Dr Daniel Coush's father died soon after he came to the Kanawha Valley leaving a farm "heavily timbered & left a few acres". The children were all young. Daniel in 1826 went to his uncle Mr Richardson in Harmer and went to school to a tutor in his family. When he returned was a clerk in a store in Gallipolis & met his brother in law Samuel McCallach at Pt Pt. - later started a produce boat up Kanawha in partnership with James Hogg. Afterward studied medicine with Dr Shaw, attended lectures at Louisville Ky. When he finished his studies practiced medicine with Dr Shaw for some years. He married Catharine Ellen Newford and lived in Pt Pt. for some time then moved to Mercers Bottom on her farm left her by her father Robert Newford.

Samuel Couch b. Sept 16, 1752, was married in old Swedes Church, Phila Jan 3, 1776 to Ann Luigs who was born at Mt Holly N. J. He is said to have owned the land on which West Phila is located. He moved to Va in 1777, buying several thousand acres of land in Spotsylvania Co. He was a large slave owner but being a Quaker liberated his slaves. Their children were

Gen Wade Hampton III is buried
in Trinity Churchyard, Columbus Ga
under the sheltering arms of a great
oak tree & in sight of the equestrian
statue of himself erected on the capital
grounds by his state.

Over his grave is a fine white marble
tomb, whose inscription reads.

Sacred to the Memory of
Wade Hampton

1861 - Lieutenant General C. S. A. - 1865 -

Son of
Wade and Anna Fitzsimons Hampton
Born in Charleston
March 28, 1818
Died in Columbia
April 11, 1902.

Whole hearted, Faithful - and Loyal -

My sword I gave to him that shall suc-
ceed me in my pilgrimage, and my
courage and skill to him that can get it.
My wounds and my scars I carry with
me to witness for me that I have fought
the battles who will now be my reward-
er. When the day that he must go hence
was come, many accompanied him to
the river side into which as he went he said:
'Death where is thy sting?'

Gen Wade Hampton

The day after his death, The State, (Columbia S.C. newspaper) editorially said:

"So proudly modest a man was Wade Hampton that the records may be searched in vain for any full story of his life. He would never furnish the materials, and even when he served his state in the United States Senate, the congressional directory contains no further statement concerning him than that he was born in S.C. that served in the Confederate army and been elected to the senate. It is difficult in the extreme, therefore to present even an outline of his distinguished career.

Scarcely among the memorials of the war in which he bore so conspicuous a part - will reveal his military record, and ^{few} the memories of old friends, & followers may be garnered incidents of his service to the state in time of peace."

The Durrett Branch
of
Hampton Family

Sarah Hampton, daughter of William Hampton,
Planta's wife Martha Catlett, of Drysdale Parish
Caroline County, was married sometime prior
to 1746. ^(date of her father's will) to Richard Durrett of Caroline County, fam-
ily of Orange County.

The Durrett's were a prominent + wealthy family
of the central Piedmont region of Virginia in
Orange, Albemarle, + Spotsylvania Counties.
(see Wood's History of Albemarle Co. + Crozier's Abstracts
of Spotsylvania Records) and later generations
established well known families in Kentucky + Col.
Robert F. Durrett of Leesville was long president
of the Filson Club, and probably Kentucky's greatest
archaeologist.
