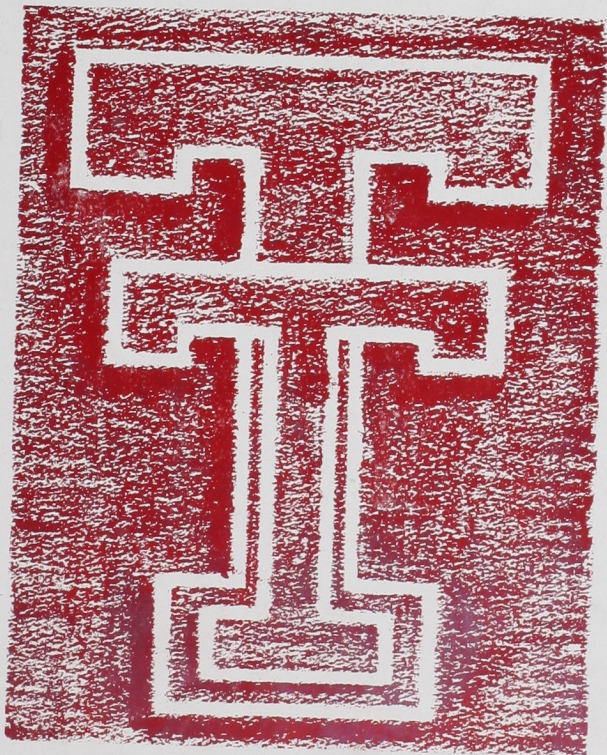

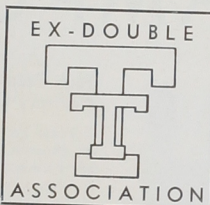

The membership fee is \$1 per year, which is used to defray office expenses of the organization. The association has no paid workers and practically all the money collected is used for stationery and postage.

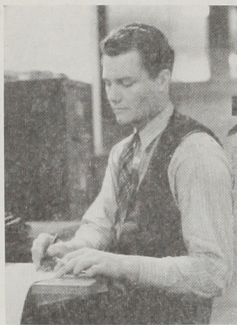
members of the council are: W. L. Stangel, chairman since 1937; H. C. Pender, H. F. Godeke; and Tom Douglass, student representative.

Elva Baker is assistant to Dean of Men at Tech. Jake Geron is with the Farm Security Administration. Jack Hardy owns and operates a diaper cleaning plant in Houston, Texas. Wilson Gilmore is with the Colgate Palmolive-Peet Soap Company of Dallas, Texas. J. H. Dallas is Postmaster at Brownfield. Melvin Trostle is City Engineer of Temple, Texas. Thirty-eight of these ex-lettermen are now training athletes and building character in public high schools of Texas. These persons represent only a few of the outstanding members of this association.

★ ★ ★ The Toreador Editor Resigns

Bill Wood, editor of THE TOREADOR since February 1940, resigned to accept a position as assistant sports editor of the Fort Worth Press. He has loved his journalism work and his resignation brings to a close one of the most colorful careers in the history of the school of journalism at Texas Tech.

He has been interested in journalism a long time and The Western World paper of the Lubbock High school under his editorship won All-American honors for the first time.

He began his college reportorial duties at Tech in 1937 as a freshman. He later worked on The Daily Texan and the Austin Statesman-American as general reporter while a student in the University of Texas. He then worked for a time with the Austin Tribune. In the fall of 1940 he returned to Tech and his writings again appeared in THE TOREADOR and in the Texas Tech Magazine. He held down the job of news editor for both publications and wrote for the La Ventana in his spare time. When Edd Kidd resigned because of health conditions Bill became editor of THE TOREADOR and last spring he was unopposed for the job. The 1940-41 paper received an All-American first class honor rating. This year he set the pace with his Techsians and Texas which was widely read in other schools.

