LUBBOCK --- One of the nation's top men in the National Aeronautics and Space Administration will be the featured speaker at the American Society of Engineering Education meeting Friday and Saturday (April 6-7) at Texas Tech.

Dr. Homer E. Newell, Office of Space Sciences director of the NASA in Washington, D. C., will speak on "Why Space?" at the Friday night banquet.

More than 150 engineering professors from New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas will participate in the southwest section ASEE meeting.

Newell became assistant director for space sciences in October, 1958, and was named director in November, 1961.

He received both the A.B. and Master of Arts in Teaching degrees from Harvard University and the Ph.D. in mathematics from the University of Wisconsin.

In addition to numerous teaching positions at Wisconsin and the University of Maryland, he was ground instructor in navigation with the Civil Aeronautics Administration from 1942-43.

Dr. Newell joined the Naval Research Laboratory in 1944 and became head of the Rocket Sonde Branch in 1947, in which position he was in direct charge of the rocket upper air research program at NRL.

In 1955 he was named acting superintendent of the Atmosphere and Astrophysics Division, which included the Rocket Sonde, Radio Astronomy, Atmospheric Electricity and Aerology branches. He was also science program coordinator for Project Vanguard, the U.S. artificial earth satellite program.

He has been and is a member of a number of scientific committees, including the special subcommittee on the Upper Atmosphere of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics and the Rocket and Satellite Research Panel, of which he is now chairman.

Dr. Newell is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, scholastic honorary, Sigma Xi, graduate research honorary, Research Society of America, the American Geophysical Union and the American Rocket Society. He is a fellow of the American Assn. for the Advancement of Science.

Newell is the author of numerous scientific papers and books. He is executive vice chairman of the technical panel on rocketry of the U.S. National Committee for the International Geophysical Year and is a member of the USNC's technical panel on the Earth Satellite Program.

Other principal speakers for the two-day meeting include Dr. L. E. Grinter, graduate school dean at the University of Florida; and Dr. Monroe Kriegel, Technical Placement director for Jersey Production Research Co. in Tulsa.

Also on the program are Robert W. Olson, research and engineering vice president for Texas Instruments, Inc., in Dallas, and Dr. LeVan Griffis, engineering dean at Rice University.

LUBBOCK --- Grade school through high school students with scientific interests will participate in the 17-county South Plains Regional Science Fair Friday and Saturday (April 6-7) at Texas Tech.

The fair is sponsored by the South Plains Science and Mathematics Teachers Assn. in cooperation with Tech.

The two top winners in the senior division (grades 10 through 12) will receive expense paid trips to the National Science Fair May 2-5 at Seattle, Wash. Their exhibits will compete with regional winners from over the United States.

In addition to the senior division, there are divisions for junior high and elementary school students.

Judging in the junior and senior division will begin by 4 p.m. Friday, with the elementary school judging at 10 a.m. Saturday. Winners will be announced at a 12:15 p.m. luncheon Saturday in the Student Union Building.

The public may view the exhibits from 7-10 p.m. Friday and from 8 a.m.-3 p.m. Saturday in the Tech Science Building.

Exhibits will be judged on scientific thought, creative ability, clarity and dramatic value, thoroughness and technical skill.

Advanced registration figures indicate that this year's show will probably exceed last year's 165 entries.

The physical sciences exhibits will be in Chemistry Building rooms 32, 33 and 34; biology in 238, 236 and 234; junior high in 113 and 230; and elementary in 107, 111 and 112.

LUBBOCK --- Dr. J. Wayland Bennett of Texas Tech will leave Friday (April 6) for Egypt, where he will spend a month analyzing that country's grain markets.

Dr. Bennett, an agricultural economist, will study Egypt's livestock production and the possible economic potential for its utilization of feed grains.

He said the Egyptian government is considering purchase of up to 500,000 tons of feed grain from the U.S.

The U.S. Feed Grain Council, a private agency, is sponsoring Dr. Bennett's trip to Egypt. The trip also is under auspices of the Grain Sorghum Producers Assn. which has headquarters in Amarillo.

Accompanying him on the Egyptian survey will be R. W. Cohlmeier of Chicago, a nutritionist with Cargill Inc., feed and grain corporation.

Dr. Bennett spent last June and July on a similar mission to Nigeria, Liberia and Sierra Leone in west Africa.

A native of Lorraine, Texas, Dr. Bennett is professor and head of Tech's agricultural economics department.

