LINDALE, SMITH COUNTY, TEXAS,

Is a Village of about four hundred inhabitants, on the International & Great Northern Railroad, twelve miles North of the city of Tyler, the County-Seat of Smith County, in latitude 32 degrees and 30 minutes, longitude 18 degrees and 20 minutes west from Washington City, D. C. Altitude about 700 feet, being one of the highest points between the Gulf of Mexico and Red River, in Eastern Texas. It is near the centre of Eastern Texas.

The writer, having spent the last few years in the famous fruit growing State of California, and being acquainted in the fruit growing States of the East, asserts without the least fear of successful contradiction that Eastern Texas offers more inducements to Fruit Growers than any other portion of the United States. The soil is of superior quality for general agricultural purposes, and is peculiarly adapted to fruits and vegetables. The health of this section is phenomenally good. Our schools are of the first order. Our church facilities are most ample, while the social and moral status of our community is all that any honest, law-abiding man could desire. The citizens are noted for their energy, industry, sobriety, morality and true Texas hospitality.