Last summer he was married to Emily Ann Mack of Fort Worth, a 1941 graduate from the English department. They will now make their home in Fort Worth

Tech Faculty Elects Advisory Committee

Texas Technological College continues its progress under the able leadership of President Clifford B. Jones who is always seeking means of securing closer working relations between faculty and administration. This has been brought about by the election of an advisory committee without executive power by the faculty at the suggestion of the President. This committee of twelve is to serve as "a medium for clearing constructive suggestions", in an attempt to bring about this closer working relationship.

Two representatives each from the divisions of agriculture, engineering and home economics, and six from arts and sciences were named. They will consider problems of faculty, students, and the college as a whole, and will have a representative on the college administrative council.

Representatives by divisions are: Arts and Sciences—Dr. C. B. Qualia, head professor of foreign languages; Dr. W. B. Gates, head professor of English; Dr. Fred W. Sparks, mathematics professor; Prof. T. C. Root of the economics and business administration department; Dr. Bessie B. League, associate professor of biology; and Dr. J. William Davis, assistant professor of government.

Agriculture—Dr. A. W. Young, head professor of plant industry; Prof. Mart G. Pederson, associate professor of dairy manufacturing. Engineering—Prof. J. H. Murdough, head professor of civil engineering; Prof. F. L. McRee, associate professor of civil engineering. Home Economics—Miss Mabel D. Erwin, head professor of clothing and textiles; Miss Vivian Johnson, head professor of home economics education.

Survey of Tech Students Is Made

Agriculture, animal husbandry and forestry are the occupations of the parents of 35 per cent of Texas Technological College's 3,549 students, a survey of parents' occupations in the Registrar, W. P. Clements, office shows. Included in those classifications are farmers, ranchers, stockmen, dairymen, florists, gardeners, trappers, herdsman, lumber, nursery and poultry men, saw mill and textile mill workers.

Further statistics show a total of 478 Texas towns in 182 counties, twenty other states, one U. S. possession, and two foreign countries listed as home addresses of Tech students.

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Men's Residence Halls Are Named

Commemorating two former directors of Texas Tech, the college board has designated the two men's residence halls on the campus *West Hall* and *Sneed Hall*.

The dormitory known since its completion in 1934 as "Men's Dorm", "Horn Hall", and "Men's Dorm No. 1", has received the official name of *West Hall*, honoring the memory of the late James H. West of Houston. The newer dormitory, completed in 1939, is named for the late Joe T. Sneed, Jr., Amarillo cattleman and chairman of the board of directors at the time of his death last spring.

Tech Leads American Colleges in Extension Work

Among the universities and colleges of the United States, Texas Tech leads in offering air corps preparatory courses by correspondence, according to information received by the extension division from Joseph R. Peller, director of the United States Army Recruiting Station of West Texas.

The extension division, working in unison with Major Peller and his assistant, Captain Perry C. Euehner, has published a bulletin outlining these courses.

Dr. Bing Chang Ling, a student from Shanghai, China will attend Texas Tech next semester.

She has completed work on the doctorate, but can't secure passage home. She was scheduled to return to China December 26, but her passport has been extended until she can safely return home.

Dr. Ling went to Wellesley four years where she received her B. A. degree. She received her M. A. at Michigan and for the past two years she has been attending Yale. Dr. Ling will continue her studies here only as a courtesy, since she already has her Ph. D. She is in the United States as a student.

January 1 room and board in the dormitories was advanced to \$30 per month. The \$2.50 raise was passed upon by the Board of Directors in their meeting November 15.

Board of Directors and management of the college have been anxious to keep the living costs at Tech at the lowest level possible but it was necessary to make the increase since it was impossible to maintain the dormitories at the old price of \$27.50.

Tech Is To Cooperate In National Defense Work

Various phases and general problems of assisting in the recreation of young men stationed at the new air base located 10 miles west of Lubbock were discussed at a called meeting of the presidents of all campus organizations in December.

Approximately 100 campus organizations were represented at the meeting at which President Clifford B. Jones presided.

Several faculty members and townspeople were called upon to voice their opinions about various phases of the national emergency.

