The spirit of Mrs. W. S.
Riggs has been called to its
Home Above, death releasing
that spirit from the tired body
last night at 7:20 o'clock.

There was never a life of
more earnest, efficient service
to others than was that of Mrs.
Sarah Jane Riggs.

Born in Tennessee February
26, 1841, her childhood was
touched by many of the pio-
neer conditions of that state.

Coming to Texas in 1851 she
entered upon the scenes of the
history of Bell county, when
Belton was still known as No-
lanville.

The section now known as
Tennessee Valley was settled
by a colony under the leader-
ship of Oliver Bigham, father
of Mrs. Riggs. Of the five
children of the Bigham family
one now survives, Swan Big-
ham of this city.

At the age of seventeen Mrs.
Riggs was married to R. M.
White. To them one son was
born who died in early young
manhood.

When the call of the Confed-

tives with a host of friends.

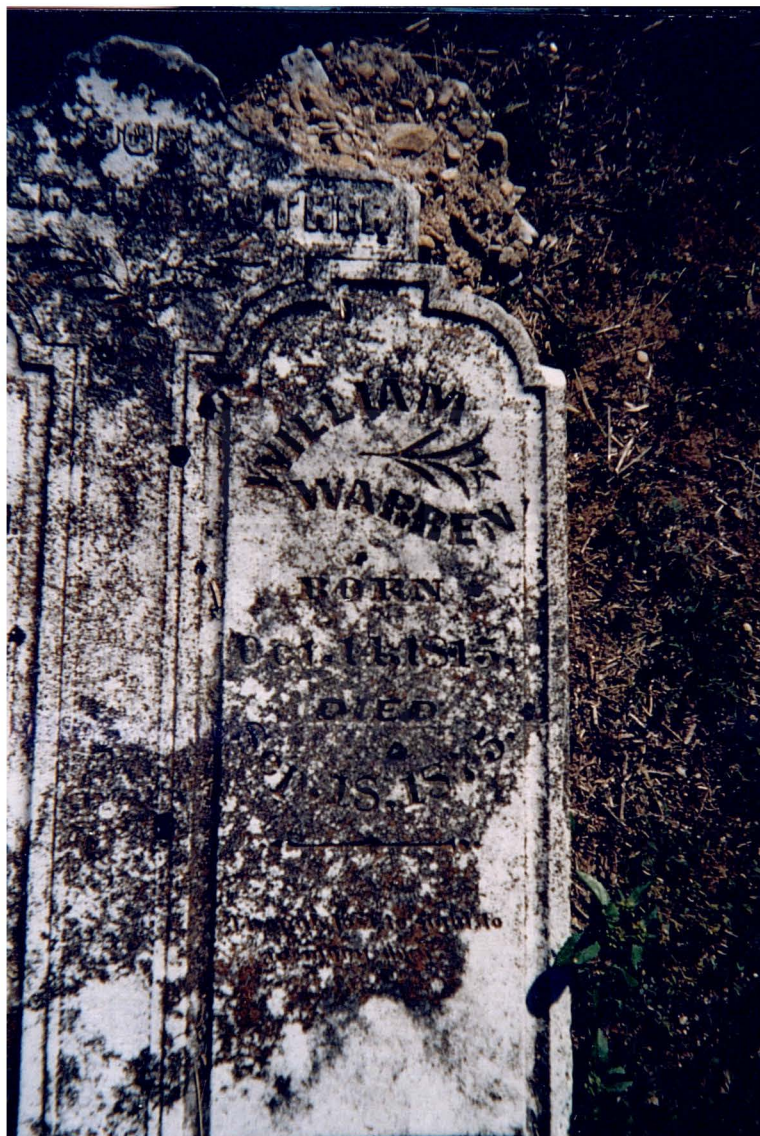

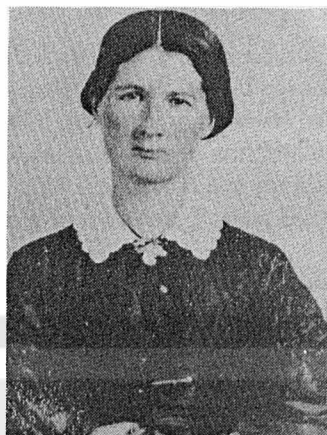
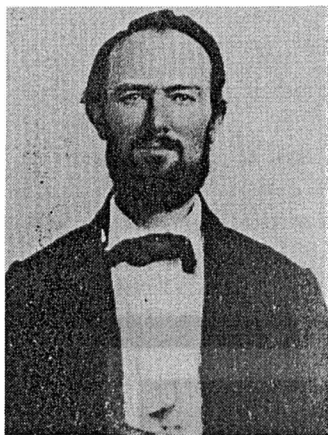

in the medical corps. When the war ended, he returned by boat and disembarked near Galveston.

After the war, Burns, a farmer, assembled a block of land for a homeplace about six miles northwest of Temple and two miles south of Old Howard. He purchased 116 acres from Silas Baggett on July 6, 1867, then added about 100 acres from T.W. Foster in April 1870, then completed his acreage by purchasing 60 acres in August 1870 from Fred Neibling. He bordered his land with bois d'arc trees on three sides and a country road on the fourth.

On this land Burns built a substantial home of stone and lumber. Rock walls about 10 feet apart went through the center of the house. There was a front hall and large rooms on either side had fireplaces. Rooms were located off the back hall and a porch went across the front of the house. Two generations resided there before it was demolished and replaced in 1914.

Mary Ann Burns died March 31, 1896 and he died March 19, 1907. Their children were: Thomas Andrew (1853–1933) who married Fanny Breedlove; William John (1854–1934) who married Annie Elizabeth Messer; Mary Jane (1856–1951) who married James Lee Irish; James Vannoy (1859–1930); Martha Ann (1861–1936) who married Joe H. Strange; Robert Emmet who married Mollie O'Keefe; Alice who married Olympus; Eugene (1869–1933); and Ernest (1872–1914) who married Minnie Ray.

All of the family are buried in marked graves in Hillcrest Cemetery, Temple except W.J. and Annie Burns, who are buried in Pendleton Cemetery, and Robert and Mollie Burns who are buried in Abilene.

John Crockett Burriss

A letter written from Morgan County, Alabama dated July 13, 1872, gives some information on the family of John Crockett Burriss, the first of his family known to have settled in Bell County. In the letter written by Elizabeth Burriss Epperson, sister of John Crockett, the names, dates of death and the whereabouts of those family members still alive are given. The letter did not include the names of the ancestors, but did give their death dates. It also said that all the deceased family members were "lying in a roe at Shiloh," a cemetery in Morgan County.

Further research revealed that some 100 graves on the west side of the Shiloh Cemetery were unidentified, including the Burriss graves. It is thought that the father's name may have been William, but there is no absolute proof.

John Crockett Burriss (Oct. 13, 1810–Sept. 13, 1880) was probably born in Tennessee. He is buried in the Hammersmith plot in South Belton Cemetery, but vandals destroyed his tombstone prior to 1983, and before July 1984, markers at the graves of his wife and two of his grandchildren were taken away.

On December 24, 1840, John Crockett Burriss married Elizabeth Curry (July 3, 1820–May 21, 1851). Elizabeth Burriss is said to be the first person buried in South Belton Cemetery. She died three days after the birth of her third child. Her grave is in the Hammersmith plot on the east side of the cemetery.

