

Roxbury Friday eve Oct 14th 1842

Dear Margaret

As I cannot come this week as I expected, I believe I will write to compensate in a measure my disappointment. It was my intention when I last saw you of visiting you this week but I am doomed to stay home three or four weeks longer. Sarah has gone to Rye again. Aunt Brooke has gone to New York and she wanted Sarah to be company for Uncle while she is gone. I believe she is going to stay about a week. I saw Isabella a few weeks since she said you was going to Newark. I suppose you have had a pleasant visit it is such a delightful place I shall always remember with pleasure our visit there. Mrs Purdy called last Sunday afternoon he stayed about an hour and a half and then left for the Yellow Cottage. He said he heard you had a bone to pick with him. Well! Margaret I suppose you will soon begin to enquire if there not any news to write but I declare I do not know of any that will be interesting to you but I will try to think of some. I believe the meeting of White Plains and several other towns are going to celebrate the battle of White Plains on the 28th of October. I expect it will be quite interesting. We had Mr. Moody to preach last Sunday. Mr. Harris was gone to North Castle three miles above the Plains they have organized a Church

there there they are going to name it St Stephens. Margaret do you never intend to write again? Only a letter from you would be a real treasure. But I believe you wrote last but that is so long ago I hardly know when that was so it all my own fault. Sarah wished me to send her love to you she has got over her sneak fit but she says she will not forget she wrote last June and that is the last time either of you has written. How is Amanda? are you as intimate as ever? I suppose you are. She is a fine girl. I should like to have been in New York very much to day to have seen the celebration of the Croton water. I dare say it was well worth seeing. Aunt Phoebe, Uncle John and Catherine Dick went down yesterday I suppose you have seen them. What beautiful moonlight evenings we have had for a few nights past. I often imagine myself sitting by your parlor window conversing with your dear self as we were wont to do last fall and gazing at the moon. I really believe we are going to have a storm it looks very much like it now and it very much the roads are very dusty. Mother and myself went to Rye last Friday and spent the day. We left there about half past five but did not get home until 8 o'clock the baby was sick and screamed nearly all the way so that we had to stop several times. I suppose you think there is great attraction in Rye there is I can assure you there are several very fine young gents but ~~but~~ one of them has been getting married he is related to Miss Barber's Isabella saw them both last winter Margaret I must tell you how very sociable the ladies are. Isabella has not been here since you called here that morning I have called there once and took dinner and since then and Delia has not been here since the first of last April. Amanda was here twice while she was up but she could not come mother time I do not know whether she is angry or not but I am determined not to go there if she does not come in eight months.

longer if it was not for seeing them at church we would not see them much often than you who live thirty miles off.

Mary Lane and Isabella are coming to New York next week or the week after and I will send word by them when I am coming. I have made up my mind to come to see you if you will have me provided you will come home with me as you promised.

Miss Childs did not make as long visit as she anticipated her mother and sister were going to Michigan they sent for her to see them start. Sarah and myself were to the Yellow Cottage while she was there and spent the day. I heard Richard was there and spent a very long Sunday evening with Charlotte.

The Country looks beautiful at present especially around the lake. the woods back of the lake are splendid you can see almost every variety of colour they lake is very full. I have been gathering nuts William and one got nearly three quarts this morning.

Margaret how does Robert come on has he been to see you lately. I saw him pass the other day but he did not call he was so very attentive when you was up I expect he has been down several times since. Mary mother says as soon as you get Bob she will have ~~the~~ ^{the} baby christened so make haste and get him if you want the poor child to have a name. Mother and Father join in sending their love to you. Mother sends her love to yours just Susan Bonney.

I sat down to write a short letter but I think I have written a good long one but you must excuse the uncorrected names in which it is written for I was in a great hurry.

It is getting late and I am rather sleepy therefore I must bid you
