Dear Mrs. Yeary,

The League in Lubbock has gone into action on their Local Current Agenda item which has been a KYC Survey.

We are enclosing newspaper clippings which give a complete story of the situation in our County Government.

At the last election the League realized that the County Judge had "stacked" the court with his men. (He paid all election fees for one of the men to run in opposition to one of the commissioners who was up for re-election, and actively campaigned for him.) We have been closely following the action of the court since that time.

To give you a little background, we are in our fourth year of conducting our KYC survey. We have had these reports, which consisted of personal interviews of county officials by a wide range of individual league members, attendance at all meetings of the Commissioners Court by many different league members, in our U it discussion groups and printed in our bulletins. Out of these have come many areas of agreement. At our General meeting in January, we voted unanimously to make it an action item.

I will say this, it is the best thing FOR our League you can imagine. We have never done anything, in our community, except our Voters Service and informing the public on issues, and we have, of course, reached only a small number of elippings. You can see by the newspaper coverage that we have had complete coverage and that the people in Lubbock are very much aware that there is a league here.

It just so happened that we were having a general meeting the next day after the second raise of county officials were announced. Our KYC chairman and I began to discuss the situation and to notify members of the discussion to come before them. Somehow the newspaper, radio, and T. V got wind and were we covered in full at our meeting!

The only information we gave to each medium, before the meeting, was that we were having the meeting, the salary increases would be discussed in conjunction with the other

needs of the county, that the membership would decide, by a majoriety vote what action, if any, would be taken. This was after we were contacted by them, of course, and the day before our meeting. You can see by the big headlines "OPFOSITION TO!" that they paid not the slightest attention to our statement. However it was carried correctly both by radio and T. V.---and later by the newspaper.

We are enclosing a copy of our petition along with our "Statement of Position" which will be presented at the court on February 12th, the public hearing required by law.

about a thousand names, and no effort on our part. We have had letters, telephone calls and contributions. (one check for \$100.00) Here is just one quote from a letter, and we could give you many, many more:

We have had a tremendous response to the petition----

"I sincerely trust that you will follow through on this and even extend your efforts to checking the merits and demerits of other phases of local government."

We will say, too, that we have had only calls against what we have done, and one threat to "life or limb" out of the hundreds of calls we have received. (See enclosed clippings.)

We hope to end this on Tuesday by our dignified statement and the petitions.

We are also including clippings of other things that have happened since we started this in order that you may get a complete picture. We have taken no part and made no statement regarding these events. (Real League-like!) Also we believe that we have been with-in the policies laid out by State and National on all action taken.

This has had far reaching effects. The Post Dispatch of Post, Texas had an editorial on it, Snyder, Texas has heard about it, and a man from Plainview, Texas came to see us to see how we conducted our study. He said for years the y had been aware of the evils in their County Government, but until they saw what an organized group could do,

## CONTINUEING RESPONSIBILITIES

Our Know Your County Survey was put on Continuing Responsibilities last March. Since that time we have not done very much except to distribute our booklets to the public and make several talks before various study clubs. Two organizations I think of at the present moment are the Lubbock Jr. Womens Club and the Legal Secretaries Association..... Also, the Daughters of Amnity. Our talks were very well received. One club member of the Lubbock Jr. Womens Club said that frankly they had thought this program would be very dull and it turned out to be the most interesting program they had ever had.

In August of last year the county raised the taxes in our city on all real estate property. One man to whom we had sold one of our booklets was very upset over the proposed increase particularily after he had read our booklet showing the descrepancies in taxes between rural and urban property. Practically overnight he organized a group of citizens numbering over 100 and appeared before the Commissioner's Court protesting the increase. This appearance before the Court had its benefits in that the commissioners are aware that the people are very upset. A new county judge was elected and took office in January. One of his main proposals was to promise to see what he could do about the tax rate... and I think something will be done.

Our very worthwhile president of the League did not think it wise that we, as League members, should appear with this group. She pointed out that we had accomplished our purpose - educating the citizens to participate in affairs of government. We feel very humble yet proud that we promoted this interest in our own local county affairs.

In January, at the very first meeting of the new Commissioners Court our League presented a resolution to the Court urging them to keep a more accurate record of all business transacted at each meeting of the Commissioners Court. This resolution they unaminously adopted.

We are urging all our members and particularily our new members to go observe meetings of the Commissioners Court so that they will become better acquainted with the proceeding of such court.

## A LETTER TO YOUR CONGRESSMAN? MAKE IT COUNT

A letter to your congressman or senator (or for that matter to your governor or a local official) will have a better chance of receiving serious attention if you follow these rules, based on those that the National Education Association suggests to its members.

DO know your legislator's full name and address - DON'T guess at the spelling.

DO use plain or personal stationery - DON'T send mimeographed circulars, form letters or printed forms, which get little or no attention.

DO know what you're talking about -DON'T base your letter on rumors or unverified statements or figures.

DO identify clearly any bill that you mention, if possible by name and number - DON'T use a vague or general description that might apply to any of several pieces of legislation.