It is known that John Crockett Burriss came to Texas before 1834. He furnished meat, corn and other supplies to the Texas Army during the Revolution; served as a mounted militia man in Company A, Robertson County during the days of the Republic; and during the Civil War, he was a member of Company B, Battalion Home Guards, Capt. James H. Weathersby commanding. In 1849 he signed the petition of F.A. Hill requesting that a new county be created out of Milam and Robertson Counties, the new county to be called Falls. He owned land in several Texas counties and is an approved ancestor in the Daughters of the Republic of Texas and in the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Children of John Crockett and Elizabeth Curry Burriss were:

1. William Wilson Burriss, Sr. (Feb. 18, 1848–Jan. 5, 1927) born in Milam County, married Emma Annie Rhoda Caddell (Nov. 15, 1857–Dec. 10, 1936), born in Navarro County. They married on July 23, 1874 in Navarro County. Both died at Cedar Knob and their marked graves are in Cedar Knob Cemetery.

Their children were: Annie Mae (b. 1879) who married Jim Thornton, no children; William Crockett (1881–1882) buried in Hammersmith plot in South Belton Cemetery; Nancy E. (1883–Mar. 20, 1958) had four children; John Jay (b. 1885) married Katie Willingham in 1915, buried at Salado; Sarah Manurvia (b. July 13, 1887) married Felix H. Herrington in 1906, 10 children; Charley Wiley (1889–1894) buried in South Belton Cemetery; Minnie Ella (b. 1891) married M.J. Cathey in 1913, had three children and died in New Mexico; and William Wilson, Jr. (b. 1894) is buried in Cedar Knob Cemetery.

2. Manurvia Burriss (Sept. 15, 1849–Nov. 7, 1890) married Peter Hammersmith (b. Nov. 15, 1843) on March 6, 1868. The Hammersmiths established shoe stores in several Texas cities, including Belton. The known children were: John, Will, Roy, Charles, Byron, Minnie, the wife of Clarence Metcalf. Manurvia Burriss is buried in South Belton Cemetery and her grave is marked.

3. Elizabeth Burriss, born May 18, 1851, died a few days after birth.

October 23, 1857. Then Vina's father gave them a farm in Arkansas, and while there, Jane Ellen was born February 24, 1860. In a few years they sold the farm and moved back to Texas to a farm in Bell County, near Belton and Shallow Ford. They traveled in a wagon all the way. When the Civil War started, the Tullochs moved into Belton. Robert Euclid was born February 4, 1863, in Belton.

Magnus Henry left his wife and five small children and enlisted in Company K, stationed in Galveston. While there he became ill and came home. He died April 14, 1863, and was buried in the South Belton Cemetery, located on South Penelope Street.

Sometime after Magnus' death, Vina met J.J. Robertson, a Scottish Presbyterian, (b. July 20, 1832) and they married July 20, 1864. It was said that her wedding dress was a brown and white gingham check with a matching bonnet. The Robertsons lived at the Norman Austin place near the Leon River. Robertson was a tinner and had a shop in their home.

They had two sons: Johnston Robertson was born July 2, 1865, and David Bell was born September 15, 1867. They moved to a place about a mile from Belton on the Killeen road. The place was small and they made plans to build a new house. It was to have two stories and a basement. Vina died November 3, 1871, and is buried in South Belton Cemetery.

The house was built after J.J. Robertson married Jennie Hood. Lumber for the house was hauled from Rockdale, and it was built with a Scotch flat roof and still stands. The only Tullochs who lived in the big house were Robert Euclid and his family. It was sold after Robert died.

Before their mother married Robertson, John Silas and David Houston Tulloch went across the river to Cade Maule's school. Elizabeth Ann stayed in Belton with her Uncle John Henry's family and went to school there.

The Tullochs and Robertsons were members of the Presbyterian church. The first church was built on Pearl Street, but a larger church was later built on the corner of Main and Second. The present church is on Church Street at Greenbriar.

John Silas and Christina Wellhausen Tulloch married January 30, 1877. Christina was born in Amity on November 18, 1854. John and his brother, Robert Euclid worked for J.J. Robertson in his plumbing business. Robert later became owner of the shop and now his grandsons, Bobby and Fred own the plumbing business in Belton.

John Silas and Christina had nine children:

1. Mable died in infancy.
2. John Henry married Annie Andrews and had Lynn, Virginia Cass, John Clinton, Annie Elza and Henry Lee.
3. Frank Houston married Norvelle Lee and had Mary Kelly, Walter, Frank, Lee, Jane Stevens and Ray.
4. Margaret married Hood Garner and had Lula Belle Lee, Christine Mason, John Hood, Laura Lee, Estalene McNett, Dorris Williams, Rose Nell Webb and Walter Lunn (Bill).
5. Mary died young.
6. Emma Belle married Jay Kegley.
7. Walter married Mattie Nixon and they had Edna Janet Minter and David.
8. J.J. Robertson married Bettie Newton and had Joyce Kennedy and Carol Thomas.

9. Jane Ellen never married.

John Silas in his later years had to retire from his work because of bad health. Christina died July 8, 1906, and he died June 19, 1912. Their graves in South Belton Cemetery are marked with stone markers.

William Turland

William and Harriet Blocksom Turland came to the United States, arriving at Galveston on Christmas Day, 1868. They are shown on the 1900 Bell County census as residing in Precinct #2, Salado Town, #283 and #284. William was born in November 1842 in England according to the census, but Bible records show his date of birth as October 1840 in Birmingham, England. Harriet's birthdate in the census is May 1841, while Bible records say May 1840. She, too, was born in Birmingham, England.

Harriet Blocksom came to the United States in 1865 where she was governess for a family in Pennsylvania. She did not like the United States, and at the end of one year, returned to England. Family legend says she married William Turland in 1868 and they came to the United States that same year. It is not known just where they lived between 1868 and the early 1900s when they were living in the Amity community near the Hamblin farm in Bell County. William and Harriet died in October 1914. She suffered a stroke a few days after William died. A double tombstone marks their graves in North Belton Cemetery. Less than two weeks after their deaths, their house burned to the ground.

Five children were born to William and Harriet Turland, all sons:

1. William Henry (Oct. 15, 1872–Aug. 23, 1963) married Mettie Emma Hedrick (b. Jan. 18, 1884) on September 27, 1903. Emma died December 25, 1966. Will and Emma are buried in Killeen City Cemetery as are their three sons. Their children were: David Bradley Hopkins (Sept. 22, 1940–Apr. 1, 1952); Adolphus Marvin (Mar. 20, 1910–Aug. 8, 1974) married Madge Loraine Bryan on October 5, 1955; William Henry Jr. (Billy) (Nov. 2, 1917–Jan. 27, 1981) married Martha J. Cowan on October 25, 1956; and Johnnie

lived at Wills Point before returning to Temple. Their children were:

a. Clifford B. (1909–1975) married Hazel Peck and had one son, Jay Lamar.

b. Mildred L. (b. 1913) married Francis L. Hamilton of Milan, Missouri, in January 1943, and they had two daughters: Kathy and Penny.

c. Malcolm Mahler (b. 1917) married Elaine Schuelenberg and had one daughter, Vicki.

d. Raymond Everett (b. 1920) married Marie Holland and had four children: Eddie Ray, Arva Kay, Jan and Jill.

e. Margaret L. (b. 1923) married Luther J. Dean in 1945, and had four children: Pamela Kay, Cynthia Ann, Mark Kevin (d. 1976) and Therese Lyn.

f. Frederick Theodore (b. 1927) married Novalene Caffey and had two sons: Bradford and Brady.

