On my return from the great Baptist Convention, where the good Lord was with us. I find yours of the 6th on file in my office, and now hasten to reply. You say you went down to meet Bob, and learned from Oglesby that he would not be in till later, and the cattle not before the 9th, and as you had to deliver the heifers, you went back with Green, leaving Charlie to take the cattle up, which was alright. I hope you will deliver your heifers without further trouble. It is alright to take the cows and calves up, if you wish to, and ship them off, or at least I have no objection. You say you found the cattle in Tahoka, traveling the fence, etc. Will you please tell me where you found the jogs in the fence. If you found any, you beat me. You say you told Chas. to settle them. That's alright; it is true there ought to have been some cows and calves put with them, but the fact is that the yearlings would not have been satisfied at the start had they been put in a clover field. You say they look like cattle in the Kansas City yards. Now, did you see those cattle or did you surmise or hear this. Did you go to the "jogs", or did some one tell you of them? You say that you were satisfied the cattle were in good shape when put there. I can tell you they were not in such good condition, or I would not have hastened to move them. I am only turning you over a little about writing when I dont think you saw them. I take it that in the case of the cows, you heard they were looking awful bad. Dont you know those cows could not look awful bad the next day after the calves were weaned. say the calves were dandies, and I expect that if you had seen the cows as well, although they had to be brushed pretty heavily, you would have written differently. I have a letter from Burns saying we lost Bishop Horn no. 50, one of the best of the Gudgell and Simpson bulls. dont know of any cause to assign his death to. Yes, you got away with Nelson pretty good, and I think Van Natta too, which I think you are capable of doing any time, as you are a calm cool trader, and I am awful glad of it. I think you did well to get off your tailings. They brought nearly as much as the top used to bring. You might tally again, if you can;. Yes, you had better take the white faced steer calves, and ship them to Lower. You had better wean all bald faced calves that are old Some are too young to wean. I want you to keep and winter the bull calves, or sell them at \$60. You may send a half dozen bull calves to Lower with the steer calves, if the cars run right. My Dear George: --

I have just received a letter from Bob, dated the 7th, in which he gives a splendid report of the cattle over the range, and especially at Tahoka Lake, from which place he has just returned. He says the cattle are looking better than when they were put in, and there is plenty of water and grass, which latter has been but very little damaged by the numerous fires of late. I am bothered no little about feeding the bulls down there. In fact it seems my grain will cost 46 ¢. I will feed at that, if I cant do any better. I enclose a letter from Dalton, wanting some bulls, and have written him that if you had 10 bulls (good ones) unsold, you could ship him them when you shipped at \$75.00. I dont know what you have, but if you can, send him 10 good calves when you ship the steer calves to Lower. Lower says he is ready for them. I expect that you had better ship them as soon as possible, for they wont do to go with the "S" steers in February. Anyway you had better take time and not hurt them. Ship at least one car-load of the best, say about 50, and put from 1 to 5 bulls (calves) to him. Dont ship to NXM unless they are good. I want him to have 10 good bull calves.

Bob shipped 750 cows last week, 27 cars, 9 to Chicago, 9 to Kansas City, and 9 to St. Louis. The returns showed that the average net price was \$22.29 per head. There was one car-load of young steers. It seems that people are still wild on cattle on the range. The



In case of payment of bill of goods, for instance, write "For Groceries for Branding Outfit, as per receipted bill attached". In case of labor, write, for example, "For Labor with Tanking Outfit, one month, Jan. 15 Feb. 15, with 2 o/o discount for sight draft".

Reports to this office show that we are losing lots of cattle, especially on the old "S" range, the worst losses being at Sul-Oglesby says he estimates at least 1,000 at that place, and if he is right, our loss on the old range will be 1500 or 2000 head. Alley is losing some atmTahoka, some 75 to 100. At Rattlesnake, he says they are doing better, also at Anderson's. At these places we are not losing so many, account of recent light showers. Ward's and McKenzie's seem to be doing the best of any. And this will continue for some time yet as the weather is both dry and cold. When it turns warmer there will be no moisture to bring the grass. The thing we need now is warmer weather and rains. I have had Sulphur fenced to keep the cattle from bogging, but poverty is the main cause, and the worst of it is we cant do anything for the cattle, so will have to grin and bear it. Hord is putting in his steers slowly. 1425# at \$4.75--pretty good. Lower says he is having too much mud. Dear George :--

