Water: Unit meetings in April, 1960 were devoted to reviewing the League's newly arrived at position with explanations of why the Legue felt this way and what to do about it. We have given no sustained attention to this item since then outside of calling attention to various current news articles. What action has been taken on the national CRs by your League as an organization and by its members as individuals? WATER: Blatnik Bill (Federal Incentive Program for Sewage Treatment Plants) Membership was alerted at the April unit meetings, the Board members were alerted at the May Board meeting of possible call to action. Letters were sent in the name of the League to Rep. Bruce Alger, Sen. Ralph Yarborough and Senator Lyndon Johnson. Mutual Security Appropriations for 1961: Due to Rep. Alger's repeated strong stand in favor of a drastic cut, we felt a telegram to him at that time ( (when Bill was still in subcommittee) would be futile and so notified National office. Upon receipt of a phone call from Mrs. Loren Gordon, State Board member, we sent a telegram to Rep. stating our views on June 13th. (When Bill was due to so to floor of House). Individual members were contacted (not all reached) and at least three took action. Time for action was carried in the August VOTER so that all members were informed by the time the Senate took action. - 4 -

Are your members prepared for action on any or all of the national CRs?

The majority of our members are prepared for action on the Water CR.

With a brief review and up-dating, they would be ready for a call to action on the United Nations. However, they would need detailed preparation for any action on Loyalty-Security, Item Veto, Tax Rates Limitation, Limiting Powers of Executive and Congress over Foreign Relations and D.C. Suffrage and Home Rule.

In . which national CRs are your members most interested? In which are they least interested?

At this time, there is no clear indication as to which items are of most or of least interest to the members. They are more familiar with the United Nations and the Water Continuing Responsibilities.

To what do you attribute the presence or absence of interest in and preparedness for action on the national CRs? We are fairly new and the majority of our members are young mothers with limited time. So far, we have concentrated on Current Agenda in an effort to keep abreast with the other Leagues. We hope by next year to have covered CRs in such a way that our members will be prepared for action. We realize we hopped on a moving train when we became a Local League and we don't expect the whole organization to stop and back up for us. We are in the process no of getting our coats off and finding a comfortable seat to journey on.

The Kit sent from state insured that all areas were covered and members felt that they had plenty of information to come to agreement. This item does not have a year round resource committee, of the same makeup as the other resource committees. No legislative action has been taken.\* STATE ITEM I - TEXAS CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION: So far we have had 1 set of unit meetings on this subject dealing with State-Local Relations. There is a year-round committee which at present is gathering basic resource material and which prepared the material for the unit discussions. A general meeting has been scheduled for April but may be changed unless we receive more specific direction from state by that time. We have taken no legislative action on this item at this time. \* There are no radio or television stations in Irving and we have not made use of the Dallas and Fort Worth stations so far. We havereceived coverage in the Irving daily newspaper, which published the position of the League concerning Methods of Voters Registration and also gave us coverage while we were doing the Opinion Makers survey on Texas Con-stitutional Revision. This survey was done during the months of August and September and did make several persons aware of the need for revision. How useful were the state Board's materials, if any; state area conferences or workshops, if any; and state Board services on the state Current Agenda in general. The kit on Voters Registration Methods proved very helpful as did the kit for the Opinion Makers survey on Texas Constitutional Revision. Both were easily followed and contained techniques as well as information. The State Area Conference on Resource Committees was invaluable to our League, being new and not as experienced in working with resource committees. May, 1960

A page explaining planning and various areas of the Plan was prepared for the finance kit.

August, 1960

Plans for the community meetings in Sept. & Oct. included:

1. Securing the cooperation of nine other civic groups in the city.

2. 1,000 flyers were prepared and distributed by the civic groups and at the J.C. Community Fair.

3. Notice of the meetings went out with 13,000 bank statements.

4. A letter was sent to all ministers regarding the coming meetings and out speakers bureau.

5. Summaries of Dr. Leipziger's summary of the Plan were compiled for sale at the community meetings and distribution to contributors.

(a) our summaries: 90 sent to contributors

85 sold at 10¢ 50 given to members

(b) 59 copies of Dr. Leipziger's summary were sold at \$3.00 (this is total to date).

6. Numerous short talks were given to PTA's an other groups regarding planning and the coming meetings.

September, 1960

A community and general membership meeting was held at City Hall and attended by 120 people. A panel of six Irving citizens presented their views on different areas of the Plan. Dr. John M. Claunch was moderator.

A display booth at the J.C. Community Fair depicted the Plan as a

goal for Irving.