7. Theodore (b. May 7, 1891) married Rena Murphy (b. May 28, 1892) of Nebraska. Theodore spent his childhood in the Midway community. He earned his B.A. degree from North Texas State Teachers College in Denton, and his masters degree from the University of Texas. He spent his lifetime as a teacher, welfare worker and minister. He was superintendent of Jarrell Independent School District in Williamson County. He met requirements for ordination in the Methodist church and for nine years was pastor at Bracketville. He taught modern languages at Southwest Texas Junior College in Uvalde. He and his wife, Rena, were appointed pastors at the Stinson Chapel Methodist Mission Church. They both received their licenses to preach on December 31, 1949. They had an adopted son, Ben L. (d. 1984), who married Mildred, who now lives in Bryan. Theodore died March 24, 1961, in Bryan, and Rena in August 1985, in Bryan. They are buried in Bryan City Cemetery.

A child, identified as Marie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mahler, (Apr. 2, 1902–Apr. 28, 1904) is buried in the same plot as Mathias Frederick and Anna Eliese Mahler in Hillcrest Cemetery in Temple.

John Hamilton Malicoat

John Hamilton (Johnnie/Dick) Malicoat was born in Kentucky in 1840, and on August 16, 1858, married Nancy Lucinda Skinner (b. May 2, 1837). They had eight children: John, Paralie, F.J. Girl, Martha Jane, Ed, Elizabeth, Della and Emaline.

The Malicoats moved to Texas from Arkansas in 1875 in two covered wagons and settled in Bell County near Hol-

land. They had two guides named Skinner and John Holland.

On August 4, 1862, John Hamilton enlisted in Company F, Gordons Regiment, First Arkansas Cavalry, Confederate States of America. He was captured on October 1, 1863, and was exchanged March 4, 1865, at Red River landing. His confederate pension was denied in 1905.

After arriving in Texas, John Hamilton engaged in farming and cattle breeding in and around Holland. He died July 3, 1912, at the home of his daughter Paralie Webb in Holland.

Malinak graduated from Granger High School in 1925, attended the University of Texas, Dental Branch, and graduated as valedictorian in 1929. He taught at the college for two years, then practiced dentistry in Houston until April 15, 1933, when he moved to Temple.

On December 27, 1933, Lewis married Catharine Pennington at Houston. They had three children:

1. Lewis Russell (b. Sept. 24, 1935) married Billie Ann Chaney on June 18, 1960, at Temple. They have four children: Michael, Jeffrey, Alan and Travis.

2. Robert Justin (b. Oct. 7, 1936) married Carolyn Powers on November 25, 1961, in Houston. They have two children: Ann Clarke and Robert (Rob) Bradford.

3. Margaret Ann (b. Oct. 12, 1937) married Barton R. Long on November 28, 1959, at Temple. They have seven children: Lewis J., Claire, Jennifer, Penny, Margaret Ann, Elizabeth and Justin.

Dr. Malinak served in the U.S. Navy at Corpus Christi, and in the Pacific theater for approximately three years. He returned to his Temple practice following his service, and retired on January 1, 1970.

4. *Alice May (b. 1870) died at five weeks old.

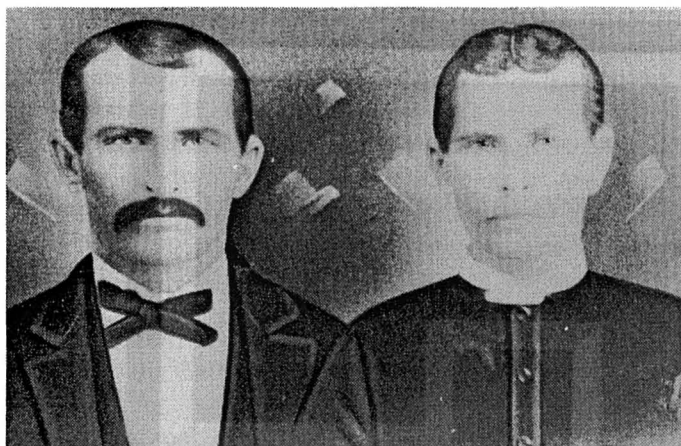
5. *John Harmon (1871–1890).

Martin Manak

Martin Manak (b. May 2, 1847) was born in Novy Hrozenkov, Moravia, and immigrated to the United States via Galveston in July 1867, where he settled in the Industry area of Austin County. He earned his living in the new land by farming.

On September 30, 1871, Martin married Josephine Bartek, and their only child, Anna, was born in 1872. Josephine died shortly thereafter. On July 13, 1874, Martin married Anna Kosarek in Frelsburg. She was the daughter of Joseph and Barbara Buzek Kosarek. Kosarek and his children had arrived in the United States in 1870 and settled in Colorado County.

Sometime between 1885 and 1889 the Manak family moved to Falls County. On June 23, 1890, Martin and Anna Manak bought 225 acres out of the Juan Cordon League in the Cyclone area of Bell County.

Martin Manak died on April 1, 1907, in Cyclone, and Anna died September 7, 1925, in Cyclone. They are buried in St. Joseph's Catholic Cemetery.

Anna, the daughter of Martin Manak's first marriage, married John Bartek. She died in 1925. The children of Martin and Anna Kosarek Manak were:

Daniel M. Manfull

Daniel Malcolm Manfull was born February 25, 1917, the son of Daniel V. and Susan Dumbleton Manfull of Augusta, Ohio. He attended Stone Pile School and Augusta School, then graduated from Kent State University in 1939. He coached and taught science in the public schools at Seville, Ohio, and Manchester, Ohio, until his enlistment in the U.S. Marine Corps in June 1942.

Manfull served in the Pacific Ocean Theater during World War II, participating in battles in the Mariannas Islands, Saipan, Tinian and Iwo Jima. His decorations include the Bronze Star and Letter of Commendation with Ribbon.

Manfull married Ruth Jurline Zuehlke (b. Mar. 30, 1922), the daughter of Albert and Ruby Aars Zuehlke of Clifton, Bosque County. She graduated from Clifton High School, attended business college in Waco, then completed course work through the Extension School of the University of California while in Japan. She was a civil service employee during World War II, working in Waco, and following the war, continued to work for the government in Dallas and San Antonio before transferring in 1948 to Nagoya, Japan, where she worked with the 5th Air Force Headquarters.

Dan and Ruth Manfull met while they were both stationed in Japan. They had married on October 5, 1950, after returning to the states. Dan retired from the Marines as a lieutenant colonel in 1956. At that time he had been most recently serving as Marine officer instructor at the University of Oklahoma in Norman, Oklahoma.

After retirement Dan became manager of the Mount Pleasant Chamber of Commerce. He held that position for over two years before his appointment as executive vice president of the Greater Killeen Chamber of Commerce, a post he held for 20 years (1959–1979).

McCam A.A. Maples

Rev. McCam A.A. Maples (June 8, 1818–June 11, 1905), an elder in the Primitive Baptist Church for 50 years, was born in Alabama. He later moved to Mississippi, and in 1881 to Bell County. His wife died in Mississippi, and after coming to Texas, he lived with his children in Wilson Valley.

Rev. Maples was pastor of Mt. Vernon Primitive Bap-

garet Barnes Mewhinney of Scotland, in 1791. Logan's father, Hugh, was born in Mendocino County, California, in 1867.

Logan came to Texas with his family in 1869, and the family moved to Holland in 1897.

Charles William Meyer

Charles William Meyer, prominent Belton feed and grain merchant, was the son of John (b. 1806) and Julia (b. 1824) Meyer. His father was born in France and his mother in Germany. They had immigrated to the United States and settled in Fayette County, where Charles William was born on November 21, 1849.

Charles married Julia Miller (b. 1858) of San Antonio. She was educated in a women's seminary in Austin. The Meyers lived in Ellinger, Fayette County, until about 1890 when they moved to Belton. All their children were born in Fayette County, but were educated at Wedemeyer Academy in Belton.

