This is the end of a Perfect Day! The Most unusual Thanksgiving I have ever spent. Bro. Rector said it was a day of Thanksgiving for Mother and all of us should be thankful for her life and what she has meant to the world. The service was beautiful, short and sweet. I am so sorry you could not have been here. So many asked do out you.

You have served your "sentence" well, and your JOB is done. We all love you more for what you have done for Mother. You did things that nobody else could have done for her. Get all of the ideas out of your head about what people have said. The greatest regret I have about it all is that I have been away from her for the last two years and could not have served her as I would like to have done. Her life will be a sweet memory to me forever. I did not have a minute with her alone. This morning I had the organ play in the chapel a number of her favorite songs as different ones came in. The three songs that were sung by the soloist were: My Savior Firt of All, Meet me There, and I'M going Home. She told me years ago she wanted it used at her funeral. Dear Aunt Julia:

I scarcely know how to tell you how much your letter meant to me. And Vada's was an especially sweet surprise. You both have given me comrage to carry on; and make me more anxious than ever to prove myself worthy of your confidence, and to succeed in making a real living for the children eventually.

I realize that my action is hardly understandable. It has always been assumed that the mother was the one to stay with her children and the father to leave. But in our case, Steve "squatted"! He absolutely refused to move out, or to accede to my wishes. Hf he were forced to leave, he would skop the country, he said, and leave me to support the children on my \$12.50 a week salary. Naturally, rent, food and clothing for four cannot be supplied on that. If I "gave" HIM the children, however, he would provide for them and I could go to ----! So for the CHILDRENS' sake, since obviously at the present, I am unable to do other than feed myself was for me to leave! It has already proved the right thing. He IS doing for them the necessary everyday things that he has refused to say were necessary before! I had nothing to take away in the way of clothes but what was on my back, xince the family typewriter and what study books I need for advancing myself. I have had to charge at Striplings on my own account, just ordinary evryday clothes in order to be able to work at all. They take \$2;50 out of my pay envelope each week to pay for these things. I pay

\$4.00 per week for a room to sleep in, and allow myself 50 cents per day for three meals, leaving me \$2.50 per week to have in my pocket book for anything that I should need cash for, that cant be charged at Striplings. Naturally, I dont care to keep that sort of thing up indefinately. I must find work that pays more. I am on the lookout for anything honest that will allow me to live better and save for a rainy day; also I should be taking out some form of accident or health policy in case some illness lays me low. But that will all come about some how, I feel sure. I am already better nervously and physically than I've been in years. It was slowly but surely killing me and destroying my reason, to continue living under the same roof with a man that kept me so agitated all the time.

the most, probably because he's so much younger and hasnt had so many vacations away from me as have John and Tory. Brian spent the night with me the other night, and all come down either to the store or to my room here to see me as often as they can. They really arent children any more, anyway. I mean most of the mother's ground work training has been accomplished; they are already set in their patterns for the future. From now on they need me mostly for moral support or advice, and I am accessible to them at any time for that. John has been self-supporting for two years now, and Tory will undoubtedly be so too, in another sear or two, with commercial art. I intend to get to the place financially where I can go with her to the best commercial art training school in the country when she is through with High, taking the longs along with us if advisable at that time.

Now, dear Aunt Julia, I havent told you all this bidding for your sympathy. I simply felt you were due a true statement of facts. I'm not feeling sorry for myself at all. On the other hand, I feel that God has been unusually kind to me. Things could be a lot worse! I am free to start life all over again, and intend to profit from now on from all the mistakes of the past. I am young and healthy. I'm not too proud to work at anything (honest), and WILL work into something worth while eventually. I thank God each night for such real friends as you

and Vada. The knowledge of your wishes to stand behind me, gives me great comfort and makes me very humble.

If you don't hear again from me until after the new year, please don't worry, or think me selfish. I spend each night polishing up for a better job; also am finishing up my Braille course, trying to finish a short story in Braille to give as a Christmas present to the Blind Institute.fr In other words, I have to sacrifice correspondence for these other necessary things. So, as I have not the cost of Christmas greeting cards either, wont you allow me to send you now, my very best of good wishes for the happiest Christmas of your life, and may 1939 be the best year of your life.

Glad you have some who compliment you or say nice things about you and your poems to others even if they do not tell you direct. Your life has made many others happy in this old world of strife, and you will rewarded for it someday, somehow. I wish it were in my power to make you happier, but at present I see no way of accomplishing it. I thought Abilene was a friendly town, but guess it is because you cannot go out as much as others and have no car to be nice to other with etc. You seem to have many friends who call, and are always going to parties and places, but I know how you feel to be in a house alone, or even with roomers who are not interested in you particularly. I feel the same way, but jusy have to submit to it.