October, 1960

The second community meeting was held on Oct. 4th at City Hall and attended by 95 people. The speakers were Mr. Ben Carpenter and Mr. James Eppright. Mr. Wre Sutherland, President, Irving Chamber of Commerce, was moderator. Dr. Hugo Leipziger was present as resource person.

The second unit meetings were discussion meetings to examine and determine possible areas of agreement on the Utilities, & Capital Improve-

ments sections of the Plan and the Land Use Map.

The third community meeting was held on Oct. 18th at City Hall and attended by 85 people.

Introduction by Dr. Harold Hall, President, Rotary Moderator: Dr. John M. Claunch Speakers: Mr. Bryan Baker, Ft. Worth Planner Mr. Milford Riggs, Director, Abilene Chamber of Commerce Mr. Staley McBrayer, publisher Resource person: Dr. Hugo Leipziger December, 1960 Unit meetings to reevaluate all previous areas of agreement and determine final consensus on the Plan. The three community meetings on Irving's Master Plan in cooperation with 9 other civic groups and the attendant publicity seemed to help the Irving League "come of age" in the eyes of the community. This coverage included detailed press releases to the Irving newspaper and those in Dallas, brief speeches to promote attendance at the meetings to almost all PTA's, advertising flyers, about 1,000, mimeographed in vitations sent through the 2 local banks with their statements, about 12,500, and letters to all the ministers in Irving (72). Pictures of speakers and moderators were used by local paper. One Dallas paper gave extremely good coverage to the meetings. (cont'd on other side of page) 2 To what extent does your League use radio? Describe.

Not at all. Irving has no radio station and no attempt has been made to interest the Dallas stations.

These Guides, along with the Guides published by the State LWV office covering candidates for State offices and proposed constitutional amendments, were mailed to the household of every qualified voter in Midland County. 19,218 voters were reached with each mailing for a total of 57,654. The expense of publishing and mailing the local Guides was paid for by the local league as set forth in the budget adopted for 1960-61. The State Guides were purchased from the State office and paid for by the local LWV. 1-B No candidates meetings, as such, were held. See 1-C. 1-0 Free TV and radio time was utilized to the fullest. The leading local radio station requested the VS Chairman to make 1 minute tapes which were broadcast numerous times daily before the May 1960 Democratic Primary Election and the LWV Poll Tax Drive in January, 1961. VS was responsible for 11 half hour TV shows. All candidates were presented before each election on these programs with local LWV members taking part giving factual information concerning the offices for which the candidates sought election. One half hour program presented by local LWV members was devoted solely to explanation of how to use voting machines, the mechanics of precinct conventions and the importance of attending same and urging citizens to cast an informed vote. There were pictures and stories on local TV news programs concerning the publishing of each Guide and during the Poll Tax Drive there was a daily progress report on both 6 FM and 10 PM news programs. There was a total of 32 newspaper articles, editorials, pictures, etc. on VS alone. Listener and viewer audience estimated at approximately 130,000. More than 91% of Midland County qualified voters cast their ballots in the November General Election and the Midland LWV feels it played some part in such a heavy turn out. In areas where there are no Leagues, we only answered letters and inquiries received enclosing League material with our answers when appropriate. 1-E All political parties were most cooperative. 2 political meetings were held with the County Chairmen of the 3 active parties, Democratic, Republican and Constitution, being presented and alloted equal time for discussion on stands and issues. At one of these meetings 3 High School students representing each of the parties also spoke. Only approximately 200 attended these meetings although wide spread newspaper coverage accompanied both. 1-F a. Finance: Our finances have been inadequate to do all the Voters Service we would like to do, to distribute more Leage publications in the Community, and to carry out areas in Local Program. We are doing better planning this year I think to increase and "weed" out our contributors file; secure more workers, and do a better job of training. I think the help from the state & national boards could be in a simplified "step" procedure ie -- what to do in concrete terms, outlining suggestions month by month.

B. Voters Service-getting more people to work! They've become so interested in Program we can't get them to work on Voters Service -- having a workshop this

month to try to remedy that.

C. Would like some ideas on how to incorporate "observers" reports back to membership since different observers attend different governmental meetings and belong to different units. They are beginning to feel like extra thumbs. When and where do you give them the opportunity to "play the piano"?

This area ranges from moderately conservative to ultra conservative. The national program material is viewed as being "slanted" toward liberalism and that it seems to be more than coincidental that League phisosophy and that of the liberal Democrats 750 essentially the same. They want a more objective "pro and con" presentation of national current agenda in order to reach a true concensus. This has been a serious problem in the past from what I can understand, and though somewhat improved with the addition of new members, it has caused a majority of the charter members to either drop out or become inactive. They are almost anti-U.N. though we are beginning to see areas of improvement, and they want to keep the Connally Reservation, and also want a Constitutional limitation on income taxes. They question whether the concensus of the latter was a true picture of membership concensus. No suggestions -- it has to be word of mouth and we have too few mouths who wish to change their attitudes, and there is daily indoctrination by the local newspaper.

