support of comprehensive planning in Texas is reached later on, the contacts made now with officials and others associated with planning might prove very valuable. Also, the Texas Research League's long-term study of metropolitan government in Texas, including planning, might involve your city. Already one League has been contacted in connection with the study.

Copies of the new publication will be sent by the SO to a selected group of state officials and other leaders holding positions in state organizations. We plan to send to local Leagues a list of these persons to avoid duplication.

Several times this year it has been observed that our S-LR CA item is unusually timely, but it bears repeating. Bollens and Schmandt in a new book on The Metropolis say, "No subject on the metropolitan agenda has received more attention in recent years than planning." And there are many who believe that the problems of the metropolis are next only to the problems of peace on mankind's agenda today.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION #68 --- STATE OF TEXAS --- May 27, 1965 Introduced by Senator Richter

WHEREAS, The economy of Texas has enjoyed an unprecedented boom for more than a decade, and there is every indication that this surge in growth and development will continue if needs of the more than nine-and-a-half million citizens of the State are to be met; and

WHEREAS, Through the years the Texas Legislature has given statutory planning authority to a number of state departments and agencies, many of which have programs and plans giving promise of untold improvements and resulting advantages to Texans, but there is no convenient "clearing house" for these ideas, no central agency to coordinate activities into a unified, overall program which could efficiently eliminate over-lapping or conflicting operations; and

WHEREAS, There is a great need for a central planning agency, a coordinating body which has the authority to review and unify such state efforts for improvement as may be underway or envisioned--adequate water supply; new parks and other recreation facilities; transportation plans, including highways and public transit; other programs involving the use of federal, state and local funds, such as the President's anti-poverty program; and the broad scope of projects designed to benefit Texas citizens; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, By the Senate of the State of Texas, the House of Representatives concurring, That a Planning Agency Council for Texas be, and it is hereby, created to serve as the official coordinating planning agency for the State; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Planning Agency Council for Texas shall initially include the following member agencies: the State Department of Health; the Texas Highway Department; the Texas Industrial Commission; the Parks and Wildlife Department; the State Soil Conservation Board; the Texas Employment Commission; the Railroad Commission of Texas; and the Texas Water Development Board. Additional state agencies may be added to the Council by proposal of the Governor and approval of a majority of member agencies; and be it further

RESOLVED, That each member agency shall be represented at meetings of the Council by the administrative head of the agency; however, the administrative head may designate a planning representative from his agency to serve on planning committees of the Council. Personnel of the Governor's Office shall perform all administrative and coordinative duties of the Council, but no additional compensation shall be paid to these employees or to officials and employees of member agencies for any additional duties resulting from their activities in connection with the Council; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Planning Agency Council for Texas shall have the authority to contract for, accept and expend gifts, grants, allocations or matching funds from any source, public or private, state, local or federal, for use in planning for the economic development of this State and its political subdivisions, and the Council may arrange for services with any state agency or agencies for the development of comprehensive plans through procedure provided by the Interagency Cooperation Act; and be it further

RESOLVED, That immediately following the adoption of this Resolution, the Council shall begin the preparation of a unified development plan whereby the State of Texas can define, establish and promote the common goals that will best serve the interests of all Texas citizens, and shall present to the Legislature periodically such reports and proposals as may be developed to this end.


