TWO CHAIRS FETCH \$500.

Other Good Prices Got at the Lehne Sale of Art Objects.

Quite a large audience of bidders was attracted to the Anderson auction rooms yesterday in spite of the bad weather by the sale of the Lehne collection of old furniture, china and cut glass. Mr. Lehne has long been known as a collector of art objects and some of the pieces sold after lively bidding for good figures.

The highest price of the day was \$500, which S. S. Palmer bid for two Chippendale mahogany side chairs. These chairs had cabriole legs, carved knees and claw and ball feet. The uprights were fluted, supporting an elaborately carved bow back.

A Chippendale settee upholstered in old "petit point" tapestry sold for \$150.

A very beautiful original Sheraton mahogany desk with a bookcase top sold to H. W. Ewald for \$325. This bookcase had double latticed glass doors, with broken arch pediment, holly inlays and original brass mounts.

An original mahogany highboy with cabriole legs, claw and ball feet and fluted corner pieces sold to Smith and Watson for \$200.

Mrs. M. Wertheim bought a corner china cabinet of mahogany for \$180.

A very unusual Sheraton mahogany sideboard brought \$300.

A handsome wall cellarette of mahogany made by John Needles of Baltimore, sold to F. Gawan for \$205.

A pair of curious and very beautiful knife boxes, sold to Mrs. Skinner for \$90. These boxes were urn shaped with silver mounts.

Mr. Skinner also purchased an ornate extension table plateau of gilt and mirrors for \$180. This was a large and handsome dinner table decoration very elaborate and unusual.

Robert Hoe purchased a mahogany highboy for \$230 and a high post mahogany bedstead was sold to J. B. Roy for \$160.

A copper and lustre tea set sold in the afternoon for \$180 to C. Buckingham.

The total afternoon sale amounted to \$9,937 and the evening sale to \$5,962, making a total for the day of \$9,899.

The sale of Mr. Lehne's furniture continues this afternoon. In the evening his collection of old prints is to be sold.

MEMORIAL MINUTE.

TRINITY CHURCH VESTRY-ROOM,
New Orleans, La., July 6, 1889.

In connection with the burial service, which consigns to its final resting place all that is mortal of our late friend and companion, the Vestry of Trinity Church desires to place on record a memorial minute to their fellow-member, the late JOHN H. MAGINNIS, as the expression of their estimate of his worth and of their profound sorrow at his loss.

In the startling suddenness with which he was called away we recognize an impressive illustration of the fact that "in the midst of life we are in death." But we also recall with gratitude the truth that his noble life was a preparation for the change, and that the summons which came so swiftly only translated him to a higher life.

In his departure from us he has left us as his best legacy the memory of an unsullied character and an integrity which knew no stain. He blended the force of a powerful will with a gentleness that was almost feminine in its delicacy, and his unusual executive ability and clearness of judgment were always mingled with kindness and tenderness to those who were associated with him. Quiet and unostentatious in manner, he was yet a born leader of men, and in his business relations his judgment was always relied upon as sound and correct. In his relations to the church he was deeply interested in the welfare of the parish, and made its prosperity the subject of his constant concern. In the bosom of his family he was the embodiment of tender solicitude for the comfort and welfare of those dependent upon him, and in all the relations of life the natural powers of his character were softened and sweetened by a truly Christian spirit and a constant devotion to duty.

In the sudden loss which we are called upon to endure we are consoled by the fact that his death was but the transition to the life immortal, and so is his eternal gain.

WILL OF JOHN H. MAGINNIS.

The last will of the late John H. Maginnis, dated November 29, 1884, was admitted to probate to-day before Judge King of the Civil District Court.

He leaves one-third of his estate to his wife, and the remaining two-thirds to his children, subject to the usufructuary rights of his wife. He appoints his wife, Lizzie Connelton Tweed, Arthur A. Maginnis and C. B. Maginnis executors without bond.

TOWN TALK AND DOINGS.

Tweed's son-in-law, Mr. John H. Maginnis, was killed by lightning yesterday in his bath house at a small suburban town on the Mississippi River, near New Orleans. Last fall Mrs. Maginnis, Tweed's daughter, wife of the gentleman killed yesterday, lay in New York so ill that her death was momentarily expected. She recovered sufficiently, however, to be removed to her home in New Orleans. It seems remarkable, under the circumstances, that her husband should be the first to die. He was a strong, stout man, with jet black mustache, and the couple fairly idolized each other. It was their custom to spend their summers in the North, and they were expecting to start for Poland Springs, Me., in a few days.

TWEED'S SON-IN-LAW KILLED.

Mr. John H. Maginnis Struck by a Bolt of Lightning While in Bathing.

NEW ORLEANS, July 4.—Mr. John H. Maginnis of the firm of A. A. Maginnis & Son, one of the largest mercantile and financial houses in this city, was killed by lightning to-day while in swimming at his bath house at Ocean Springs, a small suburban town on Mississippi Sound. The bolt passed through the roof of the bath house, struck Mr. Maginnis on the back of his head, breaking his neck, and passing through a large post, which was shivered to pieces.

Mr. Maginnis was interested in a number of the leading industries here—the Maginnis oil mills, Maginnis cotton factory, Maginnis warehouse, and others. He married several years ago a daughter of Wm. M. Tweed, the well-known politician of New York, the marriage being one of the most famous and grandest in that city.

BURIED IN METAIRIE.

Funeral Services of the Late John H. Maginnis.

About 9 o'clock yesterday morning the rain, which had been threatening the city for several days past, gave vent, and is literally poured for about an hour.

The funeral of the late John H. Maginnis was to have taken place at 10 o'clock, but it was after 11 before the funeral did take place. Even then the water was so high that it was impossible to cross the street without wading.

The Rt. Rev. J. N. Galleher, bishop of Louisiana, assisted by Dr. W. A. Snively of Trinity church, and Rev. A. G. Bakewell of Trinity chapel, conducted the ceremonies.

The body was taken from the house, corner of Jackson and Pryor streets, to Trinity church. The funeral procession as it went slowly up the aisle of the church, presented a solemn appearance. Dr. Snively and Rev. Mr. Bakewell led the way; behind them followed the bishop attired in his purple cap of office and black robe, lined with purple.

The Episcopal burial service was then gone through with, very quietly, without any music whatever, the impressive voice of the bishop made it more solemn.

The twelve pallbearers rested the handsome black plush coffin on the stands in front of the chancel, after which they took seats. On the coffin was a gold plate inscribed: "John H. Maginnis, died July 4, 1889." A beautiful cross of white roses and white orange myrtle with dark green ferns rested on the chancel steps. This floral offering was the only one at the church, and was presented by Mr. George Q. Whitney. Flowers filled the parlor of the residence and presented a beautiful appearance, and their perfume was delicious.

The deceased was interred in the family tomb at Metairie cemetery. The following were the pallbearers: J. M. Jr., H. V. Elder, R. Simpson, S. Conway, W. W. Lyons, Charles Allen, L. W. Lyons, J. S. Sanderp. Honorary pallbearers: H. Marshall, P. de Verges and W. Harrison.

Funeral services for Ernest P. Sands of 22 Hillside avenue, Glen Ridge, who died Monday at his home after a long illness, will be conducted tomorrow at 8 P. M. at the home by Rev. L.
