Lyndon Wins All Precincts Except Fox Hollow; Area Approves 3 Amendments

Palo Pinto County followed the trend of the nation Tuesday, giving President Johnson an overwhelming endorsement for a four-year term in the White House. Total unofficial county vote in the presidential election was 5,540, with Johnson receiving 3,791 to Sen. Barry Goldwater's 1,748, representing 68 per cent plus of the total vote for the President compared to 31 per cent plus for Goldwater.

Living For y-Five Years

After 45 years, J. Q. Locke has tendered his resignation as a special correspondent for the Index from Turkey Creek or Union Hill, and to some of his readers is known as "Uncle Fuller."

And the reason is because after living in the country for 61 years, Mr. Locke has now moved to Mineral Wells. He sold his farm, six miles north of Mineral Wells, 199 acres of the farm to Pat Gallagher and 160 acres to Ralph Martin of Fort Worth.

Mr. Locke was born on the Brazos River, 4 1/2 miles west of Mineral Wells, in a log cabin on the banks of the Brazos (known then as Indian Creek) in 1877. He moved to farm north of Mineral Wells 10 years later, where he has lived since. He boastfully claims he has been out of Texas only once—a trip to Oklahoma—and that he has never seen the gulf or the ocean, despite that he is a Baptist and is not afraid of water.

His children, five sons and one daughter, are all married. Three of the boys live in Mineral Wells, one in Fort Worth and the other in Tyler. The daughter lives in Idaho. Only he and Mrs. Locke are left at home now. They live at 1405 S.E. 2nd Street.

Readers of the Index will miss his articles, for they have been most interesting and the news mixed with some very clever paragraphs. His contributions have been the most outstanding of any received from the rural sections in the 48 years that the Index has been published as a daily paper. The appreciation of the management of the paper goes to him and with it the very best wishes to Mr. and Mrs. Locke and the family.

A letter received by the Index Thursday stated:
Dear Index:

It is with sincere regret that I must offer you my resignation as your correspondent from Union Hill.

Your entire staff has treated me with much courtesy and kindness throughout all these years, for which, please accept my thanks. I have enjoyed the work and trust that my feeble efforts have not, in any manner, detracted from the value and popularity of your good paper.

The Index Is A Mellow 65 Years Young Today

The Mineral Wells Daily Index, which began publication on May 5, 1900, and hasn't missed an edition or a payroll since, is 65 years old today.

Established by the late C. W. Wilson and W. B. Newton, who came to Mineral Wells from the

East, the newspaper was printed the first five years with type set exclusively by hand. Several men and women worked at the type cases. In 1905, the first typesetting machine, Mergenthaler, was installed here, making it possible to set all the news by machine, but the display advertising continued to be handset.

With the rapid changes being effected in newspaper printing, the Index now has gone offset, and seldom is a line of type set by hand.

The first newspaper in Mineral Wells was a weekly sheet, printed by a man named J. W. Gibson, back in 1882. It had several names prior to 1900 when the Index was established. Two of them were "The Graphic" and "The Resorter." This newspaper was taken over by the late J. T. Story, Sr., a veteran newspaperman. His two sons, Jim Tom, Jr., and Bob Story, changed the name to the "Morning Health Resort," and resumed publication each morn-

ing after several years of non-publication. This was in the early years of 1900. In 1914, the "Morning Health Resort" was sold to the Index, and the two papers consolidated, with the morning paper suspending. Some 45 years ago, Wilson and Newton reorganized the Daily Index into a stock company, with Wilson having the majority of stock, and remaining as managing editor. He later died.

Walter Murray, who came to Mineral Wells as manager of the Index in 1929, purchased the newspaper in 1936, operating it with dedication and dispatch until his death in 1959.

Mr. Murray also had other newspaper interests in Breckenridge, Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, and Cleburne.

Bob Hickey and Bill Houghton have been co-publishers of the Daily Index for the past six years. Porter Oakes is the managing editor, and Bill Cameron is business manager.

Today, the Index plant is a most modern printing establishment. Electronic machines set all types, and the forms, or page layouts are photographed and printed on a super-speed offset press, providing much better looking publication.

Two of the Index "family" today have a combined total of 104 years service with Mineral Wells' daily newspaper of 65 years. They are Ollie Duffield, back shop foreman, who has 57 years, and Bill Cameron, business manager, with 47 years. Duffield has been with the Index since 1908; Cameron, since 1918.