LUBBOCK --- Oil industry men from Wichita Falls, Houston, and Odessa are making final preparations on their technical papers to be presented at the West Texas Oil Lifting Short Course Thursday and Friday (April 12-13) at Texas Tech.

The 45 technical papers will center on nine phases of petroleum production. The West Texas petroleum industry and Tech's petroleum engineering department are sponsoring the ninth annual course.

Short course participants will begin registering at 8 a.m. Wednesday. Technical papers will be read at 10 sessions during the two-day meeting.

Harry W. Young of Wichita Falls, North Texas district sales manager, Harbison-Fischer Mfg. Co., will present a technical paper on "Casing Pumps."

He will present factors affecting casing pumps selection and the application of casing pumps to high volume wells. He will also give examples of successful applications.

"Intermittent Gas Lift Design Utilizing Multipoint Gas Injection" will be discussed by H. W. Winkler of Houston. He is sales manager of the technical division for Camco, Inc.

The purpose of his paper is to describe multipoint intermittent gas lift installation design. The operating principal of this injection, which includes fundamental valve mechanics, is presented.

In his paper he says that a selection of lubricants depends on many factors of design, service and operating conditions.

Dale R. Vandever of Nacor Chemical, Inc. in Odessa will present "Deep Gas-Distillate Well plus 28% Carbon Dioxide Equals Potential Trouble."

His paper is a case history of a corrosive well in the Puckett Field of West Texas, including an evaluation of corrosion inhibitor "squeeze-type" applications with a discussion of failures, workovers, costs, and techniques.

Wallace B. Johnson, sales manager for Wright Surveys, Inc., Odessa, has prepared a paper on "A New Approach to Permeability Profiles."

The paper deals with a new method of obtaining injection and producing well permeability profiles. The flow meter and nuclear fluid density tools and their use in analyzing reservoir behavior will be explained.

"Compressor-Gas Lift System for Individual Wells" will be presented by William P. Massey of Odessa. He is president of Camco Gas Lift Co. of Odessa.

He will discuss the mechanics involved in gas lifting individual wells with a small rotary-compressor system. Technique, applications and advantages are presented.

LUBBOCK --A man who is founder and president of Kobe, Inc., in Huntington Park, Calif., maker of the famed Kobe hydraulic pumps, was honored Thursday (April 12) by more than 300 West Texas Oil Lifting Short Course participants at Texas Tech.

C.J. Coberly, president and director of research and development, was named the recipient of the J.C. Slonneger Award.

The award was established in 1961 by the officers of the West Texas Oil Lifting Short Course for presentation from time to time to persons who, in the opinion of the board, have made outstanding contributions to the technology of petroleum production.

The etched bronze wall plaque was presented to Coberly for his outstanding contributions to the petroleum industry for his developments of new methods for lifting oil.

The award is named in honor of J.C. Slonneger of Dallas, a retired mechanical engineer, who was the first recipient of the award last year. He retired from Continental Emsco in 1957.

With the exception of the period from 1916-1923, Coberly's experience has been entirely in the oil industry.

Kobe, Inc., was started in 1923 to produce perforated pipe for the completion of oil wells. The method of production was a new application of oxy-acetylene cutting to form undercut slots of any width greater than 0.020 inches and in any pattern or arrangement desired.

This product became the accepted standard for California completion practice for many years.

In 1926 work was begun on the development of the Kobe Pump. The first pump was installed in 1932 and it was first offered for sale in 1935.

"Since 1935 hydraulic pumping increased very slowly at first," Coberly said. "It has been generally accepted since the introduction of the 'free pump' in 1948."

The first 'free pump' was installed in 1928 in East Texas, but the system was held back due to reluctance of the industry to use parallel tubing systems.

"This, however, has become general practice and a very high percentage of the hydraulic pump in installations are 'free type,'" Coberly said.

"The history of Kobe, Inc. to a large extent tells the experience and success of C.J. Coberly as he has been the active technical head of the company from its founding," Philip Johnson, chairman of the short course directors, stated.

Coberly received the B.A. in mechanical engineering in 1915 from Stanford University.

He worked as a mechanical draftsman for Wilson and Willard Mfg. Co., the company later acquired by Byron Jackson. From 1916-1918 he was a draftsman for Southern California Edison Co. and worked as an engineer from 1918-1923 at California Compressed Gas Co.

Coberly is a lifetime member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. He also holds membership in Tau Beta Pi, honorary engineering fraternity; American Institute of Mining Engineers; American Petroleum Institute and American Society of Testing Materials.