- 1. Finance we need to recruit more workers, and make a better effort to cover the cards we have of regular and prospective donors. We seem to have good organizational plans on paper, but something always happens so that the result is short of the mark.
- 2. Membership we have made good strides this year to reversing a trend of the past few years of a gradually declining figure. This year we ended up with a plus 15 in the membership column, while not senational, at least it is going in the right direction. We need to continue this trend.
- 3. Continue to work on more member participation in every activity.

Have no sprecific suggestion for need of help at state or national level. I think we understand our problems, the L.W.V., and simply need to get busy and work out solution. Not so silly suggestion: Hire a maid, full-time, for every

L.W.V. President!
Have you any suggestions for changes in basic national or state policies or procedures which would increase the effectiveness of the League or improve the service from national or state Boards? If so, please describe, giving reasons for suggestions and possible solutions or methods for improvements.

- 1. I feel L.W.V., at National level, tries to act on too many things, in a legislative way. Part of the problem is, in my opinion, a very unrealistic list of C.R.'s. It is very difficult to keep even the most dedicated league members conversant on all phases of L.W.V. program, and legislative actions.
- 2. At State level: I suggest limiting the mailing of bulletins to not more than five members of the state board, based on assignments made by state office, and no more than five other leagues, on an exchange basis. We waste too much time, paper and postage mailing our voter to all state board members and all presidents. If I received five, I would read all instead ---the circular file is my first thought when I see my mailbox crammed with bulletins.
- 3. Thought for all levels of L.W.V. including local; "Is this mailing really necessary?"
- 4. Overall look at Finance picture. At local level we are going broke trying to pay our pledge to state and national. If we cut back could do so much to strengthen our league in the community. Yet we feel giulty guilty, because each year we are authomatically asked for a raise, and even maintaining the too-high status quo seems to be a compromise with what the budget committee of state wishes us to do. Our league, with a \$1750 pledge to state and national, found that all revenue netted about \$3500, but we were pledged to give half our income on our pledge. This year we were asked to raise our state pledge. In stead we are going to cut back. Our suggested budget lists \$1500, but it is my feeling that even that is too high proportionately to our income.

C.A. 2: "Completion of the 'Citizens' Handbook of San Antonio'".

Work on this program was impeded because there was no full-time chairman until Sept. 1960. However, material previously collected was sorted, rewritten, and typed during the interim; and the newspaper clipping file was kept current. Since Sept. the following progress has been made:

- 1. Eight new assignments of material were made to six members.
  All assignments were completed and first drafts of each write-up were submitted to the chairman.
- 2. All but 2 sections of the handbook completed 6 or more months ago were updated.
- 3. A two-member final editing committee was appointed.
- 4. Five chapters (approx. one-half of the handbook) were submitted to the editing committee on Feb. 8, 1961, after being checked for accuracy by each city department concerned.
- 5. The chairman of C.A. 2 was responsible for the January briefing meeting. Three of the handbook sections were mimeographed by the local office and supplementary material was supplied by each of the 3 city departments discussed in these sections. The Director of the City Welfare Dept. was invited to the briefing, and the major part of the meeting was a question and answer session about the City Welfare Dept. This turned out to be a very stimulating meeting and provided the discussion leaders with excellent discussion material above and beyond the actual factual material provided.
- 6. February unit meetings on the 3 above-mentioned handbook sections were held. Meetings were primarily study-discussion type.
- 7. A special event related to this C.A. 2 item was a bus tour sponsored by the City of San Antonio for the San Antonio League members and their guests on Feb. 15, 1961. This 5-hour tour (available to any interested group) was held to familiarize citizens with the various activities of their city govt. Approximately 60 League members and guests attended.

The chief weakness of this program item has been in the collection and preparation of materials and in maintaining member interest. Although member participation has been good in the initial stages of collecting data, the chairman has not organized an effective committee system for editing rough drafts into finished form. Lack of member interest has been due to the fact that this item has been so long coming to completion.

This item was never completed. The chairman had to resign late in the year because of illness, and there was disatisfaction on the board that we could ever reach a successful conclusion on this ite. This disatisfaction stemmed largely from a feeling that there was not complete agreement among the membership, we felt, on just what the item was intedned to mean. Some felt it meant a study of Capital Improvements and some felt it meant a study of the City Budget and how our city is operated at what cost.