Reports at this office show that we have had enough rain over all the ranches to start the grass well, although there is as yet very little surface water. The cattle have stopped dying, and we will be alright if we can get some more rain soon. The latest report from the old Long "S" cows near the Ancient Briton Ranch is that only 135 dead have been counted, and I am well satisfied we will not lose more than 200 at the outside figure. There were 1900 of these old cows sent out there last fall, and I consider this a very small loss. It is reported that a close examination of the Whitefaces shows a loss of 34. This is also a very small loss. Jack Alley reports that he has seen 60 dead, and does not think that the loss on his ranch will be over 100. Oglesby has not yet reported full loss on the old range, but from his letters would judge that 1500 will cover. I figure the loss to be about 2000 on kne all the ranches, or 5 o/o of entire stock. Burns has lost 14 out of the 200 bulls at his farm. But for the rain coming so early, our losses on all the ranches would have been two or three times this amount. Bob left Wednesday morning for the ranch, from which he has been absent since March 7th.

As soon as you are through, you can drive home. to Alley to-day to get ready and look for you about the 5th. I want you to cut back 1000 steers when you start. Cut the smallest threes and the largest twoos, and leave them at Jack's. These are to go to Bill's with the 1000 heifers. I want Jack to assist you, and you him until you get off. Dehorn all the steers. Think you had better use turpentine, cheap oil and carbolic acid, mixed, as a swab. Replying to your favor of recent date, will say, I think your report on dehorning is first class. The rain was certainly fine for you and your cattle, and I am satisfied that it will make the grass good. Yes, I am satisfied that dehorning has come to stay, and it will be a great improvement on the cattle, and, after thinking the matter over thoroughly, I believe Tehoka Lake Ranch is the best place to dehorn. I am anxious about the flies, and I would advise that you keep close watch over the cattle and keep them under herd a few days after you get home, as the worms in the head are very bad. I want you to dehorn all the steers while you are at it, and when you get through I want you to cut 1000 good steers, small \$ Threes and xxxxxxxxxxxx large Twos, a smooth lot, out for Bill and leave them there. Or, if you think best, top the whole herd for the largest cattle for him. This I leave with you. The first order is really for a top, as these 1000 steers will be for sale this fall. Bill surely has a good place for them near the railroad, and not far from Liberal, Kansas, where freights are cheaper. Therefore I think you had better give him the top of the herd. I know you don't like to do this, but I believe it is for our best interests. However, all depends upon the season. By taking the top 1000 and leaving them at ack, they ought to get a good start by the time Bill will be there. To-

day I order him to be there the first week in June, Bob is getting ready to turn the heifer yearlings, as well as the other yearlings, over to Jack by the first. He is gathering them now into Rattle-Snake pasture. I have ordered him to move all the cattle from Rattle-Snake up to Evans pasture, and then to cut out all steer yearlings, with 1000 heifers for Bill and take to Jack's. Jack will then cut out 1000 heifers for Bill, and gather the 1000 steers left for him and see him off. He will then dehorn his yearling steers. I have ordered Bob to dehorn all steer calves as they are branded this year. He has already dehorned all bulls at Old Pete's. So we are now "dehorners", and let it prove to be good or bad, we are trying it by the wholesale. Evans failed to settle with Bob, and I expect to eat the grass in the pasture even if I have to do it by suit. I am running a fence from Sulphur Draw to the Magnolias.

Letter from Burns says Ancient Briton Ranch is dry. This was written on the 11th. No green grass there as yet. I am sorry he moved the bulls. You did right about the yearlings. I wanted them to stay at Burns' until Jack gets Bill off. Then I want Jack to keep the 23 and take the 100 to Ward's, but will write him further if I can't come up. I don't want to put the bulls with the cows before June the 25th. I had intended to come up right away, but I have been detained here trying to get a government contract to supply the troops in Cuba with beef. Gen. Stoddard is trying to get it for me. Our strongest compecitor so far is

Shanghai Pierce. Stoddard is now trying to compromise with Pierce, and will offer him a part interest in our contract if he will not compete.

The Government wants 75,000 pounds of net beef teday-in-Guba per day in Cuba, 180 to 200 cattle. I have offered to put them there at 6 gross, or 12 cents net. I don't know whether I will get the contract or not. I will buy the cattle in Southern Texas. If I get the contract I can't say when I will come up. I have ordered Bob to send the bulls and our old white-faced bulls, 75 to 100 in number, with 400 or 500 oldest cows at Ward's wells, up to Oxsheer's to go with the other old cows.