LUBBOCK --Bankers can be important allies in improving soil and water conservation, O.R. Stark Jr. of Quitaque told a meeting of soil conservation district superintendents for the South Plains Tuesday (April 10) at Texas Tech.

LUBBOCK --Dr. Marius Lecompte, prominent Belgium geologist, will lecture at Texas Tech Tuesday through Friday (April 17-20) under the auspices of the Visting International Scientist Program, sponsored by the American Geological Institute.

In addition to the four lectures, Lecompte is accompanying staff members and students of the Tech geology department on a field trip this weekend to the Carlsbad area.

Tech will be his seventh stop in a series of lectures at nine American colleges and universities since mid-February.

Professor Lecompte is director of laboratory, Royal Institute of Natural Sciences, Brussels, Belgium, and professor of paleontology and geology, University of Louvain at Louvain, Belgium.

Receiving his Doctor of Science degree in 1932, Prof. Lecompte was awarded the post-doctoral degree in 1940, which is required to teach at a university.

For the results obtained from his researches, the Belgian government gave him the Decennial Prize of the Mineral Sciences in 1958 and in 1960 he was elected as a corresponding member of the Royal Academy of Sciences of Belgium.

Texas Tech's Rodeo Club will use a "first" on the South Plains when an electronic scoreboard is installed in the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum for the three-day rodeo, beginning Thursday (April 19) .

The only indoor college rodeo will begin each night at 8 p.m. with teams representing 10 schools in the Southwest region.

The scoreboard was developed and designed to help inform the spectators of the standings in each particular event throughout the rodeo.

"This equipment is rather unique and I am sure it has not been used in this area before," Capt. Charles Brown of the Air Force ROTC and sponsor of the Tech Rodeo Club said.

The scoreboards were first tried four years ago at a Rodeo Cowboy Assn. event in Grand Junction, Colo. After the rodeo, a poll was taken of the spectators, proving the venture a success.

It was then decided to build deluxe models for use at any rodeo. Since that first time four years ago, the models have been used at more than 400 rodeo performances, including every performance of the national finals, the rodeo's "world series."

In conjunction with the scoreboard, electronic timing devices are also used to lessen the chance for error.

In the roping and dogging events, the animal leaving the chute automatically starts the stop watches. This insures an equal and exact start for every contestant.

The riding events calls for a person to push a button as the animal leaves the chute. The automatic timer then takes over, automatically timing exactly eight or ten seconds, blows the horn, stops the horn and resets itself again, ready for the next rider.

Dr. Goodwin also announced that Dr. Keith Marmion of Tech will succeed Murdough at the helm of the civil engineering department. Marmion will be acting head.

A Bostonian by birth and a graduate and faculty member at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Murdough has been an ardent booster of Texas Tech and the Southwest ever since coming here.

"I would be ungrateful indeed if I did not express my appreciation for the great privilege which I have had of being a member of the faculty of Texas Technological College," Prof. Murdough said.

"For here I have been engaged for most of my mature life in work which I have enjoyed, have lived in a part of the country most congenial to me, and have worked and lived with the finest kind of people there are anywhere."

Murdough has headed the civil engineering department for 35 years. Symbolic of its spirit is the Murdough chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers, which is sponsored by Prof. George Whetstone.

The group has been named the outstanding chapter in Texas for three straight years. It has received six commendation awards, more than any other chapter in Texas. It was the first Texas chapter to receive such an award.

Murdough holds a bachelor's degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a master's in civil engineering from the University of Michigan. He has been inspector for the Massachusetts Highway Commission, a draftsman in the U.S. Army field service, and aeronautical structural engineer for the U.S. Army Air Service, a sales engineer, and an instructor at MIT, Oklahoma State and Tech.

He is a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, Texas Section and High Plains Branch and of the American Society of Engineering Education. He was president of the High Plains Branch in 1954 and 1955.

Murdough is author of one textbook, "Elements of Dynamics", and co-author of another, "Elements of Statics."

Murdough has been an active citizen of Lubbock and West Texas. He is a member of the Yellowhouse Lodge of Masons; a former member of the American Legion, former member of the Lubbock Rotary Club (where he served two terms as a director), a Presbyterian (a former chairman of board of deacons), an original member of the Lubbock City Planning and Zoning Commission and member of the Board of Adjustment of the City Building Code.

The graduate students will receive \$6,600 over a three-year period. This provides \$2,000 the first year, \$2,200 the second and \$2,400 the third year.

The fellowship also provides \$400 for each dependent.

