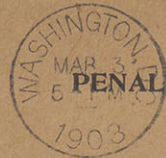

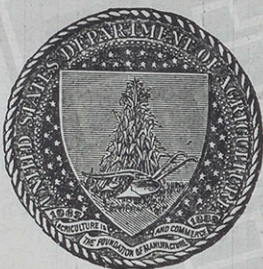

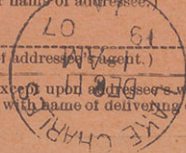

EL BERNARDEZ INDUSTRIAL CORPORATION.

N A M E.

1. The title of this corporation is EL BERNARDEZ INDUSTRIAL CORPORATION.

O F F I C E.

2. The principal office of this corporation in Virginia shall be in Alexandria, Virginia, and James R. Caton, a practicing attorney residing in said city is designated as its resident agent and attorney, upon whom process against the company may be served.

S E A L

3. The corporate seal of this corporation shall have inscribed thereon the name of the corporation and the year of its creation, and the word "Virginia".

STOCKHOLDERS' MEETINGS.

4 (a) The annual meetings of the stockholders shall be held at the principal office of the Company, in the City of Alexandria, Virginia, on the first Monday in January in each year at the hour of 3:00 o'clock, P. M., at which time the officers and directors of the Company shall be elected for the ensuing year.

(b) A majority in amount of the stock issued and outstanding shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

(c) Each stockholder shall be entitled to one vote either in person or by proxy for each share of stock registered in his name on the books of the corporation for twenty days preceding the meeting.



(d) Notice of the meetings of the stockholders, whether annual or otherwise, shall be given by publication at least six times a week for two successive weeks in some newspaper published in the City of Alexandria, Virginia, or by mailing a notice in writing to each stockholder addressed to the post office nearest his place of residence, as it appears on the stock books of the corporation, at least ten days prior to such meeting, or by serving a notice in writing upon each stockholder personally at least ten days prior to such meeting.

(e) Special meetings of the stockholders shall be held at the place prescribed for the annual meetings unless otherwise ordered by the Board of Directors, and shall be called by the Secretary on the order of the Board of Directors, or on the written request of the owners of a majority of the stock issued and outstanding by notice given in the manner above mentioned. Such notice shall briefly state the objects of such meeting, and no other business shall be transacted at such meeting except by unanimous consent of the stockholders holding all the stock issued and outstanding.

each month at 3:00 o'clock P. M., unless otherwise ordered by the Board. Notice of regular meetings shall be given to each Director by the Secretary at least two days previous thereto.

(d) Special meetings shall be held at the place prescribed for the regular meetings of the Board unless otherwise ordered by the Board, and may be called by the President on his own motion on one day's notice to each Director.

(e) Special meetings shall be called in like manner either by the President or Secretary upon the written request of two members of the Board. All calls for special meetings shall briefly state the object of the meeting, and no other business shall be transacted at such meeting except by unanimous consent of the whole Board.

(f) At the meeting of the Board a majority of their number shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but less than a quorum may adjourn over from time to time until a quorum is secured.

(g) The Board shall have power to elect or appoint all necessary officers, agents, attorneys and committees and to employ all factors, servants, clerks and workmen necessary in the conduct of the business of the corporation, and to require of them bond for the faithful discharge of their duties in such sum as the Board may direct, to fix their compensation, prescribe their duties, to dismiss any appointed officer, employee or other person in the service of the company, and generally to control all officers of the corporation.

(h) The Board may delegate to an executive committee of the Board such powers as to the Board may seem wise.



(i) The Board in addition to the powers and authority expressly conferred upon them by these by-laws may exercise all such powers and do all such things as may be exercised or done by the corporation, but subject nevertheless to the provisions of the laws of Virginia, and the charter, and of these by-laws.

3. Report of Officers.
4. Report of Committees.
5. Unfinished business.
6. Miscellaneous business.
7. New business.

#### O F F I C E R S .

6. The officers of the corporation shall be a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and such other officers as may from time to time be elected or appointed by these by-laws. The Secretary and Treasurer may or may not be the same person.

#### P R E S I D E N T .

7. The President shall have such powers and perform such duties as the Board of Directors shall prescribe.

#### V I C E P R E S I D E N T .

8. In the absence of the President the Vice President shall be vested with all his powers and perform all his duties.

WAIVER OF NOTICE.

13. Any stockholder, officer or director may at any time waive any notice required to be given under these by-laws.

N O T I C E.

14. Whenever under the provisions of these by-laws notice is required to be given to any Director, Officer or Stockholder, it shall not be construed to be limited to personal notice, but such notice may be given in writing, or published as hereinbefore mentioned.

ALTERATION AND AMENDMENT.

15. The Board of Directors may by a majority vote of the Board alter or amend these by-laws at any regular or special meeting provided notice of such alteration or amendment has been given to each Director at least three days prior to such meeting.



Such alteration or amendment may be revoked or amended at any stockholders' meeting.

REGISTRATION AND TRANSFER OF STOCK.

16. All certificates of stock issued by the Company shall be signed by its President and attested by its Secretary with the corporate seal affixed. All shares shall be registered in a book kept for that purpose, as well as all transfers of the same. No transfer of stock shall be made within twenty days of an annual meeting.
