My will.

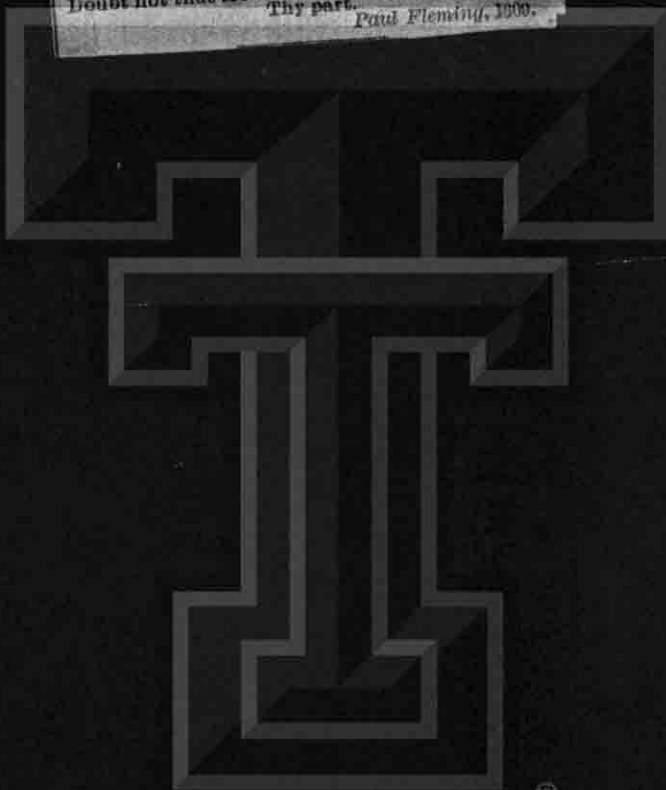
Why should'st thou fill to-day with sorrow