Recipients of the fellowships in English are Mrs. Leona Ford Dale, who received the B.A. degree in the summer of 1961 from Tech; Richard A. Gardner of Laramie, Wyo., who will receive the B.A. degree from the University of Wyoming; and Donald R. Theall of Abbeville, La., who will be graduated next month from Southwestern Louisiana Institute.

The chemistry fellow is Frederick H. Wolfe, who received the B.A. degree in chemistry in 1960 from Hoffestra College in Hempstead, N.Y.

Purpose of the fellowship program is to attract qualified students into the college teaching profession.

This will bring the total NDEA fellowships awarded to Tech to 13 since the program was begun in 1958. Nine have been awarded in English during the four-year period.

The fellowships enable students to acquire their doctorate in three years rather than spreading graduate work over several years, as is necessary in many cases. It also allows students to devote full time to study.

Teaching by fellowship students is not required by the act, but colleges may choose to include teaching in the program.

"Professor Wiesen has served well and faithfully," Tech President R. C. Goodwin said in announcing Wiesen's retirement. "We regret his leaving, but extend our best wishes for the future."

Wiesen came to Tech in 1940 as a member of the department of economics and business administration. Of his 22 years at Tech, he served 16 of those years (1942-58) as economics department head.

"After 22 years of meeting deadlines, I plan to travel and continue research in my favorite fields of international affairs and trade relations," Wiesen said.

"I will never reach a point where I don't have an interest in Tech since my roots were planted here so long ago," he said.

LUBBOCK --- A neglected facet of the Mexican Revolution of 1910-11 is explored by Dr. Lowell L. Blaisdell of Texas Tech in his new book, "The Desert Revolution--Baja California 1911."

The 268-page history, complete with a separate footnote section, was released this month by the University of Wisconsin Press.

Dr. Blaisdell, associate professor of history, traveled extensively in Lower California gathering information and consulted the National Archives of the United States, the archives of Mexico, and obscure specialized works.

In addition, he made an extensive survey of files of Mexican, American and foreign language newspapers published in the United States.

The leader of this controversial sidelight of the Mexican Revolution was Ricardo Flores Magon, a Mexican anarchist who refused to recognize the popular Francisco Madero as leader of the general rebellion against the dictatorial regime of Porfirio Diaz.

From exile in Los Angeles, Flores Magon sought to control his army, a motley assortment of Mexicans, soldiers of fortune, American Industrial Workers of America, and radicals.

Although the farcical episode was quickly squelched and Flores Magon regained control of his army, the desert revolution was doomed and Flores Magon's chances of exerting further leadership in the greater Mexican Revolution was destroyed.

Flores Magon died in an American prison under mysterious circumstances. The events surrounding this abortive movement have been clouded as to their true significance.

"One of the interesting facets of this affair is the suspicion, largely unjustified, that American border interests were trying to take advantage of the crisis in Baja California to annex the peninsula to the United States," Dr. Blaisdell said.

"This abortive revolution was an effort by a Mexican radical, with some help from foreign revolutionaries, to establish an anarchist society, first in Baja California, then in all of Mexico."

"Another facet is that so much confusion accompanied this Lower California movement that many unexpected and laughable events transpired," he said.

Dr. Blaisdell, who is interested in revolutionary history and scholarship, plans to spend some time this summer in Paris and London doing research on a French revolutionary and adventurer, Gustave Paul Cluseret. The research project is being done through the Tech Research Fund.

The book is available at the Texas Tech Bookstore.

An analysis of applications received from teachers wishing to attend the Texas Tech Language Institute this summer in Argentina shows nation-wide interest according to institute director, Prof. Alfred B. Strehli.

More than 550 inquiries concerning the institute were received from teachers from all parts of the country. Of this number more than 270 established their eligibility and completed formal applications for admittance.

Analysis of the geographical distribution of the applicants by residence shows that they live in 44 different states and the District of Columbia. Texas furnished the largest number of applicants with 30, but California was close behind, with 25. Although no one applied from Hawaii, Alaska is represented by a teacher from Juneau.

The institute will enroll 46 public school teachers and one private school teacher of Spanish. Only those who have previously attended a summer language institute in this country are eligible.

Purpose of the institute is to give secondary school teachers of Spanish an opportunity to perfect their command of the spoken language in a native environment, to become familiar with the culture of the people of Argentina through direct contact with them, and to study the latest developments in methods and materials of instruction.

The eight-week program will be held in Tucuman, in northern Argentina, with the cooperation of the National University of Tucuman. Many of the teachers attending are expected to take advantage of their trip to travel further in Argentina, Uruguay, Chile, and Peru, after close of the institute August 11.

