

TWO FAMOUS CONFEDERATE VICTORIES: CHICKAMAUGA

"THE GREATEST CONFEDERATE VICTORY OF THE WAR"—In the Tennessee battle on Sept. 17 and 20, 1863, the southern General Bragg signally defeated the army of the Cumberland under Rosecrans. "Rosecrans, from fear of battle, maneuvered forward until, with the river at his back and

the enemy interposed between him and Burnside, he was surprised by the enemy's sudden attack upon his three widely scattered army-corps. Compelled to accept battle out of hand, he despaired of success as his troops fell back, left the field, and retreated into Chattanooga."

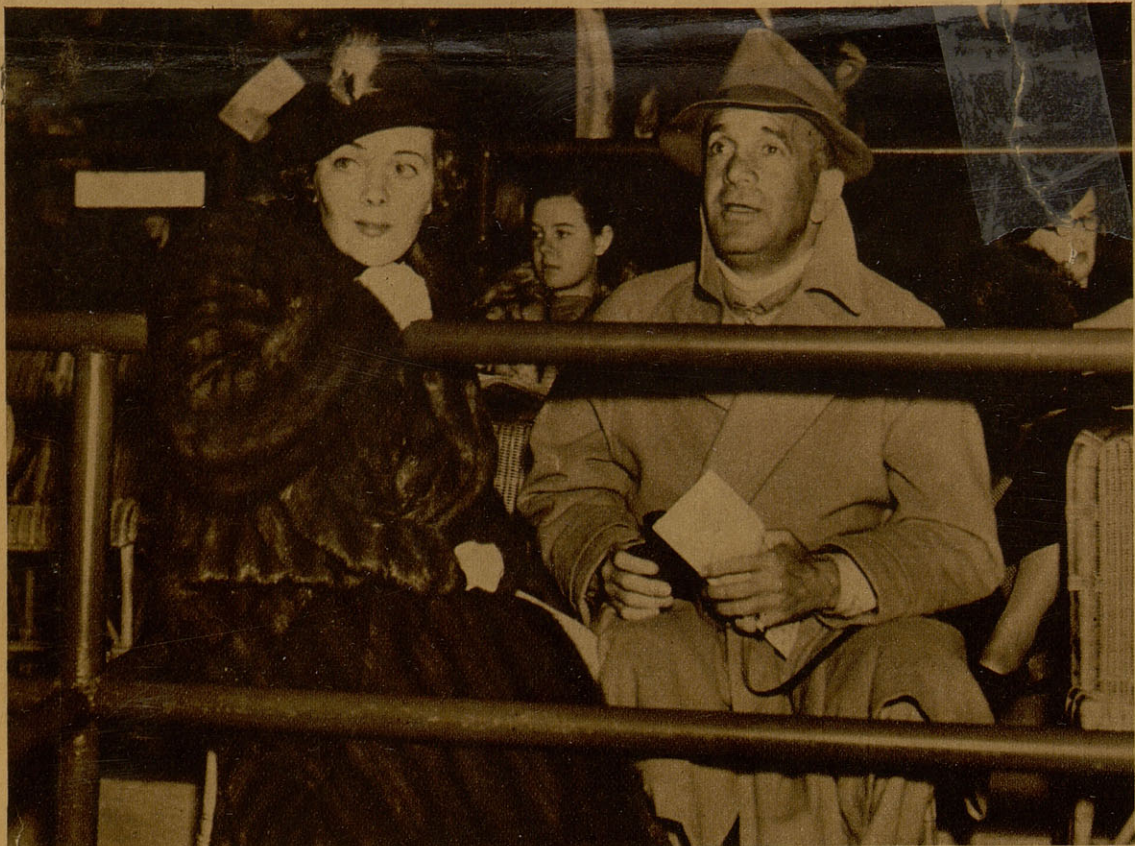
CHANCELLORSVILLE

WITH TWICE THE FORCES UNDER LEE'S COMMAND, Hooker and his Army of the Potomac were disastrously defeated on this sanguinary battlefield by the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia on May 1-4, 1863. "Hooker conceived the plan of cutting off Lee's communication with Rich-

mond with one force and turning his left flank with another. In the . . . battle of Chancellorsville, which was brought on by Lee's divining all of Hooker's plans, the Union commander . . . was forced back across the Rappahannock with the severe loss of over 17,000 men."

