Comrade Still was born in 1847 in the State of North Carolina and died in Ft Worth Texas August 22nd 1916.

He enlisted in Company "B" 7th N.C.Inft., in 1861 and served in Army of Northern Virginia until the close of the war. He participated in the battles of 7 days around Richmond, Fredericksburg, Gettysburg, Malvern Hill, Gains Farm, Sharpsburg and many other important engagements.

He removed to Texas after the close of the war, living for several years in Johnson County and later removed to this City.

Comrade Still was a consistant member of the Presbyterian Church, a member in good standing, first in Pat Cleburne Camp at Cleburne and later in R.E.Lee Camp #158 U.C.V. Ft worth. His record as a soldier is un-surpassed and though quiet and un-ostentatious in bearing was an honorable and useful citizen. Therefore,