The children were:

1. Loulie Catherine (b. 1878) was the second librarian appointed for the Belton Carnegie Library. She served as assistant for many years prior to her appointment as librarian in 1924. It was she who began the library's Texana collection. She died June 13, 1951.

2. Emma Jane (b. 1883) was the last member of the family to die. She died in 1974.

3. Harry (b. 1887) drowned in 1904.

Charles William Meyer died at his Belton home on March 13, 1924, and his wife Julia died August 22, 1932. All members of this family are buried in marked graves in North Belton Cemetery. They were all Presbyterians.

Nancy Chalk Roberts Meyer

Nancy Elizabeth Chalk, daughter of William Roscoe and Frances Omsby Blackburn Chalk, was born September 4, 1847, in Maury County, Tennessee. She came to Bell County with her parents in 1851.

In 1861 she married J. Taliferro Roberts (b. July 18, 1839) and they had these children:

1. James R. (Mar. 22, 1863–June 17, 1888).

2. Clara Frances (Mar. 28, 1866–Oct. 12, 1883) married her cousin Alonzo Roberts on March 2, 1883.

3. Rhoda Alice (Feb. 14, 1868–Feb. 14, 1882).

4. Roxie Octavene (b. Feb. 22, 1870) married John L. Moore.

A veteran of the Civil War, Taliferro Roberts died February 14, 1871, and his marked grave is in South Belton Cemetery.

On August 5, 1874, Mrs. Roberts married Charles F. Meyer (b. Dec. 12, 1849) of Reinhausen, Germany. They had these children:

1. Charles Elmer (Sept. 9, 1875–July 26, 1941) married Avis Bruce on January 20, 1898.

2. Hattie Templeton (b. Oct. 17, 1877) married John McEwan.

Meyer died September 7, 1878, and his wife died April 11, 1923. Their marked graves are in South Belton Cemetery.

John Madison Middleton

John Madison Middleton was born June 28, 1848, in Independence County, Arkansas, the son of Revenna Sutton Middleton, daughter of Dempsey and Elizabeth Sutton. John's father's name is not known, but it is thought that he and Revenna (Revenny) married about 1842 in IZARD County, Arkansas. Revenny was born October 22, 1828, in Smith County, Tennessee. The elder Middleton died by October 29, 1850, when the census shows Revenny and her children living with relatives.

Revenny Middleton married Allen Craghead on August 6, 1851, in Independence County, Arkansas, and in 1855 the family accompanied her brother, Anderson Sutton, to Bell County, Texas, where they joined Elizabeth Sutton Cox, who was widowed about 1835, then had married Benjamin Cox on October 4, 1837.

The Middleton and Craghead families settled in western Bell County along the South Nolan Creek, next to the Coxes. Revenna died March 2, 1860, as a result of pneumonia just a few days after the birth of Cynthia Craghead (b. Feb. 1860), and Cynthia died in May 1860.

In the June 1860 census, John M. Middleton and his brother, Brannick are shown in the household of J.P. and Harriet Wood. Harriet was the daughter of their grandmother's husband Benjamin Cox. J.P. Wood owned the land on which the present town of Nolanville now stands. Nearby were the Coxes, Suttons and Allen Craghead. Craghead married Mary Barker, granddaughter of Benjamin Cox's cousin, Dr. James Cox, in 1864.

On December 22, 1869, John Middleton married Mary Angelina Cox, daughter of Mary and Fleming Trigg Cox. They reared their family in western Bell County, where J.M. Middleton died on December 23, 1925. Mary lived until January 3, 1941. Both are buried in Pleasant Hill Cemetery about one mile west of Nolanville. The cemetery began on land owned by Fleming T. Cox at the time that Revenny Sutton Middleton Craghead died in 1860.

A diary written by Mary A. Cox Middleton and kept throughout the year 1901, presents an interesting view of daily life in Bell County for the Middletons, their relatives and neighbors.

Children of J.M. and Mary Middleton were:

1. John A. (Apr. 10, 1871–June 24, 1935) married Lillie M. Trousdale (b. 1879) on December 25, 1894.

2. Fleming D.C. (Jan. 20, 1873–Aug. 3, 1956) married Flora L. Irwin (b. 1879) on December 18, 1898.

3. *Albert F. (Oct. 10, 1874–Aug. 31, 1958) married *Artia T. Miller (b. 1874) on May 2, 1894.

4. *Alice G. (Apr. 23, 1877–Apr. 17, 1884).

5. Brannick (Bud) P. (Feb. 23, 1879–Oct. 18, 1936) married Emma S. Daniel (b. 1884) on April 16, 1899.

6. Polly B. (Mar. 13, 1881–Jan. 15, 1979) married Yates D. Bailey (b. 1883) on April 2, 1905.

7. *William Edgar (Oct. 6, 1883–Feb. 25, 1958) married *Bessie Rogers (b. 1886) on December 24, 1905.

8. Ninnie R. (Jan. 30, 1888–Mar. 20, 1963) married A.H. Ranne (b. 1887) on December 24, 1907.

created March 13, 1848, Major Chalk became the first sheriff of the new county.

When the census of 1850 was taken, Whitfield Chalk and family were listed in Milam County, probably in that part which became Bell County on January 22, 1850. He gave his occupation as millwright. He and his brother, Ira, had built the first mill on Salado Creek. The family was living in Bell County in 1860 and he gave his occupation as milling.

Later, this family lived in Brenham, Texas, and by 1873 were residents of Lampasas County. He died May 19, 1902, in that county and his wife died there on January 1, 1903. In 1944 the federal government erected a marble marker at his grave commemorating his service in the Mexican War. Major and Mrs. Chalk were the parents of nine children.

William Roscoe Chalk

William Roscoe Chalk, son of William Chalk and Elizabeth Williams, was born August 28, 1816, Hertford County, North Carolina. Elizabeth was the daughter of Rev. William Williams and Catherine Elizabeth Roscoe, who pioneered from Tidewater, Virginia. The Chalks moved from North Carolina to Maury County, Tennessee, when our subject was a child and later he owned 502 acres of land at the head of Cathey's Creek, District No. 1, Tennessee. Here, he was ordained a Methodist Episcopal minister.

Frances Omsby Blackburn and W.R. Chalk were married September 27, 1838, Maury County, Tennessee. She was born there February 21, 1821, daughter of Captain John Porter Blackburn and Nancy Churchwell. He fought with General Andrew Jackson in the War of 1812. She was the granddaughter of Captain Ambrose Blackburn of Revolutionary fame and whose ancestor was Colonel Thomas Blackburn of Rippon Lodge, Virginia, eight miles from Mt. Vernon, where Colonel Blackburn was buried in 1758. Two of his daughters married nephews of Colonel George Washington and are buried at Mt. Vernon by Washington's Tomb.

This Chalk family moved to Bell County, Texas, in 1851. In the 1860 census he was listed as a carpenter. During the Civil War he was appointed in 1864 to the Home Guard. In the 1870 census he gave his occupation as farming.

W.R. Chalk, a Master Mason, died March 4, 1893 in Belton, Texas and his wife died there on April 25, 1875. Their marked graves are in South Belton Cemetery. Their family included the following children: Robert Lewis; John William Douglas who married Jennie Geneva Bell; Nancy Elizabeth; Virginia Octavene who married William Taylor Lee; Ellis Blackburn who married Mrs. W. Bell; Mary Frances; Valera Katherine; and Florence Itaska who married John David Earnest.

Joe G. Chaloupka

Joe G. Chaloupka was born May 27, 1882, in Cermna, Czechoslovakia, and came to Texas in 1896. He had three brothers: Ignac, Frank and Henry, and a sister, Marie, who also came to the U.S. Annie was the only one to remain in Czechoslovakia. All are now deceased.

