Galbraith will address students and faculty at 7:15 p.m.

Saturday (April 8) in Lubbock Municipal Auditorium. His topic will be "A Modern Foreign Policy."

A business analyst as well as a teacher and author, the towering (6-ft. 8-in.) educator has won both kudoes and criticisms for his outspoken comments on economic policies in the U.S. and abroad. He speaks from a wealth of experience gained in government posts, writing non-technical books for the lay public, as an editor of Fortune Magazine, as a key figure in the presidential campaigns of Adlai E. Stevenson, and as ambassador to India from the spring of 1961 to mid-1963.

He has been lauded for his trenchant writing and caustic wit and challenged for his recommendations as deputy administrator of the Office of Price Administrator in the 1940's.

A native of Ontario, Canada, Galbraith has lived in the United States since coming here shortly after receiving his BA degree from the University of Toronto in 1931 to study economics on a scholarship at the University of California at Berkeley, where he earned master's and PhD degrees.

After a year at Cambridge University, England, as a Social Science Research Fellow and a teaching stint at Princeton University, he entered government service in 1938 as economic adviser and assistant to Chester Davis, agricultural member of the National Defense Advisary Committee, a job which led to the OPA appointment and other government positions.

Following World War II, he became director of the State

Department Office of Economic Security Policy, which took charge of
the economic affairs of Germany and Japan. He also served as
consultant to the Department of Agriculture, the National Resources

Planning Board, the Council of Economic Advisors, the National
Security Resources Board, the Selective Service Administration and
(More)

the American Farm Bureau Federation.

In 1949, he returned to Harvard as professor of economics, and to writing the books which have won a wide readership in colleges and universities and among the lay public.

His best known works are "American Capitalism," "The Great Crash, 1929," "The Affluent Society," "The Liberal Hour," "Economics and the Art of Controversy," and "American Capitalism," the last named an analysis of the problem of market regulation and power in the modern capitalist society.

Galbraith has long been active in Democratic Party affairs, serving on Stevenson's campaign staff in 1952 and 1956, on the Democratic Advisory Council from 1956-60, and on the convention staff of President John F. Kennedy in 1960.

In recent years, he has been a frequent spokesman for American liberals on both foreign and domestic policy.

Prof. Galbraith is a Fellow of the National Institute of Arts and Letters, and a member of the Century Association and the Federal City Club of Washington.

Since that time he has been with Lockheed. Of particular renown is his work with numerical methods in matrix computation. In a recent text, a major section is devoted to "The Method of E. Hansen." Dr. Hansen's symposium subject deals with that sector of interval analysis applying to differential equations and matrix computation.

A journalist by profession, Haney joined National Aeronautics and Space Administration Headquarters in 1958. He was appointed news director in 1960 and worked primarily on the formulation of public information policy on Project Mercury. Since 1962 he has been Public Affairs Officer for MSC.

He is responsible for over all planning and direction of public affairs activity within MSC and is in a position to know what error control in digital computing means to this nation's manned space flight program.

Other speakers for the morning session will be Jack Donaldson, director of the Computer Center at the Southwest Center for Advanced Studies in Dallas and Ray Boche, a systems engineer at Tech Computer Center.

Donaldson also is a scientist with the Southwest Center of Research, Division of Atmospheric Space Sciences. His two degrees are in physics and he is currently a doctoral candidate at Texas Christian.

Boche, former supervisor of computer operations for Lockheed, holds bachelors and master's degrees in mathematics from California State Polytechnic College and San Jose State. He has wide experience in the use of the digital computer for the solution of scientific and engineering problems.

Appearing on the program for the afternoon session will be George K. Bennett, head of systems programming and software systems at the Tech Computer Center; Dr. Henry Decall, who directs mathematical research and theoretical analysis at the Manned Spacecraft Center; and Dr. Thomas L. Jordan, leader of a group in charge of central computing facilities for the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory.

Louise Keller of Chula Vista, Calif., will direct the planning phase of the project. Dr. Ann Buntin, head of Tech's Department of Home Economics Education, is resident director, and Mrs. Thelma Whigham, graduate student, is research assistant.

Miss Keller's recent experience as consultant in the U.S. Office of Education, Vocational Education Division, makes her services especially helpful in planning for the development of the curriculum materials laboratory at Tech, said Home Economics Dean Willa Vaughn Tinsley. Miss Keller also is a former state supervisor of Home Economics Education in Iowa, Missouri, Montana and Vermont.

Major purpose of the planning phase, Dean Tinsley explained, will be to define the scope, content and over-all design of the proposed center aimed at developing, producing and distributing instructional materials for use in training programs supported by the Vocational Education Act of 1963.

These occupational training programs in home economics are designed to prepare high school age students for employment in such areas as helpers in child care centers, food service aides, assistants in motel and hotel housekeeping and as alteration assistants in dry cleaning shops and ready-to-wear stores.

Materials of this type are not currently available for the use of home economics teachers in developing competencies needed by trainees for employment in home economics related occupations, Dean Tinsley said.