Since that time President Jones has announced his plans of appointing a joint faculty-student committee. The committee operating on the campus will coordinate all defense activities of the college.

Members of the committee which has not yet been announced, will cooperate with Lubbock committees in an effort to provide entertainment for men at the Twin Engine air base and provide a centralized point for other campus defense activities.

James Potts, freshman agricultural student from Lubbock, has been awarded a trip to Chicago by the Santa Fe railway company. Potts was given the award for outstanding 4-H club work in high school.

Robert B. Watkins, Tech student, has charge of the Methodist Plainview Mission circuit.

Miss Jane Prickett represented Tech as Sun Princess in the Southwest Sun Carnival in El Paso from December 29 to January 1.

President Clifford B. Jones attended a meeting of presidents of Texas institutions of higher learning in Austin, January 12. The meeting was called by Sam H. Whitely, president of East Texas State Teachers college for the purpose of discussing defense measures as they affect colleges.

Dr. Jules De Launey, associate professor of physics, is the latest addition to the Tech faculty. He came from the Southern College of Optometry in Memphis, Tenn.

Dr. De Launey was a Rhodes scholar some years ago and received his first two degrees from Oxford. He received his doctors degree from Stanford University.

SPORTS REVIEW

Bowl Jinx Is Unbroken

Texas Tech Red Raiders failed to break the five year old "Bowl Jinx" as they fell to the Tulsa Hurricanes in a 6-0 hard fought hectic game New Years Day in the Sun Bowl. According to El Paso sports writers and our coaches, the array of sophomores and juniors, along with the 12 graduating seniors played their best ball game of the year, but the hefty Tulsans led the attack all the way in the air and on the ground to take the thriller.

The Hurricane's first and winning tally came in the closing minutes of the game when Glenn Dobbs tossed the pig skin to Judd on the Raiders 24 who charged to the 18 before two tacklers closed in, but he turned on the power and completed the march to victory for Tulsa.

The Red Raiders made two scoring threats in the second and third quarters but failed to push over a counter.

Ty Bain, quarterback from Tech, was unanimously chosen by sports writers, coaches, and players, themselves as the most valuable Raider and as a result was presented with a gold watch with a chain and knife. The presentation was made by Bill Parker, Tech's director of sports publicity before El Paso sports writers and about 700 fans.

Campus Boxers Enter Golden Glove Tournament

Amateur campus boxers have been in training for the past three weeks at the Tech gymnasium, and several will sign up for the 1942 Golden Glove Tournament sponsored by the Avalanche Journal Athletic club. The tournament will open February 2, and continue until all bouts have been completed. 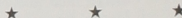

the "Radiolocator", which is used to lo-
cate Nazi bombers before they drop
bombs. These men engage in non-com-
bat work only and are paid good wages
by Great Britain. In addition, they re-
ceive food, lodging, clothing, medical
care, and hospitalization free of charge.

The Civilian Technical Corps is quite
an Alumni Club. Already men in its
membership include members of the
alumni of nearly seventy American col-
leges and universities.

J. Murray Mitchell, American Ad-
visor to the Corps, in writing to Presi-
dent Jones, pointed out that Mr. L'Roy
had brought great honor to Texas Tech-
nological College in his volunteering for
the Corps. He was required to pass
two examinations which a large per-
centage of men applying have failed to
pass. After passing his technical ex-
amination, he was required to pass a
very thorough physical examination.
L'Roy will be with the Radio repair di-
vision.

These men by learning the art of tech-
nical defense can be of great service
to our own nation should it, in the near
future, have a problem of technical de-
fense. They may be called back any
time they are needed here in our United
States for defense work; otherwise they
will be in England for three years, or
the duration of the war, whichever is
the shorter period.

college the past year. He has just com-
pleted a correspondence course in "In-
sects and Diseases" under O. B. Howell,
professor of horticulture.

C. E. Williams, August 1937 graduate, is teaching math in the High School at Raton, New Mexico.

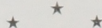

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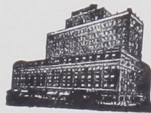