Joe was first married to Annie Gold, and they had three daughters: Lydia, Mildred and Vlasta. Annie died and Joe then married Albina Lesikar, who was born March 11, 1889, in Bell County. They were married in 1916, farmed in Burleson County and later moved here.

Albina died in December 1952 and Joe died in 1960. They are buried in Seaton.

Seven children were born to this union: William (b. 1918) married Lucille Coots Flentge; Albina (b. 1919) married Milton Dornhoefer in 1941; Rosie married Emil Wilde; Edward married Ellerene Lange; Mary married Fred Kaulfus; Agnes married Barney Love; and Clara married Edwin Kramer.

Albina and Milton Dornhoefer had three children: Melvin, Carolyn and Lahron.

Hugh Kelso Chance

Hugh Kelso Chance, the son of William Jasper and Sarah Ann Johns Chance, was born about 1877 in Yalobusha County, Mississippi. Sometime between 1836 and 1840 William Jasper Chance (Oct. 12, 1828 (Tenn.)–Dec. 26, 1904 (Lampasas Co., TX.) moved to Yalobusha County with his parents, George and Nancy McGill Chance, and his fellow siblings, John, Jane Paralee, David C. and Hugh L. Chance.

William Jasper Chance was first married to Susan Greer, and, after her death, he married Hugh Kelso's mother, Sarah Ann Johns (Mar. 21, 1842 (Ala.)–Apr. 30, 1924 (Dallas, TX.). Sarah Johns' parents, Albert and Sarah Patton Johns, and her brothers and sisters, David, Margaret J. and Mary A.E. Johns, were living in Houston County, Georgia, in 1840, and sometime during the following decade, they moved to Yalobusha County, Mississippi.

William Jasper Chance and Sarah Ann Johns were married in Yalobusha County on November 28, 1872. Two of their children were born there: Lilliam Edith Chance (Sept. 7, 1872–Sept. 3, 1965) who married H. Monroe Yates in Lampasas County on April 16, 1899. She died in McCamey, Texas. Hugh Kelso Chance (b. ca. 1877–Dec. 10, 1920) married Fern Hoffer. He died in Bexar County, Texas and produced no heirs. Another daughter was born in Florence, Williamson County, Texas: Maggie Eulela Chance (Feb. 6, 1882–Mar. 27, 1966) who married John Olney Carll on June 21, 1903. She died in Odessa.

The Chance family left Yalobusha County, Mississippi, in the fall of 1877, arrived at Vicksburg on December 3 and at Shreveport on December 18, entered Texas on December 20, and first spent time in Williamson County on January 16, 1878. William Jasper Chance kept excellent records of the trip; and along the way he bought such items as fodder, meal, fish, flour, potatoes, ferry tolls and whiskey.

Sometime around 1884 or 1885 the Chance family resettled in Kempner, Lampasas County, where William Jasper Chance's eldest brother, John, was a merchant. In Kempner, William Jasper Chance became active in community affairs, just as he had in Yalobusha County, Mississippi, where he had served as an election judge and as a justice of the peace. In Lampasas County, William Jasper Chance was a member of the Saratoga Masonic Lodge #546 in Lampasas and was probably a member of the Farmers Alliance. He made his living as a farmer, as a landlord, and, from 1891 to 1899, as postmaster of Kempner.

Hugh Kelso Chance spent his adolescence in Kempner, where he became an avid fisherman. He inherited from his uncle, Hugh L. Chance, for whom he was named, a love for watermelons. A friend from Kempner wrote to him in 1898, "When making a (watermelon patch) raid, think of me . . .

James and Phoebe bought a farm on the south side of the Lampasas River from O.T. Tyler.

Six sons were born to James and Phoebe:

1. Thomas Edgar (Aug. 25, 1877–Sept. 10, 1910) is buried in Rock Hollow Cemetery.

2. Samuel Oscar (July 31, 1879–Nov. 27, 1932) is buried in Rock Hollow Cemetery.

3. John Henry (Dec. 17, 1880–Sept. 13, 1956) is buried in North Belton Cemetery.

4. James Anderson (Mar. 29, 1883–July 14, 1961) is buried in North Belton Cemetery.

5. Wilson Monroe (Dec. 22, 1884–May 29, 1886) is buried in Rock Hollow Cemetery.

6. Hugh Austin (Apr. 12, 1887–Mar. 4, 1939) is buried in North Belton Cemetery.

Samuel C. Hannon

Samuel C. Hannon (Oct. 5, 1813–Jan. 21, 1871) was born in Georgia. His wife, Frances (Fannie) was born November 9, 1816, and they married in Cobb County, Georgia, on January 1, 1835.

Their first two children, Martha and Thomas, were born in Georgia. In spring 1839, Sam, Fannie and their two children moved to Washington County, Arkansas. While there, five more children were born: Robert, John, Mary, William and James. In spring 1853 Sam loaded their holdings in a wagon and headed the family to Texas. They arrived in the late spring or early summer 1853, at the O.T. Tyler farm south of Belton.

Tyler owned land from Belton to what was later called Elm Grove, a distance of six or seven miles. His land was on both sides of the Lampasas River. The Hannon family first lived on Tyler's farm north of the river, but in the 1850s they moved across the river, still on Tyler's farm. Sam and Fannie had two more children after moving to Texas, Lorenzo and Emma. They also lost triplet daughters in 1863 while Sam was away in the Confederate Army. The little girls were born and died the same day. Fannie was 47 years old at that time.

When the Civil War broke out, the three oldest boys joined the Confederate army. Robert went first with Capt. H.E. Bradford's Company which was organized in September 1861. They trained at Camp Henry McCulloch near Victoria until spring 1862 when they were assigned to Camp No. 25 in Smith County. Their winter quarters were at Arkansas Post. In a battle on January 11, 1863, Robert and most of his company were captured by the Union Army and sent to Camp Butler, a prison camp at Springfield, Illinois. Robert died there on February 18, 1863.

John and Thomas Hannon enlisted April 11, 1862, in Company I, 17th Texas Infantry, under the command of Capt. H.M. Bouldin. Due to physical disability, Capt. Bouldin had to resign his command and Lt. John F. Smith was promoted and took command. John Hannon died somewhere on the Arkansas front. Thomas Hannon was killed in action on the same front. During a charge, Thomas was struck in the head with a rifle ball while going over a rail fence. Thomas has a Confederate marker in South Belton Cemetery, but his burial site is unknown.

Sam Hannon joined Capt. James H. Weathers Company F, 4th Texas Cavalry. The company was raised in August 1863 to serve as a home guard battalion in the cen-

tral Texas area. Hannon was discharged from Confederate service on February 5, 1864.

Sam Hannon died January 21, 1871 and is buried in the northeast corner of South Belton Cemetery. The exact gravesite is unknown because the grave was not marked. His wife, Fannie, died in June 1907 and is buried in Rock Hollow Cemetery, south of Belton. Her grave was marked in 1976 and a marker was placed next to hers for her husband.

Louis Arnold Hansen

Louis Arnold Hansen (b. Feb. 3, 1918) was born at Laramie, Wyoming, and on August 2, 1940, married Mary Wallace Logan (b. Sept. 13, 1918) of Gillette, Wyoming. Both are graduates of the University of Wyoming.

Children of this marriage are: William Louis Hansen, a captain of the Laramie Fire Department; and Dale Eric Hansen, an actuary with the Alaska IRS in Anchorage.