At an area conference our board learned for the first time just what the board was supposed to do for a proposed Local Program. This had not been done for the above item. The board took our problem to the membership with the recommendation that we drop it for this year.

At the February, 1961, Board Meeting we spent the entire time discussing the proposed local program for the coming year. We feel we are on much firmer ground this year, and should be able to conduct a good Local Program to everyone's satisfaction.

Membership is still off. Present membership is active and we absorb new members into real participation at once. Also, we have lots of guests at our meetings - but they don't join (we call on them, send bulletins and "facts" and letters inviting them to join, and phone them before each meeting for a reasonable length of time). We can't figure it out because League has gained local respect, our local program is stimulating, they enjoy our meetings, and we follow up on every lead - ??? Some of our Board members think it's just our town - very social (over 400 women's clubs); others think we've just cleared out the deadwood and actually have more participating members than ever - but the irrefutable fact is that membership has dropped.

Units have never worked in our League - we tried them for years and attendance averaged about 5, regardless of how well planned program was. We think we've found a solution in our monthly "unit-general" meetings (which we always break up into/discussion groups) and in active committees...at least attendance has soared and we have better programs and better discussions. Should we continue to feel guilty about not having units? (I would someday like to see us have a night unit for businesswomen - coordinated with day meetings so they could participate in Muncheon discussion fully.)

Committee or resource people: Tried to use only people not on League Board; outcome: Chairman and 2 others are Board members, 2 off-board people serving. (Board members are Secy. and Treas., however, who've not participated in League Program much before now.) Committee "developed" by meeting and planning together. Each committee member did basic research on a particular facet of study and presented findings at first meeting, then followed up by applying basic research to local schools at next meeting.

Both administrators very cooperative and helpful.

Consensua reached so far is to the effect that school planning is well done in Tyler for the most part; some thought there are particular aspects needing improved planning, but no trend apparent in these criticisms. In general, League learned what it set out to learn - whether the harsh criticisms of newer Tyler school buildings by public were justified. We found that, by and large, they are not; that some of the things that have been criticized have been corrected in more recent buildings; that planning pretty well follows recommended procedures.

Action - Superintendent Dennard stated that he would like the paper on Tyler School Planning to be made available to his office for duplication for School Board members, since they may not be fully informed as to all that goes into preparing educational specifications. (He stated at League meeting that it was the most constructive meeting he'd ever attended.)

A newspaper reporter present at the Feb. meeting proposed running a series in the local paper based on League study. (Picture of Supt. and program participants appeared on front page of paper that evening.)

The League Board recommends continuing the the school construction item for LCA next year with probably emphasis being action from this year's study, possibly in form of publishing findings.

We have been conducting a Know Your Schools Survey. The first sections studied were History, Buildings and Administration. To insure as nearly unbiased results as possible we tried to assign two or more members of differing backgrounds and opinions to each section of the study. As soon as they had been completed the sections on Buildings and Administration were mimeographed and distributed to the membership. As additional chapters are completed they will also be distributed.

It happened that the section on Buildings was being studied at just the time that urgent need for a new Junior High School building was becoming apparent. Several reports to PTA groups aroused a great deal of interest in the subject. When a school bond election was called, the local League distributed copies of the Buildings section to schools, school board members and other interested people. One interesting - and flattering - note was that the Bond Divisor employed by the School Board requested a copy for use in the sale of the bonds. While the League did not take a stand for or against the bond, the facts presented in objective fashion were useful in informing the public. The bond passed.

Unit meetings have studied the results of our study on two different occasions several months apart. At a general membership meeting, the president of the School Board discussed the school bond. The units are now holding workshops on the School Survey to give direction for future work. The consensus of the first unit workshop was that further study of Teachers and Curriculum would be advisable and that action should be taken to inform the general public of the results of our study.

In general we have been pleased with the results of our survey, and have been commended by the School Superintendent and members of the School Board. Our chief difficulties have arisen from lack of woman-power rather than lack of interest.

I. 1960 Local League Projects

A. Victoria published a local Voters Guide for the local county election for the Democratic Frimary. There were no Republican candidates. We published 5,000 of these. We also ordered 3,000 of the Guides put out by the state League for the same election but covering the candidates for state offices. These were paid for out of our budgets item "Action in the Community". Distribution was done by all League members at various club meetings, mailed to members and contributors, and copies were placed in the lobbies of our three banks. Also the Chamber of Commerce asked for some. When the amount we had for them ran out, they went to the printer and ordered and additional 2,5000 using the very same Guide, paying for them, and asking no oredit for their expenditure.
