LUBBOCK -- Victory bells echoed across the Texas Tech University campus Wednesday afternoon to signal academic excellence rather than the customary sports triumph as more than 1,400 student scholars were honored in the company of administrators, faculty and fellow students.

Interim President Elizabeth G. Haley, speaking at the first Student Honors Convocation, referred to the honorees as heroes at Texas Tech.

"It is an honor today to personally congratulate my heroes, to tell you that the excellence you have achieved is pushing back the limits in school and in the workplace. What you have done will influence the overall education available at Texas Tech," Haley said before an overflowing crowd gathered in the University Center Courtyard.

Mentioning contemporary writings about the downslide of education in the United States, Haley countered, "In this era of reassessment of our education system, there are people who defy the dire predictions and succeed in meeting all their educational goals."

Executive Vice President and Provost Donald Haragan, whose office organized this ceremony as an annual event, said the convocation emerged from a longstanding omission that needed to be corrected. He said, "It seems ludicrous that a university, whose primary purpose is education, would sponsor a ceremony to formally recognize athletes without sponsoring a celebration to reward academic achievement."

Highlighted among the honorees were 57 Texas Tech students named to Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities. The remaining guests included students with a 3.5 or better grade-point-average, including 600 students with a 4.0 grade-point-average qualifying for the President's list this past fall.

LUBBOCK -- John F. Kurtzke, M.D., a leading authority and researcher on the epidemiology of neurological diseases, will deliver the Tarbox Distinguished Lecture Friday (May 5) at the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center.

Kurtzke will provide a multiple sclerosis update during the public Tarbox lecture at 11 a.m. Friday in Room 5B148 of the TTHSC.

At 3 p.m. on Friday in the same room, Kurtzke will be available at a questionand-answer session for area health professionals and support group members interested in neurological diseases and their epidemiology -- the incidence and distribution of disease in the population.

Kurtzke is a neurology professor at Georgetown University and chief of neurology service for the Veterans Administration Medical Center in Washington.

His work on multiple sclerosis led to the creation of the Kurtzke Disability Scale for evaluating the extent of the disease. More recently, he has studied Parkinson's disease and provided evidence for race, gender and geography as independent risk factors for the disease. This work into the disease's epidemiology has increased the suspicions that Parknsonism may be an acquired environmentally linked disease.

The lecture is sponsored by the Tarbox Parkinson's Disease Institute through the TTHSC Department of Medical and Surgical Neurology.

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES TO HOST DEANS' WEEKEND

LUBBOCK -- At a time when much of the Texas Tech University population is leaving school to begin new careers and lives, a unique group of Texas Tech exes is returning to relive their time spent at the university.

Five of the six former deans of the College of Arts and Sciences will return to campus on Saturday (May 6) for a special Deans' Weekend.

The day will begin at 10 a.m. in Holden Hall Room 129 with a coffee reception. A roundtable discussion among the deans, a highlight of the event, will begin at 10:45 a.m. in the same room. The deans will recollect historic occasions at Texas Tech and even tell a few "war stories." Audience members will be encouraged to participate in the informal exchange and ask questions.

Following the discussion, at approximately 11:45 a.m., the deans will be presented with a bench in the College of Arts and Sciences Recognition Garden. The bench will be engraved with each of the deans' names and the dates they served the college.

An afternoon reception will be hosted by the department of chemistry at 2 p.m. in the Chemistry Building Room 113. Robert C. Goodwin, former Texas Tech president and College of Arts and Sciences dean, began his career at the university as a professor of chemistry in 1930 and later served as chairperson of the department.

A cocktail hour will begin at 7 p.m. at the Lubbock Plaza Hotel at 3201 South Loop 289. Dinner will be served at 8 p.m. During the dinner the deans will be roasted by collegues and friends.

The former deans participating will be Goodwin, president of Texas Tech from 1960-1966 and dean from 1945-1959; Sabe McClain Kennedy, dean from 1959-1966; Lorrin Garfield Kennamer, dean from 1967-1970; Lawrence Lester Graves, dean from 1970-1983; and William B. Conroy, dean from 1983-1985. James Marcus Gordon, the first dean of the college from 1926-1945, died in May 1951.

LUBBOCK -- A group of Texas Tech University students has place first in the American Advertising Federation 10th District Competition held in Fort Worth.

The competition required the student team to develop and present a complete advertising/marketing campaign for a product. This year's product was a cereal from Kellogg's, code named Brand Alpha.

STRESS AND FERTILITY -- The two don't mix, particularly in females. That is the focus of research by Reid L. Norman, Ph.D., of the TTHSC cell biology and anatomy faculty. Funded by the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, the research subjects rhesus monkeys to mild stress by limiting their mobility, much as a driver's mobility is restricted when he is wearing his seat belt. The resulting stress is equivalent to what a human would face in the middle of a traffic jam. But even under such mild stress, adrenal or "stress" hormones are released into the body and the distribution of sexual hormones is suspended. In the female, this interrupts the flow of estrogen. Similar though less dramatic responses have been shown with testosterone in male monkeys. To discuss this basic research, contact Norman at (806) 743-2711.