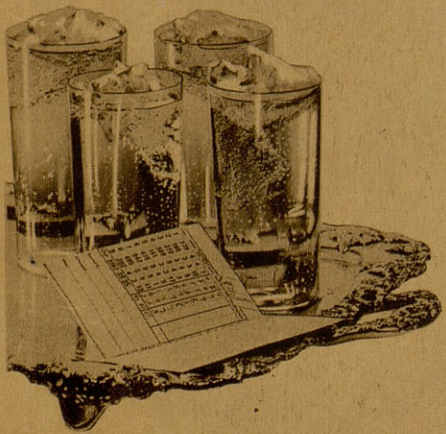

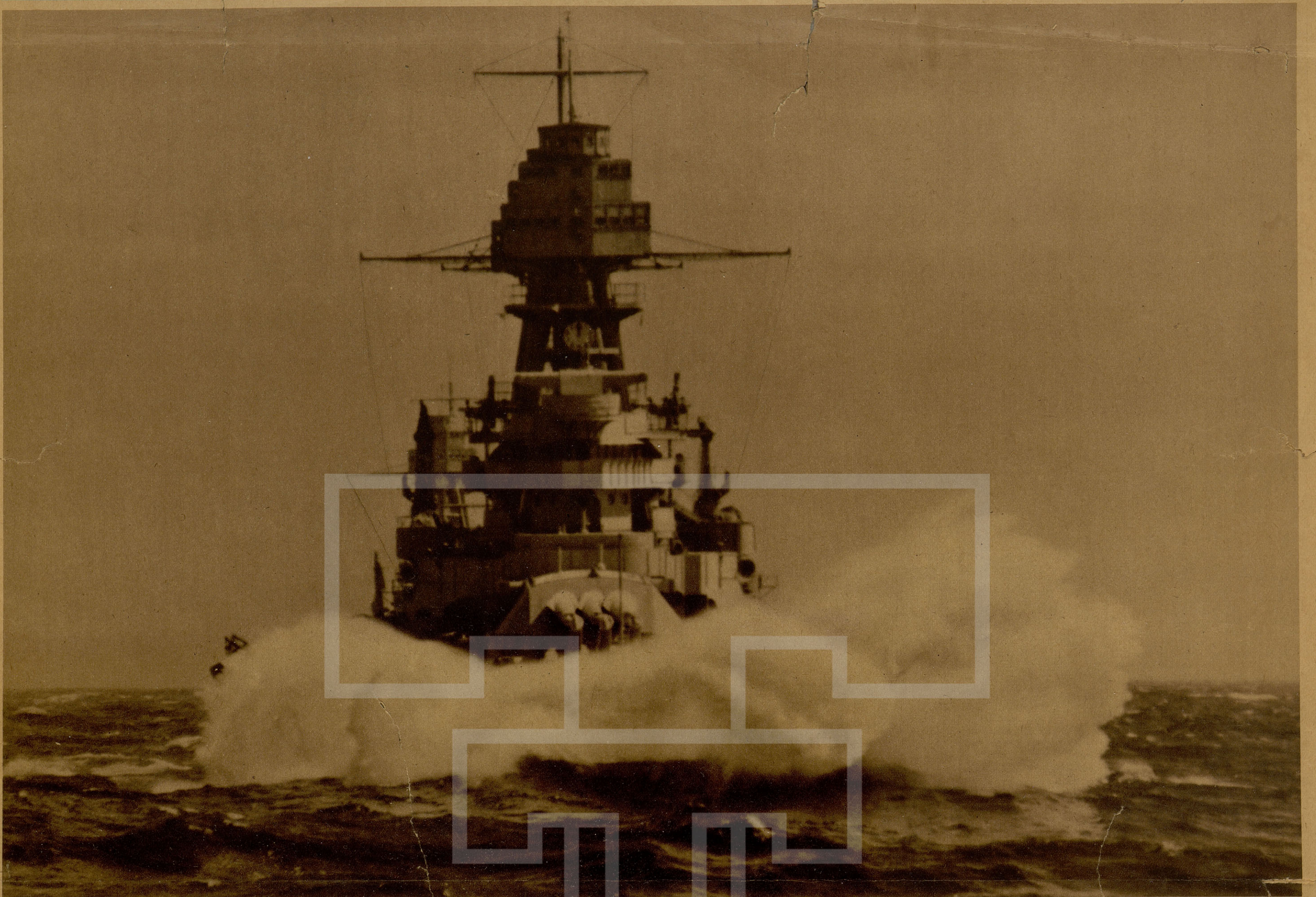

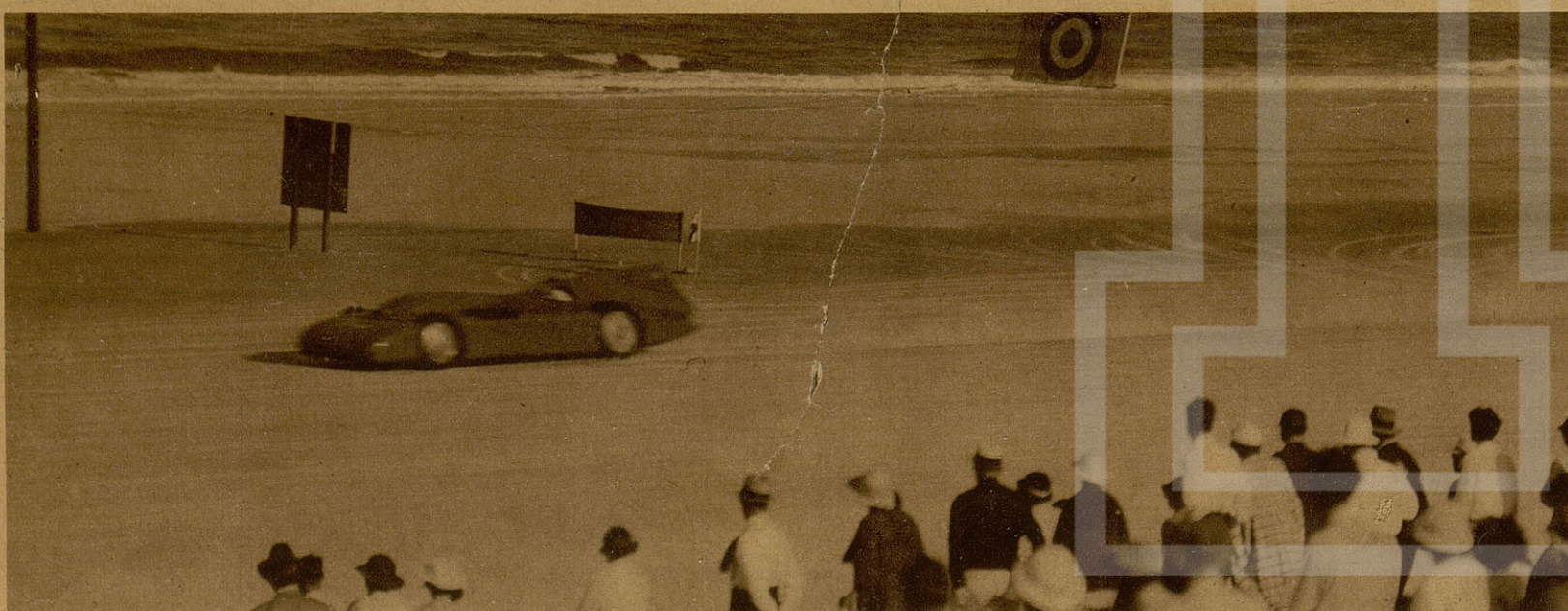