LUBBOCK --A woman who has given 34 years to training home economics teachers at Texas Tech will retire May 31 with the rank of professor emeritus.

She is Mrs. Vivian Johnson Adams, head of the home economics education department since 1937. She has served on the School of Home Economics' faculty longer than any other person.

Dr. R. C. Goodwin, Tech president, said in announcing her resignation: "As a faculty member since 1928, Mrs. Adams is one of the persons who have been influential in shaping Texas Tech's rapid growth. We are grateful to her for her leadership in this and for the training she has provided for hundreds of home economics teachers. Our best wishes go with her and Mr. Adams."

Mrs. Adams came to Tech in 1928--three years after the college's founding in 1925. She was the seventh member of the home economics staff at that time and has seen the school's faculty expand to 31 present members.

During her tenure at Tech she pioneered the establishment of home economics student training centers in Texas, with the first one at Slaton.

"Without these teaching centers I feel the growth of home economics education would have been stifled," Mrs. Adams said. "Due to the cooperation, interest and willingness of our area schools, these centers became a reality."

As department head she helped establish the graduate program in home economics education in 1937. Forty-five graduate degrees have been awarded from that department since that time.

Mrs. Lila Kinchen, now associate professor of clothing and textiles at Tech, was the first master's candidate in that department.

Upon her retirement, Mrs. Adams said she plans to keep up with her professional organizations, spend some time with her family and friends and "do a little fishing and gardening."

She also plans some traveling with her semi-retired husband, Otto V. Adams, part-time professor emeritus in civil engineering who was Tech's engineering dean for 17 years.

One of her trips will include attending the tenth congress of the International Federation of Home Economics, which meets in Paris, France, next year. She attended the ninth congress in 1958 at the University of Maryland.

Mrs. Adams is a lifetime member of the American and Texas Vocational Assns. On April 14 she was presented lifetime membership in the American Home Economics Assn. by Tech's home economics alumna and friends.

She holds the B.S. degree from Southwest Texas State College in San Marcos and the M.A. from Columbia University Teacher's College. She has also studied at Ohio State University and the University of Chicago.

Mrs. Adams is a member of numerous professional organizations, including the International Home Economics Assn., American Assn. of University Women, American Assn. of University Professors, National Education Assn., Adult Education Assn., Texas State Teachers Assn. and the Texas Assn. of College Teachers.

In addition, she is a member of the Quarterly Club, the West Texas Museum Assn., the Faculty Club, the Faculty Women's Club and is a lifetime steward in the Methodist Church

LUBBOCK --- After teaching for the past year and a half at the University of Rangoon a Texas Tech faculty member has learned that Burma is "a land of contrasts."

Ray Billingsley is approaching the end of his two-year leave of absence from Tech, where he is associate professor of agricultural economics. He is currently visiting professor in Burma to organize and teach a similar course at the University of Rangoon, under the auspices of the Ford Foundation and the University of Chicago.

In a recent letter to friends at Tech, Billingsley told of the contrasts in the country.

"The Rangoon airport terminal building is the most modern in Asia, yet its trucks and busses are mostly war relics left after World War II," he said.

"Burma's rice surplus is so large, it is the world's leading exporter of rice, yet the main import is food.

"The country is full of gold spired religious pagodas, containing golden Buddhas, yet the people are apallingly poor. The average per capita income is \$50 a year."

Despite the low income, Billingsley said, the country is rich in resources of iron, coal, oil, precious stones and other mine products.

A second-hand Ford or Chevrolet in Burma will cost \$12,000 to \$15,000, he said.

Referring to the artificial image of the American people, Billingsley said, "the image that most Burmese have of Americans is centered around the protocol-conscious embassy and military people, the movies and the sensational news concerning race incidents."

The Tech professor said American movies are very popular in Burma, and by and large create a good image, "but one could hardly call this image accurate or complete."

One observation Billingsley made was "how good American movies seem when they don't have to compete with television."

English language papers carry more American news than any other nation and racial news in America receives wide coverage.

"However, although the Burmese view of America is not complete, it is much more complete than the view that Americans have of Burma," Billingsley said.

Lauding such exchange programs as the one he is participating in, Billingsley said, "any help...to improve technology or the educational system is a step in the right direction..." and while experts are being brought into the country, "it would be better if more Burmese could be trained to take over these jobs."

Billingsley, his wife and two sons will return to Lubbock in September.