Louis, as a youth, was employed by Union Pacific Railroad and was a member of the 115th Horse Cavalry of the Wyoming National Guard. He was inducted into federal service in 1941 and served several stateside training sites in command and staff positions. During World War II he served as operations officer of 5th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry, Far East Command.

Leaving active duty in 1946, he was appointed commanding officer of the newly activated 141st Tank Battalion, Wyoming National Guard, serving at Ft. Campbell, Kentucky, and Germany, until 1953 when he became deputy commander at Frankfurt Depot in 1955.

Following assignment as military adviser to Tennessee National Guard (1955–1959), he served for a year as chief of liaison section, Military Armistice Commissioner in Pan Mun Jam, Korea, a United Nations Command.

In 1960 he was assigned to Fort Hood where he served until 1965 as commander, Combat Command "A," 2nd Armored Division, inspector general and assistant chief of staff.

Upon retirement, he became an agent for Acacia National Life for 18 years. He is a certified life underwriter, member of the Million Dollar Roundtable and was active in the local and state underwriters organizations.

William S. Riggs

William S. Riggs, born in Tennessee in November 1837, was left an orphan in boyhood, and came to Texas about 1849 with an uncle, Johnnie Blair and his family.

In the days when the Indians still held out terror to the white settlers, Billy Riggs was ever ready to take up guard duty and to defend the homes from the depredations.

When the call for Confederate service came, W.S. Riggs, 24, enlisted in the first company organized in Belton and served with Company A, 6th Texas Cavalry, Pete Ross' Regiment, Sul Ross' Brigade with the Army of Tennessee. He was seriously wounded in the Battle of New Hope Chapel in Georgia, but re-entered service as soon as he was able. He attained the rank of first lieutenant.

Long before the railroad had penetrated central Texas, Riggs engaged in the hazardous work of freighting by wagon from Waco to Cameron. And in civil life, as in the times of war, he was found ready to enter places of danger whenever the call came to him as civil officer of town or county, having served both as deputy sheriff of Bell County and as deputy marshal of Belton.

Riggs was twice married, first to Pinkie Powell, whose family resided in Waco. She died a few years after their marriage. His second marriage was to Mrs. Sallie Bigham White, the widow of Capt. Bob White, who died during the Civil War. They married in the early 1880s. Sallie died in 1918.

William S. Riggs died June 8, 1927, at the Confederate home in Austin, Travis County, and was buried in South Belton Cemetery. Six other Confederate veterans attended his funeral: J.J. Curlock, John Shea, E.M. Hatcher, J.T. Pryor, Thomas Yarrell of Belton, T.J. Bridges of Prairie Dell and A.J. Hewett of Temple.

Pete Riola

Pete Riola (b. June 11, 1873) was born in Palermo, Italy, the son of Vito and Sally Floca Riola of Sicily. Prior to coming to the United States, Peter was a shepherd as were his brothers Joseph, Dominic and Frank. Pete came to America by himself, landing in New Orleans, Louisiana, on October 29, 1894.

Riola married Rosie Scarcella on September 4, 1904, in Bell County. She was born October 17, 1888, in Sicily, the daughter of Frank and Anna Marinella Scarcella. Anna, having died in Sicily, Frank came to America with his second wife. Rosie was four years old at that time.

Pete and Rosie worked in the grocery business in Temple and operate the Riola Family Store, first on South 1st Street, then they built a store at the corner of South 12th and Avenue H. Rosie died in July 1974 in Temple, and Pete died February 6, 1968, in Temple. Both are buried in Hillcrest Cemetery in Temple.

Six children were born to Peter and Rosie Riola:

1. Vito (b. June 2, 1905) married Lillie Meir and they had three children: Lillian Frances, Charles and Joyce. Vito worked for the Temple Candy Factory and once had his own candy factory in Temple. He now lives in Cameron with his wife, Mable Hertenberger Riola. The family gets together each November to make candy.

2. Frank (b. Jan. 7, 1907) never married. He worked

as a baker at the Bell Bakery Company in Temple. He now resides at Southland Villa Nursing Center in Temple.

3. Sallie (b. Aug. 10, 1909) married Robert Wood, who worked for the Santa Fe Railroad. They had no children. Sallie resides at Southland Villa Nursing Center.

4. Anna (b. June 18, 1912) married Samuel Vaughn, who worked for the Santa Fe Railroad. Anna retired in 1984 from the dietary department at Scott and White Hospital. They had two girls: Jo Annette, who married Bill Pustka; and Marlene, who married Clarence Lastovica.

5. Josie (b. Oct. 2, 1914) married L.E. (Red) Talley, who worked as a roofer and carpenter. They had one son, Pete.

6. Johnnie (b. Mar. 11, 1916) married Evelyn Henson and recently retired as a football coach, teacher and principal in the Waco School District. He once played football for Temple High School. They had two children: Johnnie and Janet.

Rev. G.W. Robbins

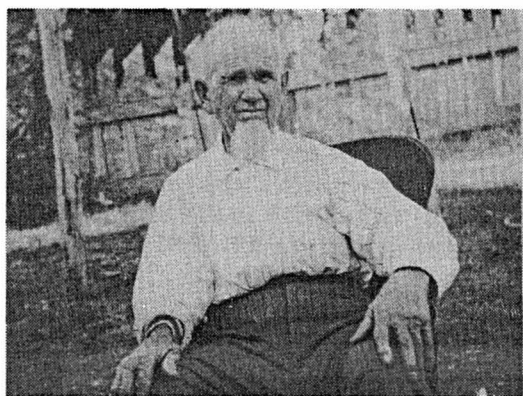
George William Robbins

Rev. George William Robbins, a farmer and Baptist preacher in Bell and Williamson Counties, was born December 18, 1870, in Williamson County. His parents were John G. and Cassie Keel Robbins, who had migrated to Texas from Arkansas in the early 1800s. At the early death of their mother, Cassie, in 1879, G.W. and his brother, Jake, and sisters, Mollie and Mattie, were taken into the home of their uncle Jake E. Robbins and his wife, Ellen. They were farmers living east of Granger.

G.W. married Nancy Rebecca Bell Troxell in 1889 in Williamson County. He was a farmer and began preaching at the Old Friendship First Baptist Church in June 1896.

For the remainder of his life he ministered to the needs of people in the surrounding communities, officiating at hundreds of weddings and funerals, traveling many miles in his open buggy with a team of horses in all kinds of weather. He was an early evangelist, holding revival meetings in churches and tabernacles throughout Williamson and Bell Counties.

Their last home was in Holland, where he died in July 1947. She died in 1949. They are buried in the family plot in Val Verde Cemetery. Children of the Robbins were:



Marcus H. Robinson

Marcus H. Robinson

Marcus H. Robinson, a Civil War veteran, was born August 12, 1837. He married Elizabeth Hale and they came to Belton from Holly Springs, Mississippi, in 1872. Marcus was a carpenter by trade. He died September 15, 1930, and was buried in South Belton cemetery. His grave has a Confederate marker. His wife is also buried in South Belton Cemetery.

They had three daughters: Anna, who married W.H. Robert; Mollie, who married M.A. Craft of Bastrop; and Blanche, who married Ben Allen.

Blanche and Ben Allen, son of J.Q. and Martha Scott Allen, were parents of a daughter, Myrtle, who married Neal Bassel. The Allens later divorced. Ben moved to Brownsville and Blanche remained in Belton, where she died November 28, 1953. Blanche Allen and her grandson, Merrit Pilcher Bassel, have marked graves in the J.Q. Allen plot in North Belton Cemetery.