DO be concise when presenting the facts -DON'T be wordy but don't leave out any really important details.

DO be sincere and courteous - DON'T use flowery terms or threatening language.






The LWV will operate a booth at the Fair for the purpose of demonstrating a voting machine and distributing publications.

LET'S ALL ATTEND! in Lacember there appeared an editorial in "The Avalanche-Journal" titled "Let the Citizens Decide". The Voting Machine Committee felt that this editorial should be answered. The Committee met with Mrs. Robert Casperson and prepared an answer which it thought would be of great interest to all members of the Lubbock League. This letter may answer some questions you will be asked, so—we are reproducing it for you—

Dear Mr. Guy:

The Lubbock League of Wemen Voters would like to thank you for your most excellent editorial of December 19 regarding voting machines.

We have the following comments to make in regard to your observations:


- County Commissioners Court submit to the people a referendum ballot to determine whether the majority of the citizens of the county preferred voting machines. Our request was denied, and the Court suggested that we circulate petitions. The League's purpose in following this suggestion is two-fold. First, to try to premote the right of every citizen to a secret ballot as guaranteed by the Federal and State Constitutions. Second, to determine how many other citizens in addition to League members are interested in safeguarding this right. To date, we have approximately 3,000 names on our petitions. Many bond elections have carried by fewer votes than this number. The names on the petitions represent a highly intelligent and civic minded segment of our population—persons certainly aware that voting machines are not free and who are concerned more with protection against corruption, protection of the purity of the ballot, the upholding of the law, rather than with the relatively small cost of putting machines in every voting box.
- 2. We certainly realize that the purchase of voting machines will involve the expenditure of county funds. However, we believe that voting machines will pay for themselves in a relatively short period of time. County Judge Milton D. Richardson of Edinburg, Texas, whose county used machines for the first time in the November general election states in a recent letter to us: "They (the voting machines) cut the cost of holding the election almost half in two.

  This was the smoothest election we have ever held. . . Hidalgo County had complete returns from all boxes by 9:30 p.m. on the day of the election. Here-tofore we have spent all night and up until the next day tabulating results."

- May we mention a number of past bond leaves that our citizens have passed which have not raised taxes at all or very little;
  - a. School Bond Election, 1959 \$8,500,000 No increase in taxes, 3,222 votes cast
  - b. City Bond Election, 1960 \$11,900,000 No increase in taxes, approximately 5,592 votes cast
  - c. County Bond Issue, 1955 \$1,897,000 Eventually reised taxes 3¢ per \$100 valuation, approximately 1500 votes cast
- 4. There seemed to be some doubt in your editorial as to whether the League would present its petitions to the Court. After seven years of hard work on this project we are certainly not attempting to rush the Court into a quick decision. Our present plan is to present the petitions sometime in the Spring. If the present Commissioners do not see fit to act on this issue, perhaps future Commissioners will see the need for voting machines.
- 5. The \$200,000 pecessary to purchase machines seems small indeed in comparison to a two million dollar annual county budget. League members, as housewives and taxpayers are certainly concerned with and conscious of how our tax dollar is spent. For this reason we are asking, on our petitions, that the county purchase machines for only the three largest boxes at this time and that the other machines be added later.
- 6. We of the League believe that the Commissioners are making a step in the right direction in providing election booths for citizens. But we feel that they, the commissioners, must realize to uphold the law that these booths must be provided for every voter—not just a select few. A county cannot provide booths plus tables and still abide by the Texas Election Law. If this law is impractical we suggest that county officials go to the State Legislature and have it changed, for it is better to change a law than to break it.

Petitions containing 2, 490 names of qualified voters were presented at County Commissioners Court, February 27th.

The League members attending were Mesdames Robert P.

Jackson, Frank H. Chappell, Jr., R. T. Frederiksen, Wright Kerr, John Rountree, George Wimberley, Basil Mess, and Bob Casperson. The League asked that the Commissioners Court give a carefully considered decision to the request made by the citizens for voting machines.

The voting machine has been at Dunbar High School and has been used for actual voting for candidates at a school election. On February 28th, Mrs. Paul Prior demonstrated the machine and discussed our work with it to the Dunbar PTA. The voting machine will be moved this week to the Texas Tech campus. It will be placed in the west end of the Student Union Building where it can be used for demonstrations to groups of college people. A question will be placed on the machine for voting-possibly, "Do you want the name of Texas Technological College changed to Texas Technological University?"



All units agreed that Local Current Agenda items adopted last year should be continued, and felt that no new item should be introduced. One unit suggested that if the membership did wish to adopt a new item, it would recommend study of County Home Rule. This is a non-recommended item since it is covered by State Item I.

LCA I. Continuation of the League Know Your Schools Survey and use of the information to further the community awareness of its responsibility for education. This will include continued study of administration and curriculum, and preliminary study of finances.

LCA II. Continued support of measures to secure and use voting machines in Lubbock County, and improvement of local voting procedures.

LCA III. A compilation and distribution of results of City Charter study.