W A has just written about a wonderful week-end he had in Richmond, and was entertained in private home by old ladies, and taken all over city to places of Historical interest, and simply saw everything of interest and it did not cost him ONE CENT as he hitchhiked both ways. I think it is grand of him to be able to do these things and employ him time and mind in learning instead of doing as so many other soldiers do, drink and gamble. He will make his mark in the world, and all of

you will be proud of him more than ever some day.

W A sent me some notes he got at a Mrs. Edda Duggan Jacobs' Home, and I have made copies and sending you one. He said he sent one to Alice. I seems he met the I W Duggan's by Marion's wife telling him to kook them up as she had had correspondence with IVEY W Duggan years ago. Then Mrs. Ivey Duggan told him to get in touch with this Mrs. Edda Duggan Jacobs, and he called her by phone, and she invited him out to hours for the night. They have twin bots 15 who are very smart and the husband is in some Gov. position. They must be wealthy for have cance etc and W A plans to be with them again and to enjoy canceing and other sports with the boys who seemed to take a great liking to him. He surely knows how to meet people and to make them like him. I know he is intensely interesting for his mind is on things of culture and education and learning and he grasps every opportunity to avail himself of such knowlege. I trust he can go to Williamsburg, Va. some week-end as you know that is the city that John D. Rockefeller rebuilt as of olden times at a cost of over \$27,000,000.00. It and Ford's Greenfield Village at Detroit, are two of the wonder places of the U S A.

About two weeks ago a big ma in the Maratime Commission came into our Shipyard and wanted to go around with me to meet the men I was checking daily. I introduced him to about 235 men out or 350 and he was delighted with the men as well as my ability to call each man by name. He leraned how the men felt towards me etc and complimented me on my splendid work among them. He returned to the yard last week and sent for me, and what do you suppose he wanted to tell me? He said when he got back to the Maratine Commission (it is the organization that sets salaries for all defence work) he told the head man about me and my work, and told him he knew that could not keep me at the present salary of 95 cts per hour, that I was too good a man for them to lose etc and how the men liked me and how I knew my work etc., so this man said he would raise my pay. Now, when this will come, 'do not know, but at any rate, I have at last found someone who is interested in me and can do something about it. Said would change my title so could pay me more, even that other time keepers are getting. If this happens soon, it would be best forme to remain wher I am. Then, the Maratime Commission is trying to get the job of placing all ex-service men in jobs, so there may be a place in that work for me after the war. This man also gave me the name of his personal friend in Los Angeles who is head of the Civil Service Com. and insisted that I go talk to this man and get his advice as to what - could get into in Civil Service at my age and with my qualifications etc., and this I hope to do some of these days when I take a day off and go to L.A. I know that my own boss will keep me where I am as long as I stand for it, and he cannot do anything more for me even if he wanted to, but this Maratime Co. man can, so I feel mighty happyover this prospect. Gov. matters work slowly, so may be some time before head from this, but it is inprespect anyway.

I had a lovely day Sunday. Attended S S and church, had good dinner, then a friend came over from LA to visit me (Man 1 lived with in L.A. when there before, and whom I knew in Dallas years ago) then I attended League at 6 P.M. and a wonderful program following what is called Sacred Chautaqua, program of which I am enclosing.

Each Monday night at Municipal Auditorium, same place where Fuller preaches, the city has f ree program, and - attended with a friend last nite. It was a group of boys and girls from LA and was very interesting. Dancing takes places, all free, after the stage show and community singing, but I had to come home and to bed as could not stay up so late. There is something going on in L.B. all the time if one could take advantage of it and that is why so many old people are here to reture and die. There are many thousands here. I feel that some should be evacuated to towns w where no defense work is on so would give room for us defense workers.

I attended "uller's services Sunday before last again and enjoyed it. He is to have a very big Easter program, so hope to attend. Will use larger audi-

torium, as there are three different ones in this huge building.

There are some other things - wanted to tell you, but cant recall them just now. Fixed my own supper tonite and enjoyed it as the third man in this little apt is away on vacation for few days, and my, what a relief to be alone when want to write or read, and not have radio blasting continually on some program not interested in. If my friend would get rid of this man, would be happy here, but since he wont I am trying to find an apt. alone. Can get any one of several to share with me when get right kind of apt.

Haven't heard from R F in long time, so am wondering how they are. Tom never writes anymore so have no idea of his whereabouts. I have many letters that I should write but I simply do not feel like it as is about all I can do to keep going with such long hours. However, must take outings occasionally to get renewed interests. Sunday one of the men where work is going to take me and some others out to a swell place to eat known as Knotts Berry Farm, so 40 minutes drive from here. It is a hsitorical place and takes hours to see it all, and get good dinner along with it. I am looking forward to go there with much interest as have always wanted to go and never had the opportunity.

Trust that you and others are well. Love and best wishes, ever. Must get this and letter to W A in P.O. tonite so will get off earlier. Just three blocks from room to P.O. to the city that John D. Rokefeller rebuilt as of olden times at a cost of P.O. ot