Maynard F.W. Robinson

Maynard F.W. Robinson was born in England, at Richmond, on June 8, 1871. He came to this country and was employed by the Santa Fe Railroad for 27 years. His apprenticeship as machinist was served with the International & Great Northern Railroad at Taylor, after which he went to work for the Santa Fe at Cleburne shops. He was promoted later to shop foreman at Gainesville, then to the position of master mechanic at Silsbee. In November 1906 he was transferred to Temple where he had charge of the mechanical department of the southern division of Gulf lines.

Robinson died when his rowboat capsized while inspecting a bridge across flooded waters of Little River. Many men spent numerous hours searching the waters for the bodies of Robinson and his partner, F.W. Leatherbury.

He was a Mason, an Elk, a Lion and a lay minister of Christ Episcopal Church. *Maynard F.W. died September 11, 1921, and Mrs. Robinson, who was born in Manchester, England, on September 11, 1872, died March 11, 1951.

Maynard F.M. and Mary Robinson married in England after having been childhood sweethearts. They came to the United States in 1894 and lived in Cleburne, Gainesville and Beaumont before moving to Temple in 1906. Mary was active in church, civic and social life in Temple and was a life-long member of the Episcopal church.

During World War I, Mrs. Robinson did volunteer work for the Red Cross, and again in World War II, donated her

time to the same organization. She was also a Gray Lady at McCloskey General Hospital. She was an active member of the Temple Music Club and 42 Club.

The Robinsons had two children: *Maynard W. (Apr. 9, 1896–Jan. 23, 1954) and Rebe O., who married Thomas Jefferson Cloud.

Willie Houston Robinson

Willie Houston (Bill) and Alice Irene Robinson have been lifelong Bell County residents. Bill was born March 21, 1898, at Brookhaven, Texas, and the Robinson farm is now part of Fort Hood. Willie was the son of Charles Henry and Sarah Mandaline (Sallie) Oswalt Robinson.

At age 18, Bill Robinson began a career with Santa Fe Railroad as a newsbutch for Fred Harvey Concessions. He sold papers, magazines and snacks first on the trains, then in stations at Houston, Galveston, Fort Worth and Temple. Getting off duty from a train run, he would walk the seven miles from Killeen to the Robinson farm. On January 3, 1920, Bill switched to rail work. He began as a brakeman, then in 1926 was promoted to conductor. Among the train runs he worked were Temple to Galveston, Brownwood, Sweetwater, San Angelo, Cleburne, Bellville Yards and Houston. His Santa Fe career spanned more than 50 years. During rail doldrums of the Depression, Bill, in 1936, worked the Santa Fe extra board while he also ran Sellers Grocery in Belton. Maintaining a full train schedule until he was 70, Bill Robinson retired in 1968.

On December 17, 1921, Bill Robinson married Alice Irene Sutton of Sparta. She is the daughter of Marion Alonzo and Margaret Ella Sellers Sutton and granddaughter of early settler James Riley Sutton who came to Bell County in 1849. J.R. Sutton filled in for the mother Irene never knew. Her grandfather lived with the Sutton family, helping raise his son, Marion's children after their mother died when Irene was 18 months old.

Bill and Irene Robinson had two daughters: Billie Margaret (b. Jan. 22, 1923) married Alfred Raymond Owen, then Robert Zimmerman; and Barbara Jeanne (b. Nov. 26, 1926) married Ivan Joseph Bakke Jr. Two of the couple's six grandchildren, Anthony Wayne Owen and Barbara Kay

child of John Hopkins (1799–1858) and Sarah Turner Lee (1803–1879). John Hopkins Lee was an Indian fighter who served with General Andrew Jackson, and was reputed to be a cousin of Robert E. Lee of Virginia.

The family moved to Texas while Ben D. Lee was a small child, and settled near a community later called Belton. Ben D. Lee married Susan Allie Grider (b. Sept. 5, 1850) on November 21, 1865. These children were born of this marriage:

1. John G. (b. Jan. 4, 1868) married Lizzie Ray Chandler on January 16, 1889. Their children were: Allie Ray (b. Oct. 12, 1889); John Grider (b. Nov. 24, 1893); Ivy P. (b. Nov. 24, 1893); Cora C. (b. Aug. 1, 1895); Elizabeth (b. Sept. 29, 1897); and Samuel Chandler (b. Sept. 29, 1906). The family lived in Brownwood.

2. Cora A. (b. Oct. 20, 1871) married A.L. (Lon) Curtis on April 7, 1898. One child was born: A. Lee Curtis (July 17, 1899–May 7, 1979). They lived in Belton.

3. Walter J. (b. May 29, 1874) married Alice W. Staton on December 16, 1895. Their children were: Mary (b. Mar. 31, 1897) and Virginia Ann (b. Jan. 23, 1912). The family lived in Dallas.

4. Aubrey M. (b. Oct. 21, 1877) married Lillian Rose on November 10, 1908. Their children were: Virginia Rose (b. Aug. 1, 1909) and John Aubrey (b. Dec. 6, 1912). They lived in Mineral Wells.

5. Robert E. (b. Aug. 1, 1880) married Mary Moreman (date uncertain). They had two children: Dorothy Kate (b. Mar. 25, 1907) and John Curtis (b. Oct. 22, 1915). They lived in Dallas.

6. Ben D. Jr. (b. Mar. 31, 1882) married Cora Agee (date uncertain) and they had these children: Cora Mae (b. Apr. 18, 1904); Mildred (b. Feb. 1, 1907); Ben D. III (b. Feb. 1, 1907). They lived in Alice.

Ben D. Lee became a prominent building contractor in Central Texas, and was responsible for several of the major structures in Belton, including the county courthouse, the Carnegie Library (now Bell County Museum) and the opera house (now First Christian Church). He also built the Milam County courthouse in 1892.

Lee was an active supporter of early public fairs in the county. He helped organize the first county fair association for Bell County and provided land for the fairgrounds near his home on the southeast side of Belton, on what is presently known as Walker Street.

Lee died December 26, 1912, and was buried at North Belton Cemetery. His wife, Susan Allie Grider Lee, preceded him in death on July 9, 1903. She is also interred in North Belton Cemetery.

Edward F. Lee

Edward F. Lee was born March 21, 1821, in Franklin County, Tennessee. He farmed and built wagons in Tennessee prior to 1853 when he came to Belton with his parents. In Belton he became a land speculator, purchased, improved and sold many acres of land. A carpenter, he was also involved in contracting and building, and built many fine residences in Belton.

In 1863 Ed Lee was elected sheriff of Bell County and filled the office until 1864 when he joined Captain Graves' company of Texas Cavalry. He was stationed at Brownsville and involved in repairing artillery wagons and can-

nons. He was in Houston when the Civil War ended. In 1867 he was appointed county treasurer by Governor Edmund J. Davis.

Ed Lee and Rebecca A. Taylor married in Franklin County, Tennessee, on January 21, 1845. She was born November 21, 1818, in Tennessee, daughter of Colonel W.N. and Polly Johnson Taylor. The children born of this marriage were:

1. Harriet married Richard Graves of Mills County.
2. *Mary married Thomas F. Carpenter.
3. William T.
4. Amanda married James E. Mitchell.
5. Lou married a Cook.
6. Brown T.
7. *Robert E. (b/d 1859).

Mrs. Lee was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church and Edward Lee was a Mason. *Rebecca died July 30, 1899, and *Edward died May 9, 1903.

Hiram Cyron Lee

Hiram Cyron Lee (May 31, 1813–Jan. 8, 1891), son of John (b. circa 1784) and Tempy Knight Lee, was born in Fayette County, Georgia, but moved to Randolph County, Alabama, where he lived until his death, except for one year spent in Bell County, Texas. He married Eliah Phillips Hanson (b. Mar. 17, 1826) of Noonan, Coweta County, Georgia, on March 1, 1842.