C. C. Will takethis herd up, starting June 1st. I intend to sell this herd this fall if I can. I think I will drive it to Bill's, and probably through to Western Kansas and let Lower dribble them out by retail, or, in other words, I want to cash them.

As to the management of your herd from Jack's up, I have no instructions except to graze them through and watch the worms, and when you
get home I would again top the herd for 1000 and put them in your beef
pasture and let the others run on the creek. I now have an idea of handling the whole of the two-year-olds this fall, but can't say positively.

I am trying to push things as fast as possible.

The 12th nominee was ex-Governor Northern of Alabama, who declined to run, withdrawing in favor of the Texan. The three names getting the highest number of votes cast were to be elected respectively 2nd, 3rd and 4th vicepresidents. The election was by secret ballot. On the announcement of the result, my name was read first, and I had the honor of receiving the

Our pastor, Mr. Truett, was called upon to reply to the speech of welcome, which he did in such a manner as to capture the Convention, and was elected to give the opening address next year at Louisville, where, if possible, I want you to attend. J. B. Gambrell was elected President of the Educational Society, founded by John D. Rockefeller, and which directs his magnificent gifts. So you can see Texas sure enough hypnotized the Convention. Our paper is spoken of very highly up there. Our mutual friend, Dr. Hayden, was not recognized at the Convention. The last great thing that he has done was to bring suit against me and 34 other Baptists, claiming \$50,000 damage for crushing out his paper, and \$50,000 damage for interfering with his peace of mind, causing him to lose sleep, white-washing his hair, and racking his nerves.

Dewey's victory did not stop the war, and no one can tell where it will stop. It may end up in a life and death struggle between the combined world and the English speaking race. I think your decision regarding the war is right. Let those go who are over anxious, but when the country needs you, get a company of rough riders and go at it.

This morning I received a letter from Mr. Frank Lower, who informs me that you misunderstood my statements concerning the number, price and location of my steers. The remainder are steers, about equal numbers of threes and fours, with a few more fours than threes. These are all in one pasture or ranch. After cutting out the 400 spayed heifers and all the unmerchantable steers, I will sell the remainder in one bunch, with ten % out-back, at \$33.00, or at \$30.00 for the threes and \$38.00 for the fours I make you these prices wholesale as of course I can afford to sell at wholesale cheaper than at retail. I don't know what percentage are threes and what percentage are fours, but the best information I have is that there are a few more fours than threes. I am perfectly willing to take 1/2 cash and to carry you for the balance at 6 % for six months, provided you allow me a mortgage on the cattle. I am sure they are going to get a good bunch of cattle and sold at the very lowest conditions they could possibly be bought --- just at the close of the winter. have tickled the fancy, in such condition as they were, of the buyers. They must be good judges of cattle, or you would never have made the trade. Lower tells me in his letter that you have 4 to 5 hundred of ones and twos in your herd. This I was not aware of, as if you remember my idea and orders were to send them to the Huling Ranch with your stock cattleere.

I think you had better let him have the spayed cows on the same terms at about \$27.50, provided he wants them. This will give him about 1000 head 600 steers and 400 cows. But you must have an understanding with Lower that these are not to be mixed with our other cattle, and the expenses must be kept separate. And you might offer Lower, in case he takes the first 1000 head, the cut backs with 10 % off at \$30.00 no interest until July 1st, and see what he says. This would about alean wp your pasture with the exception of your twos and yearlings. If he does not want the cut-backs, my idea would be to take them up to coldwater later in the season. My idea then would be if we dont sell the twos to put all the "S" twos in the Running Water Pasture, about 6000 head with what you have ..... More of this later. Now by your contract, those men are bound after you take out the spayed cowsthe ones and twos, and then 20 % cut back, to pay you 33.00 per head for 3000 head, and no grumbling. The only trouble you will have will be to cut them down to 3000. So I would go to work and cut back the spayed cows, then the ones and twos, then the 20 % and ask them to take the balance. or allow you a cut off until they are reduced to the number. I presume you are holding your self in shape if you have made a mistake and haven't the proper number, to fill the whole number anyhow. I presume they will get the full half of four-year-olds

His last statement shows sales and disposition of all the cattle, except about 750 he says are dead. Last statement shows he kept some of the money. Have made up my mind to do the best I can with him on settlement and let him go, so I think the 5 W. L. S. cattle will stay at the ranch this winter. Frank is not dishonest but he has things very badly muddled, and to say the least of it, not satisfactory. Expect to leave here about the 16th for the A. B. Ranch, and will start from Big Springs, and hope to arrive at the ranch on or about the 22nd. It seems that
