to prepare resolutions on the death of Comrade
O. Pamphre, beg leave to submit the following
to wit: Comrade O. Pamphre, was born
in New Orleans, La. in Oct. 1827. Enlisted
in "Co A" Waul's Legion at Galveston, Texas, in
1861. He first enlisted at Galveston, Texas,
in E. B. Nichols' Regt. of Light of State troops
for six months, was elected 1st Lieut. in
Capt. Bobbing's Co. served out his term of en-
listment and was honorably discharged.
He then enlisted in "Co A" Waul's Texas
Legion, for the war, - was elected Capt. of
the company, which was known as the
Galveston Lone Star Rifles, and served as
such to the close of the war in 1865.
Therefore, be it resolved that he was a true
and loyal soldier, a good citizen and
a worthy member of R. E. Lee Camp
U. C. V. No. 158. He died Oct 28" 1909