The Lees came to Bell County in November 1889 and spent most of their time at the home of Louis Littleton Talley, but also visited with their sons, John T.T. and William Bailey Lee, who resided about four miles east of Heidenheimer.

Deliah Lee died near Roanoke, Alabama, on December 11, 1908. The Lees had seven children, several of whom lived in Bell County. They were:

1. Elizabeth Ann married David Mayfield and had three children, two of whom died. She and her youngest son, Charlie, came to Temple to live, then moved to New Mexico, and later to a place near Nogales, Arizona, where she died in March 1923.

2. Martha Ellen (b. Aug. 13, 1848) married Louis Littleton Talley on January 7, 1873.

3. Lucinda Temperance (b. June 6, 1851) married Robert R. Benefield. Among her children was Walter, who moved to Bell County about 1891 or 1892, and resided near Rogers for the balance of his life. He died there in the 1940s.

4. Nancy Ozella (b. June 29, 1853) came to Bell County in 1886, and lived with the Talley family until her marriage to Handy Godwin on April 17, 1892. She lived in Bell County for several years, then moved to Dallas with her son. She is buried near her birthplace. She had two children, one of whom died in early childhood and the other, Zoolin A. Godwin, married a sister of Charles R. Harris of Temple. Zoolin is a salesman for the southeastern states and now lives in Atlanta, Georgia.

5. John Timothy Toppler (b. Jan. 21, 1856) came to Bell County about 1884, and farmed about four miles east of Heidenheimer. He married about 1889, and then moved to Bee County, where he farmed and conducted a grocery business at Leedale. He later moved to New Mexico and died at Waterloo, New Mexico, on April 21, 1920.

9. James Knox Polk (July 22, 1841–Oct. 22, 1915) was born in Tupelo, Mississippi, and married Bettie Lunsford (b. Nov. 26, 1855) in Mississippi. He died in Brownwood, Brown County, Texas. He had enlisted for the Civil War in Belton on March 14, 1862, for a period of three years. He mustered on April 2, 1862, in Company D, 21st Texas Confederate Cavalry Regiment of Lancers under Capt. G.R. Freeman and Col. Carter. Mustered out on September 11, 1865, at San Antonio, he then engaged in stock farming in Bell and McLennan Counties. He was recorded on the 1860 census of Bell County with his blind father, Hardy Hightower Holcombe, 63, living in his home.

James Holcombe

James Holcombe, eldest son of Kinchen and Nancy Hightower Holcombe, was born in 1790 or before in Bute County, North Carolina. The first census of the United States taken in 1790, records Kinchen Holcombe with family living in Morgan District, Rutherford County, North Carolina. He is listed as head of house with family consisting of one son under 16 and one female.

Land records in Buncombe County, North Carolina, indicate that Kinchen Holcombe was active in land dealing in several counties of North Carolina from 1791 and as late as 1812 in Maury and Lincoln Counties in Tennessee. It is not known just when the family moved to Tennessee; however, there seems to be uncertainty as to whether the twins born June 1, 1801, were born in North Carolina or Tennessee.

Though there is no knowledge of the early years of James Holcombe, we can assume he was in young manhood when the family lived in Maury County, Tennessee, and he probably married there about 1812. Four children are listed for him: John H.B., George, Thomas and James Monroe. The last named child was born in 1824 in Franklin County, Tennessee.

It is not known when James Holcombe left Tennessee. It is known that he was in Texas as early as 1835. The family has copies of three Republic of Texas certificates granting land to him for services. They are dated January 18, 1838; July 3, 1838; and May 1839. One states that he was granted land as a single man, having arrived in November 1835. According to Elizabeth Weir McPherson who wrote a book on the Holcombe family, James lived in Belton for many years.

James Monroe Holcombe

James Monroe Holcombe, son of James Holcombe and grandson of Kinchen Holcombe, was born in 1824 in Franklin County, Tennessee. He moved to Itawamba County, Mississippi, and married there on October 10, 1844, to Laura Elizabeth Dawson, born 1827, in Mississippi, the daughter of Riley and Elizabeth Townsend Dawson.

James Monroe is recorded in the 1850 census of District 7, Itawamba County, as a farmer with a family. They had three children born in Mississippi and one on the way when they decided to move to Texas in late 1850, arriving in 1851–52. They settled in Bell County and raised 10 children.

Holcombe was a member of the Independent Blues, the first Bell County volunteer Ranger organization which had occasional skirmishes with Indians.

As a resident of Bell County, James Monroe enlisted in Company G, Texas Confederate Regiment of Cavalry, commanded by Col. George W. Baylor. He became ill and returned home, whereupon his son, William Thomas, enlisted and served in the Civil War.

In a letter to his wife dated February 10, 1862, from camp at Dallas, Texas (Darnell's Dameron Company), James Monroe Holcombe mentions his brothers Thomas and George and their families. It is not clear whether George and Thomas were in service. He also wrote to his son, "I want you to stay at home until I come, fail not for your mother's sake—and brothers and sisters. If you want to go in my place, it can be arranged."

William Thomas was 17 when he enlisted at Clarksville, Red River County, Texas, in Company D, 18th Texas Confederate Cavalry Regiment. He was honorably discharged on May 24, 1865, at Houston.

Holcombe died May 4, 1865, and is buried in South Belton Cemetery. Laura Elizabeth Dawson Holcombe died in 1917 and is buried in Belton. Some of their children remained in Bell County and raised their families for five generations. Children of Laura E. and James Monroe Holcombe were:

1. William Thomas (b. Sept. 20, 1845) was born in Mississippi, and married Eliza Caroline Eubanks.
 2. Sarah (Sallie) Elizabeth (b. 1847) was born in Mississippi and married Harmon Wilson Doss.

John Holcombe

John Holcombe, the youngest son of Kinchen Holcombe, was born circa 1803, and died circa 1845. He married Nancy Purnell, whose father came from Ireland and her mother was of French ancestry. Nancy Holcombe died circa 1847 from poisoning administered to her by a servant. Their second child, Adeline Holcombe, was poisoned and died at the same time as her mother.

John Holcombe moved from Maury County, Tennessee, to Little Rock, Arkansas, before 1839; thence to near Gainesville, Cook County, Texas, about 1842, where he bought land. He moved in 1843 to Grundy County, Missouri, buying land on which Trenton, Missouri, now stands. He moved later to Benton County, Missouri, then to the Ozark Mountain region of south-central Missouri, where he bought land at the present site of Warsaw, Missouri. He left a section of land at Clarksville, Red River County, Texas, granted him by Texas.

Children other than Adeline included: Paralee, who married Dr. Alexander Blucher Nephler; Robert H., who died

The South Belton Cemetery is within the city limits of Belton, Bell County, Texas. It is bounded on four sides by city streets. The numbers by each burial indicates a grave number on a plat of the cemetery. The original plat is filed in the office of the Genealogical Records Chairman, Agnes Woodson Chapter DAR, PO Box 702, Belton, TX 76513 (1968 information). This cemetery is of special interest because of the 32 Confederate veterans buried here.

This list is generated from field notes made in about 1968, and should not be exclusively relied upon for information. As a project of the Bell County Historical Commission, County cemeteries are being re-inventoried and lists such as this one are being updated in doing so. As the computer list is prepared from a photocopy of a list that was typed from field notes which could have errors in field observation researchers should be careful about relying on this information for other than perh leads. Caution is advised, but it is hoped that researchers may be helped by it, as intent is to provide the best information that volunteers can provide. Corrections, changes, additions or additional information are welcomed, and will be considered fo inclusion with the next update.
