Gober's asked me to write you if you possible could buy 10 lbs. Arsenic or other poison to kill Jumbo's as they can't get any at Rule or Sagerton. What little they get is gone as soon it comes in and if a man isn't there there at that moment he doesn't get any. If it comes more rain, maybe


you can sent it by mail.

Dear Mrs Hickey:

Has Mr. Hickey come back to Brandenburg or do you know where I can reach him? Have written him several letters to Dallas Co State Hotel and they have been returned to me marked "Left this hotel on the 28<sup>th</sup>" also a letter that was forwarded by you was returned here and I again sent it to the State Hotel but it hasn't come back yet.

It may be a hard blow for you to see Mr. Hickey suffer by going first in jail but it has given the Rebel a boom as nothing ever did before. We are kept busy here now day and night trying to keep up with the new names that are piling in. Today we received about 200 new ones and every day the past week from 100 to 200

If that keeps up much longer we  
may get out of debt and then  
can begin to live like human  
beings instead of slaves.

It seems it takes war and  
such horrible things to wake  
up the fool people.

Palestine Teaks, June 5th, 1917.

Dear Comrade:- If you think the story about the arrest of myself, comrades B.B.Walston, J.W.Huddleston, Nute Huddleston and Jack Billingsly will be of any interest to Rebel readers, here it is.

On the morning of May 31st, between the hours of six and seven o'clock, while my good wife was getting breakfast ready, some one knocked at my front door and I went to answer the call.

When I opened the door there stood both a deputy sheriff and a deputy U.S. marshall and after I had been introduced to and shook hands with Deputy marshall I.S.S.Lyons, he told me that he had a warrant for my arrest and read the same to me. I was told the warrant had been sworn out by a secret service man, whose name I do not now remember. In fact the warrant itself contained that information, I inquired of Mr Lyons, whether I could make bond immediately and thereby avoid going to jail. To which he replied that he would have to take me to Tyler Texas, where a U.S.Commissioner would attend to that matter. He said he would have to lock me up in the jail here in Palestine until he attended to some more work, which was the arresting of the above named comrades who live several miles in the country, near Slocum, this county. Accordingly I was taken over and lodged in jail before seven o'clock in the morning. The jail was a portable affair some seven or eight feet wide by about thirty feet long, divided into three sections or cells; two cells containing six bunks each and one, being without bunks, was used as a sort of rest room for alleged conspiritors, lunatics and other dangerous characters.

When I arrived there was already present one white man and five negroes two of whom was as crazy as a donk politician and just about as noisy.

The place had an odor that was very offensive, The county jail is undergoing repairs and it was this that was responsible for us being placed in the one on wheels; though I shall always feel that those in whose custody we were that day could have made the day less miserable had they been disposed to do so. About eleven o'clock the other boys were brought in and then we were very uncomfortable from being crowded. Some where near five o'clock in the afternoon we were taken out and marched to the I.& G.N. depot where a curious crowd gathered to view our remains; but we didn't remain a great while. I have been told that some of this large and inthusiastic crowd ventured the cheerful suggestion that we should be shot upon the spot. This might have been because they were half shot themselves.

However some of our good friends and comrades spoke words of cheer and we were sure that their sympathy was worth ten thousand times more than those poor souls whose sarcastic smiles betrayed their servile servility to the existing order. The trip to Tyler was without any special incident.

We arrived there about 8.20 P.M. and were permitted to have supper in a restraraunt before being locked up. This jail is sanitary and we were comfortable here, though the food was very poor. On Saturday ~~June~~ 2nd, a Mr. J.L.Taff, who says that he is a minister of the gospel, was placed in jail.

He says that a U.S.marshall working in Upshur County attempted to induce L.A.Latch, sheriff of Upshur County, to go out and arrest certain parties, and that Mr Latch told the U.S.marshall that these men would come in and give themselves over to the authorities simply by being notified, but that he (Latch) would arrest them if he was furnished with warrants. Mr. Taff also says, that this Marshall intimated that it was crime against the U.S government to have contributed funds to the defense of Thos. J.Mooney.

Mr Taff says that he was placed in jail Monday May the 12th, 1917, at Gilmer Texas, without a warrant and that he remained ther until Saturday, June the 2nd, 1917, when Deputy U.S.Marshall,Lyons, came to Gilmer, read a warrant to him charging conspiracy against the government and brought him to Tyler. Mr Taff also says, that Uncle Bud Lyons volunteered the information that there would be no more socialist after the war. Which is probably unofficial and only Uncle Bud's private opinion about the matter.

When it became deffinitely known that we were in jail in Tyler, that grand old warrior of the revolution, W.J.Bell, together with his good wife and B.F.Bell, got very busy and communicated with comrade W.A.Stanley, also of Smith county, who generously and wholeheartedly united his efforts with the others and caused the big iron doors to clang open so that one of our

number could go free. All the boys spoke up at once and said it should be me. Comrade Jack Billingsly had been turned out the day before, his brother having arranged for his bond, since then comrades J.W. & Nute Huddleston have been released on bond, but at this writing comrade B.B. Walston is still in jail. However, it will be only a question of a few days until he, too, is again free.

Words are absolutely inadequate to express my appreciation of the friendship shown by our Tyler comrades. Such friendship exists only among those who have caught a glimpse of the future and is utterly unknown to the sycophants who crawl at the feet of their political and industrial masters.

During my stay in the Palestine jail I wrote a letter to Ernest Meitzen and addressed it to The Rebel. I passed it out through the bars with the request that it be mailed; But I am since informed that it was not mailed.

This letter contained absolutely nothing which was false or indecent nor yet any information concerning the movements of the army or navy. Furthermore I inquired twice of Deputy marshall Lyons whether this letter had been mailed and he replied in the affirmative. All this, and I will take a bible oath and I hope I may drop dead before I finish writing this paragraph, if I have ever advised anybody, inside or outside The F.&L.P.A., not to register for conscription.

Now Tom I know that this letter is altogether too long and I realize that this incident is only one of many that is happening now since the dogs of war have been unloosed in America. But I have given the facts to you and if you can use them for the benefit of the cause, well and good, if not, no harm has been done, I hope.

Sir Walter Scott's spirit told me to revise his famous verse, Love of Country, so here it is,

Breathes there a man with soul so dead  
Who never to himself hath said  
This is my own, my inherent class,  
Whose heart within him ne'er hath burned  
As of injustice he hath learned  
While moving through the troubled mass

If such there breath, go mark him well  
For him no minstrel raptures swell  
High though his sal'ry and well advertesed his name  
Boundless his influence, as politician can claim  
Despite those titles conferred by pilfered wealth  
The wretch, concentered all in self  
living shall forfeit fair renoun  
And doubly dieing shall go down  
To that vile dust from whence he sprung  
Having been permitted to die naturally when he should have been hung.




